Manchester's Moonman No Wallflower with Ladies

THE WASHINGTON POST... CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. — Besides being the first astronaut in history to become a last-minute substitute on a space flight, former Manchester resident John L. Swigert Jr. is an astronaut oddity for another reason. He's a bachelor.

Swigert, who lived at 907W. Middle Tpk., while attending Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in South Windsor, where he earned a master's degree in engineering science in 1965, is not the big swinger some people make him out to be.

But he's no wallflower either. He lives near the Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston in a meticulously arranged apartment where he makes his own wine and where he keeps a collection of what he calls "moon rocks" to show the young ladies he invites in for dinner.

Not long ago, a New York gossip columnist noticed him in a Miami Beach hotel with one of the June Taylor dancers. Unhappily, the columnist wrote that the dancer was seen with astronaut Rusty Schweickart, whose wife Clare had a few questions about that.

Swigert wanted to take flying lessons when he was only in the eighth grade, and while his parents agreed to it, they insisted he earn the money himself. Swigert worked in a grocery store to get the money and while doing it became something of a financial wizard. By the time he got to college, he was so good at finance that he was business manager for his fraternity and quickly put it into the black.

Swigert is one of the most robust of the astronauts at a stocky 180 pounds—40 pounds more than Thomas K. Mattingly, the astronaut he replaced on the Apollo 13 flight. He's also very muscular and worked on construction gangs in the summer to build himself up for football when he was in college. He was good enough to play guard on the Colorado University team.

Swigert's genius at finance reflects his strong desire to organize things in his life. Swigert's sister (Mrs. Robert Berube) remembers her brother visiting her when she lived in Chicago with four other bachelor girls.

"He went to our refrigerator and completely rearranged things," his sister said. "He put the lemonade in front of the orange juice because 'I' comes before 'o.'"

Astronaut Thinks of Taxes While Entering the Infinite

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Like many another American, John L. Swigert Jr. put off filing his income tax.

As a bachelor earning \$20,385 a year the reason might have been just a delay in paying the large chunk of money due and, anyway, he was busy helping friends prepare for a long trip April 15, after all, was still several days away.

But at the last minute something happened to make one friend miss the trip and Swigert went instead.

Swigert came to the astronaut corps through a somewhat roundabout way.

Swigert's father, Leonard, was a pilot and Swigert followed in his footsteps.

Swigert's mother, Mrs. Swigert, is a nurse.

Swigert's father-in-law, Dr. Leonard Swigert, is a physician.

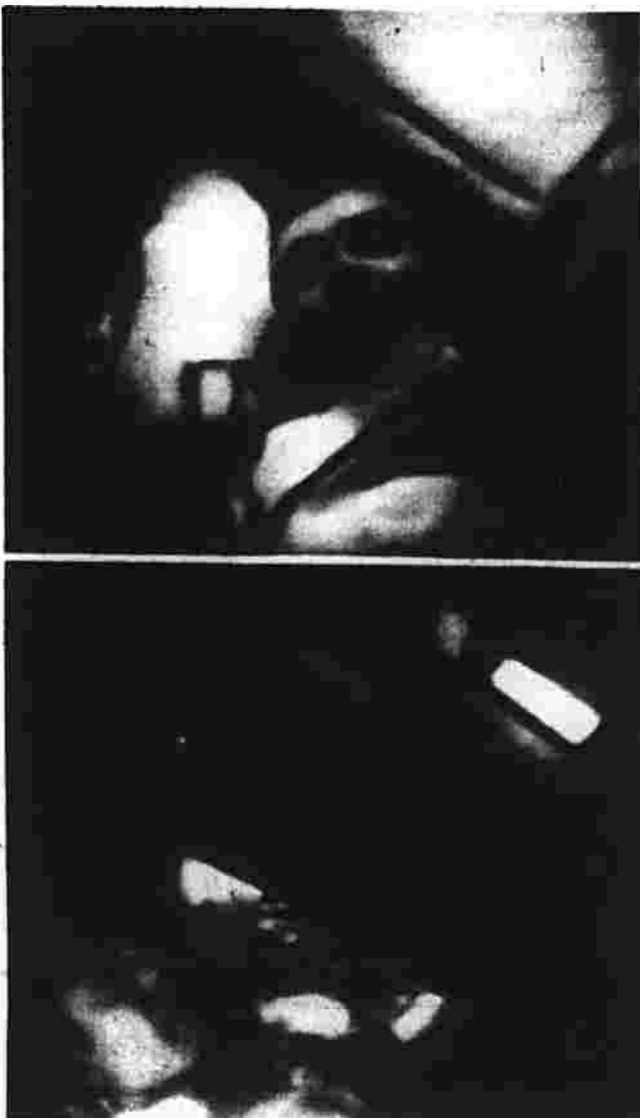
Apollo Speeds Quietly On Target in Heavens

