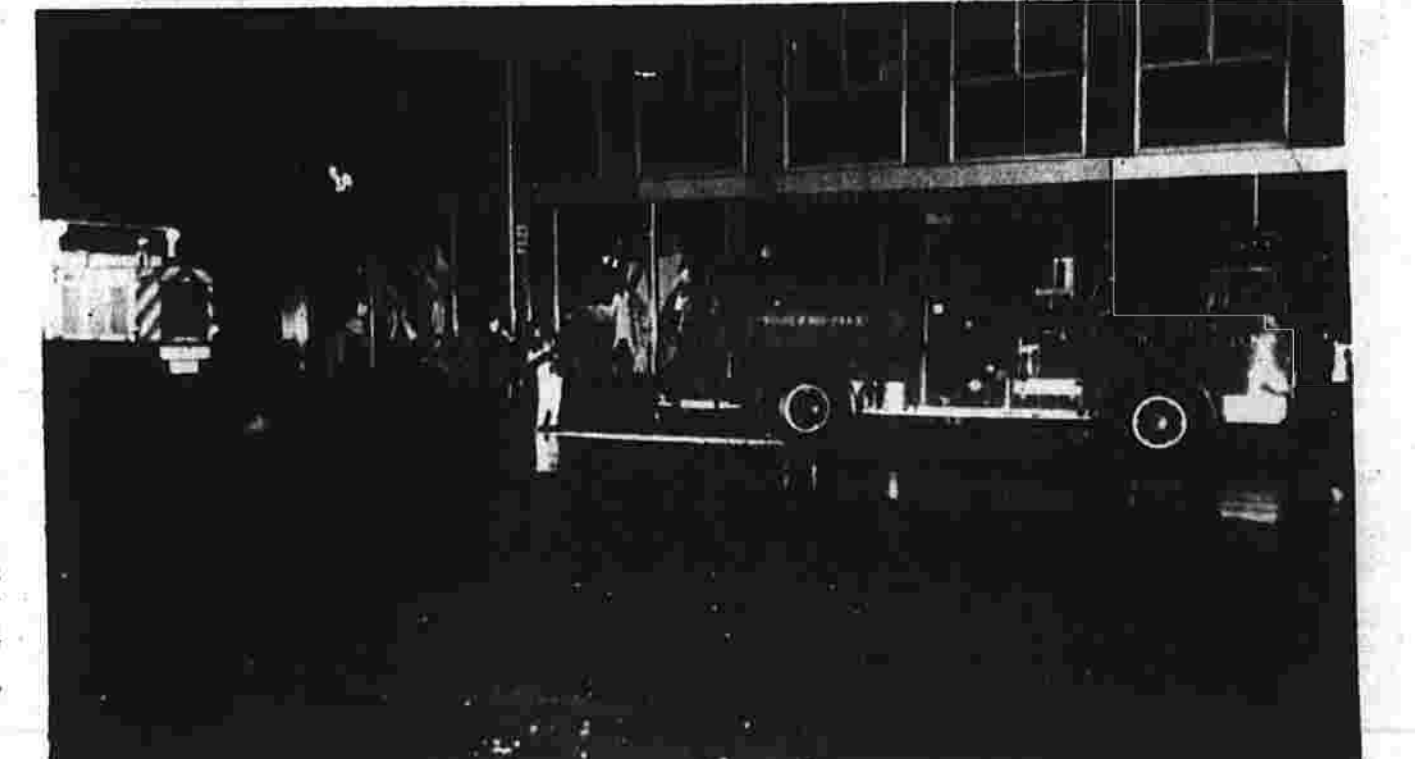

### Price Proves Truly Great In Concert

Leontyne Price wowed a SERO audience at the Bushnell Ball Room and received a rapturous ovation, standing ovation, appearing as guest artist on another of the Hartford Symphony Orchestra Subscription Concerts. She was at her best in music by Verdi, but she also offered works by Mozart, Strauss and Puccini.

She chose to open with "Dove sono" from Mozart's Marriage of Figaro which offered all the notes in pleasant style, but which failed to evoke the mood which plagues the Countess when she is not in the opera. Mr. Winograd also failed, as he usually does with Mozart, to add much to the orchestra.

Then came "Tu che le vanità" from Don Carlos by Verdi. This was done to anybody's taste. It is a good melody, featuring aria and Miss Price really got her teeth into it. She sang in the best Italian tradition and one was convinced that here was an American of true greatness in the operatic world.

