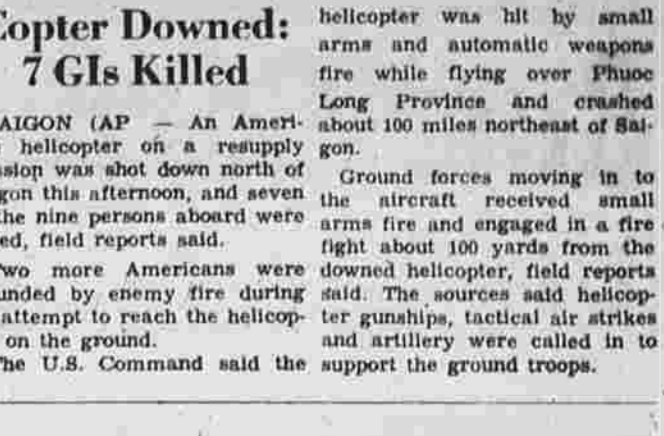

McCracken Disputes Claim That Inflation Strategy Fails

WASHINGTON (AP) — Paul W. McCracken, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisors, has disputed a claim by Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., that the administration is losing its battle against inflation. "I don't think we've lost the fight," McCracken told the House-Senate Economic Committee Monday at a hearing on the state of the economy. "It's not as if we've lost the battle."

Proxmire had told McCracken: "You've made the best of what I think is not a very good case." In defending the administration policy. "In my view, Mr. Chairman, the Johnson administration is the best that we have had in the foreseeable future."

Proxmire maintained that "what's happening to this administration economically is very much what happened to the Johnson administration in Vietnam" in terms of optimistic reports of progress. In reply to questions by Sen. Jacob Javits, R-N.Y., McCracken said he feels a balanced budget is essential and businessmen and consumers should have confidence in the economy.

McCracken, although voicing reservations about forecasting an unemployment rate, projected that the nation's average jobless figure this year would be "in the zone of 4.5 percent" under the administration's anti-inflation program. Committee Chairman Wright Patman, D-Tex., accused the administration of helping create more inflation. He said it allows

Union Sought For Soldiers

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A tiny, dissident, armed force group says it is being harassed in its effort for innovation such as unfurling and the right to refuse Vietnam and riot control duty. "What we may get is both evils at the same time—inflation and unemployment. I blame this on the administration's failure to set wage and price standards," he said.

The group, with a headquarters office in San Diego, claims between 40 and 50 members, virtually all in Southern California. "For obvious reasons we have no membership roster," says Donald Duncan, a former Green Beret soldier now an antiwar activist and a spokesman for MDM. "Eight spokesmen for the two-month-old group were who said they were on active duty and one who said he became a civilian last year. They explained their demands at a news conference Monday. Most wore parts of Navy and Marine Corps uniforms and didn't want to be identified."

MDM urges 12 changes in military ways, including higher wages, an end to the war, review boards of officers' records and an end to rank privileges, "the right to obedience to individual conscience—moral objections to religious," and "the right to refuse politically objectionable duty such as riot control or the Vietnam war."

Spokesmen said above patrolmen broke down the door of the MDM office recently, interrupting a meeting and arresting several members. They said the number of investigations connected with MDM activity, Duncan said. A Navy spokesman says 22 sailors had been arrested in recent weeks at the office for investigation of charges including unauthorized absence. MDM spokesman said those arrested were wearing authorized passes and in civilian clothes. Many charges were later dropped, they said.

Marine Corps spokesmen have blamed MDM party for a melee with racial overtones last Wednesday at Camp Pendleton, a giant Marine base north of San Diego. Thirty Marines were injured and 12 were arrested. The true cause of the melee, MDM spokesman said, was "200 years of racism." "The military creates a climate of fear and uses oppression of its own men to prevent racial violence," one said. Chapman, in Los Angeles for a speech, confirmed MDM reports that authorities are watching the San Diego office. "We are keeping a close eye on those who frequent that office because if they are members of the armed forces—they are Marines, sailors or soldiers—they will be dealt with to the full extent of the military law."

