Celebrate Pride in Manchester with the Society

Pride in Manchester week kicks off on June 2 and culminates with Heritage Day, on June 9. The Society is hosting or co-hosting a number of events throughout the week that will take participants all over town in recognizing Manchester's rich history. Some of the many events include:

- Saturday, June 2, 9 a.m.–12 p.m., **Family History Day**, at Town Hall (41 Center St.), where genealogists will be available to discuss researching family histories.
- Saturday, June 2, 1 p.m., Connecticut Trails Day Family
 Walk on a railtrail in the center of Manchester, an easy walk
 along part of the former Cheney railroad, built in 1869,
 which connected the Cheney silk mills to the main rail line
 in the North End. At 2.5 miles, it was the longest private
 railroad in the United States. Meet behind 2 Main Street,
 Farr's store.
- Sunday, June 3, 5 p.m., Wickham Park Family Hike at Wickham Park's Bird Sanctuary (rain or shine). Children and their parents are invited on a walk at this 250-acre historic park. Susan Barlow will lead this vigorous 1-1/4 hour walk. Meet at Wickham Park's Beech Grove parking lot (ask park guard for directions). The \$4 park-entry fee will be waived for those who bring a copy of this announcement. Wickham Park is located at 1329 West Middle Tpke.
- Monday, June 4, at 5:30 p.m., a family walk at Center
 Springs Park. Hike leaders will comment on history of 55-acre urban park during this approximately one-mile hike.

Prêt-à-Porter in the Silk City



Earlier this month nearly 200 people endured hot spotlights on a steamy evening to enjoy the Silk City Runway Project, a colorful and fun event showcasing the designs of Jennifer Stern and featuring WFSB morning news anchorperson Irene O'Connor (at podium) as emcee. A new exhibit was debuted that displayed some of the many fashions created by the Cheney Brothers silk mills, and there was also a silent auction. With wine, hors d'oeuvres by Café Lafayette, and numerous home-made gourmet desserts available, the event was a feast for the eyes as well as the taste buds. More importantly, it raised several thousand dollars for the Society.

Members of the Loom Interpretation Project met in April to report on progress and to establish new goals for a permanent exhibit of the Scalamandré looms located in the History Center.

Several subcommittees reported their findings:

John Lawler updated the group on Building and Grounds, and invites ALL to participate in the Thursday night group (6 p.m.) or in day-time work during the summer on Tuesday mornings. Volunteers are needed even if they're not mechanically inclined. There are jobs for all—even work that can be done sitting down. Much progress has been made in the loom room.

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John Carter informed the group about the Exhibit Committee's meeting. He emphasized that although the loom exhibit will be a permanent exhibit, the Society should set up revolving, related exhibits in the loom room and elsewhere in the building, which will encourage visitors to return. The committee agreed that the looms should not be moved into the loom room until that room has been fully prepared. In the meantime, the committee will study the floor plan of the loom room and take precise measurements of all the machinery and other items slated to be

moved there.

Regarding research, Brenda Paullo reported on the finding of 1838, a Cheney Brothers newsletter published in the 1920s and 1930s. (The year 1838 is the date of the Cheney Brothers' first mill, which was built on Hop Brook.) Several volunteers will help inventory numerous items that can be used in the loom exhibit. The Society also was awarded a grant for cataloguing and accession work.

Carole Walden reported the completion of a project to scan, organize, and annotate a collection of Cheney Brothers fashion images and stereoscopic photos of mill operations. John Spaulding was instrumental in this task, and Carole, Mary Dunne, and Dave Smith also worked on this project. The images can be used for other educational and artistic purposes besides the loom exhibit.

Susan Barlow reported on a meeting she had had with Paula Viscogliosi, Chair of Friends of the Looms, about fundraising opportunities. They discussed designing a brochure, creating incentives for donors

(such as permanent plaques with donors' names), and "anchoring" a grand opening/fundraising event in May each year, beginning in May 2008. Paula Viscogliosi also offered help with the web site, through her design business in New York.

