

Top Laos Position Seen Red Target

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — The North Vietnamese and Pathet Lao forces that recaptured the Plain of Jars may now be heading toward Muong Suoi, an important Laotian government position nine miles west of the plain, American sources said today.

The sources reported a "light probing attack" during the night on the mountain outpost of Phou Kout, on the western edge of the plain 100 miles north of the capital and on the route to Muong Suoi.

There was no report of casualties in the attack, and it was not clear whether the North Vietnamese had captured the village or pulled back.

Another unconfirmed report said an enemy force was observed moving from the Plain of Jars in the direction of Gen. Vang Pao's headquarters at Long Cheng, 35 miles to the west. Vang Pao commands a force of about 10,000 Meo tribesmen who are paid and trained by the United States.

The North Vietnamese and Pathet Lao captured Muong Suoi and held it for a short time last summer. 728 bombers of the Laotian Air Force operate from a base there.

Government forces were reported "regrouping" after the loss of the Xieng Khouang airfield Saturday drove them from the Plain of Jars. The situation

was still "quite confusing," said Col. Thongphanh Knoksy, the spokesman for the Laotian Defense Ministry.

The airfield had been defended by about 1,500 men. Informing sources said 700 of these had been accounted for, another 700 were believed "wandering around" in the hills on the edges of the plain, and they had no idea what happened to the other 100 or so.

No casualties have been announced by either side.

Thongphanh said the North Vietnamese had used three helicopters and 18 tanks to support some 2,400 ground troops in the successful assault on the Xieng Khouang airfield. He said it was the first time the North Vietnamese had used helicopters in Laos.

The North Vietnamese and Pathet Lao are estimated to have a force of about 20,000 in the area of the Plain of Jars. Opposing them are Vang Pao's 10,000 Meo tribesmen, along with hundreds of American fighter-bombers that fly attack missions from bases in Thailand and South Vietnam and from 7th Fleet carriers in the Gulf of Tonkin.

'Abduction' Linked To Bank Blast

UNION, Mo. (AP) — Authorities believe there may be a link between a series of bank robberies in Missouri, Delaware and Connecticut and the disappearance of two Franklin County, Mo., residents.

Sheriff Bill Miller says descriptions of bandits who robbed the bank of Pacific, Mo.; the State Bank of Union, Mo.; and banks in Wilmington, Del., and Danbury, Conn., are quite similar. Bombs were involved in two of the robberies.

Miller also speculated that J. Russell Pardue, 53, and his 78-year-old mother, Mrs. Daisy Pardue, may have been abducted from their home about five miles west of Union as hostages after the Union Bank robbery. Pardue recently moved from Southport, Conn., to Franklin County.

The Pacific bank was robbed of about \$50,000 last May by two men wearing ski masks, one of them armed with a machine gun and the other a sawed-off shotgun.

Bandits answering the same description took \$18,000 from the Union bank on Nov. 13 minutes after a bomb exploded in the Franklin County Courthouse, wrecking the sheriff's communications center and injuring 10 persons.

Arab Terrorists Attack U.S. Tourists, Kill Woman

JERUSALEM (AP) — Arab terrorists attacked a bus carrying 37 Americans on a "Bible Land Tour" of Israeli-occupied Jordan today and one woman was killed. Two other American women and a local tour guide were wounded.

The woman killed was identified as Barbara Artell, a spokeswoman at Jerusalem's Hadassah Hospital said. An earlier announcement said the woman killed was a Michigan resident but no address was given later when the dead woman was identified.

The wounded American women were identified as Tabes Damico of Atlantic City, N.J., and Lucille Draper, Buffalo, N.Y.

Mrs. Damico told an official at Hadassah Hospital:

"We were driving along out of Hebron about 3:20 when suddenly we were being shot at from all sides.

"We crawled under the seats for safety."

Mrs. Damico was slightly wounded in one leg and Mrs. Draper had slight wounds in both legs.

They said they were on a "Bible Land Tour" sponsored by the Baptist Life Insurance Co. of Buffalo, N.Y. and had arrived Saturday.

"Everything so far had been so beautiful, so peaceful and normal," Mrs. Damico said.

The wounded guide was identified by hospital officials as Zvi Grimberg, who lives in the Israeli port of Haifa. He was released from the hospital after treatment for minor wounds from flying glass.

Grimberg said he believed machine gun fire hit the bus, one of two traveling near the village of Halhoul on the outskirts of Hebron. The other bus was not attacked, he said.

