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Super-Forts Hit Japanese Plants; Also Drop Mines

Bomb Tokyo and Hamamatsu Industrial Targets; Japanese Report Two Mine-Laying Expeditions in Waasaka Bay and Bungo Strait. Guam, May 19.—(AP)—More than 400 Super-Forts were reported over Japan today, bombing Tokyo and Hamamatsu industrial targets and laying mines in two vital waterways. Some 300 B-29s raided Hamamatsu about noon in the heaviest strike and the only one announced by the 21st Bomber command here.

Drop Detonated Bombs They dropped more than 2,000 tons of demolition bombs in the greatest raid ever made on the industrial center.

The Japanese Domei news agency also reported two mine-laying expeditions in Waasaka Bay, western Honshu port on the Japan Sea, and in Bungo Strait, southwestern entrance to the inland sea.

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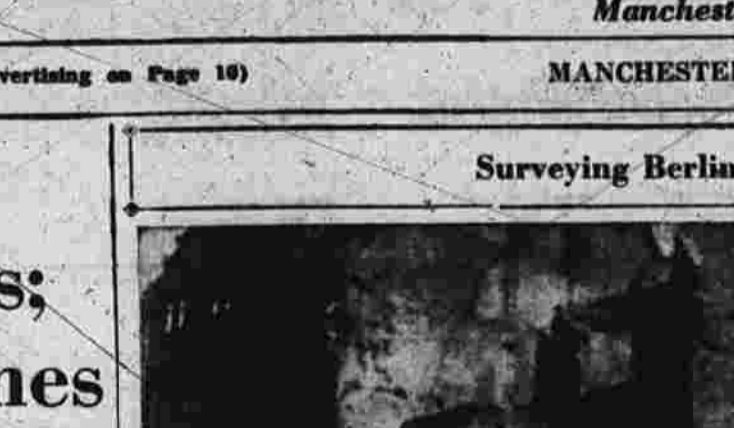
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Surveying Berlin's Wreckage

Washington, May 19.—(AP)—A source close to the House Food committee said today that the group is drafting a sharply critical report charging the government with mis-handling sugar stocks to the point of extreme shortage.

The report is expected to be drafted by the House Food committee and will be presented to the House next week, it is said.

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Alexander Says Tito Gets No Agreement

Charges Apparent Intention of Establishing Yugoslav Claims in Northeast Italy and Southern Austria by Force of Arms; Prior Agreements on Territory Disclosed Today. Rome, May 19.—(AP)—Field Marshal Sir Harold Alexander, Allied commander in the Mediterranean theater, charged Yugoslav claims today with the apparent intention of establishing claims in northeast Italy and southern Austria by force of arms, which was a reminder of Hitler, Mussolini and Japan.

He disclosed that his efforts to come to a friendly agreement with the Yugoslav leader had failed.

At the same time Allied headquarters disclosed Tito agreed in July, 1944, and February, 1945, that for military purposes Allied forces should occupy the Venezia Giulia region, including Trieste, while the Yugoslav army occupied Plume and the area to the east of the line running through north of Plume.

Alexander, charging that Tito was in violation of the agreement, said that it was his intention to prevent such action that he has been fighting this war.

He said his duty to hold these disputed territories as trustees until their ultimate disposal is settled at the peace conference.

"I tried my best to come to a friendly agreement with Marshal Tito but it did not succeed."

Gunner's Mate Stanley Olander Tells of His Experience During Action in South Pacific

Stanley J. Olander, Gunner's Mate third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Olander of 79 Mill street, a veteran of nearly two years' service in the South Pacific returned to his wife and baby Wednesday for a long furlough. He is the first man to be granted a furlough of this length since the outbreak of the war.

Wide Battle Experience

"Then I worked forward another deck trying to get topside. Flame and smoke drove us back. There we tried to work aft and after 15 minutes we found ourselves back on the fantail—about 40 feet up. There we stood on a slender platform about 25 feet above the waterline, wondering what to do.