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP)—Apollo 13's astronauts today sped quietly and flawlessly toward a Tuesday rendezvous with the moon while ground controllers tracked a rocket stage headed for an explosive impact on the lunar surface.

The Apollo 13 astronauts were relaxing on the three-day outward journey in preparation for four grueling days in the vicinity of the moon.

Preparation for Wednesday's lunar landing begins tonight when Lovell and Haise crawl through a connecting tunnel to inspect the lunar craft they call Aquarius.

The astronauts zipped past the halfway mark—128,000 miles from both earth and moon—Sunday and fired a brief burst of their spacecraft engine to shift course slightly and zero in on a spot 70 miles above the lunar surface.

James A. Lovell Jr., Fred W. Haise Jr. and John L. Swigert Jr. retired early today for 10 hours rest. Mission control planned to let them sleep past noon.

Medics reported that Lovell, the only one of the three wired for medical monitoring, slept soundly.

Mission control also reported Apollo 13 was on such an accurate path a course correction planned tonight had been canceled.

Trailing about 900 miles behind Apollo 13 was the spent third stage of the Saturn 5 rocket that hoisted the astronauts away from planet earth Saturday.

Signals from the ground shifted the 61-foot stage to a collision course with the moon. Mission control said tracking data today shows it will strike the surface about 8:10 p.m. (EST) Tuesday about 105 miles west of a seismometer left on the moon by the Apollo 12 astronauts in November.

That is about half an hour after Apollo 13 is to fire into moon orbit. The astronauts won't see the impact because they will be on the far side of the moon.

Seismic experts estimate the 15-ton stage will smash with a force equal to 11 tons of TNT, and that it will gouge a crater 100-120 feet deep.

The Apollo 12 spacemen deliberately crashed their lunar lander after they left the moon and the impact vibrated the seismometer a surprising 55 minutes, indicating the subsurface material is broken up.

Cool Astronauts Report 'No Sweat' After Liftoff

By THOMAS O'TOOLE The Washington Post... CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. — With substitute astronaut John L. Swigert Jr. aboard, the three-man crew of Apollo 13 headed for the moon's Fra Mauro hills Saturday after lifting off from Cape Kennedy right on time.

Astronauts James A. Lovell Jr., Fred W. Haise Jr. and Swigert left launch pad 39A at 2:13 p.m. EST, went into orbit 110 miles above the earth 11 minutes later and circled the globe almost twice before heading out of earth orbit at 25,000 miles an hour toward the moon 246,000 miles away.

"No sweat," said spacecraft commander Lovell after the third stage engine fired Apollo 13 out of earth orbit at 4:48 p.m. "We had a little vibration through most of the ride but everything went fine. We might have burned a couple of seconds too long."

"Can't ask for better than that," replied astronaut Joseph Kerwin from Mission Control in Houston's Manned Spacecraft Center.

Cong Rockets Rip Downtown Saigon

SAIGON (AP) — The Viet Cong carried their 13-day offensive into Saigon tonight, rocketing the city for the first time in nearly four months.

Police officials said three Vietnamese were killed and 36 wounded when four rounds of 100-pound rockets hit in downtown Saigon. One missile ripped through the roof of a theater three blocks from President Nguyen Van Thieu's official residence.

It burst above the stage during a live folk drama, spraying shrapnel into actors and actresses in elaborate head dresses, ornate costumes and thick make-up. They were rushed to a hospital still in their elaborate costumes.

Police said the fourth round landed near the Cercle Sportif, a sporting club, but apparently caused no casualties.

