London, April 28.—(AP)—Heinrich Himmler was reported today to have offered unconditional surrender to Great Britain and the United States, but Prime Minister Churchill in a special statement declared that only unconditional surrender to the three big powers would be accepted by the Allies.

Churchill declared: "It has been reported by Reuters that unconditional surrender was offered by Himmler to Britain and the United States only. Further that Britain and the United States have replied saying they will not accept unconditional surrender except on behalf of all the Allies including Russia."

The "spot" plan—under which many firms are expected to be exempt from the controls—will be put into effect as soon as possible, according to the War Relocation Authority.

Some \$700,000 worth of "spot" contracts already have been authorized, according to the War Relocation Authority. The program was curtailed because of the time of late winter's military season.

Manufacturing and the planned reconversion of industrial plants are being encouraged to get a partial reconversion program in effect as soon as possible. The gradual curtailment of military production to a one-year program is being planned.

"Waiting Period" Dropped  
In its anxiety to forestall plant shutdowns and unemployment, the War Relocation Authority has cancelled WPR in many instances, with the result that a "waiting period" during which orders are wiped off the books.

Officials refused to disclose which of the orders were cancelled, but they stated that they were not among the most important orders on the books. This made it clear that restrictions on production of automobiles and refrigerators will be relaxed in many instances.

Not until four or five months after WPR was ended, it was estimated, will the bulk of the 300-odd orders which were to be revoked as the country's production program is needed for fighting Japan alone.

### Security Conference's Doings Likely to Drag

**Simplified Explanation of Mechanics Given; Many Parts and Pieces in Charter.**

San Francisco, April 28.—(AP)—If you're trying to follow the doings of the United Nations Security conference, relax a little. It may drag along.

And it may miss you if you don't understand the mechanics of the conference will work in the weeks ahead. So here's a simplified explanation.

Forty-two nations have sent delegations to this conference. If these delegates create a league to prevent future wars, they'll have to draw up a charter.

That charter will be the rules and regulations under which the league members agree to operate. There will be many parts and pieces in that charter.

**Will Require Expert Thinking.**  
And those parts and pieces will require some expert thinking before they fit together.

The delegates cannot possibly be expert in all the details bound to arise.

So many of them have brought experts with them. Experts on things like banking, economics, treaties, law. They'll help and advise the delegates.

It is these experts who will do the real work of the conference. They'll be working day and night for the first two weeks of this year.

The delegates know before they came here that there would be certain major problems they would have to work out in forming a charter.

So it's already been arranged to divide the handling of these problems among four committees.

But since each committee will have more than one problem to solve, and will need expert help on each, about 12 committees will be established to work under and for the committee.

Some delegates will work on the committee on the navy. Some will work on the committee on the air force. Some will work on the committee on the army. Some will work on the committee on the police.

While they work and struggle along in the weeks ahead, the committee members will be in constant touch with their delegates who brought them here.

So what the committee members do will reflect the thinking of their delegates. When a committee has worked out a problem assigned it, it will turn it over to the committee.

Sometimes before it can reach agreement on such a submitted plan—the committee may have to send it back to the committee for re-working or an alternate plan.

When the committee finally approves a plan specifically assigned to it, it will submit the plan to the whole conference in plenary session.

Plenary session is another way of saying full-dress session. Meeting the delegates from all the nations will meet to approve or argue against the plans submitted by the committee.

**Watch for Signs of Wrangling.**  
So—watch for signs of wrangling on various points in the committee. In the committee, in the plenary sessions.

If some of the big powers on a committee—like the United States, United Kingdom and Soviet Union—could agree on a vital point, they might ask President Truman, Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Stalin to work it out among them. That could happen.

The four committees haven't been set up yet. But some of the committees already are working because, as noted, the delegates
