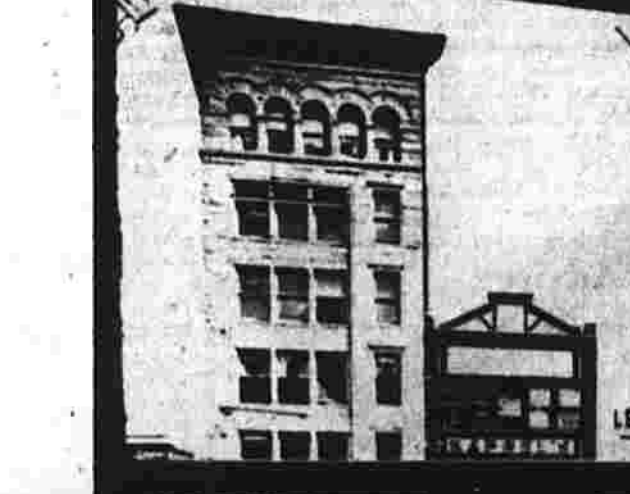

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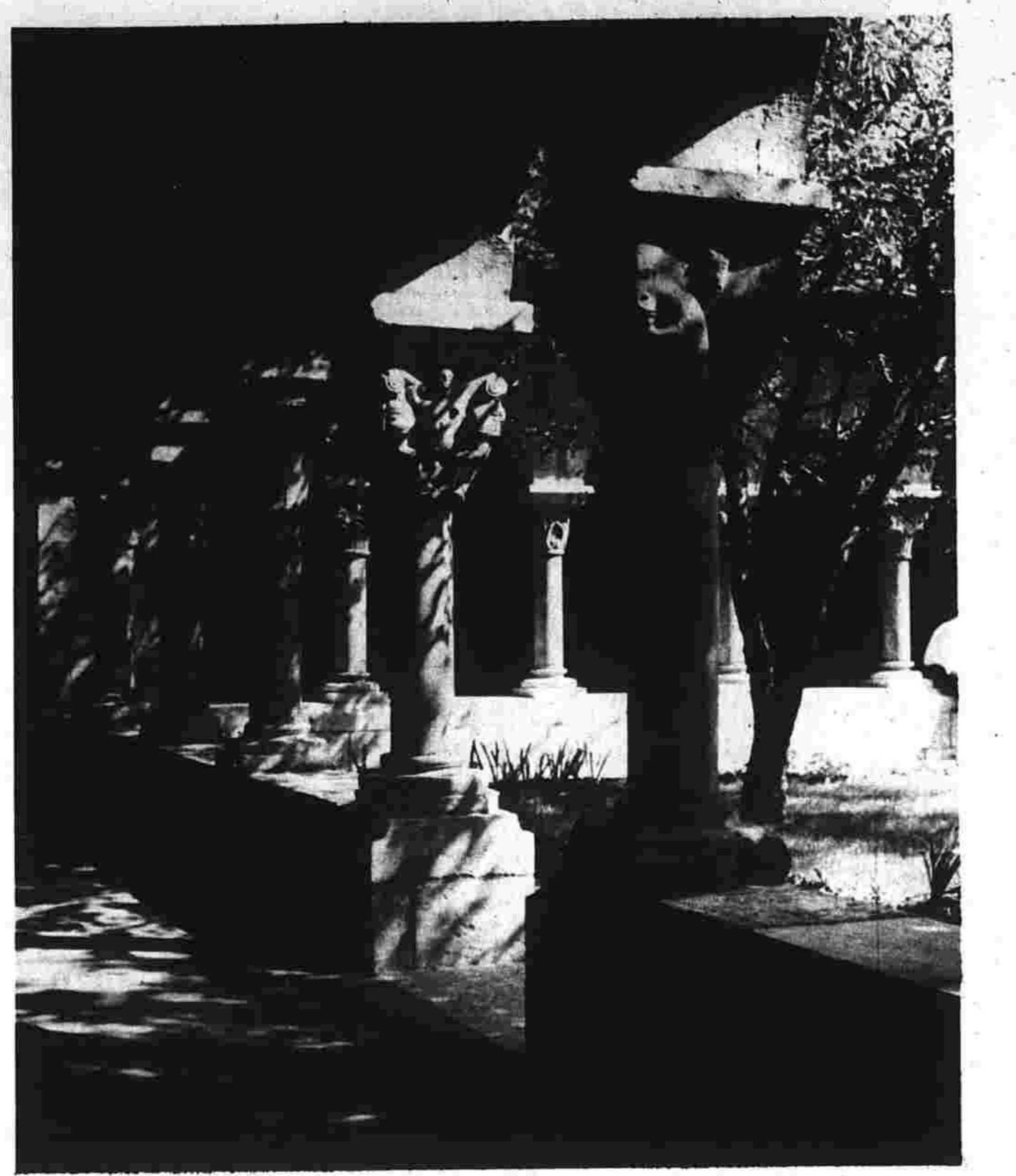

