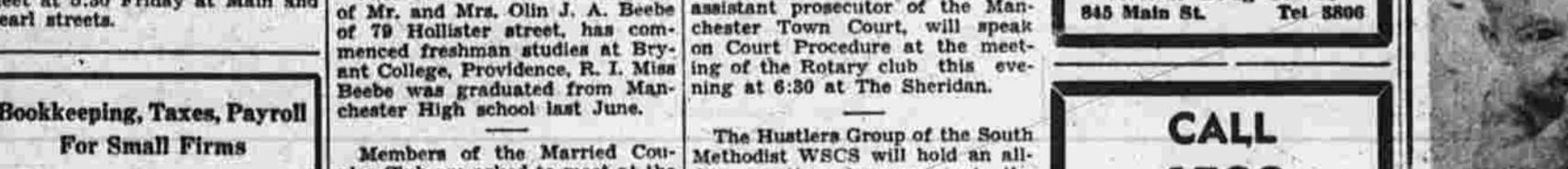

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### Patton Told Give Report On Bavaria

(Continued From Page One) That his choice of words had been unfortunate. Smith said that anyone who thought there would be a modification of Eisenhower's orders was "wild."

To a series of questions by correspondents as to why Nazis had been left in office in Bavaria, Smith replied: "Let's wait a week and see what happens."

Asked what would happen if Patton's order was not followed in Bavaria, Smith said: "I have no idea."

Outlines Eisenhower's Policy The chief of staff outlined Eisenhower's policy with respect to Germany. 1. Complete demilitarization of Germany's political, educational and economic life, as ruthlessly as required.

2. Displacement of displaced persons at the expense of the Germans. 3. Re-establishment of a free internal economy so Germany could maintain a living standard not higher than that of surrounding countries.

4. Removal of all excess heavy industries. Patton is a professional soldier and will obey these orders," Smith said.

He explained that a soldier had the right to express his opinion on a subject until a higher commander made a decision, but that once a decision was made the subordinate could do nothing but carry it out.

"Ultra-Conservative" Deep-Seated Smith declared that, as far as the Nazis were concerned, Bavaria would be cleaned up in 30 days. However, he said U. S. Army headquarters was deeply concerned over the actions of the "ultra-conservative."

This is more important than if someone overlooked a few Nazis in public office," he said, with the explanation that the "Bavarians" attitude led to intolerance and to more intensive indoctrination. Smith said Bavaria's prospects of recovering economically with its small industries, a source of reparations, were good and its food situation was not bad. In spite of the general criticism, he said, the situation there is better than in most sections of Germany.

(Continued From Page One) of the United States in the Pacific, despite Secretary of State James F. Byrnes' insistence that he came to London prepared only to discuss German questions.

Tentative plans for a December meeting in Washington of an Allied Control Commission for Japan have been placed before the British, it was reported reliably, reviving a plan under pressure from the dominions, particularly Australia.

Minor Agreements Reached Some minor agreements have been reached, it was reported authoritatively, among them an agreement to move the German reparations commission from Moscow to Berlin to speed collecting payments.

The French were said to have presented a memorandum demanding acceptance of the principle that restitution come before reparations. They maintained that the Russians had taken goods as a part of Soviet reparations, and said they wanted these back.

The French also were reported to have asked repatriation of Alsace and Lorraine citizens captured by the Russians after having been impressed into German military service. The Russians were said to have promised to weigh each case individually.

France's proposals for internationalization of the Rhineland and the Ruhr's heavy industry were believed to be high on the remaining agenda.

Chinese Back United States The Chinese, while defending U. S. policy in Japan as proceeding with necessary caution, were reported favorable to the idea of a control commission.

A Tokyo dispatch said Jacob Malik, former Soviet ambassador to the United States, had filed a petition against the findings of the labor group, however.

### Action to Restore Competition Urged

Public Works Program Necessary in Short Run; Reduction Seen Possible in Spending

(This is the third of a series of six articles in which leading economists offer recommendations for keeping America prosperous. The articles were condensed by their authors for The Associated Press from the forthcoming volume "Financing America's Prosperity," which is being published by the Twentieth Century Fund as one of its surveys in the public interest.)

If we are to bring about an orderly transition to a satisfactory economic level now that the war has ended, immediate action must be taken to prevent an excessive boom, to shape our tax laws favorably to enterprise capital, to open up international trade and finance to expansion; and, finally, to combat monopoly in all fields. Such measures can make it possible eventually to reduce public spending. But in the short run public works programs will be necessary.

Can Strengthen Private Enterprise Public works, when properly handled, can strengthen private enterprise. They must be governed by long-term productivity. They should be restricted to restoring competition in monopolized fields, or operate in those fields not well covered by private competition. And they should be timed to offset the business depression.

Without some drastic economic reforms, deficit financing could carry us to a Fascist or Socialist state. However, for the immediate future, now the debt is managed and a more important issue than how to have some further increase in the debt to put the economy into working order is longer for the future, if we avoid a continuous rise in the debt we may expect a gradual increase in productivity progressively to ease the debt burden.

