2,500 Jobs Open
 Yet 7,000 Are Idle

New Haven, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Thomas J. E. Book, works manager of the Winchester Repeating Arms Company division of Olin Industries, Inc., has been appointed general chairman of the committee on economic development of Connecticut. New England regional chairman, Henry P. Kenney, of Boston, announced today that Book succeeds Theodore H. Beard of Bridgeport.

Book has been chairman of the New Haven committee for the economic development which in three surveys made in 1943 and 1944 was credited with cashing in the shock of reconversion in this city.

Says Pullet Eggs Are Plentiful Now

Hartford, Sept. 11.—Fresh eggs for breakfast and the six egg cake for those who have eggs are back, according to Commissioner of Agriculture, Frank H. Peet. Fresh pullet eggs are now plentiful, said the Commissioner, and Connecticut housewives can again enjoy the soft-boiled egg for breakfast.

Pullets on Connecticut farms are coming into production and supplies of fresh eggs are increasing very rapidly. Wholesale dealers and farmers' cooperatives report that the volume of eggs reaching their plants has doubled and in some cases, tripled in the last few weeks. It is expected that the market will remain firm on large size eggs for the present. Pullet egg prices have dropped to considerably lower levels and both independent and chain grocers are featuring them.

"Fresh pullet eggs equal two large eggs," said Commissioner Peet. "At prevailing prices the smaller eggs sell for more than twice as much as the larger ones and the housewife would do well to take advantage of the situation."

Meat Rationing Back in Canada

Ottawa, Sept. 11.—Canada resumed meat rationing today amid widespread controversy. Halifax Chronicle reported some meat dealers may halt sales in protest.

After going through six years of meat with only nine months of meat rationing, the government announced its resumption for the purpose of providing meat for Great Britain and the liberated countries of Europe. The government's decision was made public yesterday when it was announced that the rationing had remained a secret until now.

The amount of the ration is roughly two pounds per person per week, carcass weight. All cooking and meats, liver, heart and kidney will be rationed. This means that the average family of five will have 10 pounds of meat per week. The ration will be ration-free.

Nimitz Is Moving Back To Pearl Harbor Again

Guam, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Admiral Nimitz announced formally tonight that his headquarters on Guam is moving back to Pearl Harbor, bag and baggage. Admiral Nimitz will be primarily to speed released Navy men homeward—a task he can best do from headquarters near the mainland.

Evidence of the huge transfer is seen in the packing and boxing of records and equipment which has been under way for several days. The major part of one of the Navy's biggest office inventories is expected to be completed by the end of this month.

"The movement is for the purpose of concentrating administrative supervision of the Pacific fleet at Pearl Harbor, in close proximity to the major fleet type commanders," Nimitz press release said.

"Efficiency in the task of returning soldiers and sailors, in ships available, will require close association with those type commanders (examples: commander of battleships, etc.) and with reception agencies on the mainland and other fronts. All Time Low In Votes Cast

New London Approves Annual Sessions of The General Assembly

New London, Sept. 11.—Marked by an all-time low vote cast in a city election, New London's electorate yesterday approved an amendment to the state constitution establishing annual sessions of the General Assembly, to be held in the fall.

The amendment was approved by a vote of 637 to 455. The other amendment, providing for the inauguration of the lieutenant governor, was approved by a vote of 582 to 427.

The first time in three years the Democrats succeeded in selecting a candidate in the City Council, Dr. Frank Leva with 1855 votes received the third largest number of votes in the seven main contests for the three places. Emilio Spirita, the only independent candidate, was a bad loser, receiving 471 votes.

The Democrats came within one of making a clean sweep of the board of education which has been composed of four Republicans for the last three years. The Democrats carried all the offices but Elizabeth Hoare while the Republicans succeeded in placing one candidate, Charles Redden, on the board.

Only 410 of the 11,000 eligible voters went to the polls.

draw up what amounted to a full national organization to foster and promote the simplified machine. That extensive and intricate machine was built around British shipping. In the first instance and as the United Kingdom became so highly industrialized, the machine was simply extended into the selling field.

"Following the lines which have been so successful in the past the British are adopting the one-man, one-machine method despite what they say about regional divisions," the Senator asserted. "They are trying to buy their overseas transport activities the vast commercial machine which has already been built up around their shipping and their foreign trade representative and organizations which are well distributed all over the world."

