Chelsea, Mass., Dec. 15.—(P)—A weeping 23-year-old mother, Mrs. Rose Carlan, was arraigned today on a charge of murder in connection with the death of her six-month-old baby boy, whose body was found yesterday in her home, 16 days after she had reported him kidnapped.

Mrs. Carlan did not plead to the charge, but said weeping, "It's not true when Clerk of Court Stephen White read the charge in Chelsea District court. Ordered committed to Hospital District Court Judge John W. McLean continued the case to Dec. 24, and ordered the woman committed to a psychiatric hospital for ten days' observation.

Mrs. Carlan was held on "a suspicion of murder" last night after police found Baby Ronald's body stuffed under the china closet in a combination dining-sleeping room in the Carlan tenement.

The police had gone to the Carlan home to question the mother and her sister-in-law, James Carlan, who flew home from the west coast on an emergency leave from the Navy after the kidnaping was reported.

Mrs. Carlan was led by a matron into the Chelsea District court room, in a building attached to the police headquarters, out of sight of dozens of spectators gathered around the street doorway.

merging two great departments we will achieve more effective aid to the individual service man.

Declaring himself in favor of unified field command in warfare, Halsey said that the merger of the armed services would "destroy the initiative of the individual service man."

"It would hamstring their right to advance," he said, "it would deprive them of representation before the Congress and the people, it would substitute military control for civilian control. It might lead to a military dictatorship."

He worked continuously from the early days of the Pacific war to develop coordination and teamwork. "I can't say it any more. But, let me emphasize—don't take the magic of merger to achieve the joint chiefs of staff," he said. "It is a prejudicial, arbitrary, decision of one mind."