Drug Program Expanded In D.C. Schools

WASHINGTON (AP) — Washington's school system has expanded its narcotics education program into elementary schools because officials feel it is too late by the time the children reach junior and senior high schools. Former addicts are being sent into elementary school auditoriums to warn sixth and seventh graders of the dangers of drug experimentation and addiction since growing numbers of juveniles have been arrested as addicts and some have even died from using narcotics. "Although firm statistics are not available, the city drug addiction treatment and rehabilitation center reports it has an addicted 1-year-old boy."

The city's school program has been conducted previously in the junior and senior high schools. At the first grade school session, program speakers said they were surprised at how much the children there already knew about drugs. Two ex-addicts, an ex-convict and the city's corner talked on addiction and what happened to drug addicts. Harold "Nightstick" Young, who has been a habit for 13 years, told 200 pupils not to be fooled by pushers whose sales pitch is that drugs are fun. "The people who sell these narcotics are not concerned about you," he said. "All they care about is the dollar, and they don't care what happens to you." Dr. Richard L. Whilton then talked about heroin deaths: There were 24 of them in Washington last year. The audience murmured when Dr. Whilton ticked off the ages of some of the victims: "18, 16, 14, 17. The average age was 26. A narcotics addict doesn't live to be very old."

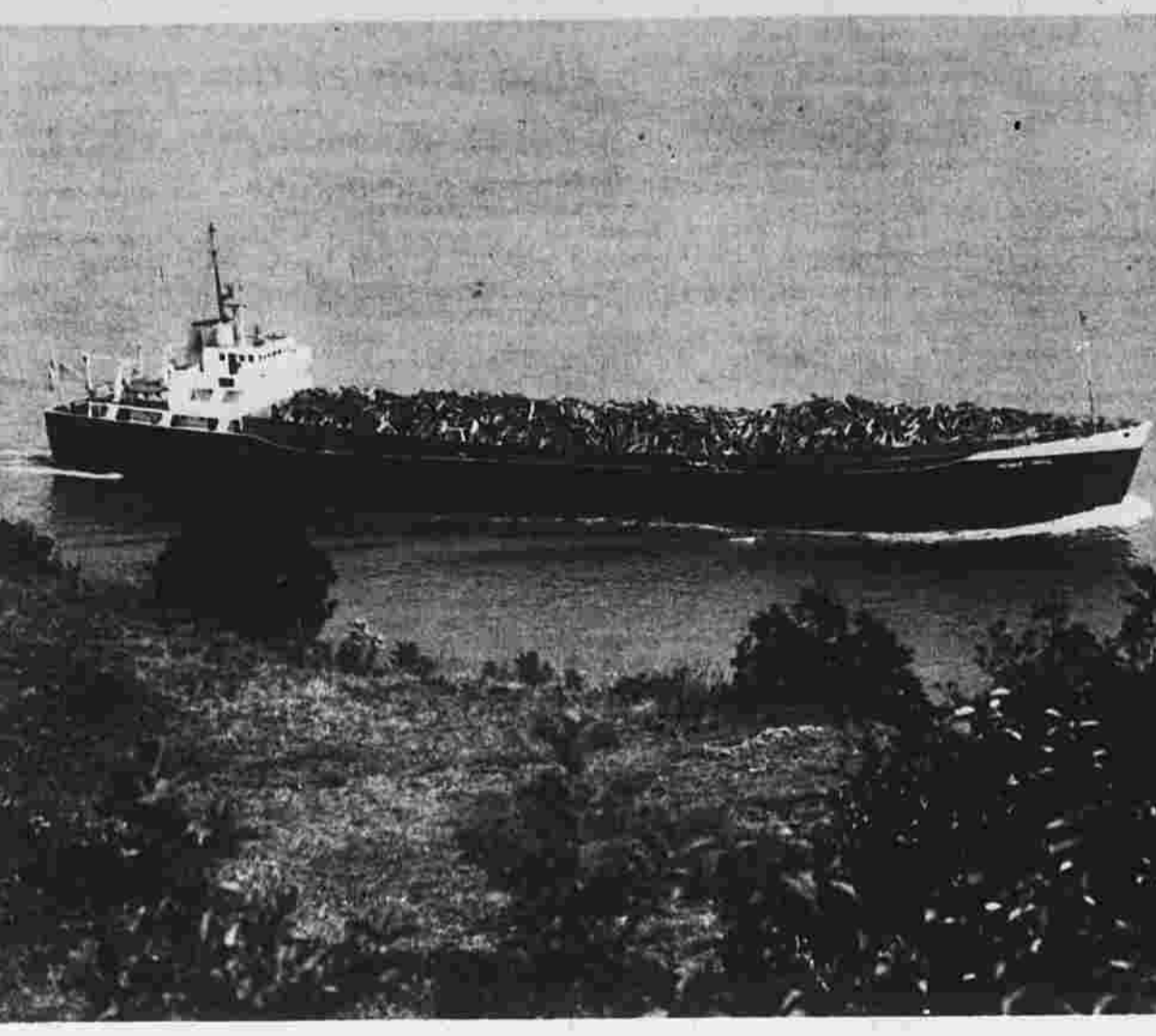

WASHINGTON — The fact that President Nixon issued his Lincoln's Birthday pronouncement on school integration without even consulting his policymakers at the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) is a portent of a harding Administration.

The overwhelming sentiment inside the White House is to benevolent neutrality toward any fairly reasonable anti-segregation proposal in Congress.

Indeed, some Presidential advisers want the President to flatly prohibit Secretary Robert Finch and his lieutenants at HEW from continuing their opposition to such amendments.

The reason for the hardened line at the White House is political rather than ideological. Whatever Mr. Nixon does or does not say, Congress seems sure this year to finally pass an anti-integration amendment similar in intent to the kind Rep. James Whitman of Mississippi has been pushing for five years.

The most dramatic example of the trend is in Washington, D.C., and its environs. Some 70 per cent of the residents of the nation's capital are black, and the school system is practically 100 per cent black.

Princeton University in New Jersey, and Georgetown University in Washington, D.C., are also predominantly black. In Montgomery County in Maryland, the Negro population is 70 per cent.

So what we have in Washington and other major cities is a continuing trend to all-black schools, not because of any segregation policies, but because there are no white children in the neighborhoods to attend those schools.

