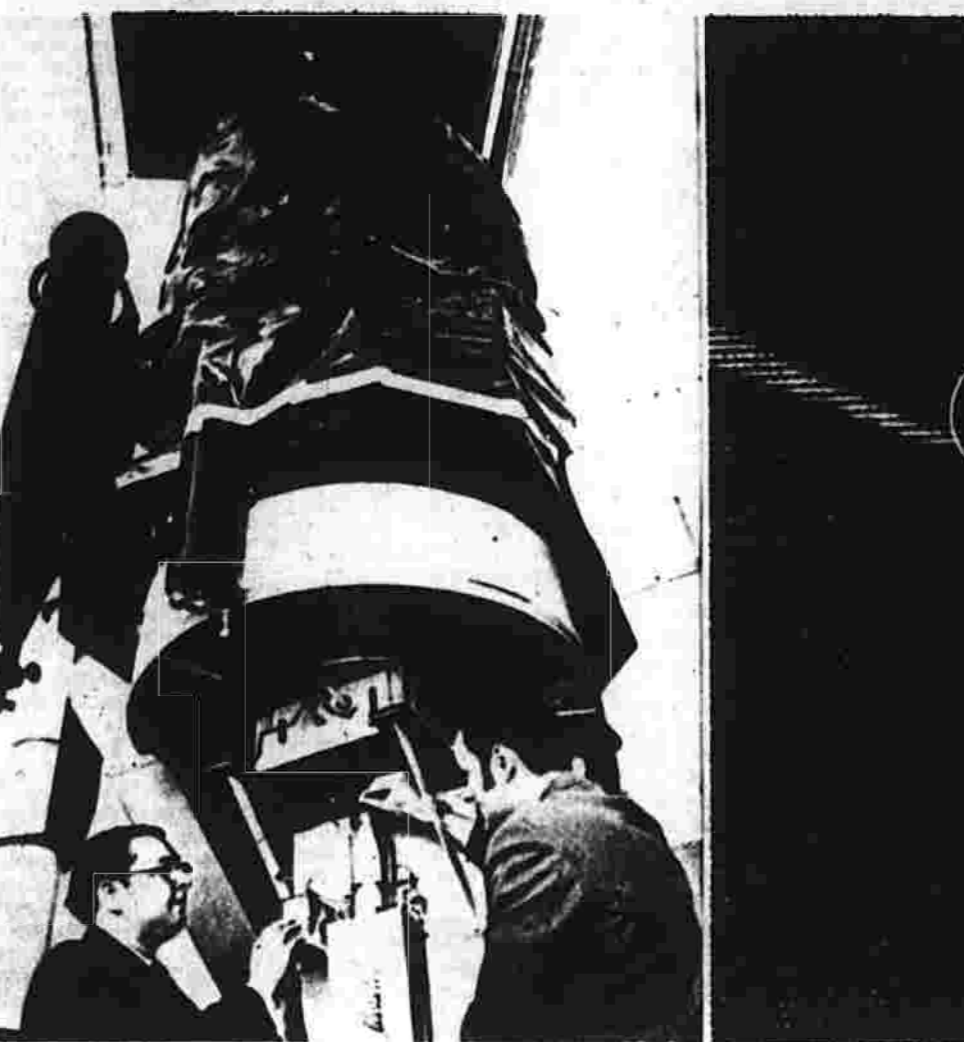

Investors Find Real Estate A Hedge Against Inflation

NEW YORK (AP) — Based on a stock market that has been stable for years, and convinced that the dollar will continue to be a long-term investment, individual investors, institutions and corporations are increasingly turning to real estate.

Real estate, it has been observed during the past few years of inflation, has been a true hedge against the declining value of the dollar. The stock market generally has failed to live up to its reputation as a hedge.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average, for example, stands far below its 1966 high. Urban land prices, however, have risen at an average rate of six per cent a year, according to a report by the Chase Manhattan Bank.

Many corporations have been aware of the profit possibilities for many years, among them, Alcoa, Washington, Reynolds Metals, and American Airlines. They find their primary transportation duties far less rewarding than real estate.

Managers of private pension funds, beset by inflation and a poor stock market, have learned in recent years that real estate investments might offer them not only better returns but more stability as well.

The latest group to be attracted by real estate investment possibilities have been financial institutions such as life insurers and banks.

