Hawley, acting surgeon general of the War Department, said today that approximately 80,000 veterans of World War I are in hospitals or at homes. The peak of World War I veterans is expected within a year or two. The peak of World War II veterans will not be reached until 1975, experts have predicted. They say as many as 2,000,000 veterans may become patients. Meanwhile the influx of patients at veteran hospitals sets new records, nurses and attendants are available to attend them. Gen. Omar N. Bradley, veterans administrator, said the veterans' situation is "very serious."

He had served briefly as acting commander of all American forces in the European theater.

"A plentiful supply of tires is not expected until several months, perhaps all of 1946," said C.P.A. Administrator John D. Small. Many tires today are of the "rubber" type, which are made of synthetic materials and are not subject to the same wear as natural rubber. Details were not immediately available. Tokyo, Dec. 21.—General MacArthur today denied a broadcast report that his headquarters had become embroiled in arguments with the Russians over assignment of Soviet occupation troops to Japan and that MacArthur had threatened to resign. "I am here to serve and not to hinder or obstruct American government," the supreme commander of the Allied powers said in a statement issued by his press relations office. "It is my full purpose to see the Japanese island of Hokkaido, the Russian participation in the occupation of Japan, and other decisions that may be made."

Nearly 100,000 from Pacific May Remain Stranded at Ports On Christmas Day. San Francisco, Dec. 21.—"It's the same old army," said Corp. A. L. Holzman, of Long Island, N. Y. "Hurry up and wait." Nearly 150,000 straggled veterans were expected to arrive in the next few days. Turner Says Kimmel Given Clear Orders; Sees No Compliance

Washington, Dec. 21.—Admiral R. K. Turner asserted today that Admiral Chester W. Nimitz did not comply with "entirely clear" orders and expressed his opinion that if Kimmel had done so, the attack on Pearl Harbor would have been cut "materially." Turner also told a Senate subcommittee investigating the Dec. 7, 1941, disaster, that Kimmel had been prepared for "just such an attack" and was "ready for war" at the time of the attack. "He did not, in my opinion," Turner said, "comply with the orders that I gave him." Turner also told a Senate subcommittee investigating the Dec. 7, 1941, disaster, that Kimmel had been prepared for "just such an attack" and was "ready for war"

draw the headquarters denial statement, set forth these reports:

1. Russia wanted to send in an army of occupation to Japan; MacArthur insisted on only a division.

2. Russia wanted to occupy the northern island of Hokkaido, which is nearest Siberia; MacArthur suggested Kyushu, leaving American forces on Honshu and islands between the Russians and Siberia.

3. MacArthur reportedly told the U. S. State department he would resign rather than allow Russia any further participation on occupation affairs.

4. "Yesterday in Washington, Tigue's broadcast report was called to the attention of President Truman," who told his news conference neither he nor the War department had received any such word from MacArthur. The State department said it had not heard of reported differences between MacArthur and the Russians.

5. Charges of despection against MacArthur's officers implementing his occupation program came up today with two charges of deception against the Japanese.

6. Crawford F. Sams chief of the Public Health and Welfare section, said Japanese government officials had misapprehended the country's food problems in an attempt to obtain American supplies.

7. Sams asserted the danger of starvation in Japan during the winter "does not now exist."

8. Meanwhile, U. S. Sixth Army headquarters said 20th division patrols on the southern island of Shikoku have "discovered further evidence that Japanese military equipment is being concealed in spite of repeated demands that it be reported."

Milk Holiday Threat Made

Producers Assert OPA Regulations Not Halting Jumps in Cost

Hartford, Dec. 21.—(AP)—The Connecticut Milk Producers Association, asserting that OPA regulations are not preventing increases in the cost of milk production and that the OPA is not trying to stonewall the market, today announced that the Connecticut agricultural production goals conference reported yesterday that the two Connecticut agricultural products which would be most important in 1946 were milk and eggs, and that there probably would continue to be a shortage of the former and a surplus of the latter.

The conference recommended a 1946 milk production goal larger than the estimated 1945 production of 728,000,000 pounds, but said that the chance of reaching such a goal would depend on the availability of farm labor and on prices. The conference predicted a continuation of the 50 per cent increase in demand for milk experienced in Connecticut since the start of the war, and said that to achieve the goal, the state would have to produce more milk than it has ever produced.

"If the OPA does not permit this," said the resolution, "we will fight our case in their own courts or any other court that can give us justice. If we fail to get relief from the courts we will ask our members to vote on the declaration of a milk holiday until our demands are met, provided we can secure the cooperation of non-member producers."