Other Nations Also
"Our own overseas air transportation will face the competition of complete machines, integrated into and over all the parts of the world which will be of commercial importance. The British are not the only ones; there will be other nations who will do the same thing. We have no ground for objection—there is nothing unfair about it."

Opponents of the one-company plan have charged that it will eventually mean government control, or that it will create monopoly. The Senator said: "These charges are not valid he declared. Regarding the government ownership charge he said: 'If the people of this country ever become convinced that government ownership of all our external air traffic is a good thing it will be done whether one or several transoceanic air companies are involved. As to the monopoly charge,' he declared, "that word 'monopoly' immediately brings up the other word 'competition' and the facts in the case are that we will most definitely be competing against monopolistic organizations of other nations."

Conceding that the one-company method is still a controversial question, the Senator asserted that he believed in it and would support it. "It would be a catastrophe," he said, "if our transoceanic air transportation should have the experience our surface shipping has had in the past. And with the same results. That would mean a small representation on the oceans airways, as we too often had on the surface shipping routes of the various oceans."

Pepper Gives His Opinions

U. S. Senator Expresses His Views on Situation Today in Europe

Berlin, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Senator Claude Pepper (D. Fla.) one-man Senate subcommittee on Foreign Trade, spoke today for American trade prospects for Moscow today in a Russian plane with the warning prediction that "European governments are likely to go Communist as fast as they hold elections."

Pepper said it was of paramount importance that "elimination of German industry's war potential would extend the avenue of Soviet influence."

"I would be inclined to give France the best outright and put the Ruhr under permanent international control, something like a trusteeship, and to see that it produces only for the peaceful needs of Europe," he said.

Pepper said his talks with French leaders, including Communist ex-premier Leon Blum, gave him the impression the Communist party was "wandering its base" in France and would "probably come out on top in election."

The Floridian expressed concern over Britain's financial position since the termination of lend-lease. He said he had held a number of symposiums with "both government leaders and also with Winston Churchill."

"There is no doubt that our idea of free economy is not possible unless Britain likewise is a going concern," he said.

He also expected to stay in the Soviet Union at least a week before continuing to the Middle East.

The Senator made a special effort to sample American opinion in Berlin on a variety of subjects, inviting Floris veterans of the Red Airborne Division to his guest house Sunday and visiting a Red Cross distribution center yesterday.

"Congress and public opinion will press every ship that will float into service for getting our men home at the earliest possible moment," he asserted.

As the meeting opened, diplomats here expressed a fear that interest in Greece might touch off a general strike there and add to the formidable list of knotty questions facing the foreign ministers. This situation was considered especially serious since it comes precisely at the time recent Archbishop Damaskinos is in London insisting upon placing his country's views before the foreign ministers. The Greek attitude on the forthcoming Italian peace treaty is important, since the treaty is the first subject on the agenda of the meeting.

Any flare-up in Greece could easily become the storm center of an already tense Balkan situation. It has been generally assumed that under the terms of the peace treaty Greece would receive from Italy the Dodecanese islands, where their predominantly Greek population. While there is expected to be no opposition to this on political grounds, it was recalled that the strategic importance of the islands is linked closely to the Dardanelles, over which Russia has been demanding greater control. The islands guard the approach to the narrow passage from the Mediterranean to the Black Sea. The Russians want to start with assurances of safety they claim are lacking so long as Turkey alone controls the passage.

A Catholic chaplain said he had been asked to help several soldiers who had succeeded in bringing their German sweethearts to Berlin when they moved in from the western zone.

"If a marriage between an American boy and a German girl represents true love, then it is a natural law," the chaplain said, but he asserted he was concerned over the loose statements of some married soldiers that they would like to divorce their American wives to marry in Germany.

But one authorized spokesman said that even for such a case he would be by U. S. authorities and this was the wedding of a GI betrothed to a Latvian girl in a displaced persons camp 300 miles from Berlin.

Gen. Eisenhower's welfare department said a large number of legitimate children of American soldiers was expected by spring.

Observers here expressed interest in the question of the release of German prisoners. They said they were already in view of a possible future German war effort.