Israeli security forces rushed to the scene, surrounded the area and helicopters came in to evacuate the wounded.

A spokesman for the Proper Tourist Agency in Jerusalem said the Americans were all from the New York area and were led by a Rev. Dr. A. Ministry of Tourism spokesman in Jerusalem said Lucille Draper, the clergyman's sister, was one of the women wounded.

The attack came as Prime Minister Golda Meir summoned the envoys of nations with airlines flying to Israel and urged them to press their governments "to stop Arab attacks on civilian airlines." She did this in connection with the crash of a Swissair jetliner Saturday after it took off from Zurich for Israel.

Meskill Tells Supporters He'll Run for Governor

To the surprise of no one and in the presence of about 700 delighted Republicans, Sixth District Cong. Thomas J. Meskill this morning announced his candidacy for the GOP nomination for governor.

Meskill made his move at a 9:30 a.m. press conference, in the Terrace Ballroom of the Hartford Hilton Hotel.

Stepping to the rostrum without an introduction, promptly at 9:30, the 42-year-old congressman brought cheers from the invited guests with his opening remarks. "Just to keep the record straight, as of this moment, I am a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor of the State of Connecticut."

His announcement made it a three-way race for the nomination. Previously announced candidates are State Senate Minority Leader Wallace Barnes of Farmington and State Sen. T. Clark Hull of Danbury.

Barnes, considered the front-runner until today's announcement by Meskill, has said he is

in the race to stay and that he will force a primary, if he gets the necessary 20 per cent backing of state convention delegates.

Meskill said today, "I offer the best and only possibility for a Republican victory." He said that his decision to run was based on statewide political polls, which showed him leading all potential GOP and Democratic gubernatorial nominees. "The polls," he said, "had a considerable influence on my decision."

He said the decision "has not been an easy one for me."

"But," he added, "I believe that there is a time in a man's life when he is called upon to do more than what is personally rewarding. I believe this is that time in my life."

Acknowledging that he is beginning the campaign "as a slight favorite," he pledged, "I will wage this campaign as if I am the underdog."

Asked to explain "slight favorite" versus "underdog," he said that, based on the results of the polls, he is the "slight favorite," but, based on the Democratic lead in registrations, he is the "underdog." Polls in February may

not prove a reality in November, he conceded.

Questioned about whether he will force a primary, in the event he does not receive the nomination, Meskill replied, "I hope to get the nomination. I'm not talking now of a primary, nor even considering it."

"A primary," he said, "is not something to plan for bolstering the party. I'd like to see us avoid one. However, it need not tear the party apart."

He said he has made no choice at present for a Republican candidate for U.S. Senator. "I have great faith in the ability of the state convention to choose the strongest candidate. I will not wait to make known my choice of a candidate and, I will not try to influence the delegates."

U.S. Rep. Lowell Weicker Jr., of Greenwich has called a news conference for Wednesday morning, when he is expected to announce his candidacy for the GOP nomination for U.S. senator.

Swiss Move to Ban Arabs In Wake of Fatal Jet Crash

BERN, Switzerland (AP) — Switzerland issued today a virtual entry ban for Arab nationals, following the crash of an Israeli-bound Swissair jetliner in which 47 passengers and crew from nine nations died.

Swiss President Hans Peter Tschudi told a news conference that the Swiss authorities will issue visas to nationals from Arab states only on humanitarian grounds—for visits of relatives—"and where significant Swiss interests are at stake," that is for diplomatic and important business visits.

He said tourist visas will no longer be given to Arabs with the exception of "extraordinary cases," such as trips by journalists.

Tschudi addressed newsmen after an emergency session by the Swiss seven-man collective government probing first official reports on the disaster.

A government statement published at the same time said that investigators thus far definitely established that the crash was caused by an explosion—in the rear of the plane but "it is not yet possible to draw any definite conclusion."

"We do not yet know what actually exploded," Tschudi explained. "It is clear that the government will raise no accusation it cannot prove."

Tschudi did not comment on

the reported claim of an Arab guerrilla group—in Beirut, Lebanon, only a few hours after the crash Saturday—that it was responsible for both the crash of the Swissair Conair Gronado, and the explosion in an Austrian passenger plane in the same day in West Germany. The Austrian aircraft made an emergency landing at Frankfurt and no one was hurt. It carried mail for Israel.

