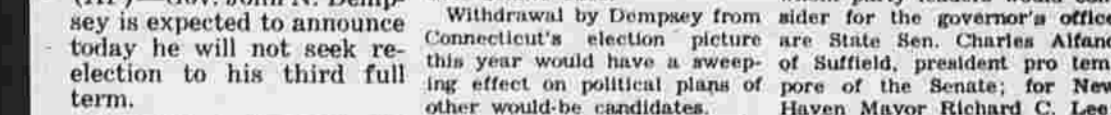

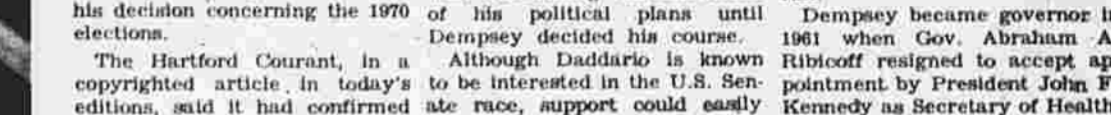

With smoke pouring from a vent at the Harnar House nursing home in Marietta, Ohio, firefighters battled a fire which killed 21 patients.



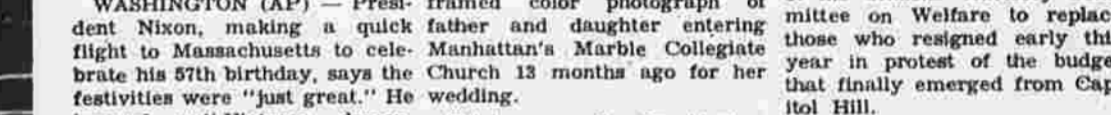

## Yablonski Supporters Vow Mine Reform Fight

WASHINGTON, PA. (AP) — Joseph A. "Jock" Yablonski and his murdered wife and daughter were buried Friday as supporters of the United Mine Workers leader vowed to carry on his battle for union reform.

Hours after the victims were buried in a Catholic cemetery in the heart of Pennsylvania's soft coal fields, about 100 coal miners and campaign workers in Yablonski's unsuccessful bid for the UMW presidency met to map strategy.

"We are going to press the full reform program to democratize this union," said Yablonski's attorney, Joseph Raub Jr. of Washington, D.C., after the hour-long session.

The 59-year-old Yablonski, a veteran member of the UMW executive board, was defeated by W.A. "Tony" Boyle in the Dec. 9 election.

In his campaign, Yablonski urged a program of sweeping reform and called for a government investigation of alleged union corruption. The belief is widespread the gunshot slayings of the Yablonskis were connected with the bitterness of the campaign.

More than 50 state, local and federal investigators have been involved in the case since the victims—believed killed either Dec. 30 or Dec. 31—were discovered Monday in the bedrooms of their rural home about 25 miles from here. Police say they have no leads.

A \$50,000 reward has been offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the killer or killers, \$50,000 of it from the UMW and the remainder from the Polish National Alliance, of which Yablonski was a member for more than 30 years.

## The Magic of Walt Disney

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Walt Disney's magic still works, three years after his death. For evidence, consult the television ratings.

For the first 10 shows of this season, "The Wonderful World of Disney" has averaged a Nielsen rating of 23, its highest in

six years. The show's share of the television audience in its viewing period has been 38.9 per cent, the highest in that same period during Disney's nine years on NBC.

Obviously the Disney people are doing something right. What they are doing is to carry on the work Walt started 45 years ago: making entertainment for family audiences.

I dropped by the studio to talk with two of the men who are helping continue Walt's work, Card Walker, executive vice president, and Ron Miller, executive producer.

Judging from their testimony, the success story of the Disney TV operation seems to be: Planning, spending, mixing.

"We've already got our programs finished for this season," reported Miller, the towering ex-football pro who married Walt's daughter. "We've got a dozen in the works for 1970-71. In fact that season is practically set, and some of our new projects will be for the 1972-73 season."

"We have to work that far ahead, because some of the shows, particularly the nature films, take a long time to produce. Also, we never know how projects will develop—for TV or for theatrical release."

Miller cited "Merlin Jones," which he himself originally planned as a television two-parter. It proved so promising that it was first released to theaters and earned a \$4.2 million gross. Later it was put into the television show. The original cost: \$420,000.

"Merlin Jones" was the exception. Most two-parter now cost about \$750,000 and their chances of earning a profit are hazardous.

"When Walt put us into the television business, he said TV would never pay a profit," explained Walker. "He saw TV as a way to promote his product in theaters and also as a method to build and promote Disneyland. There simply is no way to get back the expense of the television shows as we do them. Foreign sales help a little, but the amount that comes from overseas is very small, compared to the United States."

"If any financial expert were to examine our television operation, he'd say that we should be out of the business," Miller admitted. "But it has helped us in other ways."

He cited the example of "Davy Crockett." During Disney's first season on ABC in 1954-55, the three-part adventure played twice on television to immense ratings. The following year it appeared in theaters and earned \$2.5 million. This year it appeared on TV again and was well received.

From the beginning of the series, Walt believed in mixing the shows for entertainment diversity. That policy continues.

"We do 24-25 shows a year for NBC," said Walker. "Five or six of those are nature films, four or five are new features made particularly for television and four or five are theatrical features from our backlog."

The new films are supervised

## 'Honorary Discharge' Pays Off for Nabors

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Jim Nabors' multimillion-dollar gamble has paid off.

Early last year the bashful lad from Sylacauga, Ala., astounded the television trade by announcing that he was taking an honorary discharge from the Marine Corps and his series "Gomer Pyle." What baffled the trade was why a star would turn his back on an obvious gold mine.

As a series, "Gomer" held the potential of many more years of life. In its fifth and last season in prime time, the series was the second most popular show, finishing behind "Laugh-In."

But Nabors had his reasons: "I love to sing. And I thought a variety show of my own would be more rewarding to me personally. As to the money, I didn't know. But as it turned out, doing the variety show has

meant more money for me."

So he is doubly pleased with the success of "The Jim Nabors Show." The Nielsen ratings indicate that it is the most popular of the shows that debuted this season. Nabors even performed the feat of defeating the supposedly unbeatable Bob Hope, when the latter starred in his revival of "Roberta." You can bet that the sagacious Hope will not soon be doing any more book-musicals. And he'll doubtless avoid placing his specials opposite Jim Nabors.

For Jim the new job is a breeze after seven years filming situation comedies—before "Gomer" he did a two-year stint on "The Andy Griffith Show."

"For eight months a year on 'Gomer' I was up at 5 in the morning every day," he recalled. "My work wasn't like

Jim Arness, in 'Gunsmoke,' where he comes in two days a week. Or Fred MacMurray on 'My Three Sons.' I was in every shot.

"You know somethin'? I still find it difficult to believe this kind of acceptance. I still don't trust it."