Other Council Decisions
The Allied Control Council decisions moved to re-establish German industry to the degree necessary to satisfy demands of the forces of occupation and to relax as far as possible all unnecessary restrictions on normal international trade in commodities, goods and services.

The British military government at Bonn meanwhile gave Germans the right to organize trade unions, and laid down specific lines for such organizations to follow.

To Send Back German Agents

Allied Control Council Asks All Members to Send It Their Lists

Berlin, Sept. 11.—The Allied Control Council will ask neutral countries harboring "obnoxious" Germans to return them to Germany, the council decided yesterday at its fifth meeting.

It was understood that the list of wanted Germans was being compiled on the basis of tons of documents found in various German government offices from which the identity and functions of the undesirable was traced.

Many Orders Now on Hand

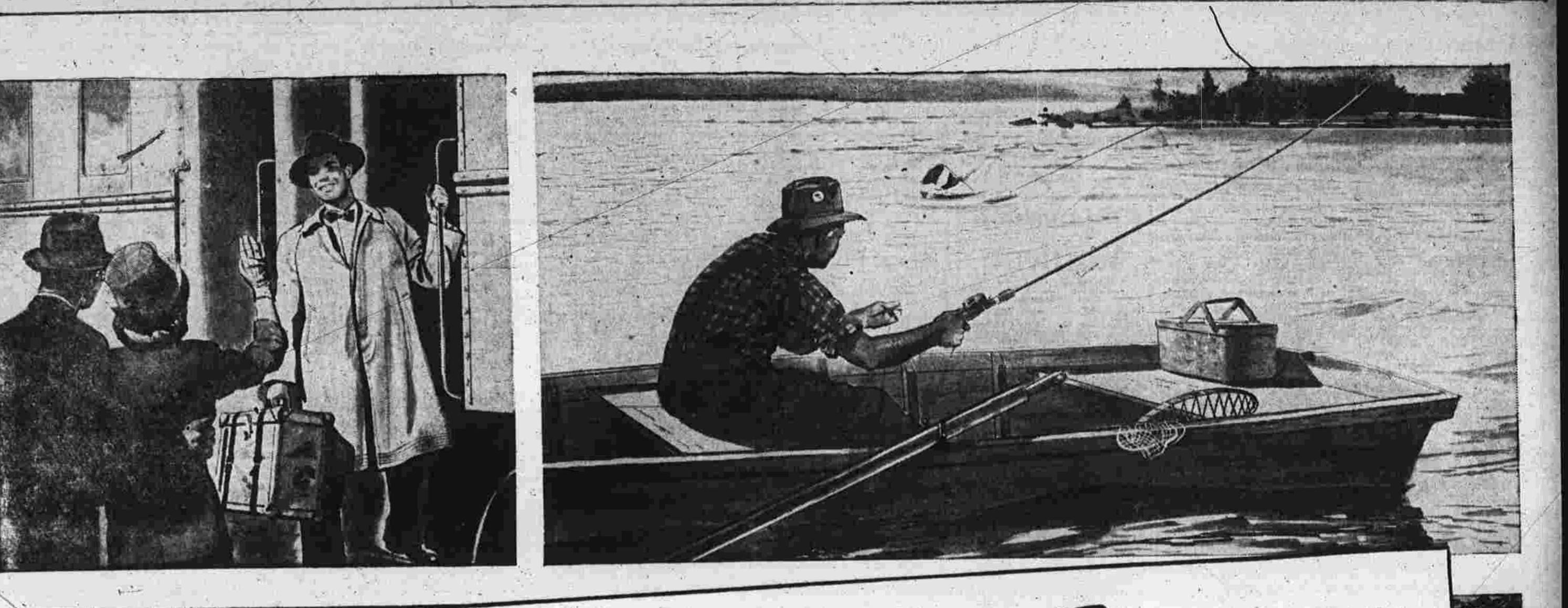
First Post-War Task Of Telephone Firms To Put in Phones

Boston, Sept. 11.—The first post-war task of telephone companies in New England will be to fill approximately 150,000 orders for "tens-a-job" that will take many months due to lack of materials and supplies.