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South Windsor Personalities, Not Issues, Vie As Congress Candidates Talk

 The contest for Democratic nomination to Congress from the First District developed into a struggle of personalities rather than issues at a meeting last Friday in the Postum Mill Club.

Most of the declared and undeclared candidates spoke briefly to the Democratic Town Committee on their past record and their plans if elected.

The 12 candidates selected in fair agreement as to the basic problems confronting the nation. Crime, poverty, community protection were constant themes in their speeches.

State Rep. Victor Tushan emphasized his accomplishments during his 20 years in public office. He mentioned his state-wide barrier program already initiated on Rt. 151 and his P&U lending program which attempts to detect a body defect in children that results in brain damage.

Rep. Col. Hartford, presently in the lead of the Revitalization Corps, presented himself as a social action candidate. He noted the increase in crime and violence, the "polarization" of the country into conflicting factions and the high incidence of poverty in an affluent nation.

Dr. Eugene T. Sweeney of the University of Hartford, considered the "baker's dozen" candidates as a sign of vitality in the Democratic party. He emphasized the importance of selecting an individual who would persevere as a persistent winner. The professor suggested that influence in Congress be achieved during the first term and that to be effective require a number of terms.

State Rep. Morris N. Johnson of Bloomfield spoke on community protection. He mentioned the "lockdown" law which he introduced to the State Senate. He also showed concern for the rise in hospital costs. "We in America have the highest cost of care as far as the area of medicine is concerned," he said. He demanded that hospitalization as high as \$1,000 a week.

Chen also spoke briefly on welfare. According to him, Connecticut "can't afford" the proposed program.

U.S. SALT Delegates Vow 'Intense Efforts'

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Salt Delegates are expected to meet in a 50-minute session at the negotiations with the Soviets, White House, said only that the delegation is going to Vienna to reach agreement on curbing the arms race between the two superpowers.

"I do not expect that this will be an easy or quick undertaking," Smith said as he and other U.S. negotiators set off for Vienna Thursday.

"I can assure you that we will do our utmost to achieve an agreement such as will enhance our security and spare us the large waste of resources over the years to come," he said.

The team members met last night with President Nixon, who passed on final instructions and gave wishes for success.

Before starting the crucial, hard bargaining BALZ round at Vienna a few days after the April 16 opening, they debated the proposal would be for a general salt freeze at the outset, though they left open this possibility later.

The Senate last week passed a resolution calling on Nixon to propose an immediate, mutual freeze by both sides on further development of all strategic nuclear weapons systems, both of offensive and defensive nature.

Among other things this would halt deployment on the U.S. side of MRV's—multiple independently reentry vehicles—now slated to start in June, and of ABMs—antiballistic missiles, a program Nixon announced Tuesday.

The Soviets would have to stop their deployment of 67 SS9 rockets and ABMs.

Many administration officials are cool to the immediate general moratorium idea, however. They feel the Soviets would agree to it, and they question whether it could be adequately policed.

It is generally agreed the time for negotiations is opportune since the two great powers are in rough strategic balance, each with enough nuclear punch to wreak tremendous destruction on the other. And both sides seem to be serious about making a deal and their costly weapons spiral.

Vernon 68.2% of Budget Increase For Schools Due to Pay

Major factors contributing to the \$1,000,000 increase in the proposed education budget are outlined in a detailed report, just completed by the budget committee and passed on to the board of education.

Salary adjustments in all categories account for 68.2 per cent of the increase. Other contributing factors are the anticipated growth in pupil population, the need for additional teachers and other staff and the growth in the area of special education.

New curriculum necessary to meet the needs of students and adults is another factor contributing to the increase in the budget. This is reflected in the \$4,668,821, as proposed, which is \$1,000,000 more than the figure already reflected in the \$3,668,821 cut from the original request.

Inflationary trends in all areas, including transportation, insurance, transportation, water, sewer and maintenance also are responsible in part for the increase.

Revenue items will increase by \$4,000,000 next year, though it is less than the increase in the current year as against the year prior to that. Two factors account for this, one being that this is the final year that the state will contribute to the non-graduate program.

Copies of the detailed budget for 1971-72 will be available to the superintendent of schools. Board members will receive their copies at the regular meeting scheduled for tonight.

