Hess Accepts Full Blame for Doings; Memory Not Lost

Feigned Loss, Even to Attorney, for 'Tactical Reasons'; Surprise Witness Testifies Spy Expert Long Plotted to Assassinate Hitler

Nuernberg, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Rudolf Hess told the International Military tribunal today that he accepted "full responsibility for all I have done, signed or co-signed," and that he wished to continue on trial with his fellow Nazis.

The court adjourned for the day without announcing a ruling on the mental fitness of the former No. 2 deputy fuhrer, whom Allied psychiatrists have reported sane, but suffering from hysteria.

Long Plotted Against Hitler Hess case was brought up after a surprise German witness testified that Germany's leading spy expert long plotted against Hitler and finally was executed in 1944 after the failure of the bomb plot against the fuhrer.

Adm. Walter Wilhelm Canaris, mysterious Greek-blooded chief of the German Army's Counter-Espionage section, was named as a leader of the anti-Hitler military clique by Maj. Gen. Erwin Lahoussen, Canaris' aide.

Lahoussen said that Canaris, who ran the German spy service disguised as a commercial agency during the days of the German republic, hated Hitler and headed a military clique which plotted against the Nazi leader from the time he rose to power.

Lahoussen testified that Field Marshal Wilhelm Kietel, one of the defendants, wanted German secret agents to murder the two French military leaders after the fall of France to remove them as possible centers of French resistance.

Weygand was Allied generalissimo at the time of the fall of France and later was Marshal Petain's administrator in North Africa.

Giraud for a time was the Allied commander in North Africa.

GM Not Ready To Talk Over Pay Demands

Corporation Agrees to Discuss Union's Strike With Government Conciliator, However.

By The Associated Press General Motors is not ready to reopen wage negotiations with the CIO United Auto Workers, but the corporation has agreed to discuss the union's strike with a government conciliator.

GM Vice President Harry W. Anderson will meet with Edgar L. Warren, U. S. Conciliation service chief, in Washington, Tuesday, with the aim, Warren said, of getting negotiations "resumed as soon as possible."

Anderson expressed the hope Secretary of Labor Schweikert would find time to attend the meeting. Earlier this week Schweikert and Warren met with union officials.

Must Modify Increase Request GM stood firm in its refusal to negotiate until the union "modifies" its 30 per cent wage rate increase request and halts what the company termed "illegal picketing" of GM plants.

The national total of jobs in labor disputes stood at 530,000. CIO representatives of employees of Montgomery Ward & Company in Chicago have agreed to meet with company representatives to discuss a proposed 60 cents an hour minimum wage.

The present minimum was increased from 45 1/2 to 52 1/2 cents Nov. 26. The mail order house announced an increase to 60 cents effective Dec. 13, for its non-union employees in Chicago, and said it would like to meet with the union to discuss writing a similar raise into a contract covering CIO members.

No date for the meeting has been set. A "demonstration" one-week work stoppage against Ward plants in many parts of the country is scheduled to continue through tomorrow.

The CIO United Retail, Wholesale and Department store employees has said it would call similar strikes "from time to time" to support its demands for a closed shop, checkoff of union dues and wage adjustment.

Admits Lack Of Knowledge On Vote Acts

Hartford, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Patrick J. DePasquale, professional bondsman and Republican leader, cross-examined in Superior court today in the conspiracy trial in progress before Judge P. E. O'Sullivan and the jury, testified that he was not acquainted with the provisions of the corrupt practice act relating to elections.

DePasquale yesterday admitted having received a contribution of \$2,500 from Herman Levitan, one of the defendants. He had testified that he told Harry Ward, Republican leader, and another defendant, that he had received \$1,000 from Levitan and suggested to Ward that DePasquale and Ward each turn over \$500 to the Republican Town committee. The report of the committee treasurer indicates contributions of \$300 each from Ward and DePasquale.

Citizen Since 1923 DePasquale today said that he had been a citizen since 1923 and in politics since 1924 and had fled.

**Arrives Home From Pacific**

**George Converse Spent Two Years Overseas; Has Six Battle Stars**

Technician 4th Grade George Converse, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence A. Converse of 40 Phelps road, arrived home Thursday morning after two years of service in the South Pacific. The local soldier's parents were highly elated when their son, whom they hadn't heard from in 11 weeks with the exception of a telephone call from San Francisco on Nov. 21, dropped in, home for good. T-4 Converse was honorably discharged on Wednesday, November 22, at Fort Devens' separation center via the Army point system.

