The War Department casualty list, Serial Numbers 0-618 (killed), Europe, 471, 0-619 (killed, Pacific), 366, 0-620 (wounded, Europe), 31, 0-621 (wounded, Pacific), 699, 0-622 (missing, Europe), 31, and 0-623 (missing, Pacific), 183, announces for the United States as a whole 1,110 casualties for July 7, 1945, classified as follows: 413 killed, 311 wounded, and 386 missing.

The Navy Department announces for the United States as a whole 1,420 casualties for July 7, 1945, of the U. S. Naval Forces (Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard) not heretofore released on Navy Department casualty lists, consisting of 274 dead, 953 wounded, and 21 missing. These casualties from the total reported to next of kin and released for publication since December 7, 1941, to July 7, 1945, to 127,822, classified as follows:
