**Wine Battle Bottles Up Common Market Talks**

BRUSSELS (AP) — A battle over the free flow of Italian and German wines across France's borders threatened today to hold up the start of European Community negotiations on British membership.

A five flow of Chianti wine by April 1 would have opened the way for talks between the Common Market and Britain.

It was Italy's condition for signing a package deal including the Common Market farm financing system and budgetary powers for their European Parliament.

However, France, under heavy pressure from wine growers who fear a flow of competition from Italy, has been unable to agree to the technical details of a common wine policy by the deadline set by the British.

**New Leadership Seated in Cambodia**

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia — Troops with fixed bayonets lined the streets in Cambodia's capital today, as the new leadership made its first public appearance at the National Assembly.

Cheng Heng was sworn in as provisional chief of state, replacing Prince Norodom Sihanouk who was ousted in a bloodless coup last Wednesday. Vice Premier Sihanouk was also named to the cabinet.

Lon Nol stood at his side.

Lon Nol said later in a broadcast to the nation that the government planned to "safeguard our independence within our present borders."

He said in reference to Sihanouk: "Any act or plot of the prince detrimental to Cambodia will be condemned as treason."

All foreign legations in Phnom Penh have been advised the action is being taken in accordance with the law, he added.

Sihanouk, who was ousted while in Moscow, was quoted as saying he called for a referendum and urging foreign powers to respect his rights.

The government ordered all pictures of Sihanouk removed from sight. Pictures of the prince, some of which have been hanging in his places since he was placed on the throne by French colonial rulers in 1941, were taken down.

A Cambodian language newspaper, "Golden Country," reported today that Lon Nol was instrumental in blocking a play by Sihanouk's supporters which normally receives wide publicity.

One local language newspaper said that Sihanouk and his wife, Princess Monique, were in Phnom Penh on Monday night. They were accompanied by a Swiss bank accounts to make him the seventh richest man in the country.

It added that the two spent all their time making movies rather than in public appearances.

He held up to ridicule a movie Sihanouk made last year, the movie "The King of Cambodia," and produced by Sihanouk, who also starred in it with his wife.

Sihanouk said he was "legally deposed" by the Cambodian parliament, according to a New China News Agency report.

"To recognize such a regime would signify that one is against Cambodian rights as well as the Khmer (Cambodian) people," he was quoted as saying.

The report, monitored from Phnom Penh, quoted Sihanouk as saying he was "ready to bear the verdict of the whole nation" in a referendum.

He said conditions for such a referendum would include "presence of an armed coalition, which is accepted by both the five parties, sent to our country for this sole purpose by India, Canada and Poland."

The three countries are members of the International Control Commission, which is responsible for overseeing the implementation of the 1964 Geneva agreement, which supposedly guarantees Cambodian neutrality.

**Anti-Carswell Senators See Victory Near**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators opposing Judge G. Harold Carswell say they may be within a few votes of defeating President Nixon's Supreme Court nominee and, after a week of debate, Republican leaders privately concede their strength is slipping.

Opponents say they can count 59 firm votes against Senate confirmation of the Florida jurist, with an additional nine senators leaning toward "no" votes.

Administration forces, meanwhile, have abandoned the confident prediction only a few more than 50 senators at most would vote against Carswell's confirmation, and now reportedly would be happy if 57 senators vote for him.

Although the outlook appears rosy for Carswell opponents, a change in the Senate composition could alter the balance. Some members of the Senate are expected to announce their intentions in the next few days.

Sen. Jack Miller, R-Iowa, who bolted his party's ranks to vote against the nomination of Carswell, said he was "ready to bear the verdict of the whole nation" in a referendum.

He said conditions for such a referendum would include "presence of an armed coalition, which is accepted by both the five parties, sent to our country for this sole purpose by India, Canada and Poland."

**Mail Strike Envelops Chicago, Other Cities**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Additional walkouts by mail carriers began today as pickets lined post offices in scattered cities in defiance of back-to-work pleas by union leaders and the administration's agreement to discuss wage demands.

About 40 pickets appeared at the front entrance to the main post office in Chicago—the nation's largest—after the local union voted to strike. The picketing began as the first shift of carriers was scheduled to report for work.

At the same time, picketing was scheduled to begin in 73 of Chicago's postal substations.

