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Soft Coal Strike Further Reduces Steel Production

Number of Persons Idle in Nation on Labor Disputes Rises to More Than 460,000; Mine Strike Covers Nearly 200,000 Now

Bulletin: Washington, Oct. 12.—(P)—Secretary of Labor Schwelb failed again today in his week-long effort to settle the soft coal strike. A conference of coal operators and miners adjourned until tomorrow morning with no hint of progress. Schwelb, unsmiling, said he had no definite word as to whether the United Mine Workers and bituminous operators are still "in the process of arguing."

Union Leaders Hit Stevedore Row in Britain

Declare Walkout Paralyzing Great Ports and Menacing Ration System Backed by Reds

London, Oct. 12.—(P)—Union leaders today condemned British stevedore strike, paralyzing the island's great ports and menacing the meager ration system, and declared the walkout was being encouraged by Communist agitators. The National Dockers Group committee of the Transport and General Workers union in a statement declared the strike was "a deliberate attempt to paralyze the country with certain political organizations who had ready prepared plans for the disruption of the country's economy and maintaining strike action."

George Wants Changes Made in Taxes Cut

Senate Finance Chairman Favors Reducing Rather Than Wiping Out Income Levy

Washington, Oct. 12.—(P)—Chairman George of the Senate Finance committee called today for reducing rather than wiping out income taxes for 12,000,000 low-income Americans. He said he would support a bill which would reduce the tax rate on income up to \$1,000 a year from 14 to 10 percent. He also would support a bill which would reduce the tax rate on income over \$1,000 a year from 21 to 17 percent.

Civil Liberties Promise Given

Amnesty for Political Prisoners Also Held Out to Spanish People

Madrid, Oct. 12.—(P)—Generalissimo Franco's government, in a move generally interpreted as a bid for support both at home and abroad, held out to the Spanish people today the promise of a restoration of civil liberties and amnesty for political prisoners. The promise, extended in an official announcement which followed a prolonged cabinet session, was to be implemented by publication of a formal decree in the next few days.

Testifies Dog Only Playful

Juana Borman Says She Did Not Have Wolfhound at Camp

Luenburg, Oct. 12.—(P)—Small dog owner Juana Borman, one of the 48 SS Guards on trial for crimes at two concentration camps testified today that the dog she was accused of having trained to fly to the throats of prisoners was only a playful little animal and that she never intended to harm anyone.

Philadelphia's City Council Sentences Pigeons to Die

Philadelphia, Oct. 12.—(P)—Philadelphia's pigeons have been sentenced to death by city council. The city immediately became divided into two factions—pigeon lovers and those who would see them exterminated. The city council voted to send a letter to the National Pigeon Society, asking them to help in the extermination of the birds.

Students Display Protest Signs in Argentina

Truman Raps Racial Stand

Powerless to Interfere With Ban on Negro Singer Set by D. A. R.

Washington, Oct. 12.—(P)—President Truman today sharply criticized racial discrimination in making public a letter concerning the refusal of the D. A. R. to allow a Negro singer to perform at its headquarters. The president said that the D. A. R. was "a disgrace to the American flag" and that he was "powerless to interfere with the ban imposed by the D. A. R. on the Negro singer."

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Death of Nazi Party Decried

Berlin, Oct. 12.—(P)—The Allied Control Council today formally decried the death sentence passed on the Nazi party, all its branches, formations and affiliated organizations. The council said that the death sentence was "a gross violation of the principles of justice and fair play."