The BankAmerica Corporation is one of several major banks to set up trusts for investing in buildings and other developments. Earlier this month Chase Manhattan Bank, First Pennsylvania Bank and Wells Fargo & Co. developed similar trusts.

Life insurers, who once staid themselves by purchasing government securities that prevents rank and file Americans from satisfying their wishes. But the demand obviously is there.

New Book Probes Life As Lived by Censors

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — It's almost as though a member of the College of Cardinals gossiped about a meeting inside the Vatican Chapel. That's the way a long-time film observer must feel about a new book written from the inside of the industry's censorship agency.

The book is wryly called "See No Evil," and it's written by a 29-year veteran of the Production Code office, Jack Vizzard. He speaks one-on-one—Eric Johnston, Jack Valenti, the head censor, money-hungry producers, sensation-seeking directors, even himself.

The inside peek of censors at work is fascinating. It was not so long ago that the language of their trade, in fact, was so hushy that they themselves trembled at the thought of being along with some of the movies they reluctantly passed.

The history of the Production Code—the rise and ultimate fall of the censors—is a tale of intrigue and power. It is a story of a man who was once a producer and then a censor, and a man who was once a censor and then a producer.

The book is a must-read for anyone interested in the history of the film industry. It is a candid and often humorous look at the inner workings of the Production Code Administration.

NEVER TO RUFF AT FIRST CHANGE

When you hold an ace, you can often gain by refusing to take the first trick in that suit. When, instead, you hold trump, you may gain by refusing to ruff at your first opportunity. The principle is the same, but players who see one are often blind to the other.

South dealer.

Both sides vulnerable.

Opening lead — Two of diamonds.

South ruffed the first diamond and led the ace of spades, expecting to have no trouble. He revised his expectation when East discarded a diamond.

South switched to hearts, losing dummy's king to the ace. East returned the suit and drew whatever trump he was able to make the contract, but South had muffed his easy play.

Dealer next led the ten of spades, but West grabbed the trick and returned the queen of diamonds to make South ruff. East led his last trump, but West still had a trump. When South began the club, West ruffed the third round and led a heart. Dummy still had a losing heart and a losing diamond, and South had performed the difficult feat of beginning the hand with nine sure tricks and ending it with only eight.

The easiest way for South to make the contract was to ruff the second round of diamonds. East continues with a

Bolton Etherington Waxing Optimistic

Bringing with him a diversity of background and unimpeachable political credentials, former Wisconsin University President William Etherington is seeking a reception for Republican VP's in Bolton last night.

Etherington is seeking the Republican nomination for the U.S. senatorial seat now held by Democrat Thomas Dodd. He is one of four GOP candidates for the post.

Although Fairfield County Congressman Lowell Wetzel is generally considered the number one spot for the nomination, Etherington would appear to be in the second place spot and is trying harder.

While Wetzel has not appeared around the state, Etherington has embarked on a rigorous schedule which he hopes will lead him to the party nomination in the rubber.

He is far more optimistic about his chances than he was 10 days ago. He explains that he feels he can win the election "if I can get nominated."

He brings with him a national reputation and diversified background as a lawyer, former president of the United States Bar, and a member of the House of Representatives. He is a member of the Republican Party and has been a member of the party since 1948.

He is a quiet, impressive man, 45 years of age, he appears far younger. Looking in person than his pictures indicate. Speaking on the issues of the campaign, Etherington focuses on inflation as the number one problem today. Just behind it is the Vietnam War, "which I have outspokenly opposed for some time."

"Inflation Psychology" — The American people are suffering from an "inflation psychology," Etherington believes. The remedy he would prescribe is a six-month moratorium on all wage, price, rent and dividend. This would give the monetary economy and the new recommended fiscal restraints an opportunity to work.

"People must begin to believe inflation can be stopped," it is to happen, he said.

Noting there are two sides to every transaction, buyer and seller, Etherington feels it is essential that a co-operative spirit on the part of the American people becomes evident to make recommendations work.

He further advocates calling a congressional hearing regarding the problem of inflation and how to best combat it.

Regarding Vietnam, he describes President Nixon's policy as a "credible one as opposed to President Lyndon Johnson's incredible one."

He would favor a cease-fire. "It is my intent to see an end to the killing and destruction rather than to any rate of withdrawal," he said.

