Red Advance Frees Yanks Held Captive Officers and Men Liberated from Nazi Prison Camps Despite Attempts at Evacuation.

Paris, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Russian troops have punched several deep breaches in German lines on a 65-mile front stretching from within 60 to 100 miles of Berlin and Dresden, the German high command declared today. It indicated that the Russian advance was being pushed toward these two cities after withdrawing German counter-attacks which Berlin only last night said had swept back in to four towns.

German Lines Broken Konev breached German lines in the area of Guben, 51 miles southeast of Berlin, at 8:15 p. m. Sunday, Feb. 19, and at Lauban, 61 miles east of Dresden. A later broadcast said Konev was attacking Lauban and thrusting for Goerlitz 12 miles beyond the Neisse river, 49 miles from Dresden. This said Konev had cut the Neisse river at an undesignated point and had "temporarily" captured Radowitz, 15 miles northeast of Goerlitz. Rohwasser, 18 miles from the city, was later retaken by the Germans, Transcean added.

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Reds Punch Several Holes in Nazi Lines; Konev Drives Ahead

Paris, Feb. 20.—(AP)—The Canadian First Army virtually cleared the ruins of Goch, fortified Siegfried line road center, today and recaptured at least five vicious counter-attacks which checked gains on the northern wing of the western front. At the opposite bank American Seventh Army widened its rearward breakthrough from the industrial area to a move to within three and a half miles and eight of the blackened steel city of Saarbruecken.

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On Iwo Jima

Up until Iwo Jima, it had been Tarawa which was the symbol of the Pacific war, the place where the first major amphibious landing was made. It was there that the Marines immediately produced a revision of our fighting concept in the Pacific war, from that time on, we tried and quadrupled the violence of our advance bombings and bombardments before we sent men ashore on any of the Japanese islands.

When we came to Iwo Jima, we laid down the greatest advance preparation of all. For three days our warships circled the island, throwing in their shells. Our bombers had been at the island for 70 days.

This life-saving strategy worked up to a certain point. It drove the Japs from the open fringes of the beachhead where we intended to land. When we did land, our progress shoreward was relatively easy; the Japs had been forced back inland.

But then it began. The Japs, from their inland positions, were able to sweep with their every inch of the beachhead we had gained. Small arms fire, artillery fire, the deadly mortar fire began pouring into our troops.

There was nothing our men could do about it except keep pressing forward. Our naval guns and our bombers did their best to lend support, pin-pointing every spot of Jap fire. But the Japs were in redoubtable cave and underground positions. We have never before, in the Pacific, come to ground so expertly and intensely fortified against us.

And now, at the end of the first two days of fighting, we hold one quarter of the island, a narrow strip of beachhead perhaps two miles long and 1,500 feet deep.

The whole island is only four miles long and an average of two miles wide. In this concentrated area, the Japs have from 10,000 to 20,000 troops, prepared to fight to their own death. To this task, we have brought a force of 30,000 Marines, whom Pacific fighting has made one of our quarter given or asked. On this miniature battlefield, one of the most important engagements of the whole Pacific war is now being fought. Before it is over, Tarawa may seem a relatively cheap engagement. There is no room for maneuver. It is killing against killing, head-on forward rush against head-on defense. After it is over, we civilians may regard it as another quick triumph in our progress toward Tokyo. The Marines who survive it will have a horror to remember the rest of their lives.

The Pride Of The French

6 ways to protect your eyesight

1. Don't sit in direct glare. Shade every light to eliminate glare and use indirect reflector lamps wherever possible. Have light come over your left shoulder. Never read facing light.

2. Avoid reflected glare. Guard against light reflected into the eyes from shiny surfaces. A highly polished table should be covered if you are to work or read at it for any length of time.

3. Don't sit in your own shadow. Reading or working in your own shadow can cause eyestrain. Your shadow can reduce the amount of light on an object to 1/4 its normal intensity.

4. Rest your eyes occasionally. Your eyes move four or five times on every line of type. To read an average magazine article requires about 40,000 saccadic movements. So stop and rest awhile.

5. Keep books clean. Remove your books and bowls occasionally to give them a bath in water, and dry them. The brighter they are the warmer your eyes. Grime built up on lenses 3/16 to 1/8 in. thick.

6. Use right built. Floor lamps should have 150 watt; table lamps, 100 to 150 watt; reflector lamps, 300 watts; 2-footed lamps, 60 to 75 watts; 3-footed lamps, 60 to 60 watts; kitchen, 150 watts.

Confirms Report Meeting Refused
