The education that Lavitt, who owns Seely Plastics Corp., will teach will concern "Trends in the Technology of Plastics."

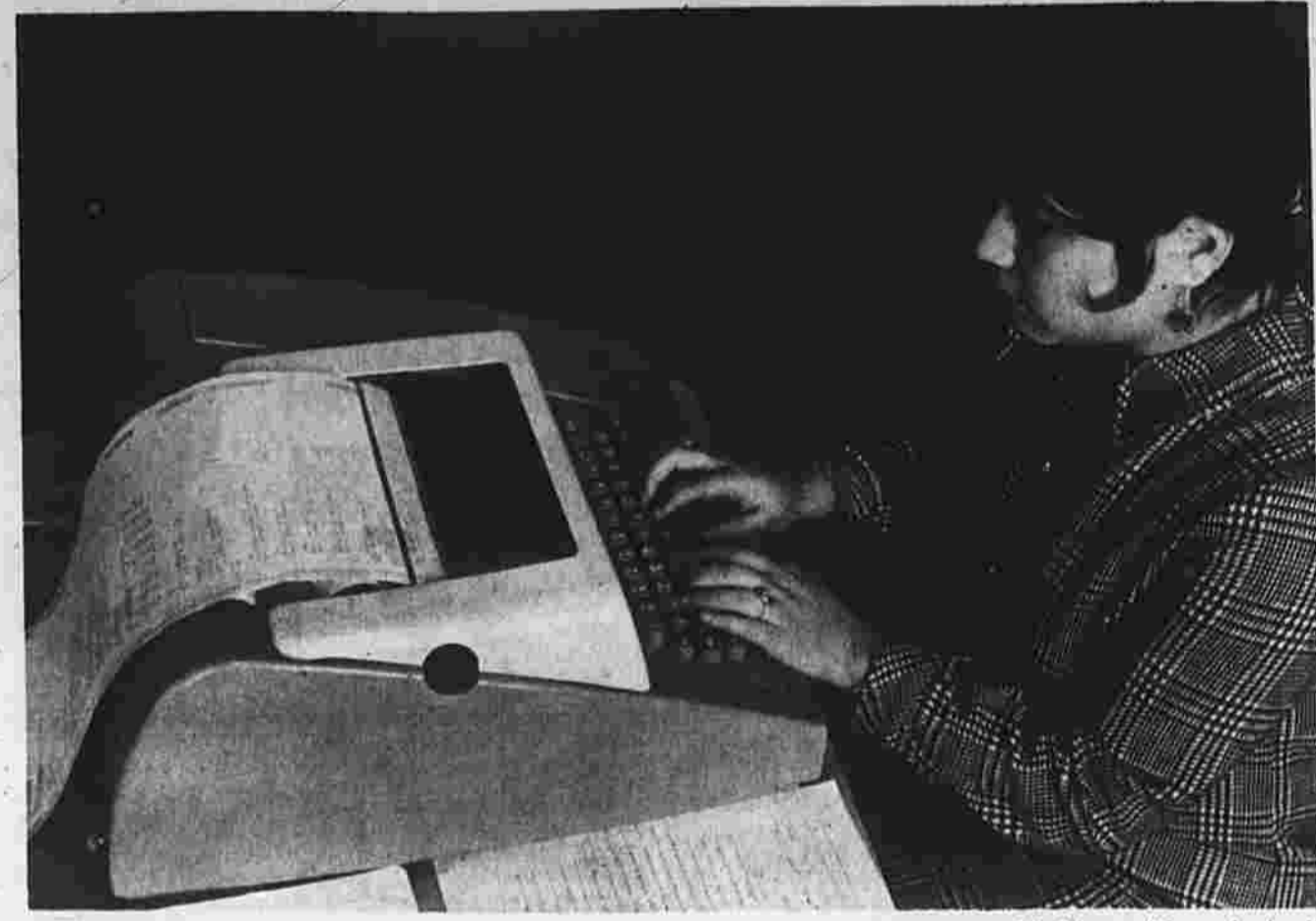

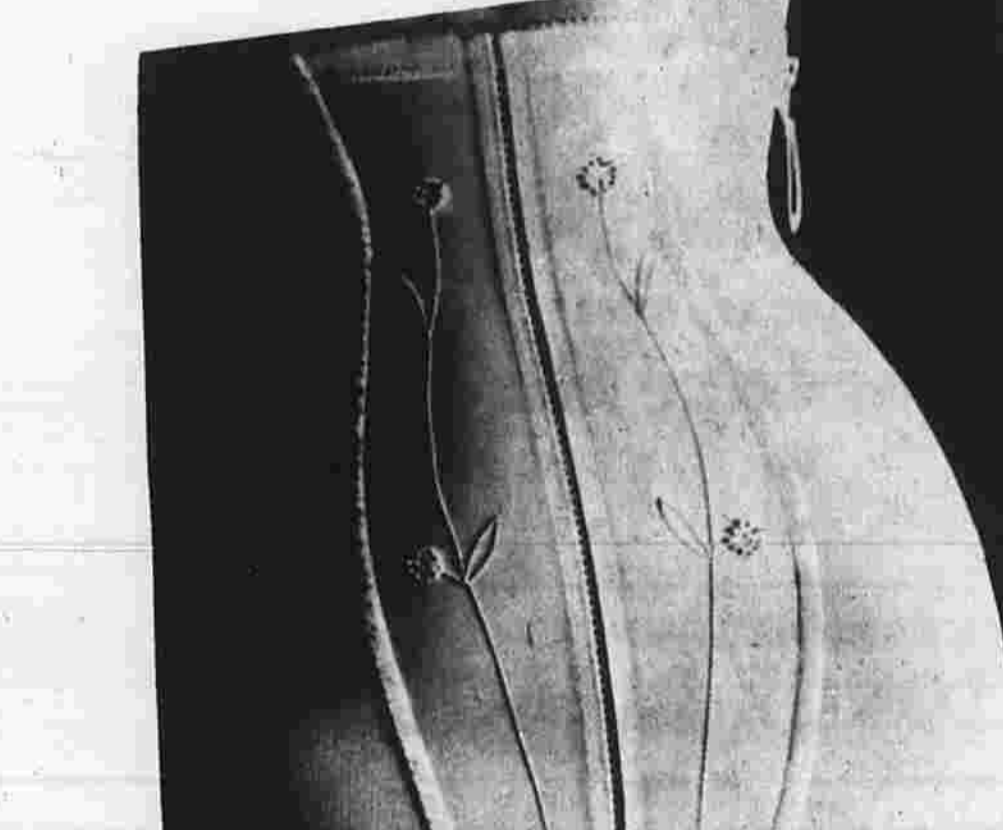



**CULTURE AND COMMUNITY: A Study of the Generation Gap.** By Margaret Mead. Doubleday, \$5.

Don't let that subtitle about the generation gap put you off. This isn't just another harangue from the psychologist-sociologist crowd about the symptoms of the well-known gap.

Instead it is a famous anthropologist's approach to the problem through her own speciality which she considers a key. Dr. Mead says our situation is unique in history, brought about by an "emergence of a world community," and now we have a generation gap that is world-wide.

While others may concentrate on the alienation of the younger generation, she has a sympathetic word for their elders, declaring they are a "strangely isolated" generation because they have seen so many extremely rapid changes in the whole "fundamental imperatives of life."

Her basic technique is to set up three classifications in which chronologically the first is authoritarian and oriented to the past. It involves grandparents, parents and children. In the next, the grandparents have more or less dropped out, and the youngsters, revolting traditionally against Mom and Pop, take their cultural cues from their own peers. The third, sometimes just faintly dull-in-pursuit of it or in retreat from the

Much of her work involved Mrs. Johnson's tours—often in behalf of environmental beautification-political campaigns with reporters covering the First Lady's activities. In addition there were such jobs as organizing state dinners, writing speeches (and rewriting them at the last minute) and answering requests for information about the White House peck.

But the author's most hectic adventures came when LBJ and Lynda

They were people whose jobs required them to be in the far corners of the world, or who had settled down because they liked the place.

He visited Peace Corps workers in the Pantheon church in Paris and the First Lady and business men in Nigeria.

The author writes with a nice descriptive touch, and his humor is pleasantly British. For American readers, the book offers an opportunity to learn how our countrymen see us when we are away from home.

### Dry Climate Preserves Ghost Town

PAMPA UNION, Chile (AP) — "Come to the big dance on Saturday night," reads the ancient, lettered poster on a wall of the town hall.

There haven't been any dances in Pampa Union for a century.