That, the long-time prophecy of integration came home to the North, its people and its politicians would lose their fervor for civil rights.

While school integration pressure remained concentrated in the South through 1969, Mr. Nixon was content to let his liberal HEW department and his conservative Justice Department collide on the school-race question—particularly on the dynamic inherent in the Stennis amendment. Sen. Charles McNair of Tennessee, who introduced the amendment, rejected pleas by HEW officials to conduct careful hearings on issues raised by Stennis.

Although HEW officials long ago perceived the growth of the trend, Finch had White House authorization to publicly oppose it. Through it all, there was no official word from the President himself.

However, there have been recent clues of a change by the Administration. Just before the House voted on Jan. 28 to uphold Mr. Nixon's veto of the HEW appropriations bill, a rumor drifted through the cloakrooms that the White House would not fight a ten-year amendment the next time around—contributing to surprisingly heavy Southern Democratic support for the bill.

Threats Cut Session Short For Chicago Seven Jury

By F. RICHARD GIBSON and EARL AYKROID Associated Press Writers

CHICAGO (AP) — A jury that had its last deliberating session cut short because of threats went into its fifth day of discussions today on a verdict for seven men charged with riot conspiracy.

Defense counsel planned arguments for a mistrial and a declaration that the U.S. District Court jury is deadlocked.

John C. Metzner, U.S. marshal, said Tuesday's deliberations were cut short after the FBI received word that demonstrators were planning to stone a bus that carries the jurors between the Federal Building and the Palmer House, a hotel where they have been sequestered since September.

"We heard threats that the bus was going to be stoned and that a man was going to be killed on the way out here (in the building area) so we got the jury out and they didn't use the bus," the marshal said.

He said that unless the jurors are discharged or reach a verdict today, the planned sit-in demonstration will be held on Monday.

Tuesday night discussions ended just after midnight. The jury was to be sequestered in a hotel in the city.

They are David T. Dellinger, 34, Jerry C. Rubin, 31, Thomas E. Hayden, 30, Abbie Hoffman, 31, Richard C. "Rennie" Davis, 28, John R. Froines, 31, and Lee Weiner, 31.

Protests marked by violence have taken place in several cities in reaction to the trial of the seven men on charges of conspiracy to cross state lines and incite rioting in Chicago and other cities in support of a national convention.

Attorneys William M. Kunstler and Leonard I. Weinglass filed a motion Tuesday for a mistrial late Tuesday and requested an immediate hearing.

Judge Julius J. Hoffman was not in chambers and shortly after the motion was handed to his clerk, the jury retired for the night.

