Skirt Top Secret As Events Before Jap Blow Probed

Senate-House Committee Orders Up Work Sheets of Cryptographers Who Picked Out Meaning of Messages Japanese Sent

Washington, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Pearl Harbor investigators today skirted one of the war's top military secrets—how we broke the Japanese code—in their scrutiny of events preceding the Pacific bastion attack almost four years ago.

Cooper and Ferguson told reporters they don't want that information, but they are not sure they will be able to get it. Cooper raised the point in yesterday's hearing that there was nothing in copies of Japanese messages furnished the committee to indicate when they were received in Washington. He noted that more than three weeks elapsed between the date one message was decoded and translation in the capital.

He pointed out that a lengthy message sent Nov. 24, 1941, by a Japanese agent in Honolulu to Tokyo about the activity of the American fleet in Pearl Harbor was not translated until Dec. 10, 1941.

On Dec. 3, 1941, Foreign Minister Togo sent the Japanese agent in Honolulu a message which said: "In view of present situation, the Japanese government has decided to evacuate its military and diplomatic carriers and crews from the island of Hawaii."

The Doctor Says:

Pulse is the Heart's Speedometer
By William A. O'Brien, M. D.

The large arteries attached to the heart, which are always filled with blood, receive an additional two inches with each heart beat. As the vessel walls are elastic, this causes a distention which passes over the arteries like a wave until it is felt in the wrist as the pulse. Chief interest in the pulse is in its rate, rhythm and quality. The normal pulse varies from 40 to 100 beats per minute (average 60 to 80). Children tend to have a more rapid pulse than adults. An extremely slow pulse (around 40 per minute) may be normal. Highly trained athletes often have a slow pulse as their powerful hearts and strong muscles send their blood around the body more efficiently than average. A slow pulse may also be caused by thyroid deficiency or some forms of heart disease.

Excitable Quietness Rate
Rapid pulse rates result from excitement, hemorrhage (shock, oxygen lack (as in mountain climbers), increased metabolism, fever, diseases of the heart and other conditions. Nervous persons who are always excited, these pulses may increase its rate from sixty.

Irregularity in the pulse is common and may be caused by the effect of breathing. In young persons especially, the pulse speeds up during inspiration and slows down during expiration and there also is a slow waxing and waning

With an eye to alleviating winter suffering, Allied authorities granted the Japanese permission to export 4,000,000 pounds of abraded silk fibers for manufacture of civilian clothing and blankets. The Japanese plan to make underwear, silk overcoats and blankets from the silk which will be mixed with cotton, wool and other textiles.

Washington, Dec. 1.—The most positive step taken by the Labor-Management Conciliation Service was its recommendation that the U. S. Conciliation Service be strengthened.

This was a sensible but not sensational recommendation. It was an achievement to get labor and management on the line saying that was the way to handle workers' demands.

And this resolution was passed: "That the Labor-Management Conciliation Service on all elements of labor and management be broadened to include the broad democratic spirit of tolerance and equality of economic opportunity in respect to race, sex, color, religion, age, national origin or ancestry."

The recommendation calls for taking a hint, may try to do it. Better pay would need congressional approval. A conciliator's job is to try to get management and labor to start talking again when they fall out.

Two Methods For Veterans

May File Benefits in Two Categories; Advantages in Both

Hartford, Dec. 1.—The Connecticut Unemployment Compensation Law gives all veterans who are employed in private, non-agricultural employment, prior to their entrance in the armed forces, the right to file under either the State Unemployment Compensation Law or the so-called "G. I. Bill of Rights," veterans were required today by Commissioner John J. Egan, through the office of James J. Graham, Acting Executive Director, Employment Security Division.

A study of the two methods in which veterans may receive benefits under each. The present benefit under the State Unemployment Compensation Law gives a bonus claimant a maximum of 52 weeks of \$22 a week plus \$2 for each week up to a maximum of 52 weeks.

If a veteran filed and has been receiving benefits under the State Unemployment Compensation Act, he may continue to draw his 52 weeks under the G. I. Bill as well. On the other hand, if he first exhausts his G. I. benefits, at the end of the 52 weeks he may file for a maximum of 52 weeks.

Under the state unemployment compensation system the first week of file is termed a "waiting week" for which you will receive no compensation, and in addition the first week in each April. Furthermore, if you are filing under the State Unemployment Compensation Law and become ill, or unable to work, you are entitled to other program to receive benefits, until such time as you are able to work. But if you file under the G. I. Bill and become ill, you are entitled to a 26-week benefit, which is paid in advance, Daniel K.