There haven't been any rains in longer than that. And so, free of moisture's rot, preserved by desert air, Pampa Union remains virtually the same as the day the nitrate boom ended and everyone left.

Pampa Union, with its creaking doors and spooky silence, is one of many similar nitrate towns that stretch across the Atacama Desert and appear just right for movie sets.

In the mid 1800s northern Chile was home to a prosperity boom, as men straggled to take salt-peter from the earth's driest desert. But gradually the demand for nitrates declined, and scores of towns withered and died.

Pampa Union, one of the largest of these, lies on the main north-south highway, between Chuquiaguata, the world's largest open pit copper mine, and Antofagasta, the important Chilean port.

The homes and workshops remain unchanged, although everything of value inside is long gone.

Also standing in bleak contrast to the desert sand is the Pampa Union cemetery. Its wooden crosses weathered only slightly and still bearing the plastic wreaths originally placed on them. There were no flowers in the desert.

### One Way To Mail Letters

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — German sailors on a long sea voyage sealed their mail into a barrel and tossed it overboard, hoping it would reach its destination before they arrived home in Hamburg.

They were lucky. Seven days later, a couple out for a walk spotted the red-painted barrel, lying a large unopened "mail" on one of Cape Town's beaches. In a box inside the barrel they found the letters, two bottles of spirits, five United States dollars and a note.

The note was headed "The German ship M.D. Bavaria, at sea October 11, 1969." It explained that the crew was on a three-week non-stop voyage from Hong Kong to Hamburg during which the crew would be unable to mail letters to relatives in the normal way.

"Please do us the favor and deliver the enclosed mail to the next post office," the note said, and make yourself a happy day with the good spirits in this container."

The mail was posted but the couple kept quiet about what happened to the spirits.

### Marriage For Society

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — Apartheid-supporting churchmen here were discomfited when a study commission they appointed told them racially mixed marriages are not sinful.

"Nowhere in Scripture is humanity divided into isolated units on the grounds of biological or natural differences," the commission reported to the Cape province synod of the Netherlands Reformed Church, largest of South Africa's three staunchly Calvinist Dutch Reformed Churches and one of the pillars of white Afrikaner segregationism.

Objecting to the report, church secretary Dr. J. D. Vorster, brother of Prime Minister John Vorster, said the commission had seen marriage too much from an "individualistic viewpoint" and not enough as part of a given society.

The synod decided to refer the report back to the commission and to the general synod for further investigation instead of adopting it as the official viewpoint of the church.

Topical stamp collecting—saving the stamps of one particular subject regardless of country—is becoming more popular each year. Even albums for the favorite subjects are now gaining favor.

Minkus Publications has just produced an important new album devoted to "Medicine on Stamps." This album is based on the world-famous collection of Dr. Joseph M. Kier consisting of 44 volumes and over 10,000 stamps relating to the history of medicine.

"Medicine on Stamps" is a beautiful album in an attractive three-ring binder. The album is fully illustrated and beneath each illustration is a capsule biography of the physician or scientist portrayed on the stamp.

A new set of stamps depicting four milestones from the historic past, has been issued by Papua and New Guinea, reports the Philatelic Bureau in Port Moresby. The 5-cent shows the prehistoric Ambun Stone. The 10-cent illustrates a Manusava Canoe of the Kula Circuit. The 25-cent has the famed Torres Map. The 30-cent features H. M. S. Basilisk.

The set is the latest in Papua and New Guinea's National Heritage series and was designed by noted Australian artist R. J. Bates.

The president who wanted to be remembered as a soldier rather than a politician, did not have his wishes honored.

When Dwight David Eisenhower died, he had been the subject of 20 postage stamps and two souvenir sheets—all of which lauded his term as president of the United States. His role as Supreme Commander of the Allied Forces in Europe was completely overlooked by various countries issuing stamps.

Perhaps future stamp issues will honor Ike as a victorious general—but they are yet to come.

A new stamp commemorating the 50th anniversary of the first flight from England to Australia has been issued not by either country but by Pakistan. The reason? The plane landed at Karachi on its way from England to Australia.

The stamp design shows the Vickers Vimy plane which made the historic flight. In the background is the Karachi Airport building as it existed at that time. The plane is brown and black, while the building is light brown against a pale blue sky.

