Hebron

Hebron, and particularly the East section, was again plunged into gloom when the report was received of the death in action of Pvt. Joseph L. Gearhart, 26, Feb. 26, on two Japanese planes over the Pacific area. His wife, Mrs. Christine Gearhart, the former Miss Christine Paine, was in a telegram from the War Department last Tuesday, telling the death occurred on the third birthday of Gary, the young son of Pvt. and Mrs. Gearhart. There is also a younger daughter, Miriam.

Pvt. Gearhart is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. Stanley Cody of Middletown, Miss Jean Gearhart of Meriden, and Mrs. Sarah Graham of Mt. Union, Penn.

Pvt. Gearhart enlisted in the Marines last June and was at his home on his last furlough here in September. He was sent overseas to Hawaii where he was last heard from by his wife. Before entering the service he was employed by the Bolsonon Grain Company. His death makes at least three men from Hebron on the list of the missing in action. Others are in doubt.

Deep regret is felt here at the death of N. Eugene Smith, a son of Edwin T., and the late Mrs. Smith. Mr. Smith was born in Hebron and as a young man was clerk in the shoe store of his uncle, Henry D. Barrows, in New London. Mr. Barrows also owned a shoe store in Norwich and in the course of time he had become owner and operator of the store, and was one of the leading shoe merchants of the city.

He served as a councilman in Norwich in 1920, was a member of the Somerset Lodge, Masonic Knights Templar and of other organizations.

He was active in Central Baptist Church circles, where he was a member of the board of managers, financial secretary of benevolence, and chairman of the house committee.

He leaves his wife, a son, Robert Eugene Smith, of the U. S. Army, at present serving in the Philippines, two sisters, Mrs. Henry Gullett of Seattle, Wash., and Miss Florence M. Smith, principal of the Seymour school, West Hartford, his father, Edwin T. Smith and a brother, Edward A. Smith and several nieces.

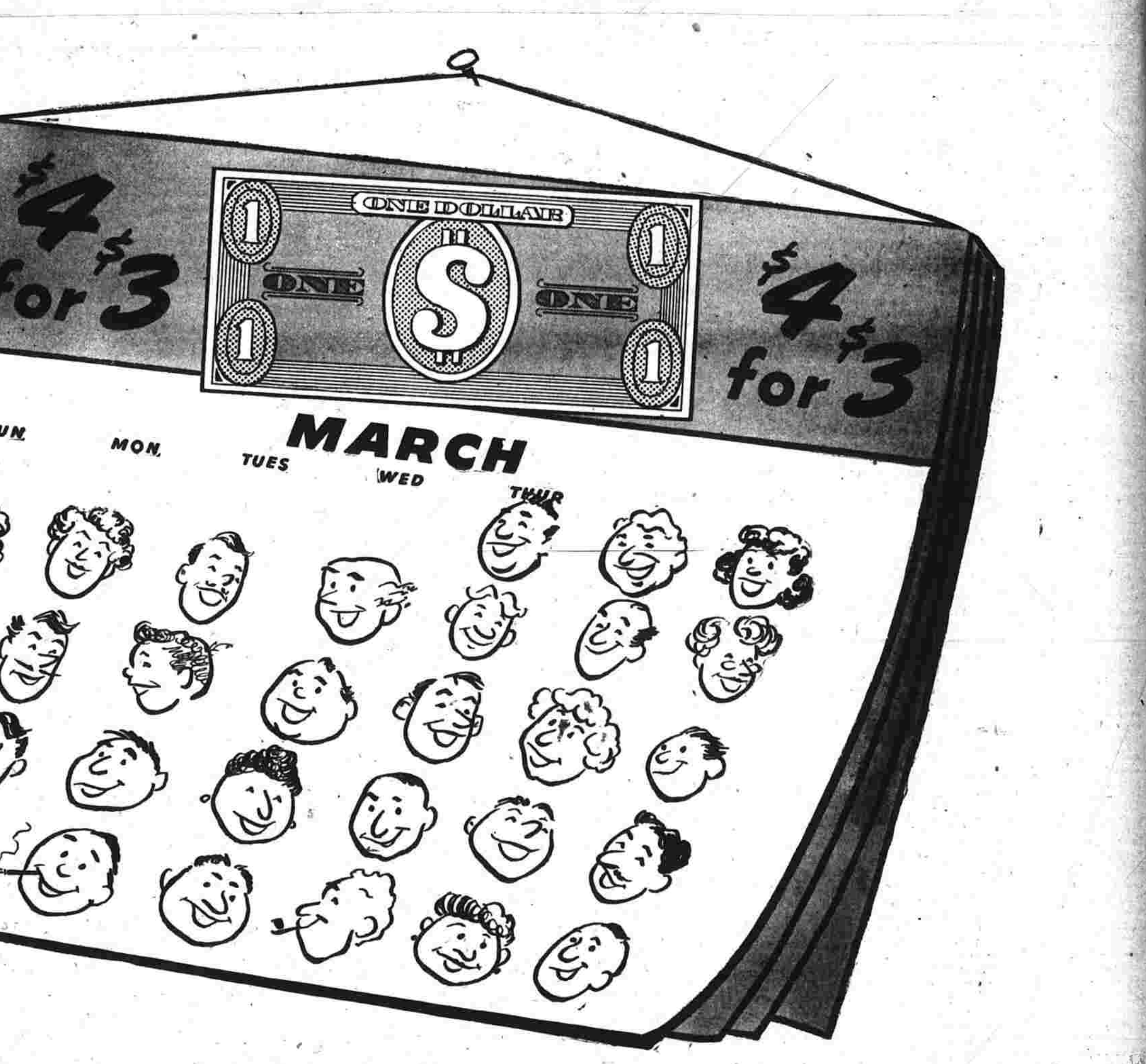
