

## Sexist job titles exasperate Abby

DEAR READERS: Most occupational and public office titles originated when only men performed these jobs. Today, women are involved in all occupations, making sex-labeled titles discriminatory

Occupational titles should describe the job - not the person doing the job. Some examples: Forget "lady doctor" - she is a doctor (who happens to be a woman).

No more "woman lawyer" - she is a lawyer. Forget "waitress" - the correct form is waiter or ser

### No more "meter maid" - meter attendant is correct. An "authoress" is simply an author.

A "housewife" is now properly called a homemaker Perhaps it won't surprise you that these updated terms come from "The Practical Guide to Non-Sexist Language," courtesy of the National Organization for Nomen in St. Louis, Mo.

While the titles "Miss" and "Mrs." originally were used to distinguish female children from adult women, the titles identify marital status: A "Mrs." is married, a "Miss" is not.

The dissatisfaction of many women with this labelin system led eventually to the use of "Ms." (The American Heritage Dictionary defines "Ms." as "a title of courtesy used before a woman's surname, without regard to her marital status.")

A woman's professional or academic title take precedence over a social title: Chancellor Jane Roe, or Jane Roe, Ph.D., not Ms. Jane Roe, And when writing a memorandum to one's office

staff, it is correct to say, "Everyone is expected to do the (not his) job well." Finally, as the guide notes, "Neither sex has a

## Therapy linked to eye ailments

DEAR DR. GOTT: In 1988 my doctor prescribed adioactive iodine to control my over-active thyroid. I'm presently taking Synthroid daily. Can anything be done to prevent my eyeballs from bulging?

DEAR READER: Based on the limited information your provide, I conclude that you had Graves' disease prominent eyes associated with an overactive thyroid gland) that was-treated with radioactive iodine in 1988: this was followed by an underactive thyroid condition for which you have been prescribed thyroid hormone

Hyperthyroidism (thyroid overactivity) is treated in three ways: radioactive iodine (which destroys overfunctioning thyroid tissue), surgery (which removes part of it) or medicine (which prevents the excess formation of thyroid hormone).

The first two methods are quite effective - but they are permanent. Also, it's often difficult for the doctor to judge how much radioactive iodine to administer or how much of the gland to remove. Thus, a major complication may be over-treatment, which leaves the patient with hypothyroidism (thyroid under-activity) that must be indefinitely treated with supplemental thyroid replacement. To make matters worse, the eye symptoms of Graves' disease may worsen after successful treatment. The reasons for this are not precisely known and there is no test to determine which patients will experience this un-predictable, iatrogenic (physician-induced) complication. On the other hand, therapy with medicine is not necessarily permanent; in fact, the dose of medication (such as Tapazole) can be altered to prevent increased exophthalmos (eye-bulging). This is why I never recommend surgery or radioactive iodine in patients with Graves' disease until I am sure that the exophthalmos doesn't in-

crease after drug therapy. There are two possible reasons for your problem: Either you have post-treatment exophthalmos, as I men-tioned, or your hyperthyroidism was not brought under

control with the radioactive iodine. You should have blood tests to evaluate your thyroid function. If the tests indicate your thyroid is overactive, you should stop the Synthroid and undergo further therapy for Graves' disease.

If, on the other hand, the tests confirm normal thyroid function, attention can be directed to your eyes. In this instance, the temporary use of cortisone often reduces th exophthalmos - but you will need close supervision by and advice from) an eye specialist.





Critics have remarked that "Northern Exposure" is "quirky," "eclectic," and "enchantingly weird."

In addition to sounding like "Twin Peaks" regurgitation, calling "Northern Exposure" quirky and eclectic does about as much justice to its layered nuances as describing the Grand Canyon as big.

It's funny, but it's not a comedy, It's serious, but not a drama. It's a series with recurring plot lines, but

it's not a soap opera. It is, to paraphrase co-executive producer Joshua Brand, the kind of place where a resident could tell his neighbor that he's fallen in love with a cow. After some initial skepticism, the man and his bovine lover would become just another accepted fact of life.

In "Northern Exposure," said Brand, "The only thing that people are judgmental about is when people are intentionally cruel or hurtful." And it is, with little doubt, a hit

for CBS this season. The show premiered last summer as a replacement series, earning glowing reviews but mediocre ratings. When the network brought it back this spring for another trial and broadcast it on Mondays at 10 p.m. (right after the highly rated "Murphy Brown and "Designing Women), its viewership soared.

