The July 11 eclipse will be at least partially visible throughout the United States, except for Alaska and northern New England. As much as two-thirds to three-quarters of the sun will be darkened over the southwestern United

States for a period during the afternoon. Better yet for research, the path of complete blackout will begin earlier in the day right over a Hawaiian mountain - Mauna Kea - that fairly bristles with space observatories and equipment.



Laos POWs sought

WASHINGTON - Dennis Daily of Hubert, N.C., took his ministerial credentials to Laos recently and made an interesting offer - \$1 million in development aid to the Lao government in trade for a small favor. As soon as the government found out what the favor was, "The next day, members of the Lao secret police were at my doorstep interrogating me," Daily told us.

What Daily wanted for his \$1 million was the return of a single live prisoner of war from the Vietnam War. He wasn't promising money only to the govern-ment. He also offered \$100,000 to anyone who turned a live POW over to a Lao Buddhist monastery, and another \$100,000 to the monastery that took care of the prisoner So far, no one has taken him up on the

offer, but his trip to Laos was an eyeopener anyway. He said he got no help from the Lao government and was stonewalled by the U.S. Embassy.

Daily is a minister in paperwork only. A longtime advocate for POWs and MIAs, he started a church and obtained some credentials so he would have an entree into Laos. The reward money was raised among other POW advocacy groups. "We felt the religious route was the only way to go," Daily said. "Government efforts have produced nothing."

The U.S. military has known since the end of the war that Laos did not return the prisoners it claimed it had then. More than 500 American servicemen are listed as missing in Laos. The Lao and U.S. governments have made some token attempts to excavate old airplane crash sites. But that cooperation has not come without a price.

The Lao government charges the American taxpayers a fortune to sift through those crash sites. One government investigator told our associate Melinda Maas that the costs run as high as \$1 million per site. One bill we saw showed that the Lao government charged the United States \$190,547 just to rent a helicopter for a mission to one site.

Of the 253 crash sites known to exist in Laos, only 13 have been excavated and 37 bodies of missing Americans have been accounted for in the process. That isn't much to show for two decades of work and untold millions of dollars.

It is small wonder then that there are people who don't trust the American government to do the job right, and who attempt to do it themselves. Daily found that it is next to impossible for an American to visit the Lao countryside uninvited. To travel just one hour outside Vientiane requires the permission of the government and the company of a guide. There are some 60 crash sites in northern Laos, but the northern provinces along the Chinese border are closed to out-

Since 1973, the Pentagon has insisted that there is no evidence that any POWs are alive in all of Indochina, but a recent investigation by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee shows that the Pentagon's conclusion is built on sand. There have been 1,400 reports of sightings of live American servicemen i Southeast Asia since the war, but the Pentagon has found merit in none of them. In fact, the Senate investigator concluded that the Pentagon has made it a practice of debunking all sighting reports and manipulating information.

The man who, until last month, ran the Pentagon's Special Office for POWS and MIAs, did nothing to boost the govern-ment's case. Army Col. Millard A. Peck resigned that post saying the office engaged in "damage limitation," and "busy work." He said, "Rarely has there been any effective, active follow-through on any of the sightings. ... I feel strongly that this issue is being manipulated and controlled at a higher level, not with the goal of resolving it, but more to obfuscate the question of live prisoners, and give the illusion of progress through hyperactivity.

Mini-Editorial

A recent study by the Kettering Foundation found that Americans think their own democratic policy process has been taken out of their hands. The most disturbing finding was that people feel like the media is part of the problem because

it has become a member of the inner circle - out of touch with middle America, dishing out only trivial coverage of political issues. The people don't own the media as they own their government, but that does not mean Americans are helpless to shape the na-ture of political coverage in their communities. Newspapers and broadcast stations are businesses, and when they hear from enough of their customers, they make changes. It is not too late to shape the coverage of the 1992 presidential election by letting your local media know what you expect.



Pain calls for a real physical

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm losing faith in my doctor. I have severe aches and pains in my legs, especially at night. I had active ulcers a few years ago and also ex-perience stomach pain. All my doctor does is write out prescriptions, and he hasn't even given me a real physical. What would you suggest?

DEAR READER: A real physical. After taking a detailed medical history, a doctor should perform a complete physical examination on any patient with symptoms, such as pain. Then, appropriate testing can be considered.

Your stomach pains could be due to recurrent peptic ulcers. These are diagnosed by an upper GI series (Xrays of your upper gastrointestinal tract). Such X-rays would also indicate hiatal hernia and gastritis, two common conditions that cause symptoms similar to those from ulcers.


The medical history may enable the doctor to differen-tiate the many causes of abdominal pain. An examination will further narrow the possibilities. For example, heart disease is sometimes associated with abdominal pain, as is aortic aneurysm (swelling of the aorta) and "intestinal angina" (lack of blood supply to the bowel). These conditions can often be discovered during examination

without the need for expensive testing. Similarly, the cause of your leg aches could be diagnosed by a meticulous examination, during which the doctor checks the pulses in your lower extremities and assesses circulation to the muscles. Perhaps you have arteriosclerotic obstruction of the arteries to your intestine AND to your legs, with resulting symptoms. Unfortunately, in the medical profession, familiarity may lead to carelessness. If your doctor has known you for many years he or she may engage in time-saving shortcuts: less listening to your complaints and less ex-amining. Even if your doctor is familiar with you, you still deserve a suitable examination. Ask for one, or request a referral to another physician.