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Monagan Quits Senate Race —Candidates Adjust Plans

WATERBURY, Conn. (AP) — With a nod to party unity as his reason, Congressman John S. Monagan has withdrawn from his short-lived attempt to run for Democratic party to nominate him for the U.S. Senate.

He's gotten ready in his home district, where this Monday morning he was the only Democrat running for the nomination to Congress.

But the Senate race is an out-of-the-ordinary. Three other Democrats are already challenging Sen. Thomas Dodd's right to re-nomination, and speculation grew after Monagan's announcement that there would soon be more potential candidates.

Monagan said Saturday that he had entered the Senate race with the hope "that it might bring unity to the party."

But he said, "Although there have been gratifying individual cases of support, the broad backing which I had anticipated had not been forthcoming."

"I have been working for months and not only has the unity not been forthcoming, but the candidate has indicated that he plans to enter the race," Monagan said.

Monagan didn't say who he meant, but later Saturday one of the other two individuals named in the Senate nomination—Joseph Duffrey—said he expects former Congressman Donald J. Irving of Norwich to declare soon.

Irwin notified Democratic town chairman throughout the state several days ago that he is considering becoming a contender. Dodd responded that he would announce by saying "now is more certain than ever that I'll win on the first ballot."

State Senate Majority Leader Edward L. Marcus, one of three remaining announced challengers, said he has more confidence now in his chances.

He added, "It takes a great deal of guts for a fellow candidate to do what John Monagan has done."

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Nation's Police Seek Bridgeport Escapee

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — A nationwide alarm was out today for John "Jackie" Reed, accused of killing a man in an underwater feud, who escaped from prison bars and escaped Sunday from the Bridgeport Correctional Center.

Police searched intensively for Reed in Bridgeport and New Haven, and local police put his home in East Haven under constant surveillance. They acknowledged, though, that it would probably be the last place he would go.

Reed, 30, was being held at the correctional center in lieu of \$50,000.

Prison warden George H. Conway said Reed apparently escaped through a second-floor window's bars and battered his way through an interior brick wall in the prison's maximum security section before dropping to a prison yard and then scaling a 7-foot-high metal fence topped by barbed wire.

Reed had apparently been saving through the bars for some time, using soap to replace them and make it appear to guards that they were still intact, officials said.

When the time came to escape, Conway said Reed first used part of a bench to smash a brick wall and gain access to the window. Then he pushed the bars aside, squeezed his slender body through them, and dropped to the yard.

Prison officials didn't notice he was missing until a person who lives near the prison on called up, saying he had heard banging and had seen a man in a khaki prison uniform in the yard.

Guards then, checked Reed's cell, found him missing, and he was reported missing.

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Fitting Crime To Punishment: The war in Vietnam has not been the first war in which American troops have developed a custom of not taking prisoners. The difference is that the true nature of the war in Vietnam is being reported and pictured as it occurs, not by remittance word of mouth years later...

Our latest such effort has been the trial of the American Neustein charged with ordering the shooting of an unarmed Vietnamese prisoner. There has been little doubt about the fact. The Neustein said he suspected the prisoner might be a soldier, but that, of course, could not be any legal justification. His defense counsel wanted to plead

that the lieutenant had ordered the death because, like everybody else, he felt under pressure to help build up the daily "body count" which some perverse streak of barbarism has made the central theme of this war in Vietnam. But nothing could hide the fact that the shooting did happen, and that the lieutenant ordered it.

Nothing could hide, either, in the outcome, just how this our veneer of concern and conscience really is. In the end, we selected the degree of crime we were willing to admit had been committed to fit our ideal of how much punishment there should be.

The military court conducting the trial found our lieutenant guilty of premeditated murder, but to its own shock and horror, apparently a greater shock and horror than it felt over the conviction carried with it a mandatory sentence of life imprisonment. After discovering this, the court took the case back again, spent another day deliberating over it, and came up with a new verdict in which the lieutenant was found guilty of "voluntary manslaughter" for which it could impose a sentence only six months in jail.

That is what the lieutenant is now scheduled to serve. In one sense, the outcome is one which calculates that six months in the life of an American officer is a fair enough equivalent to all of the life of some nameless Vietnamese, who may possibly have been a soldier.