Kunstler later told newsmen he hoped to argue the motion today.

Weinglass said, "It's obvious the jury is not able to reach a decision after four days of deliberations."

Kunstler said he did not think the defense was preparing the jury by making the motion.

Judge Hoffman said last week that he might, if the jury appeared deadlocked, call them in and instruct them to retire once more and try to reach a decision.

Kunstler contends this would be applying judicial pressure on the jury.

Kunstler said the decision of the jurors Tuesday to halt their discussions early was not surprising.

"They have an enormous task. They have been at it for four days now," the attorney said.

Columbia James Carey Finds 'Error' In Town's Car Assessments

James Carey of Lake Rd., tax and the assessments for a prominent local Democrat, has issued a statement asserting that he is "upset and shocked over" recent news releases made by the Republican Town Chairman, Howard Bates, in behalf of the Board of Tax Review and Assessors.

Carey, commenting on a recent GOP press release, said a "serious error" was made in "computing the assessments on automobiles."

Carey said, "They are mis-leading and highly improper in my opinion. I am also upset over the fact that this information comes to the taxpayers of the town by way of the chairman of the Republican Party, political overtones."

"This makes me automatically suspicious of the reasons behind the publishing of what I call a smokescreen."

"I would like to know," continued Carey, "what is the spokesman for the Board of Tax Review, Tax Assessors and the State Tax Commission? The chairman of these boards, the State Tax Commission and the State Tax Assessor, I would also appreciate being informed as to who authorized the Republican chairman to make such an irregular release?"

Carey stated, "It was learned today that a serious error was made in computing the assessments on automobiles. Due to the new tax inquiry was made at the Tax Department where it was confirmed that the method used was incorrect."

"According to the new item, 43 per cent of the book value was used to arrive at the assessment on autos. In reality it should have been a seven per cent reduction from the book value which would compensate for the depreciation in value from April values, which the book lists, to Oct. 1, which is when Columbia vehicles are assessed. Then a 50 per cent figure should be arrived at from that figure."

Carey noted that the news item said a verbal statement was received from the Tax Department sanctioning the 43 per cent figure.

"However," he continued, "that too is an error as there was a letter written to Ward Rosebrooks, chairman of the Board of Assessors, dated Oct. 2, 1969, which says, 'Dear Mr. Rosebrooks, this is in reply to your letter of Oct. 2, 1969 regarding an assessment ratio of 43 per cent on motor vehicles on the spring and fall list for Columbia.'"

"Section 1271 of the General Statutes provides, in part, that all personal property be set in the list at the same percentage of the then actual valuation as the assessors have determined with respect to the listing of real estate for the same year."

"Our records indicate that the assessment ratio used for real estate in Columbia is 50 per cent of the actual valuation."

"It seems to us, therefore, you must assess motor vehicles at 50 per cent of their actual value on the Oct. 1, 1969 grand list, if this is the assessment ratio you intend to use for all other taxable property."

Carey further stated, "The minutes of the Board of Assessors will show that I personally appeared before that board and voiced my opinion, which represented the feelings of many taxpayers, and criticized the actions taken by the members of the Board of Tax Review in lowering their auto

The most elaborate stamp show ever planned on the West Coast—Stamp Expo '70—will be held in Anaheim Calif., March 20 to 22.

Black, executive director of the show's sponsor, the International Society of Stamp Collectors, reports that among the thousands of unique stamps and rare covers scheduled for display will be the world's most costly stamp—the one-of-a-kind "black Honduras", now valued at \$40,000.

Also featured will be the broadest collection of historic stamps and covers of the British Empire, being brought from London to Stamp Expo '70 by members of the distinguished British Philatelic Traders Society, Ltd.

The U.S. Treasury Department's Bureau of Engraving and Printing will operate a "live" printing press in actual stamp production, and display a special exhibit including the complete Apollo 11 collection.

The United Nations Postal Administration has announced it will issue two new commemorative stamps on March 13. One stamp will be the fourth in the "Art at the United Nations" series and will feature the Peace Bell presented to the U.N. on June 3, 1964, by the UN Association of Japan.

The second stamp is dedicated to the "Lower Mekong Basin Development" project to help the people of South-East Asia.

The Peace Bell stamp will come in two denominations—6 cents and 10 cents. The Lower Mekong Basin Development adhesive will be in two denominations—6 cents and 10 cents.

