**Reds Claim Big Atomic Power Find**

Lead is among the heavy chemical elements whose splitting, if it could be done, probably would yield enough atomic energy for either bombs or power. Allied experiments have shown no means of splitting lead atoms. The appearance of protons when lead atoms are hit by cosmic rays is not necessarily a sign of splitting.

Izvestia said the Russian scientist Peter Kapitsa, the Soviet union's foremost expert in atomic research, had played a leading role in the building of a power magnet for the expedition.

Worked At Cambridge  
Kapitsa studied and worked for 13 years at Cambridge as a protégé of the late Lord Rutherford, famed British scientist and one of the pioneers in experiments of radioactivity and splitting the atom.

Of his most recent work, he said: "He returned to Russia in 1934, and began work at the great magnetic institute built for him outside Moscow."

For some time it had been reported that Kapitsa was working on atomic energy in the Arctician mountains.

The most recently published work, the Soviet scientific writer, N. M. Ivanov, had this to say last May 26: "His brilliant experiments with subjects subjected to strong magnetic fields at low temperatures are throwing light on movements in the atomic structure of matter hidden from the eyes of man and from his instruments."

Izvestia said the current work began last August, the month in which the first atomic bomb was dropped on Japan by the U. S. Air Forces.

The expedition is headed by the scientist, A. Alkhanov.

**Yale Professor Named Chairman**

Hartford, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Dr. Sheldon D. Bacon of Yale has been named chairman of the Connecticut commission to administer a state fund for the care and treatment of inebriates.

The action came yesterday at an annual meeting of the committee which also elected Dr. Thomas P. Murdock of Meriden, vice chairman, and Rep. Roy Edna A. F. Edgerton of Storrs, secretary.

**WORLD STANDS LIKE RED LIGHT ON TRACK: ALL NATIONS JEALOUS OF NATIONAL RIGHTS**

(Editor's Note: This is the third of three stories on the atomic bomb as it affects the future.)

Washington, Nov. 14.—(AP)—The word "sovereignty" stands like a red light on the track leading toward full world agreement—agreement with real meaning—on controlling the atomic bomb.

We've always been jealous of our national "sovereignty." So have other nations. The word means simply this:

A free and independent nation will not let any other nation or group of nations tell it what to do or how to act.

If we lose our "sovereignty," we lose our right to make decisions for ourselves.

**Run Country By Majority**

Yet in our domestic affairs we run our country by a majority vote and hold up that method as the truly democratic way of life.

Right now the problem of national sovereignty in connection with the bomb is being talked of widely.

The word sovereignty haunted the San Francisco conference last night when the delegates of the United Nations organization.

At San Francisco the big nations, including our own, were willing to yield some minor points but not the big ones. And the biggest point of all was UNO's Security Council.

This is UNO's most powerful agency. It's supposed to prevent war by acting quickly against aggressors in the United States, Britain, Russia, France and China are permanent members of the council.

All Big Five Must Agree

But—if the council wants to act to prevent war, all of those big five nations must agree. If one of them votes "no" or is powerless to act. It acts only by unanimous consent of the Big Five.

In a crisis, one "no" vote would break up UNO. The "no" vote is called veto power. One big nation thus could veto the desires of all the others.

By insisting on retaining that veto power—the protest of smaller nations at San Francisco—the Big Five really were hanging on to their national sovereignty.

Each, by retaining veto power, was making sure a majority of the others could not force it into action if it did not wish to take.

Yet, if our delegates to the San Francisco conference had not insisted on retaining our veto power, I doubt that our Senate ever would have let us join UNO. Russia also insisted on retaining its veto power.

Would Require Amendment

Any change that would eliminate any nation's veto power on the Security Council would require an amendment to the charter. The Senate would have to have a hand in that.

Even in the face of the atomic bomb, it is not likely the Senate would be willing to yield any of our national sovereignty.

Yet some senators already have said the bomb must change our thinking, that we must enter fully into international agreements, even if it means yielding sovereignty.

It has been argued here, especially by the British, no change would be necessary in the UNO charter if the Security Council took control of atomic energy decisions.

Mrs. Makler is in a St. Louis hospital, suffering from a brain disorder from which her physician, Dr. Joseph Magidson, says she may not recover. He said Makler's return might aid his wife.

### Files of Kent Case Sought

#### Republicans Look for Information Bearing on Japanese Attack

Washington, Nov. 14—(AP)—Republican members of the House Harbor Investigating committee looked today to the State department and the FBI as possible sources of new disclosures.

Senator Brewster (R., Me.), told committee members that the State department has been asked to give the committee all its files on the Tyler Kent case. Brewster said he and Senator Ferguson (R., Mich.) want to study them to see whether they include anything bearing on the declassification of the war before the Japanese struck at Pearl Harbor.