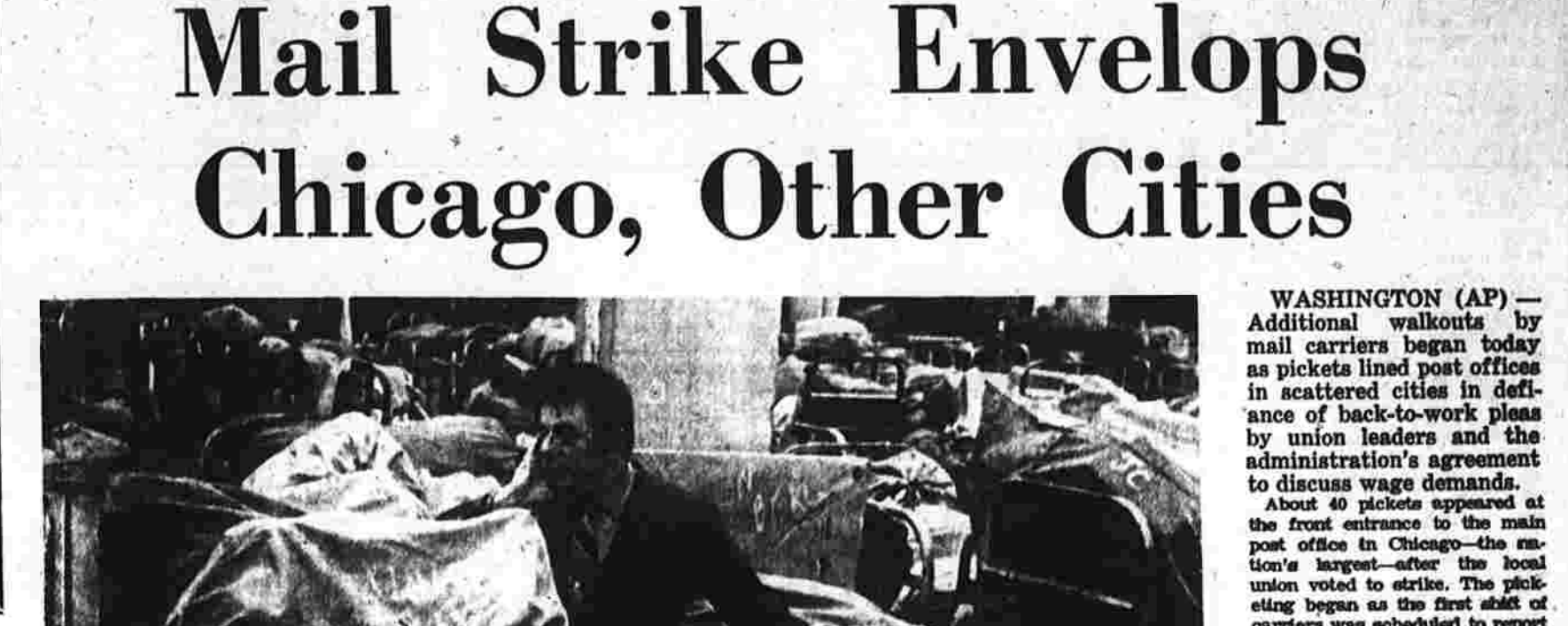
In Denver, workers also voted not to report for work beginning with today's first shift and, in Philadelphia, picketing of the male post office began at 5 a.m. EDT.

## Diplomats Ask Halt to Ransom In Future Political Abductions

**EDITOR'S NOTE:**—Political kidnappings have become an all too frequent way of life in Latin America, and the United States is not immune. The U.S. State Department is now looking for a solution. Here is a report on the situation.

Washington, D.C., March 20 (AP)—A group of American diplomats in Latin America have asked the State Department to adopt a new policy to deal with the growing wave of political kidnappings. The diplomats say that the current policy of paying ransoms is not only costly but also encourages more kidnappings. They are asking for a halt to ransom payments and for a more aggressive approach to the problem.

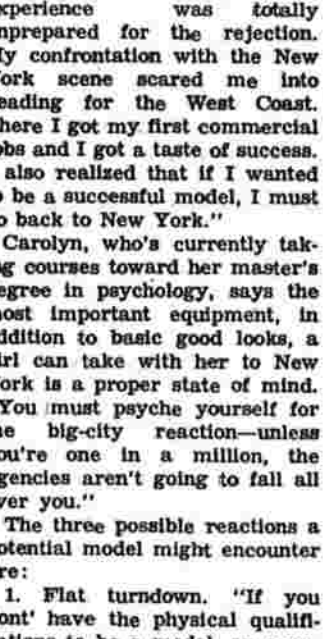

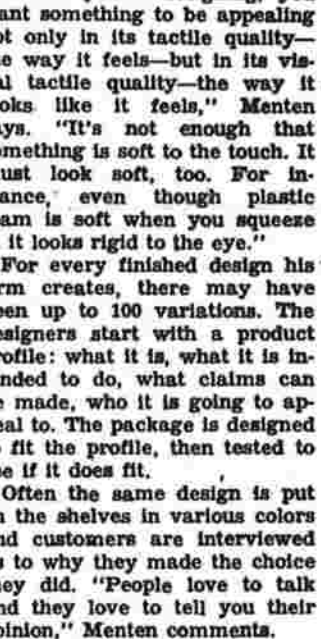

A raised man-hole on Glen Rd. was the cause, claims Robert Spillane of 238 Timrod Rd., of \$51.12 in damages to his car.