Expressing the belief that setting a definite date for withdrawing as "foolish," Etherington would prefer the cease-fire and an immediate appeal to the United Nations to guarantee the safety of the people in South Vietnam. An alternative would be to publicize a mutual withdrawal agreement between the United States and North Vietnam, an action not yet taken.

A strong supporter of the United States and its policies, Etherington criticizes it as a "sensible and sensitive budget," feels the welfare program is a "most innovative in four decades" and the Nixon administration was reported in a dilemma, caught between powerful congressional critics demanding that the U.S. withdraw from Vietnam and continue and advisers contending that the Communists will take over Cambodia unless the government has launched a campaign against the 600,000 Cambodians who have fled to the border and do more with the problem at home.

Regarding the Carwell nomination for the Supreme Court, Etherington believes Harold Carwell would have done little to enhance the public's confidence in the Supreme Court. He does believe the Senate has a "confirming duty" to support the nomination of the government and major institutions "are on trial to see if they can survive."

"The problems of environmental quality are global in scope and extend far beyond the industrialized nations," the Washington state Democrat said in remarks prepared for a meeting with international aspects of pollution.

Magnuson said his bill will lay the groundwork for a World Environmental Institute which would serve as an information clearing house and a center for research on international environmental problems.

Most nations, said Magnuson, "have not yet passed or even questioned ecology that we ignored ourselves for generations."

"A cooperative international effort could clarify the choices these nations face and could help avoid the costly mistakes we made in similar stages of our own development."

Under Magnuson's proposal, the institute would be a non-political body open to all nations. He said the institute "would concentrate on providing complex information to any nation or international organization seeking assistance on a particular problem."

He'd Start War On Pollution In Poor Areas

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — "Instead of an afterthought, the ghetto and the depressed rural areas must be the front line in the battle to save our environment and protect the quality of human life," Sen. Gaylord Nelson said Wednesday.

Nelson said he would soon introduce legislation to set up a federally-subsidized program to create jobs for the poor.

Nelson, a fervent conservationist, was an originator of the Earth Day. He was introduced at Yale by former Interior Secretary Stewart Udall, a visiting professor there.

The poor often view efforts to improve the environment as schemes to distract public attention from the harsh realities of poverty, racial conflict and income redistribution," he said.

Nelson said he would soon introduce legislation to create a Community of Environment Service for jobs for the poor.

Nelson said that while the nation must return to the outdoors, he believes that men are only temporary custodians of natural resources.

"We have polluted every major watershed out of the Mississippi," said Nelson. "National parks are going to have to interfere with people's desire for their right to pollute."

He said the government should establish strict air and water quality standards requiring industries to install anti-pollution machinery incorporating "the highest current practical state of the art."

Nelson estimated the cost of beginning to repair the environment at \$50 to \$60 billion annually — not counting allocations by state and municipal governments and industry.

Comparing that cost to the nation's annual expenditure on the arms race, Nelson said "the long term objective of the human race ought to be to make the Red and the Purple obsolete."

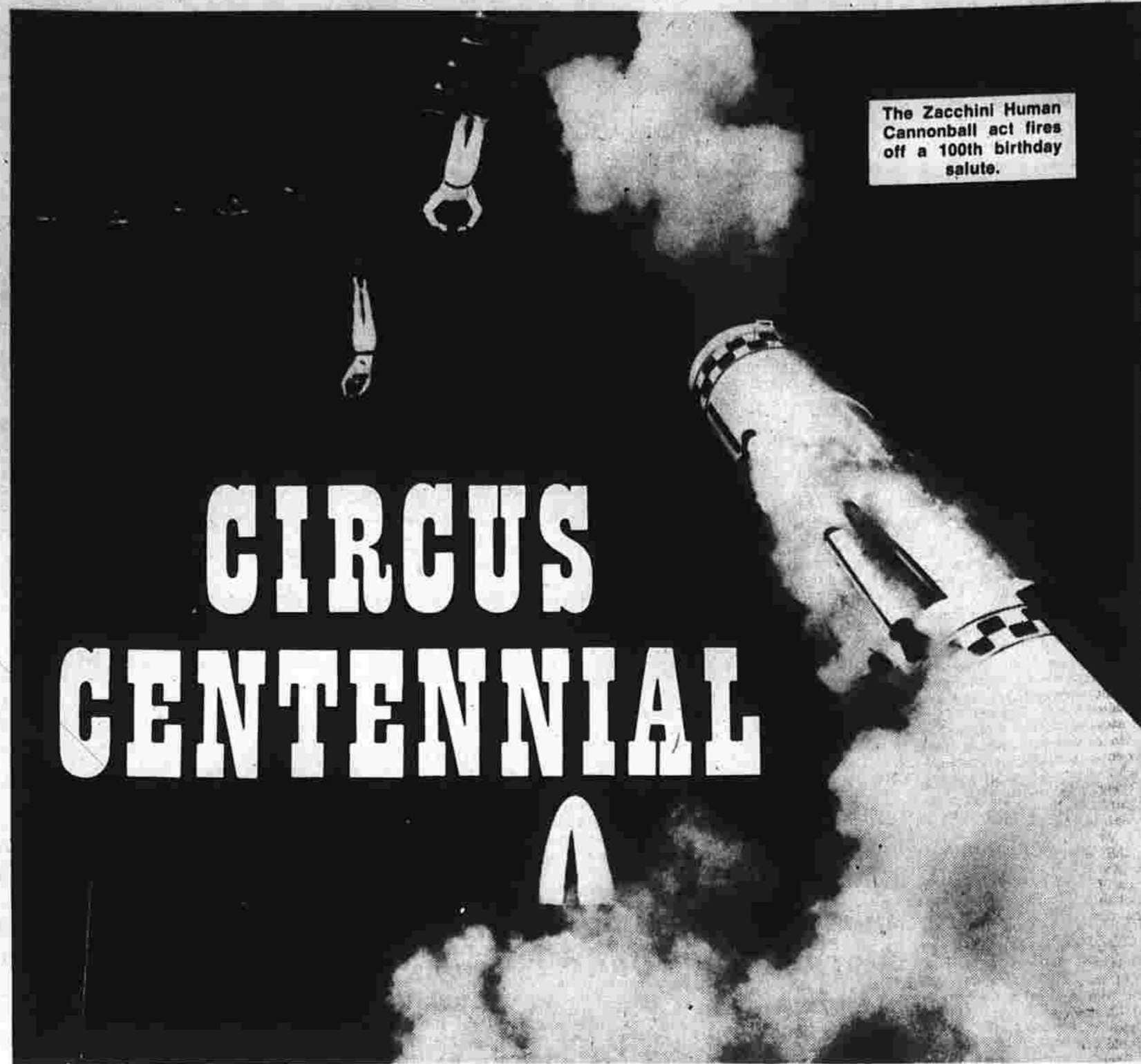

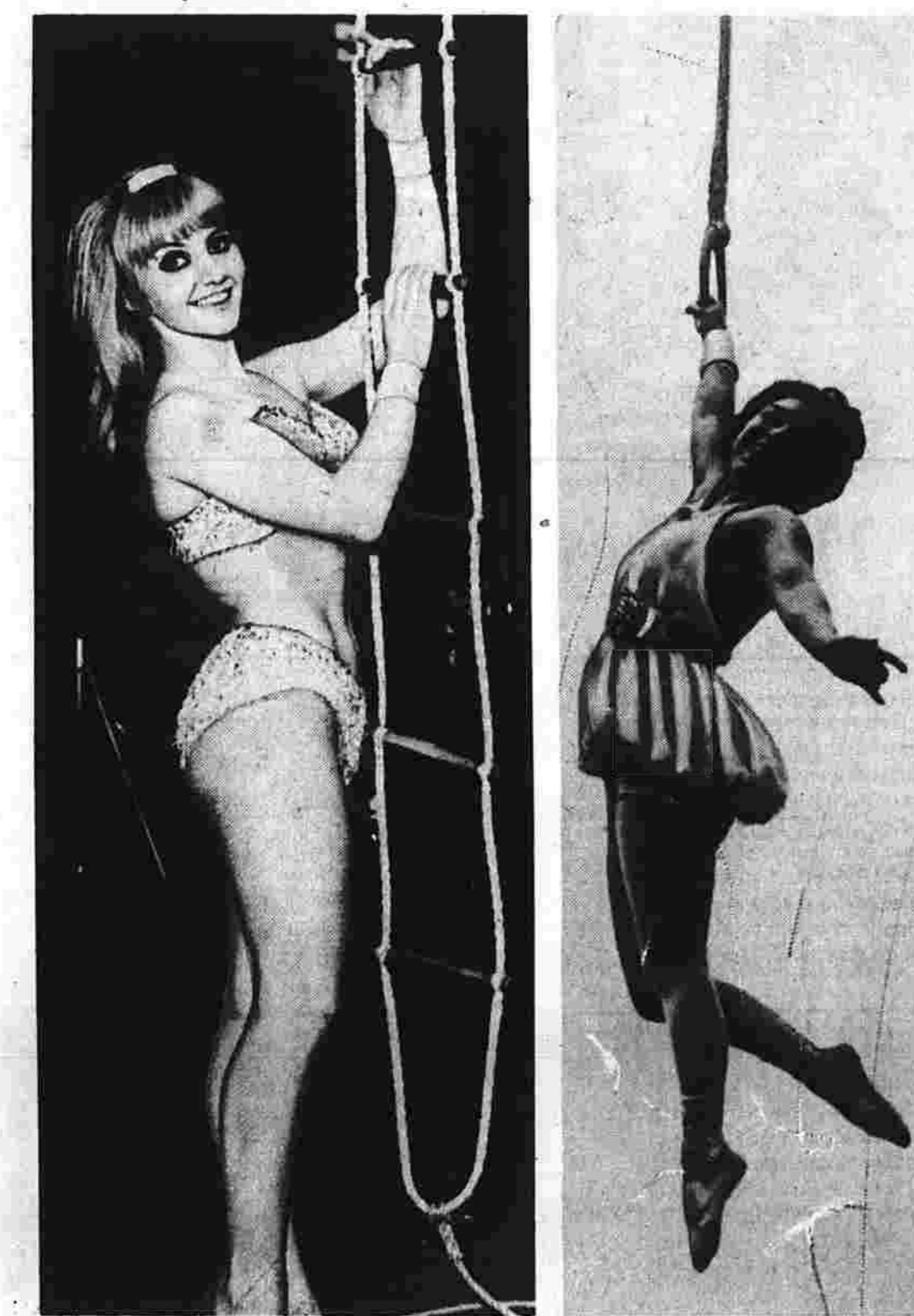

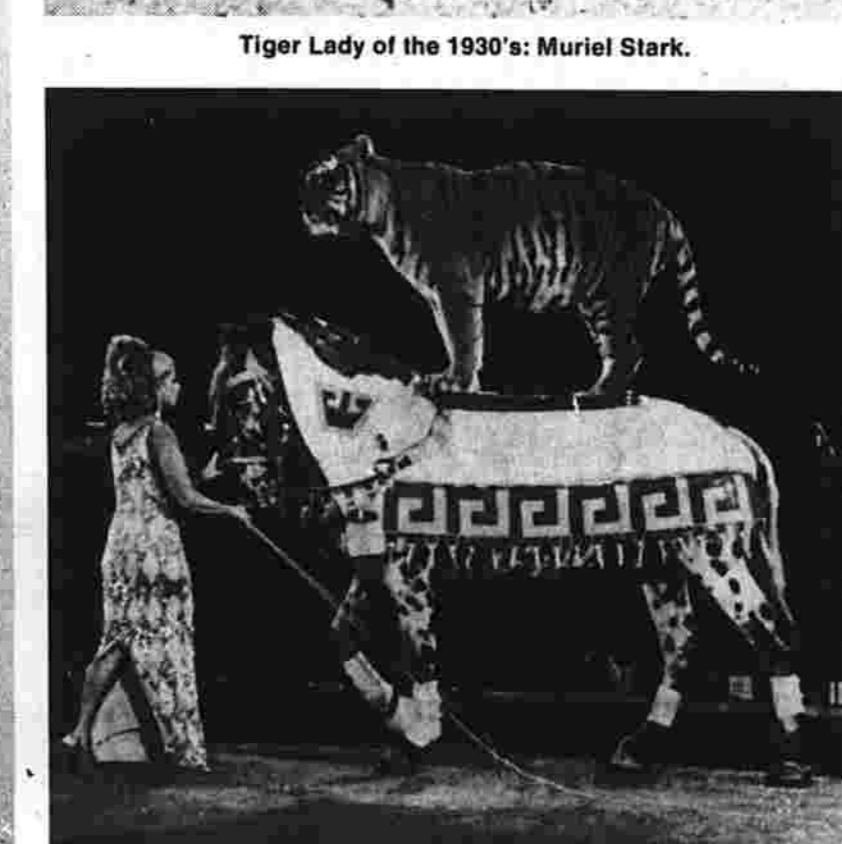

The Hula Movement On to Preserve Pure Polynesian Art Form

HONOLULU (AP) — A movement to move the hula to a pure dance form before it dies with its masters.

But not the frenzied, hip-shaking "Little Grass Shack" version that delights the Waikiki tourists. Exponents of the ancient Polynesian art would just as soon see that kind to rest.

"The hula reached a low ebb when it began being performed for sensationalism, not for its cultural value," says Winona Beamer, who is reviving the ancient dance at the Kanehahane school.

"You have to teach what the kids will need to know when they dance professionally," says Helen Richards, who has a performing troupe of her own.

"Mrs. Richards loves the traditional hula but teaches it only to a chosen few."

"The chants are the most beautiful of hulas," she said, "but they are not to be done by just anyone. A great deal more than dancing ability is necessary to perform them."

And one Waikiki dancer added a practical note.

"How long would an authentic hula show last around here?" she asked. "If you put on a program of hulas, the tourists would be bored to death."

But when the Boston missionaries arrived in the early 1800s, they took one look at the swaying island maidens and branded the hula as lewd and heathenish.

Taboo for more than a century under missionary influence, the hula regained respect-

ability about 30 years ago.

Now the experts say it has been corrupted by Western influence and fear it will be lost forever because the few remaining instructors don't teach it in the pure form.

More Time Asked to Fix Indian Suits
WASHINGTON (AP) — The Indian Claims Commission wants more time to settle longstanding tribal land payment suits against the government but Congress may refuse to listen.

"I'm not willing to give the commission more time," says Sen. Frank E. Moss, chairman of the Senate Indian Affairs subcommittee.

"Everyone is frustrated by its inability to get these claims completed," the commission expires April 10, 1971, but Chairman Jerome K. Kyndall says another five years is needed to decide claims based largely on old treaties, after Indians were stretching back over 100 years. He says the commission has completed only 85 per cent of its work.

Congress in April 1967 extended for five years term for the commission, established in 1947, and increased the number of commissioners from three to five to help with the workload. Some legislators then warned the commission to wind up their cases—no more time.

One of the winners was Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., chairman of the Senate Interior Committee. He says another extension of the life of the commission and believes it can wind up the work in its remaining two years.

Sen. Quentin Burdick, D-N.D., also has said he opposes an extension. He suggests having U.S. district courts take over the work of the Indian Claims Commission.

However, Paul Nebel, an attorney handling Indian cases, and Bruce Wilkie of the National Congress of American Indians, told a reporter they believe Congress will continue the commission.

"The commission is making progress, slow though, but faster than it ever did before. It has expedited trials and set up a calendar to hear at least the first phase in all cases this year," Nebel said.

But Moss told a reporter he feels "the majority of the members of the Senate Interior Committee feel that no more time can be given, that the cases must be finished in the two years remaining." He said Congress might have to tackle the settlements through legislation.

Rep. James A. Haley, D-Texas, chairman of the House Indian Affairs subcommittee, said he wants to take a look at just what the commission has left before deciding on an extension.

"It looks like those fellows will never finish," Haley said. "We may have to transfer the Indian cases to the U.S. Court of Claims."

Late in the afternoon of the 17th of April, 1969, I went out on a walk down the west side of 6 Main St. when I went straight through from Hartford Rd. to Hookneck across a big valley.

Scientist Declares: Skyscrapers and Freeways Can Reduce Air Pollution

Fort Collins, Colo. (AP) — Urban commuters caught in a traffic jam might be skeptical, but a Colorado engineer says more freeways and tall buildings to metropolitan areas can reduce air pollution.

Tall buildings deflect winds down the street, which tends to lift pollutants out of the city, says Dr. J.E. Cermak, a fluid dynamics expert at Colorado State University. And freeways, he says, are not the cause of air pollution problems as many people believe. Freeways are a means of getting air out of the city, he says.

Cermak says more buildings and freeways for existing urban centers such as New York and Chicago, however, won't do much good.

"Even if they took the buildings and freeways away, they'd still have the air pollution problem," he said. "You can't ex-
