Munitions Blasts Jar Halifax Area; Persist 13 Hours

our Huge Explosions And Series of Lesser Discharges at Depot In Dartmouth End After Dawn; 12 Persons Hurt, One Missing.

Halifax, N. S., July 19.—(P)—Canadian Navy munitions set off by a jetty fire rocked the Halifax area overnight with four huge explosions and a series of lesser discharges which ended only after dawn today. Damaging and crippling blasts persisted for more than 13 hours at the jetty in nearby Dartmouth. One man was killed and 12 others were injured, including a child.

There were 13 known casualties, 12 persons were injured and one missing. The whole civilian population of Dartmouth, approximately 10,000 persons, and others living in the north end of Halifax were evacuated on official orders.

The first of the major explosions occurred at 5:25 p. m. on July 18. It was followed at 11:30 p. m., 2:55 a. m. and 3:02 a. m. (P. M. W.)

The great blast, sending 500 million dollars of munitions into the air and spraying rockets and brilliant flares over the harbor area, threatened momentarily to touch off the main magazine in the Naval storage area of a House of Commons building. The fire raged beyond control as the blasts struck over Halifax.

The total number of casualties still was uncertain. A Canadian Naval officer said he believed one in the immediate vicinity of the first terrific detonation could have survived.

From that time until after midnight blasts of varying degrees of intensity continued to rock the area.

Approximately 10,000 persons had been evacuated from the danger area after the first of the major detonations at 5:25 p. m. (P. M. W.)

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Information On What Is Going On From Your FORD DEALER RECONVERSION

The last automobile rolled off the assembly line at the Ford Motor Company Rouge plant in Dearborn on February 20, 1945. On that date, Ford's production of cars and trucks was interrupted by the war.

During the war the company has produced thousands of jeeps, military trucks, ambulances and aircraft engines, turbo-superchargers, gliders, jetson gun tanks, armor cars, cargo carriers, generators, radio-sets, and many other products.

The transition from peace time production to war production was a colossal undertaking. Nearly one hundred miles of conveyor lines, tens of thousands of heavy machinery had to be moved. New buildings had to be built, new equipment fabricated and new plants had to be constructed.

Today we are in the midst of another conversion problem. This time from production for war to production for peace.

In many respects the problem is even greater than that which confronted us four years ago. The present job requires greater speed, for contract renewal is only a few weeks away. The Ford Motor Company is ready to begin reconversion.

Reconversion problems are prodigious. The Rouge plant covers 1,200 acres. It is the largest of self-contained plants in the world. In the war, the production of approximately 80,000 engines was employed within the enclosure of the plant. It was a colossal task.

The Press Steel building, presents a fair idea of the problem. This building has a floor area of nearly 1,400,000 square feet and contains several thousand machines. Many pieces of machinery such as 150 tons each. Before the war, automobile bodies were fabricated in this building. During the war, B-24 bomber parts were made for Willow Run, as well as a wide variety of other war products.

A survey of the reconversion task in this building indicates that approximately 500 machines will be required for postwar car production. A total of more than 2000 machines and several pieces of conveyors must be moved out before equipment for building cars is moved in.

It is estimated that 3,000,000 tons of machinery will have been moved when reconversion is completed in that building.

In addition, the company is faced with reconversion problems at its Lincoln and Highland Park plants, as well as a score or more assembly plants and village industries.

Machinery for the production of war goods must be disposed of. Buildings have to be cleared before plant engineers can supervise the installation of new equipment.

Nearly 100 miles of conveyors are employed at the Rouge plant. For reconversion, these conveyors must be rearranged for war production. As a result, Ford fabrication facilities are taxed beyond capacity by the tremendous amount of machinery that must be moved.

Despite many setbacks in war contracts, the Ford Motor Company is still actively producing gliders, radio-bomb engines, jetson gun tanks and several other products.

These come first. They add whatever other tasks that are assigned to the company will continue to have precedence over the war work.

Only then will 100% reconversion of all Ford facilities be possible.