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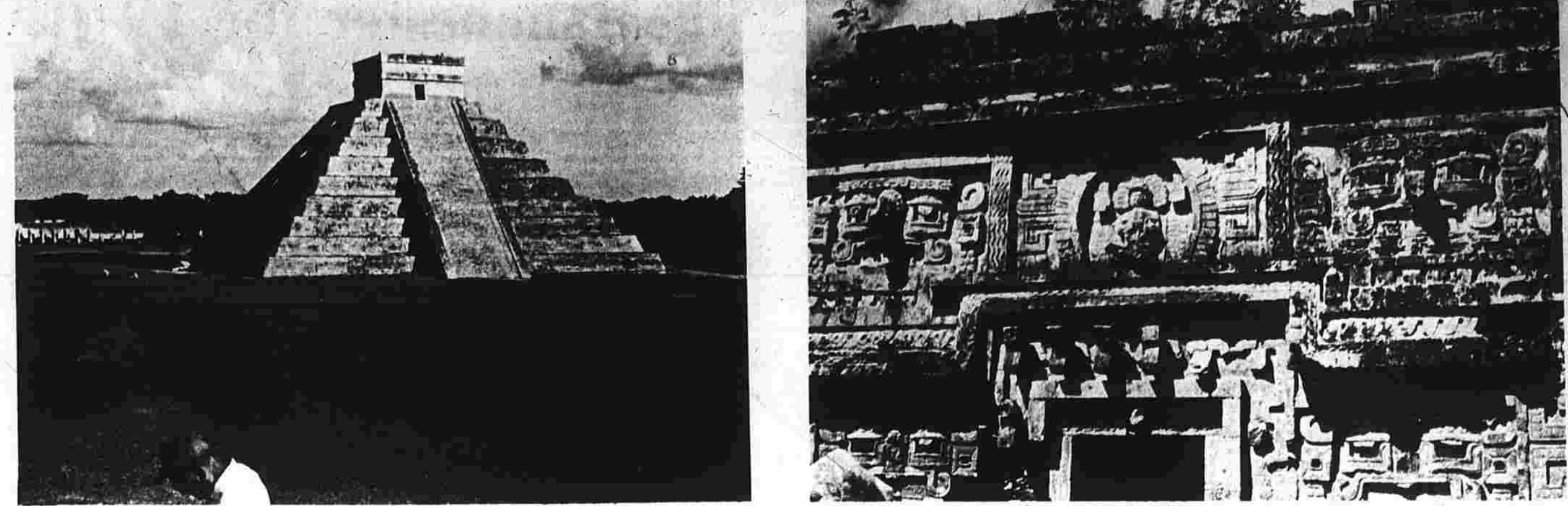

