Stock Market: Erosion Causes Loss of Prices

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market began the past week on a losing foot and kept going on stepping toward lower ground.

The market wandered aimlessly most of the week," said one analyst, "with a gradual erosion bringing prices down rather than a wave of selling pressure."

Investors have been hesitant to make buying or selling committments because of a lack of new developments, brokers noted.

Many are waiting for President Nixon's Jan. 22 State of the Union and later budget message.

"It's a state of suspended animation, where the cross-currents blend into a clear trend," said Monte Gordon of First Nat'l Bank.

The week's five consecutive losing sessions brought the Dow Jones industrial average to a 1967 low of 1,269.44.

The largest drop was Monday's 10.75-point loss to 1,269.44. The market was apparently influenced by the New York Federal Reserve Bank's continued tight money policy.

On Friday the market tried to reverse the trend and began the day with a moderate, broad-based gain, but late and sudden drop in the price of IBM triggered a decline among most stocks.

The Dow's average lost 4.8 on the week to 1,274.26. Standard & Poor's 500 stock index fell 5.33 to 130.88.

Stocks that declined on the New York exchange heavily included IBM, which fell 11.25 to 129.75.

Other declines included American Airlines, which fell 1.25 to 47.75, and Transcontinental Investing, off 1.25 to 18.75.

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Nixon Hopes to Balance Budget Without Tax Hike

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nixon administration is growing more confident it can write a balanced budget without new tax increases, an official says.

As a result, he indicated, President Nixon has decided not to ask for increased excise taxes on liquor, cigarettes and gas.

The main purpose of balancing the budget, and if possible showing a surplus, is to help in the fight against inflation.

Administration sources have indicated Nixon feared excise tax increases would hurt rather than help the campaign by possibly causing price increases.

But the source, an informed Treasury official, cautioned that Nixon has not made a final decision on tax increases for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

The President still has more than two weeks until he sends the budget message to Congress.

He has not yet decided whether to trim the government's borrowing, thus relieving pressure on the already overburdened Treasury Department.

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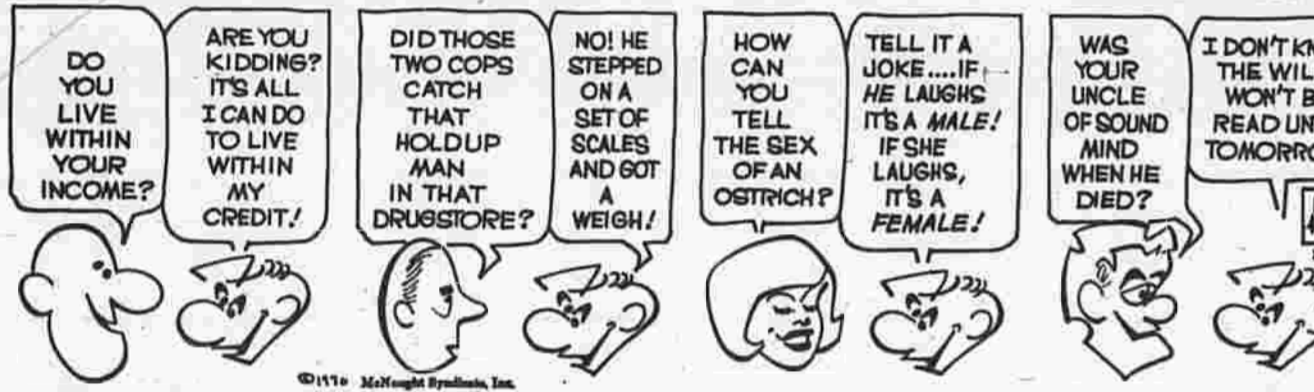

The Funniest Show Ever?

LONDON — By definition, judgment is a subjective operation, and never so much so as when about humor. So, what follows is purely one man's opinion:

There is a television series of the British Broadcasting Corporation, late at night and with a small audience, that is the funniest set of 13 half-hour programs ever produced.

Some have tried to find the key or to name the genre, and to end up with phrases like "manic flow." The people who write and perform it simply call it "silly." That it is, but silly with the exquisiteness of Belgian lace.

The show is called "Monty Python's Flying Circus." It is not a circus, nor is it flying. There is no Monty Python.

Each episode begins with a deranged jumble of cartoons in Gay Nineties execution: Human figures erupt from what remains of the head of a man trepanned down to the eyebrows. A massive foot, in disapproval, crushes everything to the ground. A giant hand bounces Queen Victoria up and down like a ball. Cardinal Richelieu whirls from a pedestal to chase a nude on a bicycle

and a sign flashes on the screen reading "Intermission" or "Part Two" or "In this performance the part of David Hemmings will be played by a block of wood." A theme will then be announced, like "Trees" or "Full Frontal Nudity," to which the ensuing program will have little if any relation.

