### N. Y. Law First On Racial Bias

**Ives-Quinn Act Forbids Discrimination in Employment in State.**

New York—By almost unanimous bipartisan action of its Legislature, New York State has forbidden both employers and labor unions to discriminate against any person because of race, creed, color or national origin, under penalty of a fine up to \$500 plus the possibility of as much as a year's imprisonment.

That is the Ives-Quinn act, the first state law against racial discrimination in employment. It is probable that the measure

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**Star Victory Grows**  
The proportion of the American victory in the Saar and the Palatinat continues to grow. Not only the Third and Seventh Armies, in a few days, doubled the amount of German territory held by Allied arms. They have taken from 30,000 to 45,000 prisoners within the last two days alone. To add to their triumph, they can claim a vast amount of German equipment captured or destroyed. In conjunction with the advance, Allied air power has been striking unopposed along the entire western front, claiming its own huge toll of German vehicles, tanks and railroad cars.

**Curfew For La Guardia?**  
It is a mounting suspicion that Mayor La Guardia undertook his one-man vigil against midnight curfew in order to build his political future for a fourth term as mayor. His personal proclamation of a "soft war" for New York is being viewed as a bid for popularity and votes. Undoubtedly there are elements in New York City who tried to persuade him that both sides were in the money, to the last conceivable drive which ended the campaign back in Tunisia.

**The Plot That Failed**  
Associated Press Correspondent Louis P. Lochner, now with our troops inside Germany, has produced a circumstantial account of the attempt on Hitler's life last July 20th. It makes fascinating reading, and it leaves one with a sense of awe and respect for the man who, in the face of apparently the last Germans with nerve enough to make an attempt on Hitler's life had and executed their plans.

There will be special gasoline for this purpose, of course, just as there has been for many years. To qualify for this special gasoline you must have at least 1,500 square feet in size and not more than 15 miles from your home or your place of work, depending on where you garden.

During the past two weeks, a number of people have been asking questions about the rationing of gasoline. They have seen the rationing stamps in the newspapers and in the stores.