Kent, a code clerk in the American embassy in London, recently completed a prison sentence in 1940, of violation of the British official secrets act and sentenced to seven years. Time off for good behavior shortened his term.

In Charge of Coding  
Brewster said that it had been his understanding that Kent had been in charge of coding and decoding messages between the Navy and the State department. He said that the investigation will be conducted by the committee which has had access to all Roosevelt-Churchill correspondence from the late president's files now stored in the Archives building here.

Kent had had on his desk copies of exhibits he had just had been sent to committee members. He said that he had seen in detail before hearings are begun by the Senate House Inquiry committee tomorrow.

House Turn Up New Data  
Although some senators have predicted that the investigation will be a "dry run," a committee said it is his opinion that quite a bit of new information may be turned up.

House Republicans, too, thought the committee is going to find out a great deal about the code-breaking operation that has been going on in the State department since the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Oct. 7, 1941.

The California-wire Hoover told him that he suggested to the Japanese consul's office in Honolulu today that he was "very important evidence" of the Japanese intention to resort to military action.

"All of this information," Gearhart said, "was promptly reported to the Army and Navy by Mr. Hoover."

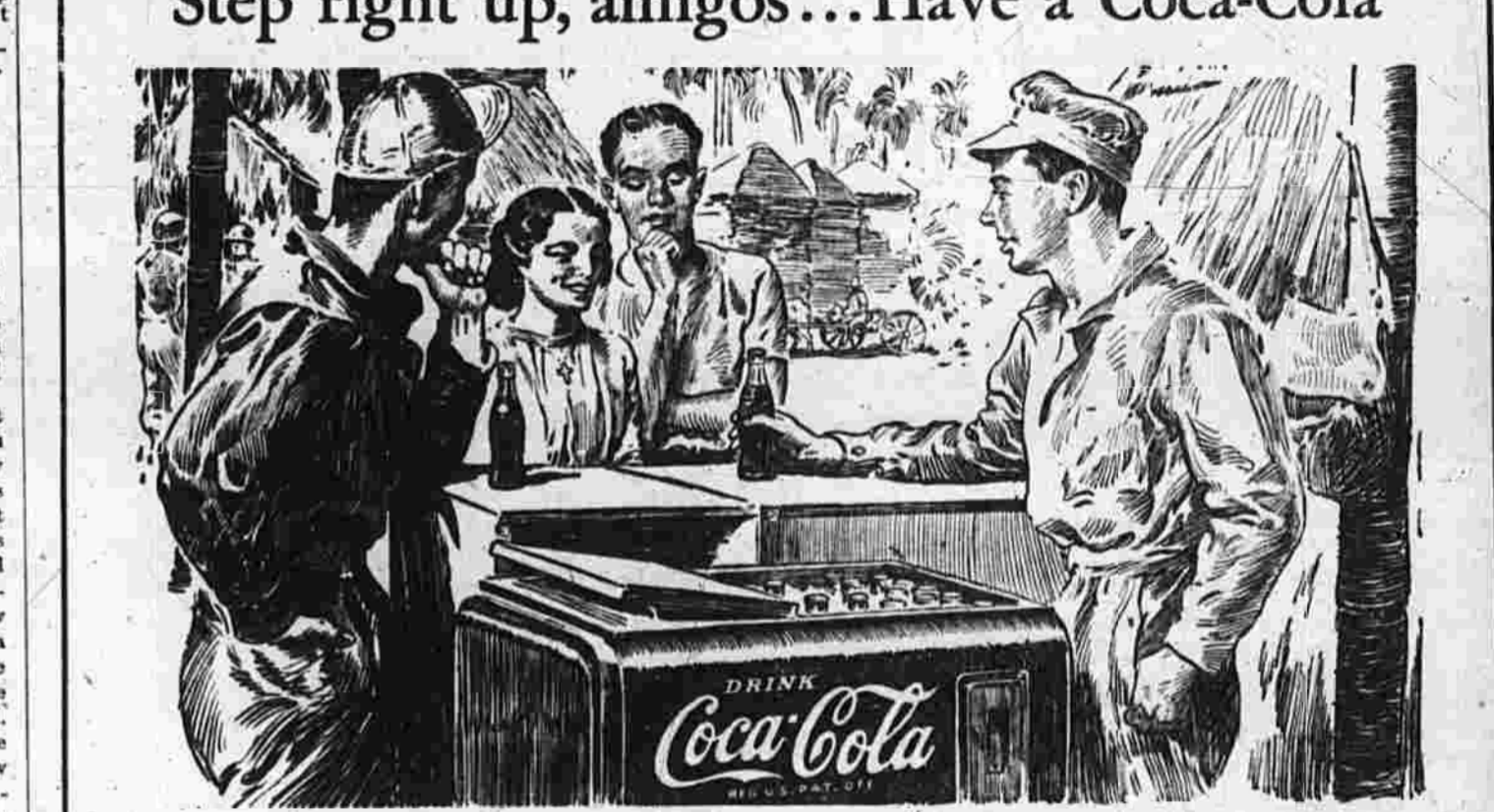

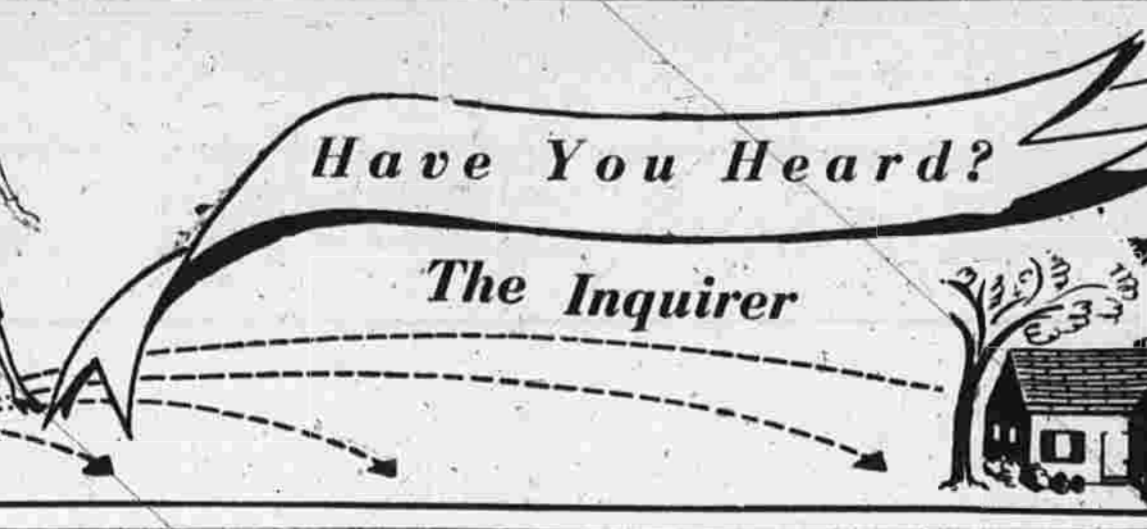

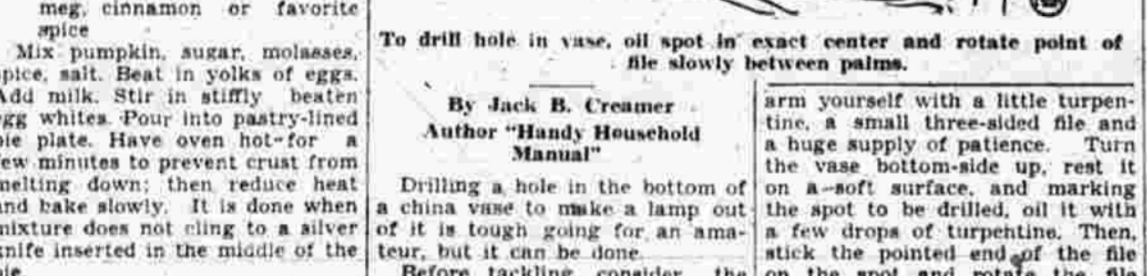

Report On the War By General George C. Marshall

This is the third of 45 installments of General Marshall's report on the winning of World War II.