On other matters, Tanyss Ludescher led a discussion about arranging for a carpooling trip to the Millyard Museum in Manchester, NH, on June 16. Those interested should contact Tanyss as soon as possible.

To coincide with the Town's Heritage Day, June 9, the Society will invite the public to view the looms; this treat will be in addition to the Cheney Hall exhibit, and the openings at the Homestead, Keeney Schoolhouse, History Center, and Old Manchester Museum. Marshall Lamenzo, Michael Nimirowski, John Carter, and Joe Lawler will stand by at the Forest Street entrance.

We Will Miss...

The Society regrets the recent passing of several of its valued members.

Last October, **Alice Farley Williams**, 96, passed away in Washington, D.C. Great-granddaughter of Frank Cheney, Alice published *Silk & Guns: Life of a Connecticut Yankee, Frank Cheney, 1817-1904*, in 1996. A native of New York City and a graduate from Vassar and Columbia, Alice spent a great deal of time researching the book in Manchester; in fact, she donated her research materials to the Society after she published the book.

Manchester native and life-long resident **Helen S. (Adamson) McHugh**, 86, passed away in February. Wife of John H. McHugh, Sr., Helen was a Society member for many years, and worked at Pioneer Parachute in town, and other places in Hartford.

A long-time champion of Manchester organizations and an active member of the town's government and community, **Eleanor** (**Dwyer**) Coltman, 91, passed away in May. A World War II veteran and Manchester resident for over 50 years, Eleanor was instrumental in the creation of Manchester Community College, and a dedicated volunteer and guest lecturer for the Society. The Historical Society will miss these special individuals.



Learn How To Collect Oral Histories

Board Director Susan Barlow will lead a workshop on collecting oral histories Sunday, May 27, 1-3 p.m., at the History Center.

Susan, who heads the Society's oral history project, will teach participants about historic "storytelling" and the basics of interviewing techniques and the logistics of transcribing interviews. Many of the techniques covered can be used by participants in creating their own historical memoirs. Carole Walden discovered some of the catalogue images; Society curator Dave Smith tracked down several more lavish images from the Cheney catalogues (about 40 altogether); John Spaulding photographed them; and Mary Dunne chose over a dozen to be printed, mounted, and laminated for the Cheney Silks exhibit during the recent fashion show. Childhood Memories of E.L. Bidwell (1859-1932)

The Society will present an intriguing booklet of the experiences of Edward Lincoln Bidwell. As a child growing up in the 1860s, E.L. roamed the woods and fields, attended the old South School, met Civil War veterans, and enjoyed many old-fashioned activities with friends and classmates. In his later years, E.L. wrote about his schoolboy days, and these memories were published as columns in the *Manchester Herald* in 1921.

Customs and Incidents of Early Days in Manchester – Reminiscences about a South Manchester Boyhood in the Post-Civil War Era will contain reprints of those columns, with vintage and contemporary photographs. The booklet is being compiled, edited, and designed by Brenda Paullo, Roberta Lusa, and Susan Barlow, with assistance from other volunteers and members of the Society. The booklet will be ready this fall, in a limited printing.

This booklet will join several other small-format local-history publications available for sale at the Society's gift shops, such as: Self-Guided Historical Walking tour of East Cemetery, by John Spaulding; From Warsaw to Manchester, Talking with Helen Kopman, by Susan Barlow; and Vet Haven and Related Tales, by Susan Barlow.

Look to the Skies

A Roof Over Our Heads

Pending the town's Planning and Zoning approval, the Society will soon commence its roof replacement of the History Center on Pine Street. Allied Roofing is scheduled to replace the roof by June 30, which will include uncovering the skylights over the future loom room. The skylights have been covered up for over 30 years, and their restoration will shed fresh light into the History Center.

According to Executive Director Mary Dunne, the roof replacement "is the key to all of our future plans," which include setting up the looms in their permanent location and ultimately relocating the contents of the Old Manchester Museum.

This major project was made possible from a \$200,000 Saving America's Treasures matching grant, an award sponsored by the federal government.