The government also decided to convene an international aviation security conference as soon as possible to study ways and means for better protection of civil aircraft. It asked the International Air Transport Association—IATA—presently meeting in Montreal, to prepare the

conference and offered to act as its host.

Tschudi announced that Swiss ambassadors in all Arab countries — including the smaller oil sheikdoms of the Arab peninsula which are also affected by the new visa rules—were instructed to inform the respective governments and invite them to take "active measures against Palestinian resistance groups" to prevent terror acts in Switzerland.

Meanwhile, seven European airlines temporarily banned freight or mail to Israel in a continentwide security clampdown today. Passenger luggage for Middle East flights was opened at several airports.

Strengthened police details patrolled corridors and lobbies of air terminals in a search for possible saboteurs. Airline officials and pilots' associations hastily called meetings to discuss long-term security measures.

In London, British Overseas Airways Corp. and British European Airways banned freight to Israel for 48 hours. Airlines with indefinite cargo bans included Air France, Swissair, Royal Dutch Airlines, Lufthansa of West Germany and Austrian Airlines.

The couple were enroute to Israel to complete part of a study commissioned by the World Health Organization and Harvard University Press.

Pompidou, Nixon Meet On Mideast

PARIS (AP) — President Georges Pompidou left for a nine-day tour of the United States today, prepared for demonstrations against his Middle East policies but ready to put those policies in the most favorable light possible in his talks with President Nixon.

Pompidou and his dashing blonde wife, Claude, took off in a light rain.

Heavy security precautions, the threat of unfriendly pickets and prospects for a sizeable congressional boycott when Pompidou addresses a joint session in Washington Wednesday made for a gloomy mood among the president's aides.

After arriving at Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington this afternoon, Pompidou and his wife are to spend tonight at Camp David, the U.S. presidential retreat, before talks begin Tuesday with President Nixon, whom he has never met.

The two presidents are expected to look further down the path of Franco-American reconciliation on which Nixon set out a year ago. U.S. officials have expressed confidence that the White House sessions will be amicable because Nixon will avoid sensitive subjects.

Nixon does not intend to bring up France's relations with the Atlantic Alliance. Although President Charles de Gaulle withdrew French forces from NATO's military structure in 1966, U.S. officials have noted with satisfaction some informal

Housing Crisis Now Hits Middle Class Americans

Editor's Note: In an age of affluence, America isn't meeting its housing needs. This, the first of five articles from the AP Special Assignment Team, looks at the problem through the eyes of a reporter.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A national housing crisis that long has plagued the poor is beginning to engulf middle class America as the need for housing outstrips production and prices spiral steadily upward.

At the same time, the rising costs and critical shortage of houses are intensifying the pressures, that low-income persons must fight to find a decent place to live.

The government says 26 million new housing units are needed during the next 10 years. Current production is not even half that rate, and it is declining. But marriages—the formation of new families who'll need a place to live—now average 2.1 million a year and are increasing rapidly.

The Associated Press investigated home buying to isolate the tangle of cost and other factors at work. Also evident, however,

