ter in the story of how American scientists, cooperating with the British, defeated the Germans in a race to develop the atomic bomb. Two new elements discovered by the race brought discovery of two new elements, neptunium, No. 93, and plutonium, No. 94, both derived from uranium. As recently as 1942 there were only 500 micrograms of plutonium in the world. And it would take more than that, the report said, to make the head of a pin.

Here is the way the Army explains this bomb, in a 160-page report prepared by H. D. Smyth, chairman of the Physics department at Princeton university and a special consultant on the atomic bomb project.

A chain reaction is started. That means the splitting of one atom causes another to break up. It is during the fission, or breaking down, of uranium that neptunium is produced. A continuation of the process produces plutonium. It sounds simple, but it takes one of the mightiest war plants, at Hanford, Wash., to get the job done.

The atom-explosive possibilities of U-235, another isotope of uranium, which can be used in the bomb, have been known for some time to the Germans as well as to us. But the catch previously had been the difficulty of producing it in sufficient quantities. A team made up of the nation's top physicists and chemists first answered in the hitherto unknown plutonium.

The Army, while it disclosed several new bomb secrets, didn't let its hair down completely. It didn't say anything about the cost of the bomb, or how much it costs now it is dropped or what sets off the explosion.

Building Up Stockpiles. It's building up a stockpile. Although experiments have been with rare elements, if it ever becomes possible to convert some common material into energy, "civilization would have the means to commit suicide at will."

Within ten years atomic power may be used for industrial purposes. The report added the Army and the scientists are aware of the "appalling" possibilities of their newly found weapons. That's the reason for the report, they said. Now it's up to the American people, who with the British and Canadians are co-workers of the secret, to decide what should be done with the world's most awe-inspiring weapon.

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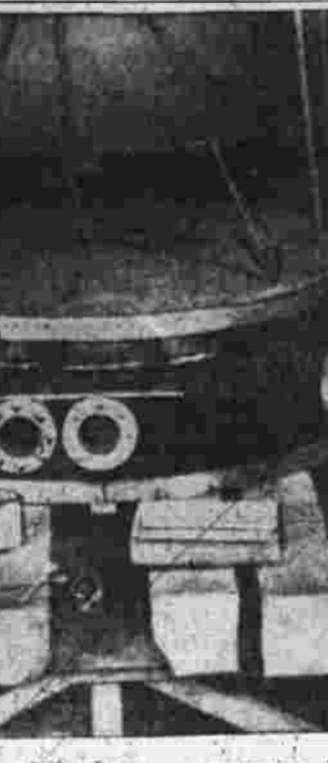
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Fenders For Everybody



Front fenders, on the other hand, have been fairly plentifully produced into assembly-line items. They are "functional" because it would be virtually impossible to produce the related portion of rebuilding the stock piles of replacement parts. It's no small task.

What It Means

Detroit—Along with the difficulty of getting the 1946 model automobiles into assembly-line production, the car industry is struggling with the related portion of rebuilding the stock piles of replacement parts. It's no small task. In normal times the various automobile manufacturers maintain stocks of replacement parts for cars built 10 to 15 years ago. The supply of parts for the older cars is not very large, of course, because relatively few of the '30s and '35s models still are on the highway. It is for the immediate pre-war models that the industry now is trying to build up the stock of replacement parts. During the war the manufacturers were permitted to make only functional parts, and these in restricted volume. A little more than two months ago the War Production Board lifted all restrictions on replacement parts, but the motorist generally still has to go to the home town automobile graveyard to replace a torn rear fender. That's because rear fenders were classified as non-functional and the manufacturers have been forbidden to stockpile them as priorities for any but essential parts. The rear fenders they do produce so far have come from the so-called "tree" steel supply, the same same source from which the industry is relying for material with which to build its limited quotas of new cars.

