





### Your GI Rights

**Questions and Answers on Servicemen's Problems**

Washington—Here are some general questions from the Army and GIs:

Q: My son got out of the Army in 1942 because of a bad arm as the result of his service. He has become a chronic trouble and he is being treated in a hospital for "domiciliary" care. He has asked me to find out if it is possible for him to also get money from the Government to attend a business college which is in the same town as the hospital. He thinks he can learn enough there to become financially independent. Is this financially possible?

A: Yes, if he has recently been discharged as a result of a permanent disability, he may be able to obtain a GI Bill of Rights at the same time.

Q: I ran a little corner stand before I went into the Army. Now I plan to start making a business again but fear I won't be able to get enough sugar from the Government to make it worth my while.

A: You may get a permit from the War Relocation Authority to sell sugar from the Government for a limited period of time.

Q: I have just returned from Europe and have a 45-day pay for my service. How much money do I get from OPA for my 45-day pay?

A: According to present allowances you can get a gallon for every day of furlough. For 45 days that amounts to 45 gallons. The gallon limit has been removed.

**How to prolong the life of your washer**

1. Don't overload washer. Overloading the machine may strain both mechanism and motor and can very easily damage your clothes. The clothes should be able to move and turn freely in the water.

2. Watch running time. Modern washers need only five to ten minutes to wash ordinary clothes, ten to fifteen minutes for very dirty clothing. Overloading running adds wear to washer.

3. Don't force clothes through wringer. Adjust rods for thickness of clothes and feed them through evenly. Belt buckles, buttons, etc., should be folded under the clothes to protect the rollers.

4. Handle your cord with care. Pull the plug, not the cord, and, above all, don't let the cord get damp. Wipe your plug in, be sure the switch is "OFF" and all controls are in neutral.

5. Clean washer after using. When you are through with the machine, remove any lint from tub, agitator or motion cups and wipe dry. Standing water can rust, stain and rot parts.

6. Investigate strange noises. If you hear any unfamiliar noise in your machine, it's a good idea to call a qualified serviceman immediately. It may mean a worn or loose part that can cause damage.

**Judge Authorizes Paying of Interest**

New Haven, July 31.—(AP) Payment by the trustees of the New Haven and Hartford bridge bonds of interest on the bonds was authorized by a federal judge today.

The judge, Federal Judge Charles C. Hinkle, issued the order after a hearing on the matter. The bonds were issued in 1938 and had been in default of interest payments for several years.

The judge's order allows the trustees to make interest payments on the bonds starting on August 1, 1945. This is a significant step towards resolving the bond issue and ensuring that the bonds remain valid.

**Eleven New Cases Of Poliomyelitis**