"Zweite Brautnacht" from Holen in Egypt, by Richard Strauss, was not quite so well suited to Miss Price's talents.

Although she has a good low range, she was inadequate to the demands of the composer, which are extremely arduous.

Two Verdi works ensued: "Addio del Passato" from Traviata, and "Pace, pace, mio Dio" from La Forza del destino. The "Addio" is beloved by soprano and by audience alike. She sang in the best Italian tradition, accompanied as though he had never encountered the composer's difficulties in his life.

Never noted for lyricism or rubato, the conductor chopped and changed in his execution, which had its effect on the singing of Miss Price, of course. The "Addio" went much better, and in fact was the most dramatic offering of the evening. As a reward for the evening, the conductor drew the lot of the evening, which was a performance of Stravinsky's "Symphony in Three Movements," the major orchestral work of the evening. This is difficult to conduct, and the instrumental parts are difficult to play. It went off extremely well, however. Yet this excellent performance, which was meant to take the place of an encore in the Verdi works, but it seemed out of place as offered, even though it was beautifully sung.

MALICIOUS OPPONENT MAKES SNEAKY BID

If you live a clean and blameless life you may avoid double-diamonds, but you must still contend with the evil that other men do. Some day a malicious opponent will make a sneaky opening lead against you and come the lead instead of fearing it.

North dealer.

East-West vulnerable.

Opening lead—Two of Diamonds. West led the deuce of diamonds and South delightedly played low from the dummy. This generous opening led solved all of his diamond problems.

East won the first trick with the king of diamonds and returned the seven of diamonds for his partner to ruff. West switched to hearts, and South had to lose a heart and the king of trumps. Down one.

"I could have gone down two," South announced with quiet satisfaction. "A bad play or would have trouble with this hand."

Worry Not Needed about South's education you can sit back and relax. Since North had a fine vocabulary and very few inhibitions, South had every chance to learn where he had gone wrong.

South should take the ace of diamonds at the first trick and the ace and then a low trump in the attempt to draw trumps without delay. West takes the second trump and leads a heart, but South must put up his long side suit and draw the last trump.

Declarer leads the queen of diamonds to force out the king, and can later ruff a diamond in the dummy to set up his long side suit. The rest is easy.

### Blacks Await Arrest For Holding Form

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP)—Black students who occupied Massachusetts Hall at Springfield College today failed to answer a contempt of court citations issued when they ignored a court order to leave the building.

The 47 black students remained in the educational dormitory they seized Tuesday after an alleged racial incident Monday night.

They were ordered by the court to leave the building by 3 p.m. Wednesday, but the deadline was extended until today.

J. Clifford Clark, an attorney representing the students, appeared in Superior Court this morning and told the judge there was "no indication" the students were arrested today.

A newsman asked if that meant the students would stay until they are arrested by police for violating a court order.

"Unfortunately, that's what they want," Clark said.

Judge Samuel T. Tisdale had issued contempt citations against the students after they refused to obey a court injunction and vacate the building.

They were to have been in court Wednesday to answer the contempt citations.

### Peace Talk: Mrs. Bin Joins Boycott

PARIS (AP)—When Nguyen Van Tien walked into the old Hotel Majestic this morning for the 28th session of the Vietnam peace talks, somebody shouted: "Where's Madam Binh?"

Tien turned and smiled. "She's home," he said.

The downgrading of the talks was continuing and no one seemed to care.

Tien was replacing Mrs. Han Nguyen Thi Binh as the Viet Cong representative; North Vietnamese Ambassador Xuan Hanh, whose title of "acting" designation head rites the Communist side, was ready to continue his quest for a list of U.S. prisoners and a guarantee of the good treatment.

U.S. Ambassador Philip C. Habib said he was raising the issue again "because this is not something we can drop just because the other side has refused to discuss it."

The U.S. delegate arrived at the session without a prepared statement, a tactic devised to provoke free discussion.

"This doesn't mean that I don't know what I'm going to say," Habib explained. So far the tactic has failed.

Nguyen Xuan Phong, the South Vietnamese replacement, read a 1,600-word statement assailing the Communist position which he said "is full of blood, fire and hatred."

Hanh's opening remarks set some sort of record for brevity. They came to two short paragraphs.