Seven other claims so far this month have been made against the town. One is for car damage attributed to an ice flow, four are from holes on Hartford Rd., and the last from allegedly poor road conditions on Finley St.

## Della Reese the Singer Becoming Known as a Talker

If you were to stand on any street corner in Megalopolis, U.S.A., and show passersby a bunch of photographs of women celebrities, chances are that you could prove Della Reese ranks high among the 10 most recognizable females in the country, right up there with Jackie and Pat and the rest.

Even to those who live in a town where her five-times-weekly syndicated TV show is not aired, the face is familiar.

"Carson, Frost, Griffin, Bishop, Jonathan Winters, Hollywood Squares and all the game shows—you name 'em, baby, I've done 'em," says Miss Reese, a voluble, outgoing woman whose fame as a talker is rapidly gaining ground on her longstanding reputation in the world of golden records. (The

second single of her career, "And That Reminds Me," sold a million and earned her awards in the trade papers as most promising girl singer of 1967. It was the first of five gold-strickers.)

The sharp-witted Della was a logical choice to become the first woman, black or white, ever to face the nation on a daily program of this type. Her chameleon-like personality, speech pattern and grammar all change according to the company she is in. As a former child gospel singer in Detroit and later a Wayne State University psychology major, she can deal uninhibitedly with any interviewee, from musician to politician.

She has a rare capacity for creating unusual situations with her guests. When California State Assemblyman Jess Unruh declared himself a Country and Western music nut, within moments she had him singing a C and W song, "I Walk the Line." Another guest singer was California Gov. Ronald Reagan's daughter Maureen. Lou Rawls' nine-year-old son Lou Jr. conducted his father's singing. When Earl Palmer, who plays in the Pete Myers Staff Orchestra, brought his 17-year-old son to the studio, she set them up for a two-generation drum battle.

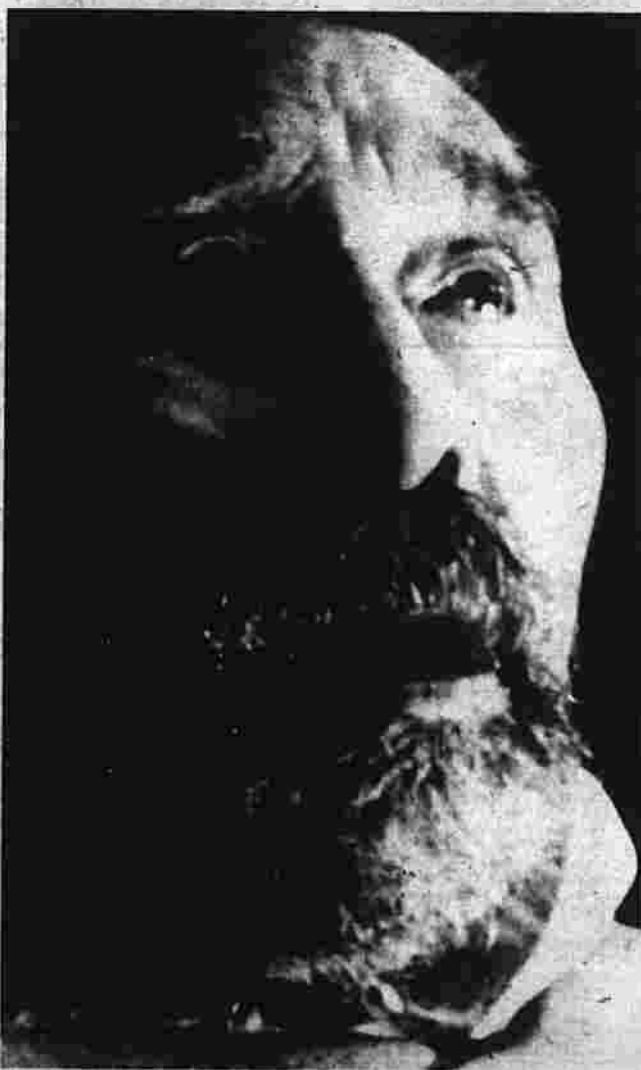
She is particularly proud of Myers' band, which may be the

best and most jazz-oriented on basic brass section renown; Bobby Bryant, who often leads a band of his own; and various alumni of the bands of Buddy Rich, Woody Herman and Stan Kenton. When the handlers of the program at RKO-General tried to initiate an economy drive by throwing out half the band, Della rose to her full 5 ft. 8 in. and put her foot down firmly. The musicians' notice was promptly rescinded.

Myers, an arranger and trombonist from Manchester, England, came to the U. S. in 1964. He met Miss Reese through Bobby Bryant, who shared the arranging assignments with him in her new album.

"I bless the day I found Peter," says Della, "because

## Linda Harrison: 'Bracken's' Girl
