Rubber Plant Strike Ends

Workers Agree to Return 'Pending Negotiations' Promised.

Although 13 workers of the outside department of the Naugatuck footwear plant of the U. S. Rubber company were due back at their jobs today following their walk-out on Wednesday, a company spokesman said last night that about 1,600 employees of the water-proof division of the plant would be unable to work until Saturday because of the walkout.

Robert Lowell, industrial relations manager of the plant, said that supplies would not be available for the "making" departments because of the work stoppage in the key cutting department.

George T. Froelich, president of Local 43, United Rubber Workers of America (CIO), who termed the walkout "manipulated," said the workers agreed to return today "pending negotiations" following a conference between union officials and the strikers.

The workers walked off their jobs Tuesday, protesting in protest against a work order issued by the company.

At Shelton, where more than 90 workers at the American Crucible company left their jobs on Tuesday morning in what union officials said was a protest against the discharge of an employee. High charges in the situation was reported following several conferences between union and company officials.

Spokesman for the Shelton Industrial Local 463, Pleythine, Dudley Novotny Workers (CIO), said the dispute had been referred to the State Board of Mediation and Arbitration.

Body of Mrs. Stevenson Found in Woods by Boy

Florence Street Woman Disappeared Dec. 15 When She Left Home To Take Walk.

The mysterious disappearance of Mrs. Rachel Stevenson, 86, of 65 Florence street, who had been missing from her home since Dec. 15, 1944, was solved last night by the discovery of her body on Birch Mountain road, Manchester, near the Bolton town line by 13-year-old Arthur Gerlich, son of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Gerlich who was walking in the woods with his dog.

The entire town was aroused by the sudden disappearance of Mrs. Stevenson, a resident of the Bolton town line, and known to hundreds of people living on the East Side. She left her home at 11:30 a. m. on Dec. 15, 1944, to take a walk and was seen walking south on Spruce street, east of Highland street and at various points along a long, circuitous route directly over Birch Mountain, a seemingly impossible feat for one of her age. But she finally disappeared in spite of the efforts of local and state police.

The first information given to the police was when Warren Gerlich, father of Arthur Gerlich, phoned the police on Dec. 15 at 3:30. He recognized her and was going to stop and give her a ride but thought she was out for a walk. At least a dozen other persons said they saw her in the vicinity of Birch Mountain.

The woman seen by Mrs. Johnson turned around abruptly as she partly entered the Wadwell yard, continuing on up Porter street, taking Wylie street to Highland street. Mrs. Johnson convinced that the woman she saw was Mrs. Stevenson but that she could have rested all of Friday night after she was seen on Campmeadow Road by William McKee, will never be solved.

Under The Smoke Screen

To the East and the Palatinates, the American Third and Seventh Armies are now credited with having taken 100,000 German prisoners, for one of the cleanest triumphs of the whole war.

But even while we and the Germans might be considering the consequences of this Allied victory, other sectors of the western front draw the attention of both sides.

While this headline affair in the East has been proceeding, the Remagen bridgehead has been enlarged, until it is no longer a mere bridgehead, but a peninsula more than 30 miles long. It has happened so quietly that it is difficult to realize that we actually needed 20 miles of the eastern bank of the Rhine, with all the opportunities for new bridgings and crossings such control affords.

It is in there, a thing of power, that we could, if we wanted to, take the time, make this operation one which would, sooner or later, lead every other Allied army to have a safe crossing of the Rhine.

But General Eisenhower's timetable does not seem to include such a wait.

General Montgomery's sector of the Rhine is under a two-way blackout. The greatest amount ever puffed up, 60 miles long, from the sector from the Germans. In their ignorance and alarm, they are providing us with an almost continuous stream of reports to that effect. Allied victory is about to cross the Rhine or has already crossed it.

But we, on our side, are equally lacking in authoritative information. Between us and this vital sector of the front, there is one of those news security blackouts, such as are imposed only at moments of critical importance in the evolution of the war.

At this juncture, the Germans have changed operations, maintaining the one able who understood, and bringing up Marshal Kesselring, the defensive genius of the Italian front. That he has ability, and that still back of the Rhine, he has top grade German troops which have been carefully held in reserve for the final battle in the west, that is, no doubt. But what is coming will not leave much of the reputation of this new Nazi general, or any other general, to be made in the East. The Nazis are beyond human help, and they have no claim on any other kind of help.

The OPA And Meat

There are many arguments and sides of argument on the meat issue now disturbing Washington, and we presume, therefore disturbing housewives throughout the nation.

Perhaps we will keep a sane view of the situation now and for the future if we keep two main things in view.

First, Americans are not going to go hungry although the meat, indeed, is some light-brightening, indeed, we are going to continue to be the best-fed nation in the world. This present alarm is as bad as anything we will actually be called upon to meet.

Second, there are interests trying to use the present "emergency" as the lever by which they may increase their own profits at the expense of the consuming public. The meat industry, charging that OPA red tape and OPA price policies are primarily responsible for the meat shortage. But it has been their continuing ambition through all this war to escape or destroy all price regulation. They have been continually in a state of half-striking against the national price regulation, unless they could be guaranteed a higher profit.

Various adjustments have been made, from time to time, to correct them a higher profit. But they have taken such reasonable concessions in full stride, and immediately resumed their attitude of strike. They have withheld meat from the nation in much the same way and for much the same reasons that John L. Lewis has withheld and threatens to withhold coal. There is no ceiling on the prices and profits they think they should be allowed to get.

If they were yielded their price, and told that they could have the unlimited profits they want, they would start this evening at \$8 a cask in the Howell Cheney Truck School, which will make an appeal.
