agments they soon learned that each top-heavy Jap "victory" as announced had hit the Japs which it hurt the worst—their pride and by these gross misstatements they were covering up.

When internees lived so close to sub-par existence, with their slow starvation facing them and with no knowledge of their possible deliverance or the fate of the U. S. troops...

Events in the lives of Mining Engineer and Mrs. Charles Hubbard for nearly three and one-half years from shortly after Pearl Harbor until their flight and sky troops last February 23, will remain in this category.

Pressed back by sheer need of the customs and needs of the natives, these cultured people, one an engineer and graduate of an American university, and his wife, a graduate nurse, were forced with thousands of others to retreat to the primitive in their daily living to keep body and soul together.

And during it all the mental Japs landed and waited as starvation and real malnutrition cut down their number one by one.

Those things which we as accepted patriots tried to do in the past year, would have been to them ultra-highly advanced conveniences, and similarly the food which we so ungraciously denied over the counters and shops, would have been to those who were in the hands of the Heaven-sent blessing.

They lived in all in spite of nature's ingratitude which unfolded foods from up-into the clouds, and the quality, is in itself a miracle. But in the natural course of existence, sometimes comes events and occurrences which border on the miraculous. And the experiences of the Hubbards and other thousands of prisoners of the global war are of this quality.

Caught by the Japs at their modern, yet almost palatial mining town colony south of Manila, when the Jap bombers swarmed over Luzon from one desperate point in December 1942, the entire colony of 85 people, men, women and children, were suddenly and without chance for preparation, thrown into a helpless state, destitute but one thing to escape from the coming Japs. The shock of the thought of being captured and possibly suffering tortures of body and mind, jarred every one of the colony into a state of panic.

They all reached Manila but there was no escape. Caught like rats in a sinking ship, they remained in the capital of the Philippines to await a doubtful fate. They had failed in outracing their enemies in gaining that which they sought most of all—Liberty. And for 30 months afterward lived miserably from hand to mouth—life that at best was far below the minimum for natural existence.

But fortunately they lived to tell their story to the world. There were others who failed and their bodies are being today close by the Los Banos camp near the shores of Laguna de Bay on Luzon.

The Hubbards admitted that in general the tortures of body were inflicted by the Japs on their charges. What was more crushing came to them in continuing mental strain.

Starvation by cold, calculated means was their lot. How to circumvent it was their problem. The best heads of the camp in official conference tried to solve the problem and in the end but one avenue of escape was left them—supplement of the dwindling daily fare of food by ingenious processes, experimentation of food values of the lowly grasses, roots, bulbs—in fact anything that held the hope of containing an energy vitamin.

Feeling Conditions. They made the best of a tough situation and faced the issues squarely. These cultured, civilized internees, age-trained to the sciences, arts and face of temporal delirium, all sexes, were suddenly immersed into a crowd of primitive conditions and simple forms of living.

Fortunately they had water in abundance and the lack of proper clothing was compensated by the best of the tropic sun. Sanitary conveniences—wax-sub-par and everything else of the order of the minimum was below the minimum for sanitary existence.
