### Farmers Face Problems, Too

**Agriculture in Post-War Adjustment Puzzle as Well as Industry**

Storrs, Aug. 25.—Agriculture along with industry—faces three great postwar problems which can make or break the prosperity of the whole nation, says William B. Young, acting dean of the College of Agriculture, University of Connecticut.

First, both industry and agriculture will have to improve their efficiency to turn out more goods at smaller production costs.

Second, food production must be adjusted to give the farmer a fair return and the consumer a reasonable price.

Third, the little businessman and owners of family-sized farms must be able to compete with corporate enterprise and large commercial farms.

Agricultural efficiency will rise as the labor supply becomes adequate, the quality of farm and household supplies improves and machinery is replaced. "The farm equipment situation grows better every day," Dean Young declares. "More tractors have been allotted to agriculture, spare parts from combat vehicles have been provided for farm use and tractor tire production is almost adequate. It probably won't be very many months before commercial production will be able to satisfy all demands for new equipment."

Discussing the problem of adjusting prices and production, Dean Young points out that the Staggall amendment passed in Congress will protect farmers by supporting prices on certain farm products for two years after the end of the war. This surplus in these crops—resulting from patriotic efforts during the war to meet military needs—will not bring many lowering of prices when thrown on the market.

Recent Department of Agriculture surveys reveal that most farmers expect the government "to step in" if prices should drop rapidly. Dean Young says agricultural men favor crop controls, if necessary, to prevent untidily surpluses in any one product.