Stop the stamp is the inscription "50th Anniversary of First Aeroplane Flight England-Australia 1919-1969." At the bottom of the stamp, the word Pakistan appears in English, Urdu and Bengali.

Also recently issued by West Germany was a stamp for Rohnberg on the Tauber—a city built in medieval times on a river that runs uphill.

### Pentagon Satisfied With Project 100,000

WASHINGTON (AP) — per cent of the 10,000 men Blacks make up more than 40 per cent of the men brought into the armed services under a special manpower program to help previously unqualified recruits reach the military's education and health standards.

Under the project, individuals referred to as "New Standards" men receive special educational help or medical assistance in order to become qualified for duty.

Thus far, the report says, 246,000 men have been put into uniform as a result of Project 100,000.

Of the 246,000, 92 per cent were persons who, it was considered, could not otherwise have met the educational requirements.

Of the 227,000 about 93,820, or 41.2 per cent, were nonwhites.

many before the committee and in his opinion as a district court judge, that he is "a scholar of the law." He added, "You have made an impressive appearance before the committee."

Sen. Hiram L. Fong, R-Haw, also told Carswell that his answers to questions "have satisfied me that you are worthy of confirmation."

However, referring to a written supremacy speech that Carswell made 22 years ago as a candidate for the Georgia legislature, Fong said he wanted to ask him one more "deep down in your heart do you feel any bias or prejudice against any individual because of his race, color or creed?"

"Absolutely not," Carswell replied.

Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., said he was pleased that Nixon had nominated someone with a conservative philosophy and regarded as a strict constructionist in interpreting the Constitution and said that in his judgment, Carswell "will prove a magnificent service on the Supreme Court."

Thurmond said there was nothing in Carswell's record to indicate he did not believe in fair treatment and equality for all.

Sen. Marlow Cook, R-Mary., recalled the objections that had been raised to the nomination of Justice Hugo L. Black in 1967 because of Black's one-time membership in the Ku Klux Klan.

He told Carswell that witnesses who appear in opposition later to his nomination should be prepared to admit that men do not change their minds, but have on the basis of charges in society.

At the start of the hearings the 50-year-old southerner, confirmed by the Senate last June as a judge on the 8th U.S. Court of Appeals, swore he is no racist.

"I have no notions, no beliefs, no opinions, no prejudices, no biases, no prejudices," he testified in repudiating a 1948 political speech supporting white supremacy.

Carswell said he wouldn't expect the committee to vote for his confirmation if the members thought he harbored ideas of that kind.

Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., in raising questions of judicial ethics, told Carswell he wanted to know what his standards were "if your nomination is confirmed, which I think it will be."

Bayh, who led the fight against Judge Clement F. Haynsworth Jr., President Nixon's first nominee for the Supreme Court, said he had told the committee his comment didn't necessarily mean he was going to vote for Carswell.

Carswell, who lives in Tallahassee, Fla., was nominated by Nixon Jan. 29 for his fifth term on the Court seat vacated by Abe Fortas last May.

Haynsworth, rejected by the Senate 85 to 43 last November, not only had staff labor and civil rights opposition but was also pictured by Bayh and others as giving an appearance of impropriety because of stock transactions while on the bench.

Carswell, also opposed by Bayh and civil rights groups, testified he owns no stocks or bonds and told the committee that "certainly a judge should not sit in a case where there is an appearance of impropriety."

When asked about a country club in Tallahassee that took over a public golf course, Carswell kept it segregated after a 1965 Supreme Court decision requiring desegregation of public recreation facilities, Carswell said he took no part in its affairs.

"The children should be helped only if they have been able to borrow money from other sources. But they should agree to pay interest on the loan."

"Never lend money to children, unless there are solid reasons for doing so. The young couple should be made aware of the necessity of meeting their financial obligations in a business-like way. It would make the parents feel more secure."

