Negro WACs Found Guilty

Four Sentenced for Refusal to Obey Orders At Army Hospital.

Fort Devens, Mass., March 21—A convicted of refusal to obey orders, four Negro WACs were sentenced last night to one year of hard labor and to be discharged dishonorably.

The quartet had contended they were ordered to perform menial tasks in Lowell general hospital because of their color.

Two male Negro officers and two white WAC officers were members of the seven-man court. During the court martial, Pvt. Alice D. Young of Washington testified that Col. Walter M. Crandall, commanding officer of the hospital, had told her "they want no black WACs at the motor pool" after she had requested a private Young's statement was supported by Pvt. Alberts Goss of Tuscomba, Miss.

Complained of Discrimination

Their Colonel Young, whose home is in Vinhall, Me., made the declaration at a meeting of the two WACs testified that the four were discriminated against because white WACs were not forced to do the same type of work as Negro personnel and because, they said, Colonel Crandall told them Negro WACs were supposed to do "the dirty work."

Colonel Crandall did not testify. He is on a 10-day leave and was not present at the court martial.

The four convicted by the court were Pvt. Anna C. Morrison of Richmond, Ky., Pvt. Johnnie Murphy of Rankin, Pa., Pvt. Mary Green of Conroe, Texas, and Private Young.

The verdict, announced after an hour and ten minutes deliberation, was taken calmly by the four in court. Private Morrison, however, became hysterical after leaving the room and had to be forced, screaming, into an Army car by MPs.

Trial and sentences are subject to review by high Army officials. Maj. Leon E. McCarthy, trial judge, announced, stated that he had received a copy of the court's decision. He said the decision had no bearing on the decision.

"The only question is whether they disobeyed an order directly given to them—and it was based on their color," he said.

"There was no discrimination. There would be none in the verdict. There should be no difference in their punishment because they are colored."

to raise the issue that ratification of an aviation treaty submitted to the Senate may involve tacit approval of those agreements.

Senator George (D-Ga.), who is trying to get the treaty approved by the Foreign Relations committee, said he recognizes that some of the provisions are objectionable but that he and the Senate it.

For that reason he said it might be a good idea to delay consideration of this and other international proposals until the San Francisco conference reaches an agreement.

May Be Much Confusion

"There is a great deal of confusion in the Senate if too many controversial matters are brought in now," he commented.

Besides the aviation and Mexican water treaties, the Senate either has before it or soon will be asked to consider the agreements made at Bretton Woods on monetary matters at Hot Springs on food and a proposed oil compact with the English. It also will be called upon to vote on extension of lend-lease operations and the reciprocal trade agreements.

Senator Pepper (D-Tx.) said he thought all of these ought to come before the Senate in one package, without waiting for results of the San Francisco meeting.

"We've got to face all of these problems and we might as well get them over with as fast as we can," he said.

Cadet Nurses Badly Needed

Drive to Be Conducted Here Next Month to Secure 35 Girls.

Mrs. Celia Wandt, R. N., Manchester Public School Nurse, has been appointed chairman in this drive for U. S. Cadet Nurse Corps drive which will be conducted throughout the country during the month of April.

Assisting Mrs. Wandt are Miss Florence Riley, R. N., school nurse of Glastonbury, Miss Georgia Greenaway of the Manchester High School faculty and Mrs. Thomas Martyn.

The objective of the drive is to increase vitally needed nurse power throughout the nation. This appeal is directed to young women about to graduate from high school at the end of this year, or who graduated within the last two to three years.

Created by the Congress to increase nurse power, the Corps offers all-expense scholarships in nurse education to qualified young women. They may enroll at the school of nursing they select. More than 1000 schools of nursing throughout the country are participating in the program. This is an opportunity for young women to perform a vital and interesting service now, and at the same time, prepare for a career in the post-war years.

Need at Least 35 Girls

Based on estimates and with an enrollment of about 23 girls in this area of at least 25 girls should be enrolled to meet the quota of this area.

Students of nursing, admitted spring classes in this area include Bridgford Hospital, Hartford; Hartford hospital, Hartford; Norfolk hospital, Norfolk; St. Vincent's, Bridgeport; Stamford hospital, Stamford; Waterbury hospital, Waterbury; and University of Connecticut at Storrs.

Pussy willow blossomed big and fluffy along the brook. The man standing still and motionless, the cold littered plot in the backyard had not lost anything last night. He was simply sub-dividing the old garden in mind again for the current season.

Everything was advanced by the strange heat wave of mid-March. Everybody was sure it was only a flash in the pan, yet they could not help keeping time with the climate in thought and mind.

"We'll pay for this," one weather-wise Main streeter said last night after a cold shower had swept a sweet breeze. "I have never seen it to fall when March blows." April will chill us to the bone. Then came the rain.

River Reaches 8-Year High

The Mississippi reached 38 feet above flood stage, yesterday and the Weather bureau said it would continue to rise slowly for the next few days.

Third Levee Being Built

Engineers said a third emergency loop levee was being built at Hannibal lake below Pine Bluff, Ark., to protect the area from the rising Arkansas river.

Two deaths were attributed to the flood in the Louisiana-Mississippi area as the Mississippi continued on the rise from St. Louis to the gulf.

Way Opened For Appeal

Supreme Court Says Petition by Zukauskas Should Be Granted.

Hartford, March 21.—(AP)—The Connecticut Supreme Court today opened the way for an appeal by Francis Zukauskas, former Waterbury policeman under sentence of death for the murder of Mrs. Stephanie Plungis.

The high bench, in a memorandum on the motion of Zukauskas' counsel for an order directing the superior court to permit an appeal at the expense of the state, declared that the state's refusal to pay for the appeal was unconstitutional and that the court should not place upon the state the cost of an appeal by a defendant in a criminal case where there was no substantial ground upon which it could rest, although when this was called upon to review its own conduct of a trial, it should reach such a conclusion only after candid and careful consideration; and the severity of the punishment imposed might be a material consideration in reaching a decision.

Should Be Able To Appeal

Apart from an exceptional situation, the matter would rest in the discretion of the court. The situation presented by a conviction of murder in the first degree is, however, unique, in that the penalty is death. It is our conviction that public policy requires that a defendant found guilty of this crime should always, if he so desires, have an opportunity to appeal to this court, and the fact that he is without resources should not stand in the way.

The decision noted that State Attorney William E. Fitzgerald, who prosecuted the case, although committed at the trial, joined in declaring that "public policy would best be served" by granting the appeal.

Thirty-four year old Zukauskas was convicted of shooting to death his admitted mistress on the night of Nov. 1, 1944 after a violent argument.

Zukauskas buried his 24 year old neighbor in a vacant grave in Middlebury. His wife, he testified, accompanied him but did not witness the burial.

Mrs. Zukauskas, who is the mother of two children, took the stand in her husband's defense.