Radio Scope

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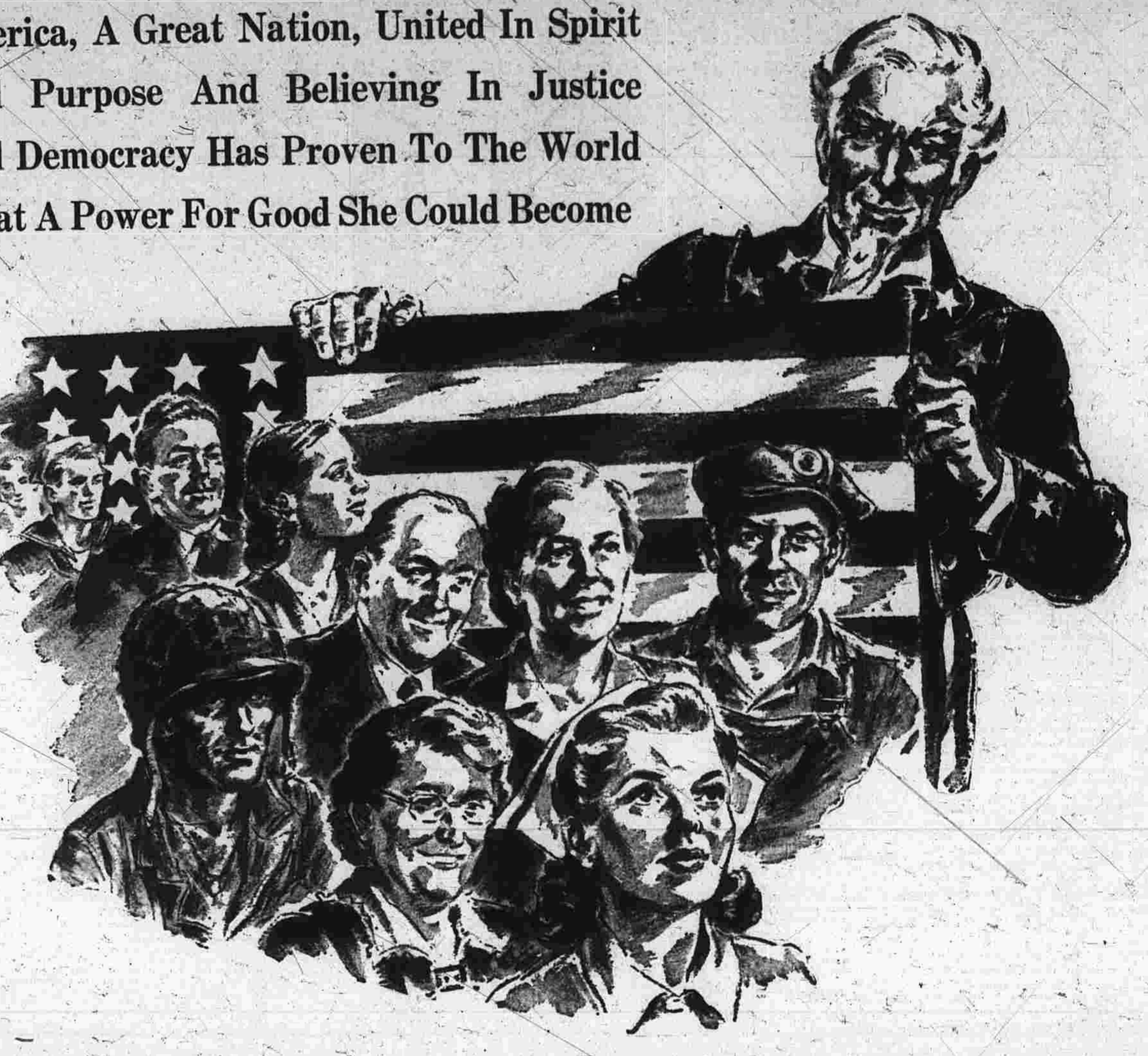