The Old Civilization of the MAYANS

A huge flaring moon arose directly from the east, quickly flooded the ruins with a silvery, veiled light. I climbed the pyramid of Kukulcan, the great pyramid of the Mayans, to come alive again after 2000 years of total isolation. We walked towards the Ball Court. The soft sound of fresh-cut grass crunched under our feet, out of tune with the rock and roll blaring from the Mayan hills which sprawled outside the gates. The Ball Court is larger than a football field. There are no stands, just two huge vertical walls. At the fifty yard line, some 20 feet high, is a large stony ring anchored vertically on the wall. Each team of five or six players tried to put the rubber ball through the ring using legs and body, but no hands. The score was always 1-0. The captain of the losing team was put to death at the nearby platform of the Tigris and Jaguars Temple. The walls are decorated with numerous skulls. We learned that some 180,000 live victims were sacrificed to the Aztec God Mars, known as Huitzilopochtli. We climbed crab-style the steep steps on the south wall, leading to the high platform. Here is a one-room structure for the king. It reminded me of the Temple of the Winged Victory of the Athens Acropolis. At the far end is another beautiful temple, now gleaming pure and white. It stood forlorn and abandoned by its priests, who officiated at the ball games. The Mayans had a theocratic society. The center of Chichen Itza stands the huge pyramid named El Castillo by Francisco de Montejo, the conqueror of the Yucatan. The Spaniards came from medieval Europe, thinking that America was inhabited by savages. Instead, they stumbled into the magnificent cities of the Mayans.

Doctors Popular Again

NEW YORK (AP) — Doctor series have, once again, proven to be durable television commodities. Three new ones were launched in September, and all of them will return for a second season.

ABC's "Marcus Welby, M. D." did so well that it was among the first series of the season to be renewed.

Among the three—actually it is 2-1-3 because the medical segment of NBC's "The Bold Ones" shares the screen with two other story lines—Robert Young's Dr. Welby is the only one that can be counted as a solid hit. Much of its success is due to Young's sympathetic portrait of a wise and dedicated family doctor.

"Medical Center" on CBS follows the form and, pretty much, the traditional substance of the genre. There is some unwritten rule in TV writing that medical series must have an old doctor and a young doctor who are often in a conflict of ideas.

Dr. Welby is unquestionably the head man in his series, with James Brolin playing his swinging young assistant. E. G. Marshall and David Hartman of "The Bold Ones" play, respectively, the mature and the young doctors, but both of them usually are supporting players to the medical inventions and developments around which plots are built.

"Medical Center" plays it safe and down the middle. The star is the young doctor, played in sober, dedicated style by Chad Everett. Its emphasis is on human drama related to illness.

Wednesday night's hour was the story of an aging former football star facing surgery to correct a vascular condition affecting his legs. The point of the story was that it was not so much his legs that were bothering him as the fact that life was empty with the glory days behind him. It was a mildly interesting treatment in a series notable for its polished production and professional performances.

Behind Dickens, James Franciscus

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — One of the production minds behind this Sunday's new television production of "David Copperfield" is James Franciscus. The same James Franciscus who starred on television in "Naked City," "The Investigators" and "Mr. Novak."

What's a TV series doing in a project involving England's foremost actors? Quite a bit. And Franciscus was part of the team responsible for last season's successful production of "Heidi."

Jim Franciscus is partner with Fred Brogger in Omnibus Productions, which has created both classics for NBC. So far the actor has served only in a production capacity, but that may be changed.

"We've got some other properties for the future, including a western in which I might fig-

ure," Franciscus said. "Now that I've made some progress in the feature-movie field, I figure I can enter into some of the deals as an actor without appearing to be an albatross around the company's neck."

His film career has progressed with the current "Marooned," in which he plays a stranded astronaut, and the unreleased "Beneath the Planet of the Apes" and "Hell Boats." He figures he might hire himself as an actor, but he'll remain active behind the scenes.