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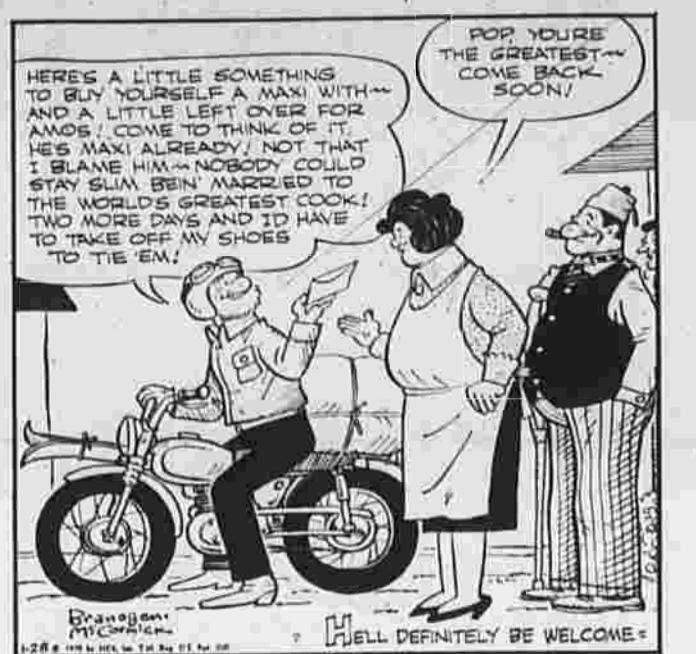

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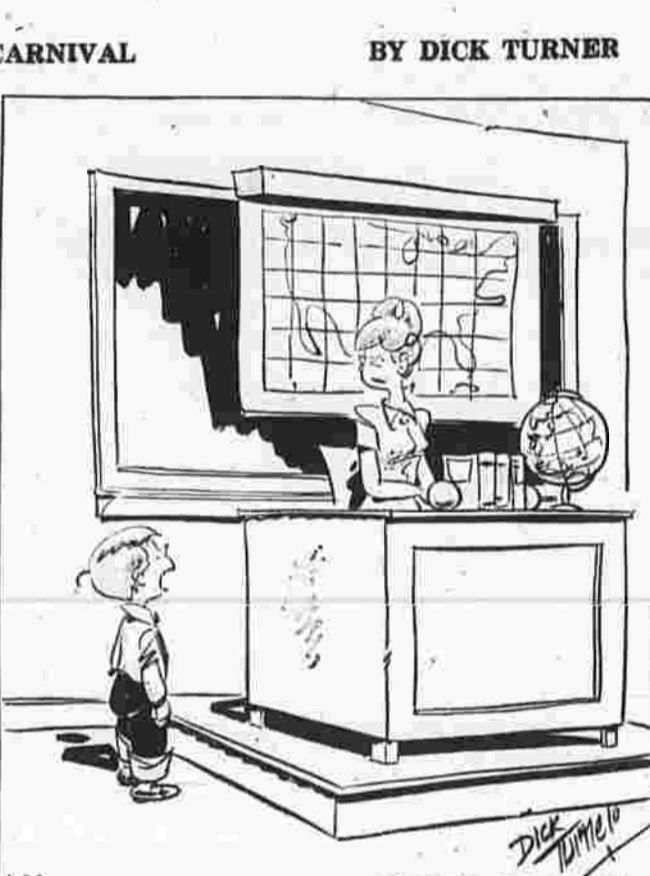

Board Appears Reluctant To Increase Water Rates

The Manchester Board of Directors last night, in an informal discussion of a proposed rate hike for users of town water, appeared reluctant to authorize it, or even to schedule another date for discussing it further.

Under the proposal, prepared by Director of Public Works William O'Neill, the water cost for the average home, with four persons, would rise approximately 34 per cent. Sewage charges, because they are computed at 75 per cent of the water bill, would rise proportionately.

O'Neill explained that an average homeowner would pay about 10 cents a day more, under the new formula—six cents more a day for water and four cents a day more for sewage.

The proposal, he said, would bring in an additional \$200,000 a year to the water department and an additional \$142,000 a year to the sewer department.

O'Neill said, costs to the Town Fire Department, for hydrant service, would go up about \$27,000 a year (from the present \$27,000 to a proposed \$54,000). Costs to the 5th Utilities District would go from the present \$1,000 to a proposed \$1,700.

The directors, although they acknowledged Manchester's water-improvement needs, expressed their concern over the many costly proposals facing the taxpayers.

David Odegaard, chairman of the meeting in the absence of Mayor Nathan Aspinwall, who was ill, commented, "With all the projects we face, with inflation and with a Southern tier increase, I doubt whether the people can afford a water-rate increase."

Donald Kuehl remarked, "Perhaps a graduated increase, smaller the greater in two or three years, might be better."