The chaplain, on leave of absence from Yale, was warm in his praise of the manner in which he said European students are carrying on in the face of hardships, asserting: "Books and equipment are now trickling into the study centers. National and municipal committees are seeking to provide adequate shelter and cafeterias are operating where dormitories can procure at least one substantial meal each day at low cost.

"The patience, the courage, and the hope of these students is outstanding. They are all looking forward to the future and, meanwhile, are continuing the education which will fit them for the tasks which lie ahead."

After Christmas, Mr. Lovett will continue his activities for the service fund with a tour of schools and colleges in the United States.

Tokyo, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Japan lost 19 hospital ships during the war, it was learned through a violation of the rules of warfare. Major Masaharu told Kyodo News Agency today.

Bombardiers, repatriated former captives of hospital transport, said Japanese authorities failed to promptly identify hospital ships, refused to transmit their names to the Allies, insisted upon stationing hospital ships among combat vessels in action, and often used them as armed transports.

He said that most of the vessels were being used as transports when sunk.

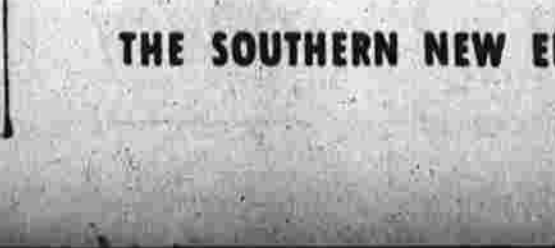
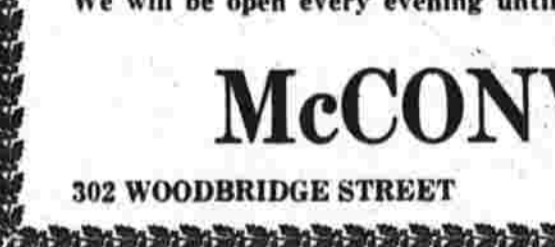
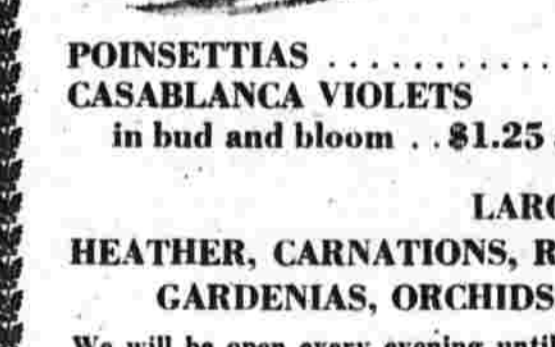

Benefits to Veterans Widened by Congress

involve Education, Amputees, Loans, Disabled Veterans and Any Future Bonus Action

Washington, Dec. 21.—(AP)—War veterans get a better break. Congress has widened their government benefits. President Truman is expected to sign all this into law shortly.

The benefits include education, amputees, disabled veterans, and any future bonus. The changes are in the so-called "G.I. bill of rights." Here are the main ones:

1. Amputees—The Veterans Administration had no authority under the old law to pay a veteran's living expenses when through difficulty with his artificial limb had to go to a distant center for a new limb or more training with the one he had.
2. Education—The bill becomes law as soon as the bill becomes law. VA can pay the travel expenses of a government employee, a veteran or two years after the war's official end, whichever was later.
3. Can Wait Longer—Now he can wait four years to start. He had to finish schooling within seven years of the war's end. It's now 10.
4. Education—to get schooling a government expense, any veteran who entered the service after he was 25 had to prove his education had been interrupted by military service.
5. This is no longer necessary. Any man can get an education as he is entitled to according to his length of service. The limit is four years.
6. Intensive courses—VA pays up to \$500 a year for a veteran's education. It used to do it this way: It figured a year's school term at nine months. It broke down the payments to so much a month.
7. A veteran wanted an intensive course which lasted only two months but cost \$500. The VA paid only what it figured that two months' share of nine months would be.
8. Now VA will pay up to \$500 for a short intensive course even if it is more than a year.
9. Get No Living Allowance—There had been no provision for government pay for correspondence courses except extension courses at regular intervals. Now the government will pay for correspondence courses, with certain limits. A veteran taking this gets no living allowance, as he would if he were a school boy.
10. Pay at school—substance pay (money for living expenses) a veteran going to school was \$80 a month, if single; \$75 if married. Now it's \$65, if single; \$60, if married.
11. Disabled—Vocational and rehabilitation training for service disabled veterans had to be com-