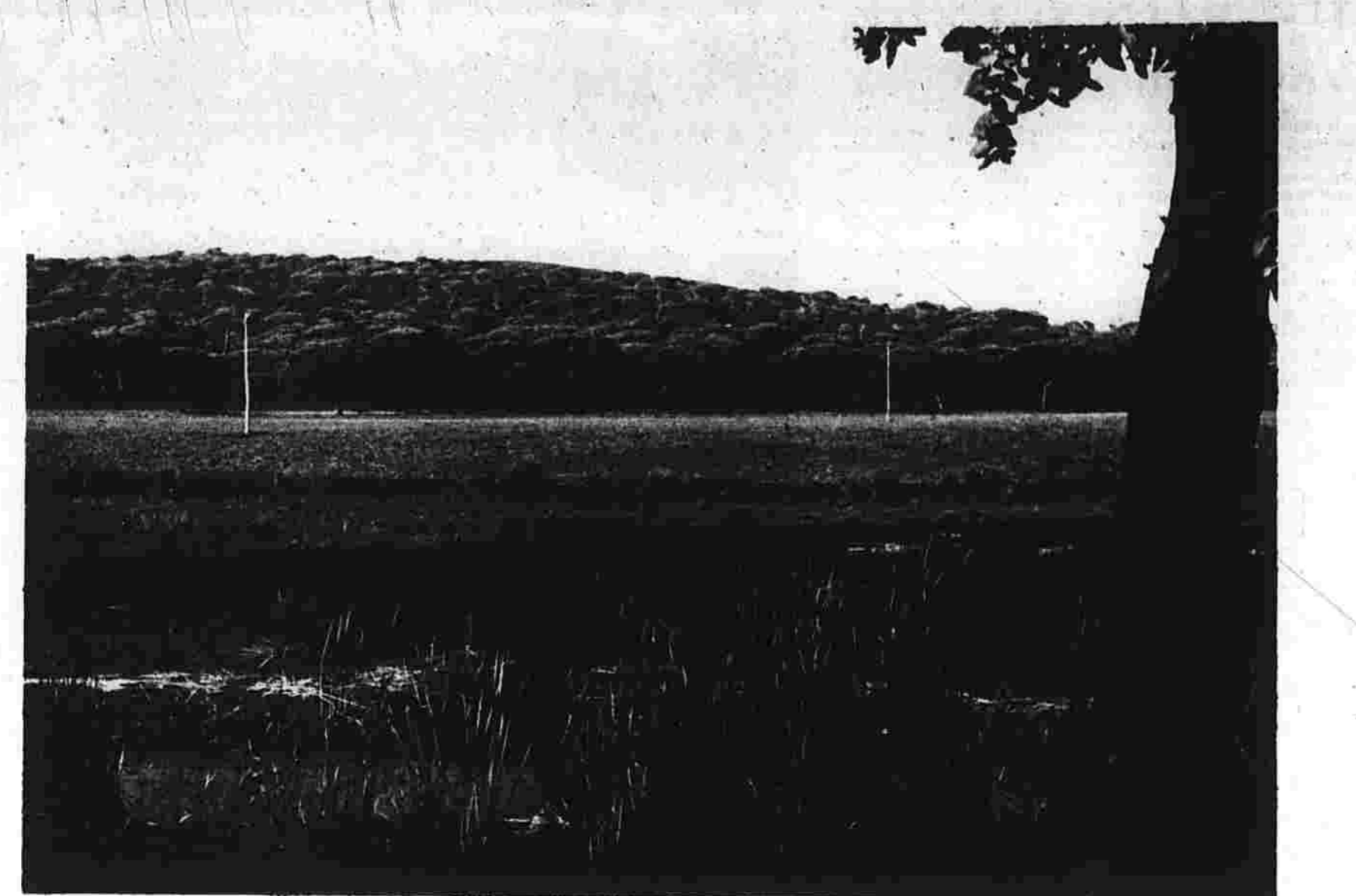
With the justice meted out by the military court, the Army apparently considers the case closed, and is not discarding the lieutenant. It would be hard to see how it could discharge this one man, for the way he solved his problem of what to do with a potential prisoner, and leave others still in the service. Even when better advice is count there were phases of World War II when prisoners were classified as an item that could be done without.

