



directors of vocational rehabilitation meeting here Monday night abilitation of the Federal Onice of Education gave rehabilitation service to 145,000 disabled per sons last year and placed 44,000 of them in employment. In an address prepared by Michlivered by Miss Tracey Copp, assistant director of Federal vocational rehabilitation, it was stated that "22.9 per cent of 10,097 of those placed in employment had never before been employed. "The total annual earnings of the 44,000 amounted to \$6,283,200 before their rehabilitation. As against this sum, their total earnings rose to \$6,482,000 a month by the end of the year," he said Shortley reported the record for the New England states showed that 14,397 received rehabilitation services and of these 4,296 were rehabilitated and placed in jobs. Of the job-placed men and women 974 had never been employed. The monthly earnings of the 4,296 persons had amounted to \$50,944. After employment, their monthly earnings mounted to \$631,212. Job Not Being Done Well Enough He asserted that while "we have done a good job," he wanted to emphasize "that the job is not being done well enough. We are getting too many reports of 're-jects' and 'not-accepted' cases. Our job is to see that our rehabilitation services reach the greatest possible number of persons who need them." 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



Title 32 - National Defense Chapter IX - War Production Board Part 4500 - Power, Water, Gas and Central Steam Heat

(Utilities Order U-9) 54500.61 Utilities Order U-9. (a) Purpose of this order. War requirements have created a shortage of the supply of coal and other fuels. The purpose of this order is to save fuels used in the generation of electricity by prohibiting certain unnecessary uses of

(1) "Person" means any individual, partnership, association, business trust, oration, political subdivision, governmental agency or corporation or any organized group of persons whether incorporated or not.

(2) "Electric Supplier" means any person who generates, transmits-or (c) Prohibited Uses. No person shall use electricity for any of the following pur-

(1) Outdoor advertising and outdoor promotional lighting. (2) Outdoor display lighting except where necessary for the conduct of

(3) Outdoor decorative and outdoor ornamental lighting. (4) Show window lighting except where necessary for interior illumination. (5) Marquee lighting in excess of 60 watts for each marques. (6) White way street lighting in excess of the amount determined by local public authority to be necessary for public safety.

(7) Outdoor sien linhting except for: (i) Directional or identification signs required for fire and police protection, traffic control, transportation terminals or hospitals: or di-rectional or identification signs for any similar essential public services the lighting of which is specifically certified to be necessary by local public authority. Certification shall be made in writing to the appropriate electric supplier and need not be in any particular

(ii) Directional or identification signs using not more than 60 watts per establishment, for doctors and for hotels, and other public lodging establishments.

(d) Exemptions. (1) Any electric supplier who considers that compliance with this order by the persons whom it supplies directly and indirectly, will not reduce the consumption of coal or other starce fuels may apply for exemption for the area it serves to the Office of War Utilisia. War Production Board, Washington 25. D. C. Ref. 110.

(2) The War Production Board may from time to time issue directions exempting designated areas from this order if it finds that compliance within such areas will not reduce the consumption of coal or other scarce fuels in accordance with the purpose of this areas. (e) Appeals. Any person affected by this order who considers that compliance with this order will work an exceptional or unreasonable hardship on him or who considers that compliance will endanger public health or safety may appeal for relief to the District Office of the War Produktion Board for the area in which the consumer is located Ref. 120.

(f) Notices. (1) Every electric supplier shall, as soon as practicable notify by publication or otherwise all persons to whom it supplies electricity for uses problemed by this order of the terms hereof. (2) If any electric supplier has knowledge of a violation of this order by a person to whom it applies electricity, it shall inform the person of the violation. If the violation is continued the electric supplier shall notify the person in writing of the specific terms of the order which emply and of the penalties prescribed for violation and shall mail a copy of the notice to the District Office of the War Production Board for the area in which the consumer is located. Ref.: U.9.

(g). Violations. If the War Production Board determines that any person is using electricity in violation of this order, it may direct the electric supplier serving such person to disconnect service and prescribe the conditions under which service may be reconnected. In addition, any person who wilfully violates any provision of this order or who in connection with this order wilfully conceals a material fact or furnishes false information to any department or agency of the United States is guilty of a crime and upon conviction may be punished by fine or imprisonment.

(h) Re-ctive Date. The effective date of paragraph (c) of this order shall be Issued this 15th day of January 1945.