T-4 Converse enlisted in the Army February 26, 1942, and was sent to Fort Bragg, N. C. for his basic training. He was then assigned to the Signal Corps and later served as a liaison officer in the Philippines and New Guinea, Bismarck archipelago, the southern Philippines and Luzon. He was awarded six battle stars for his duties against the enemy as well as the Asiatic Pacific, Good Conduct, American Theater of Operation and the Philippine Liberation ribbons with one bronze star. In addition he holds the Victory medal.

T-4 Converse arrived in this country in San Francisco on November 21 and called his parents for the first time in several years. It was also the first news of their son in 11 weeks. The local soldier then flew from San Francisco to the Newark airport in a C-47 and from there to Fort Devens where he was given his final papers. He is a graduate of Manchester High school, class of 1939 and prior to entering the service was employed by his father.

Carrier Division one, said "the surest, swiftest and lowest morale which are resulting from the heat of the current discussion combined with the effects of major stimulation add to the need for the earliest decision consistent with thorough consideration."

He drew a distinction between operational and administrative commands. Unification of operational command in each theater was conducive to the most effective conduct of war, he said, since it is flexible and easily changed to meet conditions. But administrative command, he contended, is of necessity relatively enduring and inflexible.

"Operational command can be unified completely and adequately in Washington and in the field, in peace and in war, irrespective of the administration organization of the national defense into one, two or three departments," Sherman said.

**Boyle's COLUMN**

Shanghai, Nov. 30.—China's top admiral, Chan Shao-Kwan, wears six stars, one more than any other admiral in the world. And right now the Chinese Navy is down to six ships, one for each star.

It wasn't always that way. Hundreds of years ago the Chinese Navy had no many ships—wooden junk, of course.—that they could be chained together to form a sea blockade, 200 miles long.

That was back in the Han dynasty and the three-kingdom dynasty, when three warlords were fighting one another on sea and land. They fought a close-quarter war in those days. They sent junka affre with flaming arrows, board-ed, and beat in every head with spiked clubs.

The modern Chinese navy began to take shape after the opium war of 1842. China built dockyards and a navy training station. Sharp setbacks suffered several decades later when the Emperor sent the Navy and built a summer palace at Peking.

In 1897 the Navy had 53 ships, including five cruisers; total tonnage, 44,000 tons.

The fleet was destroyed—except for six small vessels—in three blockade operations on the Yangtze river in late 1897 and early 1903. These blockades were more or less delaying actions, and were costly in men and ships, but prevented the Japanese from sending invasion forces into the interior aboard transport ships.

All five cruisers were lost just below Nanking. Small craft were purposely sunk in the river and the cruisers lined up behind this barrier. The blockade was effective until Japanese aircraft dropped a destructive load of bombs.

The Chinese tried the same tactic again, with mines sited, at a point midway between Nanking and Hankow. Again Japanese planes sank Chinese ships, but the Japanese didn't get up the Yangtze.

The third blockade was at Hankow, where floating mines supplied the few Chinese ships left. Some Japanese destroyers and transport were sunk. This blockade enabled Hankow to hold out for 10 months. It might have fallen in a matter of weeks had the Japanese been able to come up the river.

Coal Seven-Eights of Navy  
These three blockades cost seven-eighths of the Chinese navy. The few ships that survived were taken upriver to Chungking after their guns had been removed and employed at shore batteries.

The Chinese Navy as such ceased to exist, but Chinese sailors went into the countryside as guerrilla forces. Some operated mini-fields along the Yangtze.

Soon there will be more than 20 gunboats, but nothing heavier than a gunboat, in the Chinese Navy. Some are being raised from the river bottom by the Japanese and turned over to China. Others are gifts from Britain, the United States and France. At least one American gunboat, the Tutuila, is now in Chinese hands.

China wants a seaworthy navy. Gunboats are all right for the Yangtze, but they aren't built for the sea; so China wouldn't mind taking over some of Japan's ships.

Lieut. Comdr. B. C. (Charlie) Ling, Admiral Chen's liaison officer, puts it this way: "We understand that Japan's remaining aircraft carriers, battle-ships and smaller warships are going to be sunk in the demobilization program. We feel that's bad. These ships should be given to China in part payment for what Japan has done to us."
