

> **Report Says Korean Marines** 'Massacred' 200 Viet Civilians

HONOLULU (AP) - An anthropologist who made refugee studies in Vietnam says he gave the Pentagon documented evidence of South Korean war atrocities two years ago. He said the report was stamped top ecret and kept quiet. A. Terry Rambo, now a graduate student at the University of Hawaii, disclosed Friday his government-sponsored research project in 1966 uncovered systematic terror by Korean marines "Scores of refugees told us

the reason they had left their villages was because the Koreans were shooting them." he

Rambo, 29, said his interviewers, mostly Vietnamese students, "got so angry they wanted to organize a protest demonstration in Saigon to kick the Koreans out of their cuntry." He said refugees in Phu Yen Province, located on South Vietnam's central coast about 250 miles northeast of Saigon, told of Korean raids in which South Vietnamese men and women civilians were picked out at random and shot, apparently in retaliation for sniper fire. He said he was told nearly 200 civilians had been massacred. But after reporting his find ings to high-ranking military authorities in Salgon, he sad 'I was told not to include any llegations of Korean atrocities



### It Never Was A Foot

Saturday, January 10

Just like we thought might prove to be the case, Vice President Spiro Agnew has been carrying out his foreign liplomatic assignment without any display of his supposed talent for putting his foot in his mouth.

He has managed, in one-protocoled en counter after another, to display tact and good taste and deliver his authorized message without losing all suggestion of that flavor his domestic reputation gives

Some of the people who have met him abroad, having been prepared for their neeting by some of the American comment which has tried to turn the Vice President into some kind of wild and boorish freak in American public life, have been surprised to find what a nice. normal fellow he can be.

But if some people abroad were not prepared for the real Agnew, they were merely the second hand victims of a mistake in which America's own intellectuals were deceiving and misleading

made about Agnew has been made by those who have presumed to assume that not capable of thinking on the same plane with some of the more distinguished intellectual products of the American civilization.

Judging him from such a false eminence, they made their first great error when they assumed that some of the early statements with which he attracted public attention were statements in which he had put his foot in his mouth.

What he had put into his mouth, quite deliberately, was simply a little elementary, ordinary, every day common sense inSwhich he himself deliberately refused to go along with the fashionable fol-de-rol and accept as valid some of the frothy false values of the intellectual establishment of the moment. He was serving notice that we had come into a period when a spade might occasionally be called a spade, instead of some fancy kind of ding-dong, but the fact that he was refusing to kow-tow to the dominant and fashionable intellectualese of the moment didn't mean that he had a weak brain, or an inability to discriminate, or a lack of taste.

Quite naturally and inevitably, our Vice President has had to grow out of the ignoble little Siberia to which the super-sophisticated salons of the time sought to assign him. Not even he could ever have imagined just how much fun he was going to have doing it.

### Long Shots Do Come In

It is statisticians who, of all people are leading the criticism of the recent draft lottery, contending that it did not roduce a "truly, random selection" because the way the numbers came out of the fish bowl produced a pattern which, by the statistics, would have to be labeled a 100,000 to 1 shot.

This pattern, in which the higher draft umbers were concentrated in the first a few months of the year, then showing a steady decline toward the end of the calendar year, makes the draft harder on those whose birthdays occur late in the year.

For the statisticians, a pattern such as this is not proof that it is possible for a 100,000 to 1 shot to come in, but presumption that the way in which the fishbowl was operated was somehow at MANCHESTER EVENING HERALD, MANCHESTER, CONN., SATURDAY, JANUARY 10, 1970

From this reaction on the part of th statistical critics of the draft fishbowl one can project a ridiculous theory about what they would consider a "truly random selection." It would, at the extreme, be a selection which would reflect odds which were permanently and perfectly

The time to have considered the possible imperfections of the fishbowl lottery-these imperfections being, obviously, the chance that the laws of chance might have themselves a field day-would have been before, not after, the selection and employment of the fishbowl method

The fishbowl method was selected be cause chance was supposed to be impersonally fair in the way it distributed the risks of service.

