Lions Club Seeking Funds To Assist Blind-Retarded

A special wing for the blind-retarded at Mansfield State Training School is the goal of the Lions Club members in Manchester who have started a fund-raising campaign.

The wing, to be placed in the Marvin Hall dormitory, will serve the approximately 100 blind-retarded children and adults out of a total population of 1,700 residents at Mansfield.

Willard Marvin, president of the Manchester Lions Club, says the Lions Club decided to back this project after hearing a speaker from Mansfield at one of its meetings in January.

Since that time, Marvin said, they have collected only \$200 in donations, but they have just begun a full-fledged campaign. The drive for funds includes letters requesting donations from a large number of Manchester residents.

The blind-retarded committee of the Mansfield Training School is requesting a total of \$30,000 in donations for the wing to supplement state appropriations.

The money will be used to remodel the interior of the wing, to purchase a variety of "careful" and "recreational" equipment, to obtain braille publications and other items designed for the sightless, and to increase the number of staff personnel if necessary.

Members of the blind-retarded committee say it is impossible for them to completely meet the program's expenses with state funds because of a "recent austerity budget reduction."

Soviet Nuclear Sub Disappears at Sea

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Soviet nuclear attack submarine, perhaps with as many as 88 crewmen aboard, apparently has been lost in Atlantic waters 400 miles northwest of the Spanish coast.

The word came Monday from the Defense Department, which reported that American planes observed at least some of the drama of the high sea incident before the submarine disappeared last weekend.

The \$500-ton vessel, one of a class of hunter-killer submarines capable of talking American ships, was seen in distress Friday and Saturday, then vanished Sunday—with two oil slicks remaining.

No one actually saw her go down but Navy anti-aircraft patrol planes had watched the weekend as two Soviet surface ships attempted unsuccessfully to locate the submarine.

At one point Soviet crewmen stood on the deck of the submarine for about 15 minutes, Navy P-8 Orions planes, flying from an airbase in the Azores, saw none of them leave.

"Late yesterday the Soviet surface ships were still in the area where the submarine was first sighted and were apparently conducting a search," the Pentagon said Monday. "It is possible the Soviet nuclear submarine may have sunk."

There was no immediate reaction from the Soviet government to Washington's announcement. But Westerners in Moscow believed the submarine was on its way to take part in large-scale maneuvers which the Soviet Defense Department announced last week.

The North Vietnamese left 50 rifles and seven heavy weapons on the battlefield, said the spokesman.

South Vietnamese ground troops and bombers have been making regular forays across the border in collaboration with Cambodian forces in efforts to crush North Vietnamese and Viet Cong units that have their base camps in the area that juts into South Vietnam. It is known to the military as the Paro's Peak.

Further south, AP Correspondent John Vinton reported from Taku, Cambodia, that Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops were being operated in the Seven Mountains region of the western Mekong Delta, attacked two Cambodian posts about six miles from the border and captured about 20 soldiers and policemen.

Taku, Province's assistant military chief said the Viet Cong were looking for Ho Chi Minh estimated that there are 20,000 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese in his province.

There was no word of fresh fighting in miles farther west along Highway One, where more than 3,000 Viet Cong troops advancing into Cambodia are reported on three sides of the Sway Rieng, a provincial capital with a population of nearly 30,000.

Cambodian officers in Phnom Penh, the Cambodian capital, told AP Correspondent T. J. Williams that U.S. or South Vietnamese troops were being carried by a revolver.

Apollo 13 Astronauts Battle To Return in Crippled Craft

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP)—Apollo 13's astronauts battled today to bring their crippled craft back to earth from a quarter million miles away as Mission Control decided they would aim for a Friday splashdown in the Pacific.

James A. Lovell Jr., Fred W. Haise Jr. and John L. Swigert Jr. took shortcuts to conserve their precious consumables of water, oxygen and power as they moved farther toward earth toward a moon which had been their landing target until a violent eruption of a pressurized fuel tank Monday night.

They were to loop around the moon tonight and two hours later, at 9:40 p.m. EST, were to fire their lunar landing engine to speed them back toward earth and a dawn splashdown in the Pacific north of New Zealand at 12:15 p.m. EST Friday.

Asked whether the three astronauts, principles in the most dangerous drama in American space history, would make it home safely, flight controller Glynn Lunney, answered, "Yes, barely."

"We've got the situation stabilized," he said. "The most critical thing now is to keep it stabilized the rest of the flight."

As Lovell, Haise and Swigert flew away from home, here was the picture about their spacecraft.

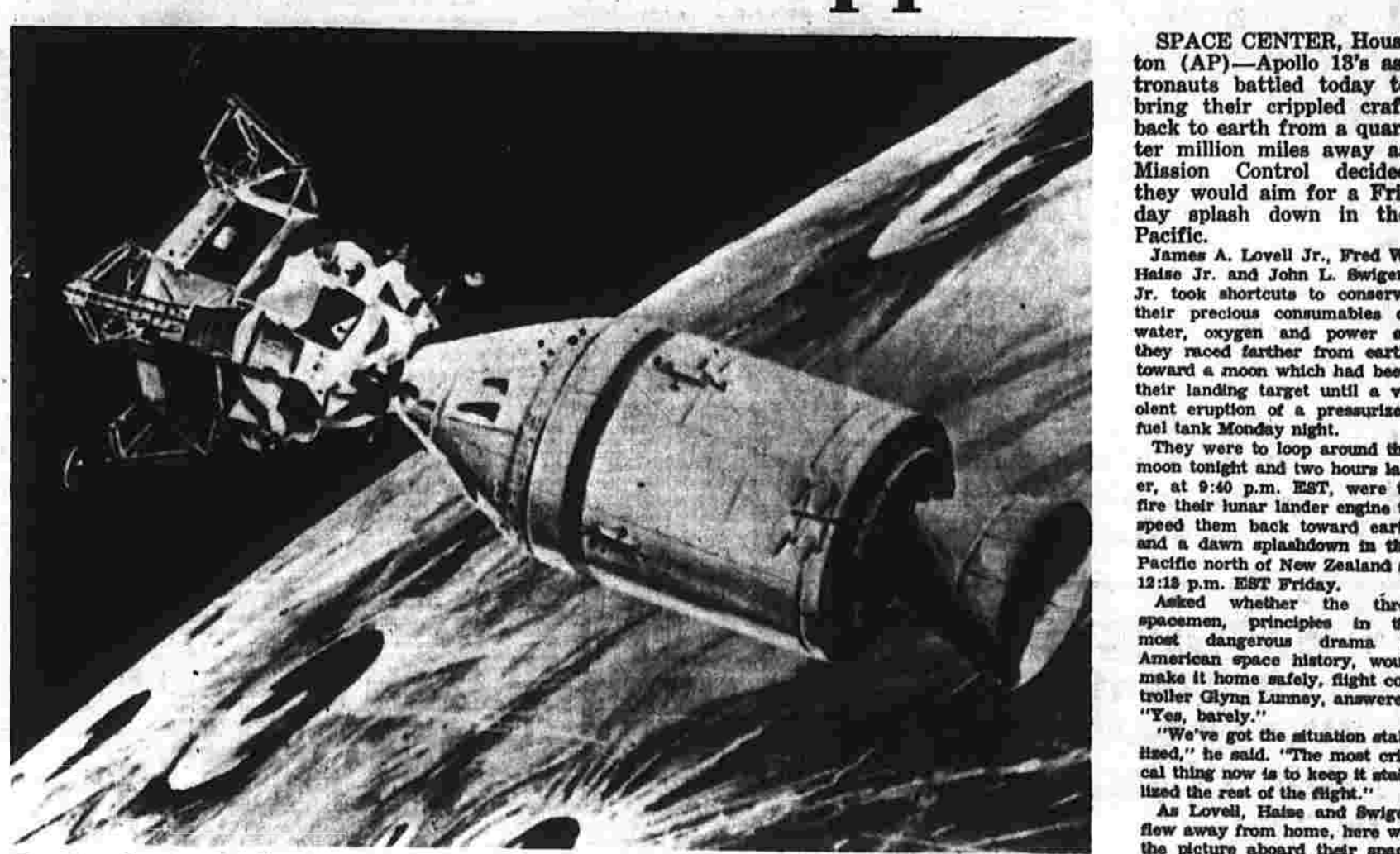

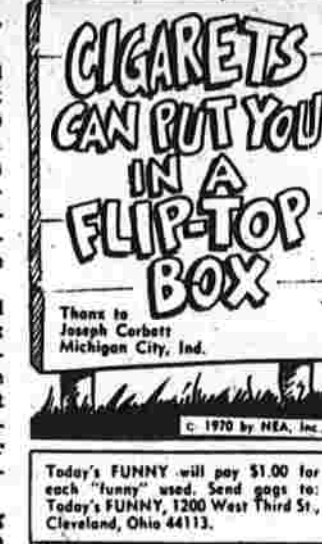

In advance of these talks that it is putting of its own deployment of a missile-defense system and its development of multiple warheads for offensive missiles.

Who, then, is this mellow, dove-like fellow?

He is none other than McGeorge Bundy, national security adviser to President Johnson in the moments that President converted a Cuban Gulf radar echelon into a modern equivalent of a declaration of war, and launched a bombing of a whole country in retaliation for a raid by a few guerrillas in an American air base in Vietnam.

He is—in short—the most famous hawk of the Vietnam involvement, and the more noted a hawk because he brought such intellectual distinction to his role.

True, he has already suggested his own personal disillusionment with the particular war he did so much to promote. True, too, he may be quite as sincere in his present recommendation of disarmament policy with Russia as he was sincere on both sides of the issue in Vietnam.

But what seems possible to a cynical observer is that Mr. Bundy, having concluded that his intellectual prestige may have been tarnished by the way it handled raw power when it had the chance to in Vietnam, is out to reestablish his credentials as a dispassionate potential broker for future Presidents. One of the charms of being an intellectual is that one does not have to be consistent.

The Thirteenth Space exploration has now, at last, unloosed one of those fateful surprises it had been holding in reserve.

The accident to Apollo 13 presents the worst danger our astronauts have yet encountered.

By the same measurement, their safe return, if it can be managed, will represent the greatest technological accomplishment since the first space flight itself.

May the slender reliances which now constitute their chance of safe return all hold fast and constant through the many terribly anxious hours that remain for them and for their associates at Houston and all the rest of us who can merely wait and hope.

Such A Day Should Never Come

Even if the maintenance of the six cent price for the handling of a first class letter meant that the government would have to lose money handling that first class mail we would be for it.

The general taxpayer of this country subsidize everything under the sun from great prosperous farm operators to struggling shipping firms and railroads and air lines. We will always think it quite fair and appropriate, therefore, for this same general taxpayer to subsidize the individual American's letter writing privilege, should such subsidy be necessary.

The financial fact of the moment is, however, that no such subsidy is necessary for the letter writer. He is already paying his own way. His government already makes a profit on him, every time it cancels a six cent stamp for handling one of his letters.

This fact — that the first class letter writer is already paying more than his own costs — makes it all the more unreasonable for President Nixon to suggest that the rate for first class mail should go up to 10 cents a letter, as part of his program for financing pay increases for postal workers.

Wherever that money is coming from, it should not come from that part of the post office clientele which is already paying its own way.

The first class letter writer — who should be considered entitled to a subsidy for himself if he needs it — should not be subsidizing into paying so much extra postage he ends up subsidizing somebody else.

One member of the House at Washington has been quoted as saying that "it will be a long, cold winter day before Congress will boost first class to 10 cents, Mr. Nixon and the union leaders notwithstanding."

That sounds like some famous last stands we have heard before. But it might be worth using one of last of the six centers writing somebody in Washington to the effect that letter writers ought to be charged for their own costs, but no more.

SAIGON — President Nguyen Van Thieu, until now an unequal vocal public supporter of Vietnamization, is coming to share military apprehension here that too many U.S. troops may be withdrawn in the coming months.

In an exclusive interview at the presidential palace, Thieu reiterated his approval of the currently announced pullout of 115,000 U.S. troops. "Up to now, the formula is very correct," he told us. But he added he agrees with generals, both U.S. and South Vietnamese, who are concerned about that rates continuing this spring and summer. "We worry about the speed," he said.

Indeed, the President seemed worried generally about the long-term U.S. commitment in South Vietnam. Pointing a picture of the long war gradually petering out without any negotiated settlement, he asserted some U.S. military presence here will be needed for many, many years. When asked whether he thought President Nixon is committed to the U.S. staying on in that role, Thieu replied cryptically: "I hope he will stay."

We saw Thieu at a moment of public turmoil in Saigon when main thoroughfares had been cordoned off by combat police to prevent demonstrations by disabled veterans and students and barred wire barricades protected the palace and the national assembly. While the Vietcong insurrection is being ground down in the countryside, Thieu is expressing his worst political trouble since his election in 1967.

Given that background, Thieu was cool, imperturbable, and confident. His only display of emotion was maintained, tentative laughter when asked about Sen. J.W. Fulbright's speech recognizing North Vietnamese hegemony all over Indo-China ("How would Fulbright like the Communists to take over the United States?").

Thieu seemed less apprehensive about political turbulence in Saigon than the permanence of the commitment in Washington. Consequently, he urged that future U.S. troop withdrawals should be very careful and calm because of heightened Communist military pressure. "They have increased their infiltration and may attempt a great victory — the capture of a provincial capital — before your U.S. decision to make a lot of noise," Thieu told us. "Then they may ask for a cease-fire to consolidate their gain."

Thieu's reply, "It will take years, he predicted. The Communists, he went on, will not drop their demand — "until they have a coalition government" — until they are sure we are more stable, that President Nixon will be re-elected in 1972, and that we will not elect a neutralist as President next year."

Moreover, Thieu advised that the U.S. military presence will be needed here even after the war ends. "U.S. troops should stay here and guarantee the peace, like in Korea and Germany, because all of Asia will not possess the power of the U.S. to deter aggression." In addition, he contended the new Communist regime will be able to maintain neutrality only if its army is equipped and trained by the U.S.

In the context of that heavy Asian burden for the U.S. Thieu showed appreciation of how his domestic policies recently have played into the hands of U.S. enemies of the war. He acknowledged that his prosecution of deputy Tran Ngoc Chau for alleged security violations did not improve the American climate. "The U.S. is helping us and I wish I could do something to help the U.S. help us," he said a bit wistfully.

Nevertheless, he had no regrets about the Chau affair. "As chief of state, I could not do otherwise," Thieu told us. "It would have affected the morale of the army."

As for Saigon's street disorders, he contended that "usually the Communists are behind them." Again, he seemed concerned about American reaction, explaining carefully that a nation at war cannot permit dissent in the streets for the way the United States does.

Thieu is worried about U.S. support for the war on two levels — the short run, the state of the next U.S. Congress; for the longer run, American public support of South Vietnam. But there are many here who feel Thieu is muzzled less by U.S. war weariness than by what has been happening in the presidential palace itself. That more important subject will be taken up in a future report from Vietnam.

Connecticut Yankee

The Wall Street Journal the other day published a survey of the 1970 political practices across the nation, and found, without even looking into Connecticut, that one of the things 1970 candidates are expected to do is to formalize a multi-city announcement of a candidacy which is no surprise to anybody.

As we read the record, Connecticut actually pioneered in the business of the handsomely staged announcement of the expected candidacy, with State Senator Wallace Barnes and his personally piloted plane inaugurating the multi-city type of announcement, and with Congressman Mike Dardano, with his hotel ballroom production setting the pace for one-site concentrated fanfare.

In any event, no matter who was first, one 1970 trend is heavier spending earlier in the campaign year than has ever been political practice before. Some of it is being done by candidates who have to fight their way through conventions and primaries to nomination. But some of it is being done by candidates who have their nominations locked up, but who know they are going to have to upset odds if they are to win in November.

The Wall Street Journal survey included this comment: "This heavy advertising spurge months before election day flies in the face of traditional practice, which is to save almost all the media budget for an autumn blitz."

Some of the early money being spent in Connecticut is assuredly going to be wasted, as far as November is concerned, because some of these spending it are going to have to miss nomination.

But for those who make it to nomination, the spending they have done in quest of nomination is going to continue paying dividends right through November.

And, by this column's book of political maxims, it is going to pay off well. For instance, that candidate who has been running those artistic full page pictures of his own face makes it to nomination, this column's kind of calculation says that those pictures published in April would be worth twice as much, voter-wise, as similar pictures published in October.

In this column's book of maxims, most voting determinations are made months before voting day, and even voters who persuade themselves that they are making up their minds at the last minute are influenced by subliminal impressions they absorbed a long time before.

It is the lingering after-effects of a candidate, which has been inside the voter so long that he regards it as the candidate's own measured deliberation rather than that of the campaigning of the candidate, which is the precious thing we would like to shoot at, if we were a candidate.

It is our theory that, in most political campaigns, there is a rather early moment after which no candidate is going to increase his own positive standing. What can happen in the climactic phase of a campaign is that a candidate can begin to slip because he does something to offend or disillusion support which was heading toward him.

As for the voters, they are cynical and suspicious of everything and anything a candidate says or does or of how he looks in September and October. But what they may remember from the previous March or April can seem to them genuine and authentic, reliable because it is subliminally familiar.

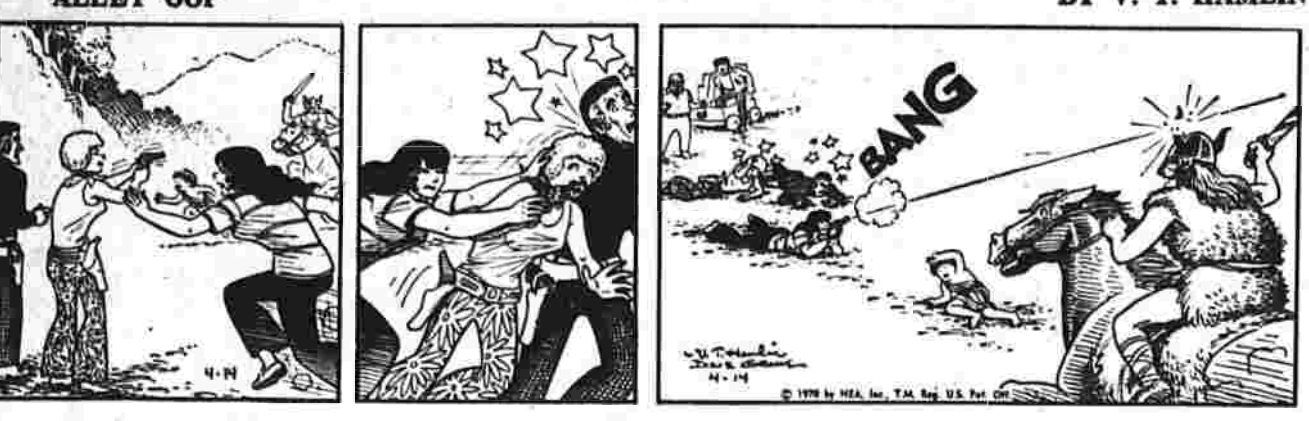