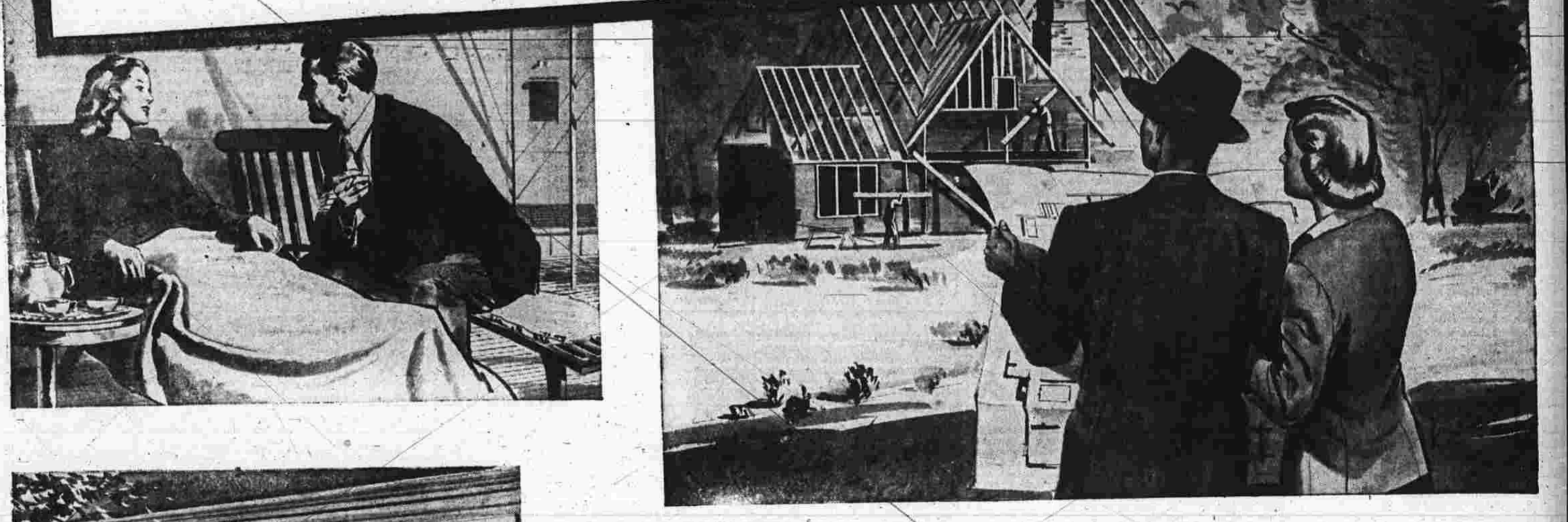
The New England Telephone Company and the Southern New England Telephone Company, in articles in the New England Council's News Letter, state that after orders are filed they plan to swing into programs of improvement, expansion and replacement designed to add new plants and rebuild old ones which will incorporate the newest in telephone equipment.

This will take an estimated five or six years and cost approximately \$150,000,000. Of this amount, about \$100,000,000 would be spent by the New England Telephone Company and the remaining \$50,000,000 by the Southern Company, which serves Connecticut.

There will be no layoffs during the reconstruction period. The New England Telephone now employs 22,500 and plans to take back 1-700 former employees now in military service. The Southern Company employs 6,000 and will increase the number by 600 with the return of veterans.

How to take good care of your electric refrigerator

- Let foods cool. Steaming hot foods should not be placed in the refrigerator as this increases the temperature and causes the motor to work overtime. Give them sufficient time to cool.
- Don't overtop refrigerator. Jamming food into compartments prevents proper circulation of air. Every time you open the door the temperature is raised and the motor works longer.
- Remove ice trays carefully. Using a sharp instrument to pry or force trays free may chip or puncture the freezing compartment and entail costly repairs. If trays get stuck, try defrosting.
- Defrost regularly. When frost is more than one-fourth inch thick, it's time to defrost. Clean both with warm water and baking soda to remove odors, (one teaspoonful to three quarts).
- Maintain even temperature. Your refrigerator was designed to preserve foods—not to freeze them. Running on "HIGH" can damage the foods as well as overwork the motor.
- Don't try to fix it yourself. If your motor runs more than one-half of the time, it probably needs repair. But call a reliable service man. Amateur bungling can wreck expensive parts.