The zany cartooning (by an American, Terry Gilliam) comes to a momentary end. An old derelict, who could be Gunn Straight out of "Treasure Island," races jerkily across forest and meadow, escaping incredible hazards of traffic and bombing, to arrive in front of the camera and be knocked down by a perambulator. A recent switch had the idiot old man hanging mute and agonized on a hook in an abattoir, alongside a row of fig carcasses.

There are no typical sequences. Examples will have to do:

A petty mobster type, of Italianate name and white-figured tie, is manager of a schnook and making good money by publicizing his intended exploits. His first is a cross-channel jump of 26 miles; his previous record, "Unofficial" he confesses disarmingly, having been 12 feet. This coming to

grief, he is next billed as the only man in history to attempt to eat Chichester Cathedral and, finally, to split a railway carriage with his nose. Cartoons again. This time an elaborate theater curtain rises to reveal another, and so on, eight times.

Live again. A private comes to the colonel's office, is dangerous, with real guns and cannons and explosives, and someone is sure to get hurt. "A bloke was telling me," he explains, "if there's a war on and you're in the army, you have to fight."

This is interrupted by the entrance of two Mattiosi, knocking bric-a-brac from the colonel's desk while telling him that he has a fine army and "we wouldn't want anything to happen to it."

"It would be a shame," one continues, "if anyone should set fire" to the 7,000 infantrymen, two paratroop divisions and 600 artillery pieces there assembled. For \$1.75 weekly they will guarantee that no armored division gets done over.

The colonel refuses on grounds that it's silly, silly.

"The whole premise is silly and it's not well written," the officer complains. "I'm the sen-

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — In television they figure if a new series is pre-empted four times in its first season, it has no chance to survive. Here's a show that gets bumped off the network 20 times but manages to continue.

No freshman entry is this: It's Ted Mack and the Original Amateur Hour, which seems to have been on television since Dr. Lee De Forest invented the audion tube.

The show is scheduled on CBS at 5:30 p.m. Sundays, which

means that it runs smack-dab into the National Football League double-headers and playoff games through most of the fall and winter.

"Sometimes I think the only way I can get back on the air is to put on a football helmet and jersey," cracked the genial Mack. "It's kinda tough when you've got a staff of 20 who have spent their lives with this little turkey, and they have to remain idle for 20 weeks."

The Amateur Hour will make it back to the network on Jan. 25, after the pros have finally wrapped up the season. Mack has been going about the country to call attention to his return and was in Hollywood for an appearance Saturday night with Lawrence Welk—"we're the heroes of the support-stocking set."

Thousands upon thousands of amateurs, including Frank Sina-

for officer here and I haven't had a funny line yet. I'm stopping it. The sketch is over."

The private still wants to leave the army and the colonel replies: "I stopped your sketch five minutes ago," and orders the cameraman: "Zoom in on me. Close up. That's better."

Comes a parody of the interesting people" TV show. The MC, gum-chewing and nauseatingly ingratiating, presents a man one-half inch tall, in a match box; a hypnotist who puts bricks to sleep by his eyes (he rejects the first brick presented to him, on grounds it is already asleep), and an invisible man, drowning endlessly that no one ever takes notice of him.

"Monty Python's Flying Circus" is written, produced and acted by six men and one girl, all under 30, mostly Oxbridge, and all attractive. Its weekly budget, about \$3,500 is ludicrously small, even by British standards, not to mention American. Six makeup men convert that many actors into four times as many characters for each show — and fast.

BBC began the program with trepidation, relegated it to a terrible viewing time, and still worries that it will appeal to only a small fraction of the viewers. Maybe so, but that's what American editors thought when the comic strip "peanuts" first came on the market.

I think, on the contrary, that it's everyone's dish except those at the far ends of the spectrum, the primitive snobs and the desiccated ones. Where "Laugh In" covers its feeble jokes with numbers and speed, and is vulgarly vulgar, "Circus" has no truck with the quick one-liners, the blackouts and the boofos, and is elegantly vulgar. Scripts are inescapably flat in the reading, but try this one: A Surgeon is with a patient, Mr. Notlob:

Surgeon: I'm afraid I'm going to have to operate. It's nothing for you to worry about although it is extremely dangerous... "There's nothing wrong with you that any expensive operation won't prolong."

In the operating room, the doctor makes a cut four feet long.

Surgeon: What a great slit. Gentlemen, I am now pulling it apart. (Pulls it apart. Guitar and conversation are heard. Head of a squatter pops out of the torso.)

Squatter: Hey, man, groovy. Great light show, man.

Surgeon: What are you doing in there?

Squatter: Doing our own thing, man, man.