Japan's Objectives Not only were the European partners of the Axis unable to coordinate their plans and resources and agree within their own nations how best to proceed, but the eastern partner, Japan, was working in even greater confusion.

What Japan Intended The best estimate of Japan's plan for the accomplishment of her objectives appears to be the following:

1. Neutralize or destroy the U. S. Pacific Fleet by an attack on Pearl Harbor.

2. Drive rapidly south over the Pacific Islands and the Southwest and South Pacific Islands in order to cut sea routes of the United States from the East and gain the vast natural resources of the East Indies.

3. Cut China's supply line from the west by an invasion of Burma, Malaya and the Philippines.

4. Invade the Aleutian Islands via Midway, Alaska, to form a northern flank, dependent on the Japanese and Russian navies.

5. Bring the American Navy to a standstill by a surprise attack on the West Coast aviation industry, and then seize California.

6. Stimulate unrest to eventual revolution in India.

7. The Japanese strategic plan included a surprise attack on Hawaii, capturing Oahu and the important bases there, and bringing us a necessary focal point from which to launch operations in the Western Pacific.

There can be no doubt that the great and mistakes of the heroic stands of the British and Soviet peoples saved the United States a war on her own soil.

Had the U. S. S. R. and the British Army of the Nile been defeated in 1942, as they well might have been, the Japanese and Italian navies and air forces would have had better coordinated operations.

Our close approach to that terrifying situation should have a sobering influence on Americans for generations to come. Yet, this is only a prelude of what can be expected so long as there are nations on earth capable of waging total war.