Franciscus and Brogger scored their first success with "Heidi," which amassed a No. 3 rating among specials in 1968 despite a hassle over beginning the special before the end of a crucial pro football game. A repeat of the Swiss classic scored No. 5 among 1969 specials—this time NBC was careful to delay the start until after the end of another football game.

"I'm hoping that 'Heidi' will hang in there as a perennial like 'The Wizard of Oz,'" Franciscus said. "That's important because we won't realize a profit until the third run." The perennial "Oz" will precede "David Copperfield" on NBC Sunday night.

Omnibus produced "Heidi"

for \$850,000. "David Copperfield" was made for almost double that amount. To provide additional financing, Omnibus and NBC included 20th Century-Fox as a third partner, and the film company is releasing the Dickens tale as theater attraction in England.

What does Franciscus contribute to the project?

"I'm heavily involved in the writing of the script, the casting and the making of the deal," the actor remarked. "Then Fred Brogger takes over as producer and Delbert Mann as director, and I get the hell out until after shooting, when I help on the cutting."

Casting was especially important for "David Copperfield," which required a succession of indelible characters.

"That's where we were lucky because of the English system," Franciscus said. "English actors, if they like the script and the company, are much more agreeable to taking small roles, even though they may be stars. The big names here are much more reluctant to enter into a television production, especially in supporting roles."

The crucial point, Franciscus said, was the acceptance by

Laurence Olivier of a cameo role. His fellow performers followed. Among those in the "David Copperfield" cast: Ralph Richardson, Michael Redgrave, Richard Attenborough, Wendy Hiller, Ron Moody and Emlyn Williams.

A Day in the Life Of Three TV Stars

LOS ANGELES (NEA) — At 5:00 a.m., the stillness in the house with the New England flavor is shattered by a telephone ringing.

"Good morning, it's five ayem," a phone operator says.

"There's not too much you can say about that," says Elizabeth Montgomery, whose working day has just begun.

A few miles away, in another home with a New England flavor, an alarm will ring at 5:45 a.m. Hope Lange will rise, pad to her kitchen, where she will have a cup of instant coffee and half a grapefruit, and let the cat and poodle puppy, Reilly, out into the yard.

Several miles away and almost two hours later, in a hill-top home overlooking the San Fernando Valley, Jim Nabors will awaken with a headache. This is taping day for his CBS-TV show and rehearsals went badly yesterday.

Hope, Elizabeth and Jim are three fairly typical working peo-

ple—the first two wives, mothers and career girls, and the latter a bachelor who works too hard.

Hope has two children. Patti, 10, is away at the moment. Chris, 12, will be awakened in time to get him to school.

Once a week, Hope plans the week's menus. She leaves daily lists for her secretary, then she heads for the studio and an 8:30 set call, which means she must arrive by 7:00 for her makeup, hair and wardrobe. "They send over a breakfast which I don't usually eat," she says. "So I try to get a sandwich and save it for lunch."

Hope's working day ends between 6:00 and 6:30 p.m. It takes her about 20 minutes to drive home.

"I get very, very tired," she says. "The toughest thing is not to fall asleep after dinner. It's easy to nod off and wake up two or three hours later too rested to go to bed. So I take a walk or exercise after dinner to keep awake until it's bedtime. If I go to sleep by 11:00 at night I'm all right the next day."

The reason Elizabeth Montgomery and her husband, Bill Ashet, are awakened by the telephone company is simple: "I've broken too many alarms through a combination of pure reflex and sheer fury. But I'm very hard-pur to be pleasant to the girl who wakes me. I don't really want to say 'Thank you.'"

Elizabeth's three children are all under six. But she and Bill, who drive to work and home together (he directs many of her Bewitched shows and produces the series), have a fairly regular schedule that allows them to get home at a reasonable hour.

Ronnie Schnell, seen on television's "The Jim Nabors Hour," says television has allowed him to fulfill an ambition he's had since 1952. "Finally," he says, "I've saved up enough money to buy a 1962 car."