The mere fact that chance happened o operate to make it safer to have been born in one month than in another does not mean that the process itself was unfair, even though the result was obviously poor luck for the individuals who were born in the wrong months.

### Another New Science

The other day in this space we came mon the science of econometrics, just honored by the award of a Nobel Prize to its two most famous practitioners. In econometrics the science of keeping a country on an even prosperity keel can be mastered theoretically at least, by a sufficient storing up of past data and an intelligent projection of its future ap-

Now there is in the news a thing called 'Urban Dynamics." This is, first, the title of a book published this year by Professor Jay W. Forrester of M.I.T. second, it is the designation for a new sociological science, made possible by the existence of the computer which delves into the ills and problems of the modern city with what is claimed to be an accuracy greater than that of the normal experts on city problems.

Professor Forrester believes in facts over intuition. "The intuitive solution to the problems of complex social systems will be wrong most of the time," says

But just having the facts is not enough - P "In the social sciences," writes Profes-

sor Forrester in his book, "failure to understand systems is often blamed on inadequate data. The barrier to progress in social systems is not a lack of data. We have vastly more information than we use in an orderly and organized way. The barrier is deficiency in the existing theories of structure. The conventional forms of data-gathering will seldom produce new insights into the details of the system structure. Furthermore, the structuring of a proper system theory must be done without regard to the boundaries of conventional intellectual disciplines. One must correlate within a single system the economic, the psychoand the physical. When this is properly done, the resulting structure provides nooks and corners to receive fragments of our fabulous store of knowledge, experience and observations."

In other words, the human brain isn't good enough or fast enough to give us the right answer to problems as complicated, as those of present day urban

This, on experience, we believe, and wait for Professor Forrester's computers which, when perfectly adjusted, will be able to chart how to keep Manchester a City Of Village Charm for the next 250 years which, for all present purposes, will be adequate.

### **Needed Deterrent**

The proposal by Registrar of Motor Vehicles Richard E. McLaughlin for mandatory jail terms for persons convicted on drunken driving stands little chance of success in the Legislatureeven though the terms would be serv-s ed out on week ends, holidays and or on vacation time, so that a family would not be deprived of income. What some legislators have called the "basic rights and privileges" of citizens have weighed more heavily in favor of the drinking driver than of the victims of accidents involving liquor. Thus, legislation that would merely lower the allow. able alcohol content of the bloodstream to .10 per cent from .15 per cent in determining whether a driver is under the influence was defeated this year. Similar legislation has been filed for the 1970

The so-called "implied consent law." under which breath tests began coming into use about two years ago, set the .1 per cent standard. While prosecutions have increased under that law, it is still estimated that two-thirds of the state's traffic fatalities this year will be linked to drinking drivers.

If jail terms continue to be an unpalatable idea to the Legislature, a milder and probably helpful course would be to adopt the .10 per cent figure, which is the federal standard. Such a step, by increasing the risk of license suspension for the drinking driver. should make the implied consent law a stronger deterrent .- SPRINGFIELD

If such is the manner in which oil comes into being, then oil should be present on the moon. The moon must possess some of the same attributes as the earth and, therefore, future astronauts should find oil there. Perhaps within the next few years when Apollo 20 has landed on the moon we will have a definitive answer.

What does this have to do with food? The answer is that today experiments are under way designed to produce foods from oils-not only foods in the normal sense, but foods which can be tailored with specific protein, fat and carbohydrate

The clue to this process was uncovered when French investigators discovered that a rather large variety of micro-organisms lived and reproduced in refinery equipment, bottoms of oil tanks, in oil-impregnated solls and even under the tarry surfaces of roads. In 1952, a German biologist, Felix Just, succeeded in growing yeast on pure hydrocarbons with a high waxy content. A series of experiments tried to duplicate this effort and considerable success was achieved.

Normally, yeast is cultured from sugar-a carbohydrate. The sugar is dissolved in water to which has been added soluble minerals and organic compounds containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium together with trace minerals and
