Baldwin Gives Broad Outlines of Program

Designed to Keep Connecticut in Forefront Industrially as Peace Production Resumed.

Hartford, Jan. 2.—(AP)—With the conviction that "winning a military victory and planning for the post-war world are inseparable tasks," Gov. Raymond E. Baldwin sketched to the new General Assembly today the broad outlines of a program designed to keep Connecticut in the forefront industrially when it turns from war to peace production.

"Connecticut has forged ahead in war production," said the chief executive in his inaugural message after being sworn in for his third two-year term. "When peace comes, she must go ahead in peace production too."

He gave an inkling of what the legislators can expect in his budget message on highway financing when he remarked: "We will have to give attention to providing a more systematic method of financing highway construction and maintenance in the future than we have in the past."

He proposed also integration of all courts; establishment of a state recreation commission; renewal of emergency war powers for at least another year and possibly two; steps to "bring in targeted" including "better financial returns for all our agricultural products, particularly milk"; measures to develop and expand our national industries and other benefits for returning veterans; consolidation of four state agencies now dealing with various phases of aviation into a single commission on aviation; election law changes, chief among them a constitutional amendment providing for a complete and free opportunity to exercise his choice for any one of several candidates on the respective party tickets separately.

Church Is Left \$42,380 in Will

Local Interest in News Because Pastor Is a Manchester Native

Edward J. Wall, president of the Community Sales company of Concord, Mass., formerly a resident of this town, and Herald subscriber, enclosed in a letter of greeting received today by Publisher Thomas Ferguson clipping from a Boston paper which Mr. Wall thought his readers in Manchester would be interested in. It is in regard to Rev. Laurence L. Barber who was the pastor of the Orthodox Congregational church of Arlington, Rev. Laurence Barber was born in Manchester, the son of the late Rev. Clarence H. Barber, who was pastor of the Second Congregational church for 20 years, assuming the pastorate in 1886. Mr. Wall in his letter to Mr. Ferguson characterized the latter as "a wonderfully good man."

On the Diplomatic Front

Over the New Year week end one grave United Nations problem came to what should be a fair solution.

This was the problem of civil war in Greece.

Mr. Churchill's courageous trip to Athens apparently put its biggest dividend in opening his own eyes to the fact that the Greeks were not merely the brigands and guerrillas he had previously imagined them to be, but the symbols of the aspirations of a free people for a clean chance to develop their own idea of political freedom in the wake of this war.

At any rate, his own eyes were turned to London was to "permeate" the exiled Greek king to the creation of a regency and the assumption of the post of regent by Archbishop Damaskinos is the beginning of the solution the King himself professed to want.

Mr. Churchill's visit to Greece themselves. Allied statesmanship, by being big enough to admit and repair error, appears before the world in a better and healthier light.

If it is the right kind of thing which has happened in the Greek situation, there is no such small creation of extreme position visible in the Polish crisis.

When the Moscow-sponsored Lublin Government proclaimed itself the provisional government of Poland, that represented Stalin's continuing determination to force his own complete victory in a situation where he has never shown one ounce of possible compromise. Regardless of the confused issues of the Polish question, the method of solution chosen by Stalin is that "might makes right." That is exactly the creed this war is being fought on.

Against this kind of policy from Stalin, there is obviously no opposition possible from within totalitarian Russia itself. There is no Russian public opinion to be appealed to, as there is in the case of Hitler to reconsider, as Mr. Churchill felt compelled to reconsider on Greece.

Now has British public opinion, on this issue, manifested any intense effort to force Mr. Churchill to change his position, which is the present statement from London is that Britain will not formally recognize the Lublin Government "at this time," which indicates that it will, sooner or later.

This leaves American diplomacy as the only formal opposition to Stalin's policy with Poland. Secretary of State Stettinius announces that we will continue to recognize the London Polish Government as the legal representative of Poland.

In this American diplomacy has a continuing and consistent aim. It is not to outlive or oppose any particular Polish government. It is committed to the idea that the solution of this problem should be arrived at through international negotiation in which the Polish people themselves should be treated as equals of the Russian people, not as helpless victims who could be ignored.

How far we will get, or will not get, with an aim and hope seemingly so far from the face of Stalin's dictatorial determination in the weeks and months ahead, determine everything about the course of the European war and the prospect for an organized peace to follow it.

It is possible that we can never with the European war conclusive, by without those Russian armies, Stalin commands, and apparently commands to advance only when his diplomatic, and territorial prices have been met. It is equally doubtful that we can ever see a lasting peace on the basis of a fashioning power, politician, or the unhappy dilemma that with no happy solution in sight.

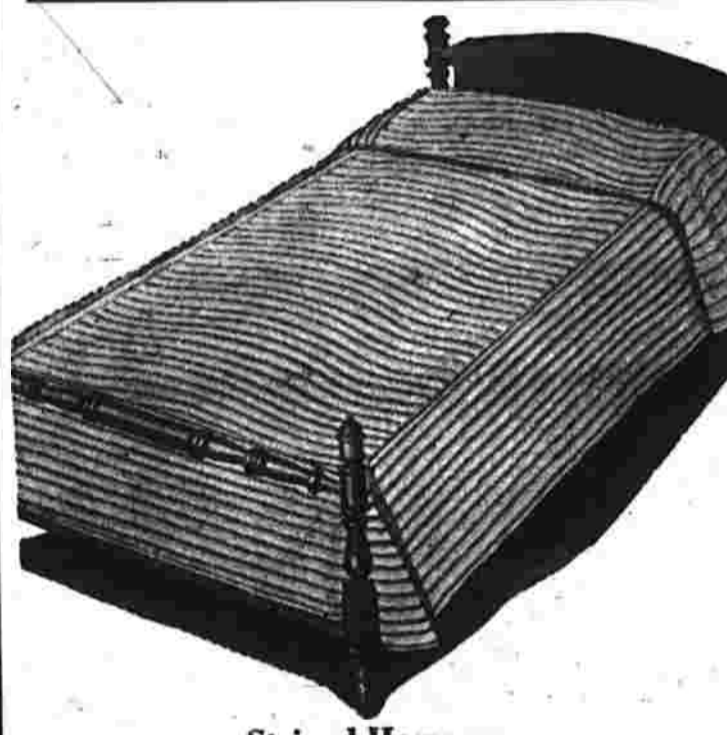