After recalling that the Viet Cong had held a prisoner's wife, Mrs. Raymond Schrupp, of Fayetteville, N.C., that mail could be sent to captives through a postal address in Cambodia, Hanh said: "However, at that time your spokesman said nothing to indicate that the prisoners of war you hold in South Vietnam will in turn be allowed to send letters to their families on a regular basis. We are asking for confirmation that these men will, in fact, be permitted to write to their families regularly."

### The Cooper Amendment

The other day the Senate adopted, not on motion of Senator Stennis of Mississippi or Senator Ribicoff of Connecticut, but on that of Senator John Sherman Cooper, the Kentucky Republican, an amendment which would have the effect of bringing into sections of six Northern states, including Manhattan, Brooklyn and the Bronx most importantly, the same kind of federal law on voting rights which already applies to the South.

By the Cooper amendment, the Voting Rights Act of 1965, if it continues on the books, would produce relaxation of literacy tests and the invasion of federal voting registrars in any section of the country where less than half of the voting population was registered or voted in the last national election.

Apparently there are some Northern ghettoes in which registration or voting was below the 50 per cent level in 1968. By voting the amendment, the Senate held that a disenfranchisement in the North, whatever its particular causes, even if it happened only by the neglect of people to exercise citizenship privileges freely open to them, was just as serious a problem as any disenfranchisement down South, even though the latter might be the result of deliberate freer-out policies on the part of the whites.

As might have been expected from his record on the Stennis amendment a month ago, Senator Jacob Javits, the New York Republican, led the fight against the Cooper amendment. Once again, his fear was that this was a kind of legislation which would let the South off the hook without accomplishing anything constructive or valuable in the North.

And once again we wonder what is wrong with the opposite theory, which says that perhaps the best way to persuade the South to try to comply in good faith with the necessities of any all-American future is to have the North demonstrate that it does recognize and accept all its own parallel responsibilities.

### Hypocrisy? Cheers!

If there is one thing we of the parental generation ought to know it is that we are not so full of hypocrisy. Our young tell us that all the time.

The proposition that hypocrisy is one of the evils that we, the elders, have fostered upon the world is not, however, intended to be discussed, any more than one would debate whether the world is round. You are supposed to start with that as a philosophical premise, and then listen to how the young are going to change all this.

There's a temptation, of course, to retort that the young are not exactly free of it, if the word means pretending feelings one does not have. To preach love and hate and then spit out a stream of words in a queer way and then tear up the pea patch; these are hardly consistent.

More to the point, certainly about everything while you are conscious inside of a turbulent uncertainty is certainly a form of hypocrisy. The young are no more free of this than their elders.

Or, I suppose, you might note that at least the milder forms of hypocrisy have their merits. They are the lubricating oils of society. Life is more pleasant for our hiding, now and then, our true opinions of our kin and neighbors, or for our parting in a queue when actually we feel otherwise.

But all this is really no answer to what the young charge us with. To answer this is either to be trivial or speechless. The true charge, of course, for it is nothing less than that we do not live up to the virtues we pretend—and that charge cannot be denied. We do indeed, all of us, preach peace and make war. We profess to believe, let us say, in the sanctity of marriage and we preach it to our young as a holy estate, or at the least an honorable one; in fact we treat it as a casual contract to be broken when inconvenient.

We say we have no more laws, in fact most of us ignore those laws we feel little of, whether it is going through a traffic light or passing a vehicle in a queue when actually we feel otherwise.