Briefly, many economists believe that depressions are caused by an excess of savings in relation to investment, especially investment in high-risk enterprises. They argue that such savings must be prevented, perhaps penalized, or we shall have economic stagnation. As long as the material standard of living-income groups is inadequate, the savings will be excessive. Capital can be used for slum clearance, hospital schools, etc. It is a cruel irony that we have "too much saving."

Purpose of Economic Activity Consumption is the purpose of economic activity; and a much more equal sharing in total consumption is one important purpose of a democratic economic program. This may possibly be achieved by progressive taxation, heavy death duties, marked expansion of social security programs, free or at-cost provision of many essential services, equality of opportunity through free public education, and through a general relaxing of monopoly restriction.

A democratic economic system must have the decision as to taxing and consuming to the income receivers. The most that should be done regarding this decision is to try to establish an economic system in which saving is not motivated by fear of periodic depression.

### Checks Public Transit Buses

Special Effort Is Being Made to Assure School Transportation Safety

Hartford, Sept. 26—The Highway Safety Commission has been assured by Motor Vehicles Commissioner Elmer S. Watson that specific efforts are being made by his department to ensure complete inspection of vehicles used in Connecticut for school transportation.

The Public Utilities Commission is studying possible changes in identification lights for buses. Improvements in destination signs, enlargement of stop lights, safety features of emergency doors to facilitate emptying of vehicles in case of accident. Stress is also placed on statutory width limit of 36 inches which is an overall restriction. Water vehicles cannot be registered in Connecticut for public transit.

The close supervision of public transit vehicles by the Public Utilities Commission and the Department of Motor Vehicles are being maintained by William M. Greene, director of the Highway Safety Commission, "is most gratifying. It has been years since reasonable inspection of such vehicles has been possible, because of wartime restrictions. Accident prevention agencies are even more apprehensive about possible accident consequences."

"Through constant inspection of such vehicles under the Joint agreement of the Public Utilities Commission and the Department of Motor Vehicles the public is assured that defective vehicles will not get going," he said. "What's your hurry," he mused, "I paid for it, don't I?"

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Trouble Seen Lying Ahead In Germany

(Continued from Page One) outside it has any exact knowledge about what is going on.

Stripped of Machinery. The frequently expressed impression of American officials is that the Russians have stripped their territory, particularly the Berlin area, of virtually all useful industrial machinery.

Attribution Action To Strikes. They say the indications are that Russia has gone beyond the limit of the Potsdam Big Three declaration. This called for removal of machinery down to the minimum required for essential peace-time existence.

Furthermore, officials here expect little or no help from the German eastern area in feeding people of western Germany. They say the Russians decline to furnish any food for British and American zones in Berlin.

The Potsdam declaration was supposed to provide for handling Germany as an economic unit. Machinery taken from the Allied western zones was to be exchanged for food taken from the surplus food areas of eastern Germany. There is no evidence, however, that anything has been done about this.

British Zone Conditions Worst. In the heavily industrialized British zone, conditions are reported to be worst of all.

The British have made known to American authorities their extreme concern over the prospect of freezing and starvation, particularly in the bombed areas.

First appeals are expected to come from this area. What happens on these immediate problems of food, clothing and organization will fix in the months immediately ahead a pattern of German existence for a long time.

Chance of Split-Up. Based on this point is the authoritative prediction that there is a good chance of Germany splitting into Soviet dominated eastern territory and one or more western areas dominated by the Anglo-American-French Allies.

There are reports that one of the main factors behind the French desire to have an industrial state carved out of the Ruhr area and given an international or independent status. Here the main concern is what then might happen to the rest of western Germany. It would become a sort of central German state having neither political nor economic reasons for independent existence.

There is obviously no easy solution here. One thing seems certain. It is that the solution will never be found while we follow a policy of economic isolation, in which we believe the American farm produce must be destroyed if Americans can't eat it all. This produce should be going where it is needed, and our standard should be that America is over-producing only when there is no more hunger in the world.

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Chinese Reds Attack Japs

Wu Reports Violation of Central Government's Disarmament Program. Chungking, Sept. 26—(AP)—China's minister of information, Dr. K. C. Wu said today that Communist troops in north China are attacking Japanese, in violation of a central government disarmament program.

A questionnaire at a news conference referred to reports published in a local Communist newspaper, reporting that Japanese were fighting with Communists and upholding the questionnaire.

Two Japanese had attacked the Communist with the sanction of the Chinese central government, Dr. Wu said flatly that this was untrue.

Ordered to Maintain Order. "The government has a plan for accepting the surrender of Japanese forces in China," the minister said. "Orders were issued to Japanese commanders that before the arrival of government troops they were to maintain peace and order in their respective areas."

"If the Communist troops obey instructions of the central government and stay in their own areas, there will be no conflict as alleged in the Communist paper."

"Have Communists been attacking the Japanese?" Wu was asked. "I should say so," Wu replied.