Soviet Nuclear Sub Disappears at Sea

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Soviet nuclear attack submarine, perhaps with as many as 88 crewmen aboard, apparently has been lost in Atlantic waters 400 miles northwest of the Spanish coast.

The word came Monday from the Defense Department, which reported that American planes observed at least some of the drama of the high sea incident before the submarine disappeared last weekend.

The \$500-ton vessel, one of a class of hunter-killer submarines capable of talking American ships, was seen in distress Friday and Saturday, then vanished Sunday with two oil slicks remaining.

No one actually saw her go down but Navy anti-submarine patrol planes had watched the weekend as two Soviet surface ships attempted unsuccessfully to locate the submarine.

At one point Soviet crewmen stood on the deck of the submarine, which was seen by a Navy P-3 Orion plane, flying from an airbase in the Azores, on one of her last leaves.

"Late yesterday the Soviet surface ships were still in the area where the submarine was first sighted and were apparently conducting a search," the Pentagon said Monday.

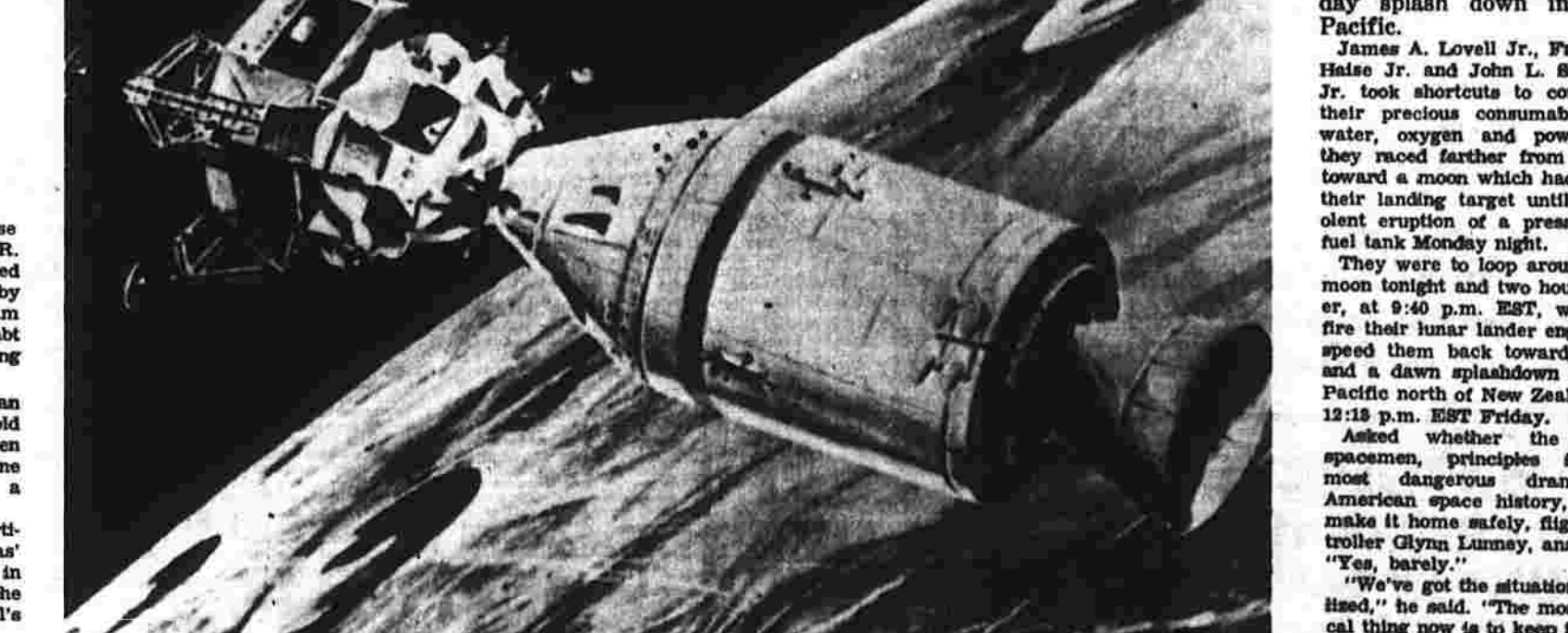