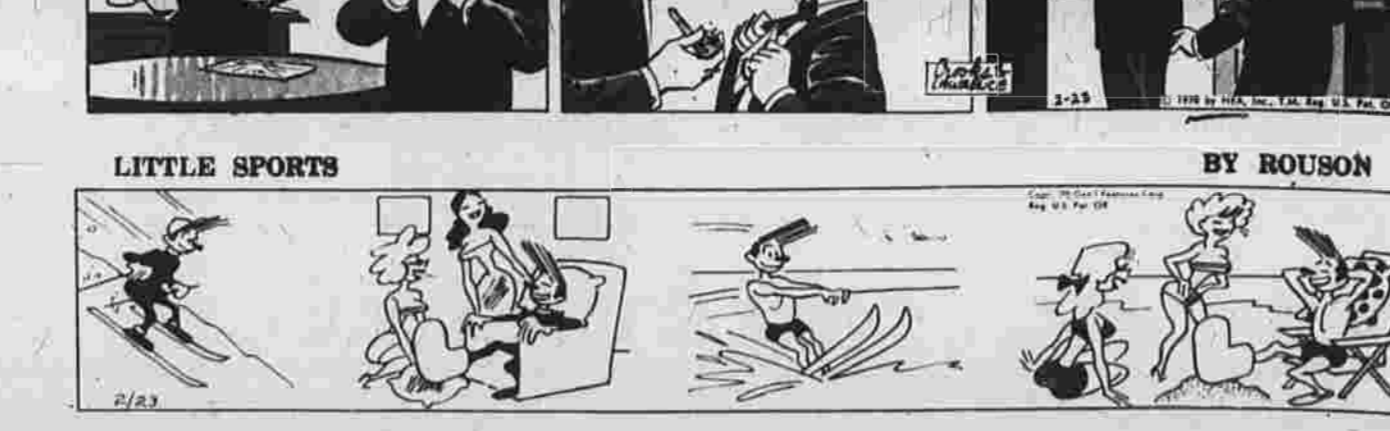
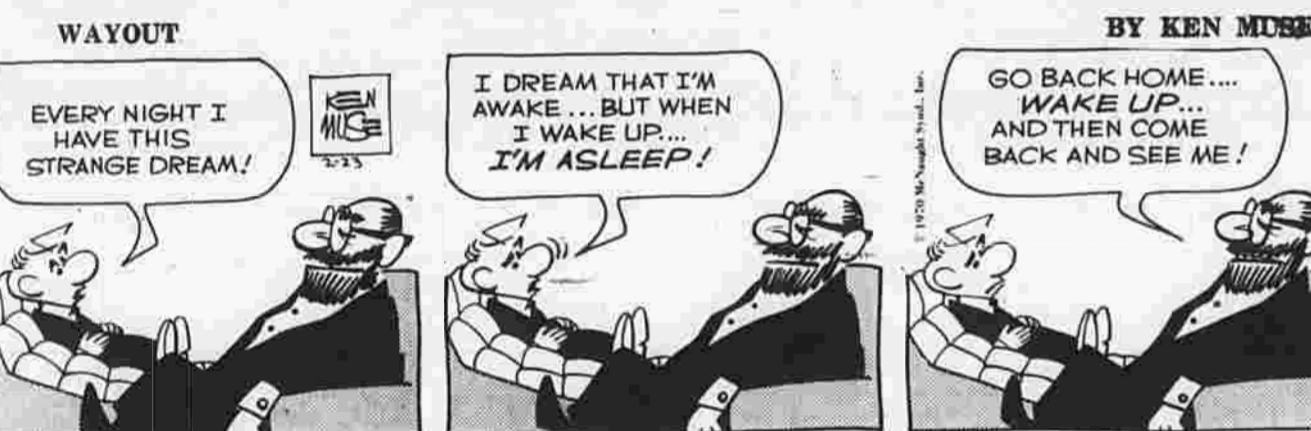
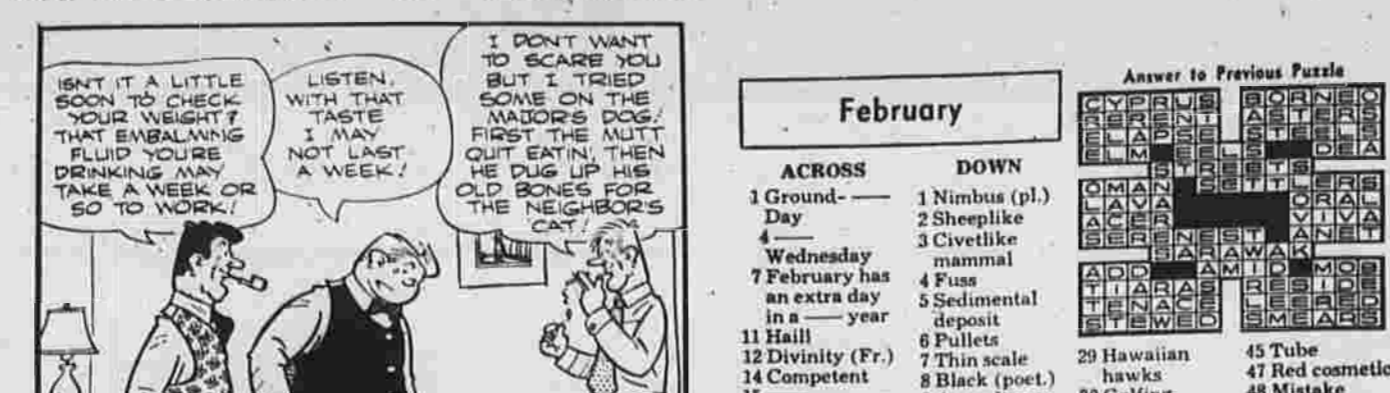
