Francis T. Maloney

The respect in which Senator Francis T. Maloney was held by his own state and by his Washington colleagues transcended party.

That was no accident, nor was it the result of any effort on his part to push himself forward into personal popularity. It was directly the result of the fact that his own public service so often transcended party.

He was, true, a member of one party, with political obligations to it. But the member of the present Senate so frequently balanced those political obligations against his concept of the public good and against the dictates of his own conscience.

As his prestige increased, and as his own knowledge that such independence was appreciated grew, the caliber of his service kept pace, until he dared make it clear, many times, that his first concept of duty was to his own country and to the public good ahead of any merely partisan considerations.

Because of such high sincerity his opportunities for service multiplied. He was increasingly influential. He was more interested in ending controversy than in starting them. When the demands upon him left him time for work of his own choice, he sought something of considerable permanent value, as in his plan for the reorganization of most backed congressional procedure.

It was the character of his service which must be judged responsible for his untimely death. He was still a young man, as men in public life are rated. But the complete devotion with which he gave himself to his duties, the painful sincerity with which, on every issue which came to him for a decision, he insisted on his own standing, lay especially heavy upon him. He is not the first man of principles who has been hastened to his death by the grave issues of these times.

The Russians Roll On

The second phase of the Russian offensive—the thrust below Warsaw—first took shape as a 38 mile advance on a 75 mile front. There, in the superlative sense, was a break-through. On the western front, we once had a break-through at Aachen. It was about 13 miles wide, and it penetrated perhaps a dozen miles into the German positions.

This second Russian break-through below Warsaw was more or less a duplicate of the first Russian blow, which specially captured Kieles, and in new Russian direction of Cracow and the German Silesian frontier, now reported only some 25 miles distant.

Business Expenses May Be Deducted

Here is the ninth of 10 authoritative, easy-to-follow articles telling the wage-earning taxpayer how to prepare his income tax return. Readers should clip and save each installment of the series.

The miscellaneous group is the catch-all for deductions. Here you can charge off all or part of the mortgage interest and real estate taxes on a cooperative residence (which could not be deducted at all before last year); the special flat \$500 extra exemption for a blind person; the rental of a safe deposit box.

Here also you write off losses from credits and loans that have become uncollectible. These now are regarded as capital losses and should be reported in a separate Schedule D to be procured from your collector's office. They can be taken only in the year in which the Internal Revenue Bureau is notified of the loss.
