Society New Home of Olympian Runner Joe McCluskey's Artifacts

The Society is pleased to announce a generous donation by the family of Manchester native and Olympian Joe McCluskey (1911-2002). The collection includes records of Joe's successes, medals, photos, and diaries that document the story of the youngster from Manchester who made his way to the Track and Field Hall of Fame. Athlete, coach, family man, and Navy veteran, Joe was famous for his drive, his good nature, his smile, and his love of his hometown.

The collection is in the process of being catalogued, and will eventually be on display. Copies will be made of the newspaper clippings and other documents, and these archives will eventually be available for researchers. Some of the photos have been digitized, and a book about Joe is in the works.

Joe trained with Coach Pete Wigren at Manchester High School, ran for Fordham University in the Bronx, won a bronze medal in the 1932 Olympics, and coached at the N.Y. Athletic Club. He won 25 national titles in distance events, capturing the steeplechase title a record nine times between 1930 and 1943.

It was Joe's older brother, John, who won the very first Manchester Road Race, a Thanksgiving Day event that began in 1927, before Joe was old enough to run. Joe went on to set records in the race in 1930, 1931, and 1932, and 15 years later made a stunning comeback, winning the race at age of 36 – the oldest man ever to win. According to the late Earl Yost, Manchester Herald sports editor, "McCluskey valued the win as much as his national championships and three selections on the United States Olympic team." Other sportswriters called Joe "the all-time track great," "the distance sensation," and "the outstanding runner of the East." Joe was instrumental in reviving the Road Race after its hiatus from 1935 to 1944; by bringing his world-class running to the race, he attracted other track stars.

Mark's significant influence will be felt at the Homestead for years to come. His exceptional dedication to preserving the building, artifacts, and grounds is evident to all of the new Homestead Committee members. The committee is especially appreciative of the meticulous records he maintained and it will preserve his legacy by continuing to implement his work plans for the continued maintenance and preservation of the Homestead. He retired from the position of Committee Chair last year.

Long Forgotten Turkey Day Race Rediscovered!

Records of the history of Manchester's Thanksgiving Day Road Race indicate that the first race was held in 1927 and continued every year through 1934. There was a 10-year hiatus until 1945, when the Thanksgiving Day tradition was revived with eight runners, including hometown favorite Charlie Robbins, who later became well known for running barefoot. The race has been run every year since then without interruption.

A few weeks ago Diane Owens donated her father's scrapbook to the museum. Her father, John Pasek, was a cross-country runner for Manchester High School, Class of 1939. The scrapbook contains clippings from the Manchester Evening Herald, including one from Friday, November 25, 1938. That clipping reported on the previous day's cross-country race, stating that it was "revived as a Thanksgiving Day sports feature after a lapse of three years." Third place went to Wes Robbins, younger brother of Charlie Robbins. Wes was a high school sophomore, originally from Manchester, but had recently moved to Providence, RI. He ran as a member of the East Side Boys' Club, finishing first on that team. Wes now lives in Bolton.

David Heatley served in France during World War II and was stationed in Texas for a while. He remained there after the war, raising a family who are still there. Dave died in 1999. Bob Doggart also served in WWII and attended UConn after the war, graduating as a mechanical engineer. He lived in Coventry for many years and now lives in Glastonbury.

We do not have any photographs of that race, and there were none in the Manchester Evening Herald. If anyone has a picture of the 1938 Road Race (or any of the races before WWII) we would like to make copies of them. Please contact us.

Reportedly, this race has been dismissed as not part of the traditional series of races because it was run on a shorter course than previous and subsequent Turkey Day races. The officially recognized races have all been run on a course measuring nearly 5 miles, while the 1938 race was only 3.1 miles long. The course was south on Main St., east on Charter Oak, north on Autumn, west on Oak, north on Spruce, west on Pearl and south on Main to the finish line.

For this race there were 16 runners, all of whom finished the race. The winner was David Heatley, of Manchester High School who finished the race in 16:38. There were 10 other entrants from the high school and five entrants from the East Side Boys' Club. The second-place finisher was m m m

Bob Doggart, also of the high school team, who stayed with Heatley throughout the whole course and provided a very exciting finish by crossing the line only one foot behind the winner!

"One-Time Only" Law **Allows You to Contribute** to the Society Using IRA **Distributions**

The Pension Protection Act of 2006 permits donors age 70 or older to make charitable gifts of up to \$100,000 in 2007 directly from a traditional or Roth IRA to 501(c)3 nonprofit organizations. This is a one-time allowance that ends 12/31/07just in time for you to make a 2007 gift to the Society.

Those who are eligible and interested in taking advantage of this gift-giving opportunity should speak with their financial advisor immediately. The rules do not allow amounts to be withdrawn by the IRA account owner and then forwarded to the Society. You will need to request a check payable to the Manchester Historical Society.

Upon death, IRA accounts are subject to up to 79% taxes, comprised of income and estate taxes. To whom would you rather give your money?

Celebrate the new year on January 1 with a walking tour of the downtown area. The stroll along Main Street will take a deeper look at often-seen but unnoticed historic buildings, dating from the turn of the last century, with their parapets, cornices, and unusual brickwork.

In early February, a walking tour of the Town Center, kicking off at Town Hall, is planned. We will view and hear commentary on Lincoln School, the old Post Office, Masonic Temple, Orange Hall, and Probate Court.

In early March, Town Clerk Joe Camposeo will lead the Midtown walking tour, starting at the old Hollister School and covering about 1.5 miles.

These are great opportunities to learn about different parts of Manchester—as well as take off some of those extra holiday pounds!
