

COST OF OUR SCHOOLS.

According to statistical tables published in the annual report of the they were old and experienced enough State Board of Education, Manchester ranks sixteenth among the towns of the state in population, and seventeenth in the number of children of school age. The educational expenses per child enumerated amounted last year to \$15.47. In the amount expended for each child enumerated Manchester stands 24th in a list of 168. Based on actual attendance, however, our ratio is much lower. The average attendance in our schools unusually large considering the imber of children enumerated. Thile by enumeration we stand sevnteenth in the list, by actual attendance we stand 13th. Therefore the cost per child in school is a good deal less, compared with other towns, than the cost per child enumerated. There are 75 towns in the state which expended more last year for each child in school than did Manchester.

It cost on the average \$20.83 to give with her husband and family from every child in Manchester schools the instruction he or she received last year. In Hartford it cost \$37.83 per pupil; in New Haven \$27,26; in Putnam \$24.10; in Bristol \$25.87. FOOD ADULTERATION.

The Connecticut food law, which has been in effect since 1896, has resulted in an improvement of the quality of the food products sold in this state. The law provides that the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station shall make analyses of food products on sale in Connecticut suspected of being adulterated.
