Mined Streets and Japanese Mortars Firing From Upper Floors of Office Buildings Obstacles; Clear Nipponese Will Fight Bitterly. Manila, Feb. 10.—(P)—Mined streets and Japanese mortars firing from the upper floors of office buildings slowed American infantrymen today in their stubbornly resisted drive through the heart of Manila toward dock areas south of the Pasig river. It was clear the desperate and trapped Japanese would fight long and bitterly in defense of the flame-blackened Intramuros district, through which the most must pass to reach the dock area from their amphibious Pasig river crossing.

Russians Push Drive Along Northern Oder

Sweep Within 29 Miles Of Stettin as Enemy Broadcasts Tell of Outflanking Advance. London, Feb. 10.—(P)—The Red Army closed toward the Oder river today, apparently preparing to storm that beleaguered East Prussian capital from all directions with a force which the enemy said included American amphibious tanks. The problem represents probably the most severe test of Allied cooperation that it can hardly be solved without some concessions to Poland's future by the United States and without considerable pressure by the British on some elements of the London-Polish government.

Bombers Hit Nazi Convoys

Tactical Air Forces Continue Attacks in Holland, Western Reich. London, Feb. 10.—(P)—Continued heavy bombing of the Allied Tactical Air Force, keeping up the air attacks on German convoys, blasted road and rail convoys in the Netherlands and in western Reich last night. Sixty-eight Nazi planes, including jet-powered Messerschmitts, were destroyed in daylight operations and Allied losses were 26 planes.

Yanks Repulse Nazi Attacks

Germans Halted at Strettoia, Southeast of Key Town of Masua. Rome, Feb. 10.—(P)—German counter-attacks have been repulsed in the Sardinia valley and the west coastal area where the Fifth Army made limited advances in the last few days. Allied headquarters announced today that the Nazis were halted at Strettoia, three miles southeast of the important town of Masua and 19 miles north of Lammia. Naval base at La Spezia.

Japan Fears Russia May Fight in Pacific

### Red Cross Club Like Home To Fighting Men Overseas

Washington, Feb. 10.—(AP)—"It's sure wonderful to see someone from Connecticut in the States," said a Red Cross club worker recently returned from the Southwest Pacific reported that the corner where the first place men head for when they reach the club.

In the European theater, the name "Connecticut" is emblazoned on the side of a club, one of the 194 "Clubs on Wheels" which Red Cross operates, bringing the ever familiar coffee and doughnuts, magazines and cigarettes, new records and library books distributed by armed clutmobile girls.

Providing even more tangible connections with home and family is the American Red Cross communication service. Whenever a fighting man may be contacted with his family is no farther away than the nearest field director or hospital social worker.

**Home Service Help**  
Fresh from the battle lines, a child may be seriously ill or financially in trouble. The field director will send an emergency message through to the man's hometown chapter. A local Home Service worker will visit the man's family to see what aid is required. Loans or grants may be made to ride over the emergency. A health or welfare report is rushed back to the worried man through the field director, who may travel miles over treacherous roads to deliver the message. The American Red Cross Home Service now handles an average of 1,500 such messages a day for men overseas.

Among the Manchester men and women who have served or who are now serving with the American Red Cross overseas are: Mrs. Harold L. Gray, Mrs. Verus F. Nickerson. This committee is empowered to make out a slate of officers to be acted upon at the annual meeting which will be held the last Monday in this month. Vice-chairman, secretary and treasurer, and an executive board member will be elected at that time.

Nickerson, production chairman, stays the whole time through, as do several others who bring lunches, with drink provided.

## Death Caused By Gas Fumes

A spokesman for the Connecticut Light and Power Company said that after a search for gas to locate the source of the leak had been made, it was found that the gas fumes had followed along the pipe into the house.

## Comments From the River Road

It seems to me that just about all that has happened in the last few weeks has been concerned about the "problem of Germany" as the Russians are apt to name it. Even Britain, sorely as she has been wounded by the insanely malevolent Hun, is apt to be misguided by writing a check to the piggy bank of the "four big powers."

Believe me, the Russ will have to be very clear that the Stew has the first call on the fate of Germany and the Germans I should pay very much like to see they get their own share of the limelight—which burn unquenched under shades of black.