In its new time slot, "Northern Exposure" rarely fell below the Nielsen top 30 list. The last episode of its current run aired this week. CBS will announce its fall schedule May 29 and the makers of "Northern Exposure" aren't too

worried about being picked up for the 1991-92 season. "What I've been surprised by is the outpouring of genuine interest," Brand said. "This is the first time that we've gotten this kind of unadulterated good will. People are

swooning." Brand and John Falsey, the creators and executive producers of "Northern Exposure," also created "St. Elsewhere" and "A Year in the Life," two critically acclaimed shows that bent the parameters of formula television. The shelf life of the latter program, however, proved to be not as long as its title.

The premise of "Northern Exposure" is the journey of Dr. Joel Fleischman to a remote village in the Alaska wildemess. Fleischman, recently graduated from New York's Columbia University Medical School, must practice in the tiny Alaska town to repay that state for

financing his education. Once there, he is mired in culture shock. The 62-year-old tavern owner has an 18-year-old girlfriend. The local disc jockey reads "War and Peace" excerpts. The entire town congregates in the middle of afternoon to eat borsht and knock back pepper vodka when an old Russian friend drops in.

Brand and Falsey said they had little trouble interesting CBS in the series - although, they admit, network executives might have expected something a little different than what they got.

## Senator eschews PACS

WASHINGTON - Sen. Bob Pack wood, R-Ore., knows how to corral campaign money as well as anyone in the Senate. Yet he now manages to raise multimillion dollar war chests without taking a penny from big-business politi-

Packwood has refined the fund-raising science of what some would call juni mail. He sends letters to strangers across the country soliciting contributions to his re-election campaign. Packwood has mastered wallet-limbering solicitations. that begin with this line:

"Dear Friend. Please forgive the informal nature of this letter, but it is late in the evening, and my secretary already has gone home. What I want to discus with you is Israel's future. It simply could not wait until morning."

As the reader visualizes hunt-and-peck Packwood at his typewriter, the three-page letter continues: "Instead of spending all my time raising money for my own re-election campaign, I'd prefer to devote my time and energies to protect-

ing and defending the security of Israel!" The letter contains 10 conspicuously crossed-out typographical errors and concludes with: "Whether you give \$25 or \$250 today isn't nearly as important to me as knowing I can depend on you as a special, caring friend."

The image of the earnest, hardworking late-at-his-desk senator apparently works, Packwood has already raised \$1.9 million through direct mail for the 1992 campaign. His re-election campaign has sent out a total of 52 different mailings since Oregon re-elected him for a fourth six-year term in 1986.

In the process, Packwood believes he is taking the higher ground in campaign fund raising. He has forsworn all PAC most certainly have sent two more liberal aspire to something like the "common- seems extremely unlikely that it could be money" stigma. He argues that he is "not taking special interest money" now, but just soliciting help from his supporters across the country.

> Packwood may have an admirable aversion to PACs, but he has little compunction about playing to people's emotions. In one letter to a carefully selected audience, Packwood laments the consequences of being a "staunch friend" of

"Over the years, I've become a kind of lightning rod for the political opposition. Each time I run for re-election, I attract powerful, well-financed opponents deter-mined to bring about my defeat."

Rep. Peter DeFazio, D-Ore., told our associate Jim Lynch that the claim was "blatantly deceptive" and "ridiculous." In 1986, Packwood outspent his rival by more than a 100 to one (\$6.5 million to his opponent's \$64,000). In 1980, Packwood outspent his opponent almost 10 to one. In his 1974 re-election bid it was

A Packwood spokesperson explained that the 1986 opponent was considered "powerful" and that the senator's upcoming, yet-to-be-named foe, was expected to be "well-financed."

Last year, Packwood voted against egislation that would have set campaign pending limits on candidates. The neasure passed the Senate, but the House dorged it. A similar bill is on deck this vear. It puts campaign finance limits for senators on a sliding scale with the population of their states. If it passes, an Oregca senator would be limited to a maximum of \$1,990,848 on a Senate

Packwood says he hopes to raise at least \$5 million for his 1992 campaign, and expects to attract 150,000 to 250,000 contributors through the mail. He will stick to the patented formula. A Packwood spokesperson explains the senator writes the first draft of the solicitations, then a direct-mail professional re-writes them. In the case of the "late in the evening" letter, it was sent out in its original form, straight from Packwood's typewriter. His spokesperson noted that the letter was written at 11 p.m. and that Packwood is "not a very good typist."

In the meantime, the midnight oil being burned in the Capitol building means that Oregon's senior senator is at his typewriter - no doubt his secretary fast asleep at home.