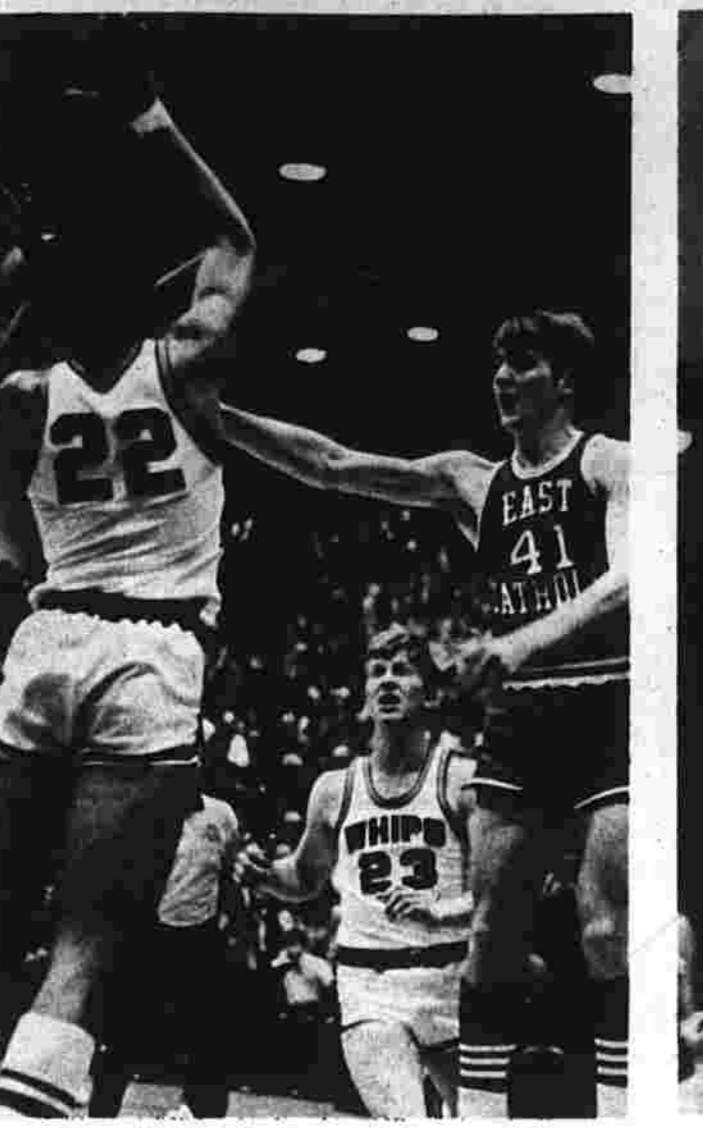
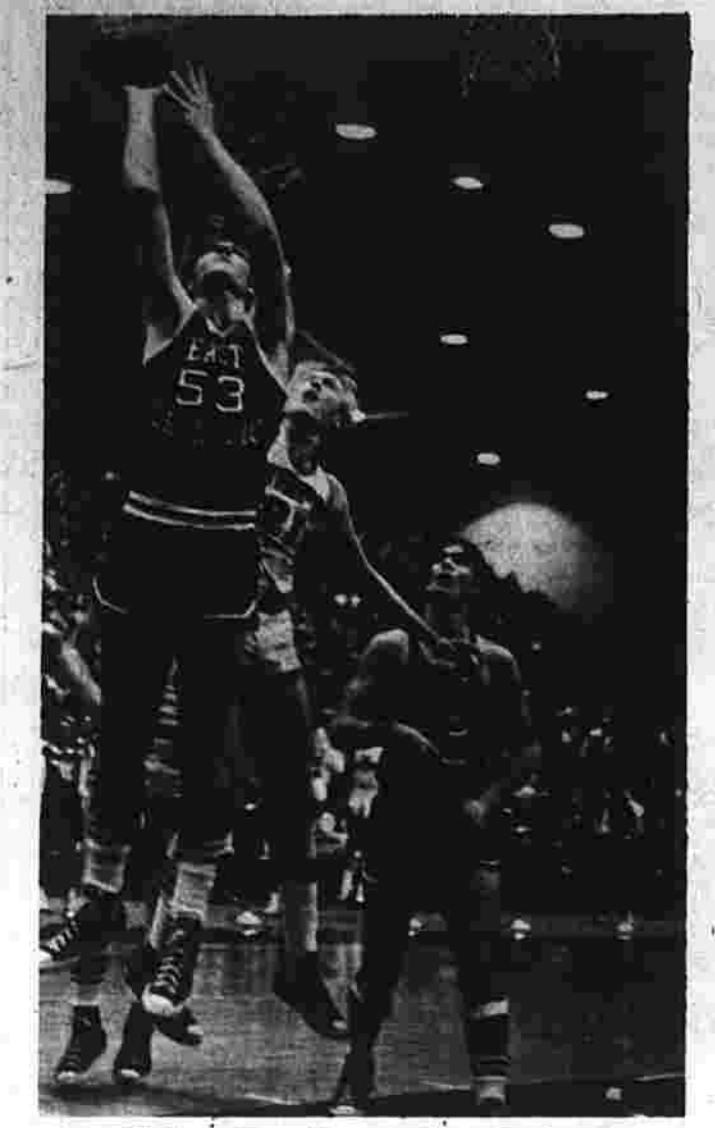