The Edgar Lee Masters 6-cent postage stamp, first in a series to honor American poets (previously mentioned in this column) will be issued Aug. 22 at Peleaburg, Ill., where the work is buried.

Although it is far in advance that first day cancellations may be obtained for this stamp by sending addressed envelopes, together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Peleaburg, Ill. 62701.

The outside envelope should be endorsed "First Day Covers six cents Edgar Lee Masters Stamp." Cover requests must be postmarked prior to Aug. 22, 1970.

THE MAIL BAG... To John Boyle of Sacramento, Calif.—said to relate, the baggage tag and the Hawaii statehood stamp do not appear to be valuable finds but are nice as mementos.

To Jon Anders of Rhinebeck, N.Y.—do not write on the back of any stamp, used or unused. The slightest mark can destroy the stamp, to say nothing of its value. Use stamp hinges or put the items in plastic pages. Any writing can be placed next to the stamp—but never on the front or back.

In glancing through the new topical album "Medicine on Stamps," published by Minus Publications, we can see some interesting highlights. Pope John XXI in the 15th century was a physician, as was Georges Clemenceau (prime minister of France during World War I) and Sun Yat-sen, the first president of China.

Each of these men is commemorated on stamps in this album with some 16,000 other illustrations based on the world famous collection of Dr. Joseph H. Kirt.

St. Nicholas is honored as the patron saint of Virginia, Russia, children, sailors, and inventors, in the tradition of the Greek Orthodox church.

Job Security, Benefit Hikes UAW Goals

DETROIT (AP) — A raft of fringe benefit improvements and more job security are proposed as new contract goals for the United Auto Workers, as are a substantial wage increase, year-end bonus and other financial gains.

The UAW also proposes to battle anew this year for a clause which would bar a firm from subcontracting work to others who, in the union's view, pay "substandard wages or maintain substandard working conditions."

A series of proposals by the UAW International Executive Board were distributed Monday to the union's 1.8 million active and retired members across the country for study.

The formal set of goals will be drafted by the union's convention in April at Atlantic City, N.J., but recommendations of the executive board, headed by UAW President Walter P. Reuther, usually win favor from the delegates.

—To meet the problem of job-replacing automation, the UAW proposes application of "the principle of attrition," with the work force reduced through "retirements, quits, discharges and deaths," rather than layoffs.

—Expanding the company prescription drug program to retirees and surviving spouses, and full company payment of the medicare premium.

—Tying pensions to the cost-of-living.

—Renegotiating life insurance, sickness and accident benefits to reduce further the financial hardship caused by illness and maximize the financial assistance provided for the family that suffers the loss of its breadwinner.

—More holidays aimed at increasing the number of long weekends.

—Diversion of a portion of pension funds to "proper safeguards for investment in housing and other community facilities to help workers meet their housing needs and to enhance the social environment of their communities."

Defense for Chicago Seven Plan to Go to Higher Court



CHICAGO (AP) — The government has won a split verdict in its prosecution of seven men accused of inciting violence at the time of the 1968 Democratic National Convention, but defense lawyers plan to appeal the validity of the federal anti-riot law in higher courts.

U.S. District Judge J. Edgar Conner convicted five men Wednesday of crossing state lines with the intent to incite rioting during the convention in August 1968.

But the jury of 10 women and 2 men acquitted all seven defendants of conspiracy to promote the bloody demonstrations between the police and antiwar demonstrators.

Two defendants, Lee Weiner and John H. Frisnes, were cleared of conspiracy and of a charge of inciting violence in Chicago during the five-month trial. Frisnes and Weiner both resided in Chicago during the summer of 1968 and were not charged in the indictment with crossing state lines to incite rioting.

Convicted were David T. Dellinger, 31; Jerry C. Rubin, 31; Thomas E. Hayden, 28; Abbie Hoffman, 31, and Richard C. "Rennie" Davis, 29.

Each man could be sentenced to a maximum of five years in prison and fined \$10,000.

Judge Julius J. Hoffman did not set a date for sentencing. All seven defendants are being held in the Cook County jail on contempt sentences imposed by Judge Hoffman last week. The contempt charges range from 2 1/2 months to 2 1/2 years. The judge has refused to grant bail on contempt charges pending appeal.
