





Austria's sordid past

VIENNA, Austria - Two anecdotal pieces of evidence speak volumes about Austria's commitment to renounce the ugly anti-Semitism of its past. - A sculptor was obliged to put barbed wire on top of a downtown Vienna memorial to Jews who suffered in Austria in World War II. The barbed wire is supposed to keep the Viennese from defacing the statue.

- Austrian high-school children play stomach-turning video games, including one in which the player is a Nazi concentration camp commandant killing and torturing Jews to earn points. Half a million Austrians cheered when their native son, Adolf Hitler, trium-

phantly entered Vienna in 1938 and annexed Austria to the Third Reich. The echoes of that cheer are still heard. There have been subtle attempts to still it, like the sculpture of the Jewish slave. Jews who were not murdered or sent to concentration camps became slaves in Vienna, the capital city, where their most menial task was to scrub the streets clean, on all fours.

A local sculptor's piece depicting that stooped humiliation was completed for the 50th anniversary of the annexation or "Anschluss." Vandals soon smeared it with paint. Viennese and tourists would use it as a park bench, a trash receptacle or a fire plug for dogs. The sculptor came up with what he

must have thought was a sensitive solution. He put bronzed barbed wire along the back of the bent-over street scrubber, so no one would be tempted to sit on him. The sculptor reasoned, "Barbed wire is the crown of thoms for the Jews.' Never mind that the statue of a persecuted Jew is now wearing a symbol that has come to be associated more with esus Christ than with Jewish history. The Viennese Jewish community had hoped for better treatment, but didn't

necessarily expect it. Not all the bigots are holdovers from Hitler's glory days. The underground video game industry in Austria carries more than 100 racist games. One of the most heinous is "KZ Manager." KZ is the old abbreviation Germans used for concentration camps. The hero of this game is the commandant of the reblinka death camp. His goal is to gas as many prisoners as possible, make money from their labor, steal their gold illings and turn their skin into

Hitler, a native Austrian from the provinces, hung around in Vienna as a vould-be artist and architect when he was young. It was a time of incredible ewish success in the arts and other intelectual pursuits, and Hitler was bothered. "I began to see Jews," he wrote, "and the more I saw, the more sharply they became distinguished in my eyes from the rest of humanity. ... Gradually, I began to hate them."

The current Austrian Chancellor Franz Vranitzky believes that Austrians have not sufficiently confronted their past. Their unwillingness to do that was reflected in their knee-jerk election of Kurt Waldheim as president when he was exposed for lying about his assignment with a German army unit that engaged in war crimes during World War II.

Foremost Nazi hunter Simon Wisenthal, 83, has made his home in Vienna. He estimates that Austrian Nazis, not including Hitler, were responsible for the deaths of 3 million Jews. DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been diagnosed with peripheral neuropathy in my feet. My HMO says only medicine will control the pain, but friends indicate the condition can be treated and cured. I need some help. DEAR READER: Peripheral neuropathy means that the nerves in your feet are not working properly; this can lead to pain, numbness and weakness. Peripheral neuropathy has many causes, the two most common being diabetes and poor circulation. If you have either (or both) of these conditions, you could be helped by methods to improve circulation (such as an operation to unblock the clogged arteries in your legs) or by bringing

your diabetes under control. Health Maintenance Organizations almost always have specialists to help people with complex problems such as yours. I believe you first need an examination by a neurologist to determine which nerves are affected and to what degree. This may require nerve conduction studies and tests to assess nerve function. Also, if appropriate, the neurologist might refer you to a vascular specialist in

In the event your HMO does not have the necessary specialists, your doctor can refer you to the appropriate resources outside the HMO. While HMOs don't like to do this (because it reduces profits), such referrals are

sometimes necessary for proper patient care.

Once you have established the cause(s) of your neuropathy, you and your doctor can decide on which treatment would be most suitable for you. Although medicine may be your best option, your friends are correct that many forms of neuropathy are curable — once the cause of the nerve malfunction is identified.

DEAR DR. GOTT: As a teen-ager I had a rash on my body, in my mouth and above my lips. Now when I open my mouth the skin splits and becomes raw. Could this be

DEAR READER: Any rash, in theory, could be lupus, a common autoimmune (self-allergy) disease affecting the skin and, often, the joints, lungs, heart and kidneys; lupus is diagnosed by blood tests and biopsy.
