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Service Employees Join L.A. Teachers' Walkout

Wildcat strikes by truck drivers continued across the nation, and in Los Angeles, 6,000 other school employees planned to join striking teachers on picket lines today.

Service Employees Local 99, AFL-CIO, said it would strike to protest planned job and budget cutbacks in Los Angeles schools. The union represents cooks, janitors, bus drivers and some other non-teaching personnel.

About half of the city's 25,000 teachers have struck to demand smaller classes and higher pay. During the strike, now in its second week, nearly half the system's students have not attended school.

Ed Brinard, secretary-treasurer of the service employees local, said, "We think that by early next week the entire school system will be closed down. The school system is the nation's second largest."

The striking drivers are trying to force a repudiation by the Teachers Union of a tentative national contract which provides pay increases of \$1.10 an hour over three years. The truckers, who currently average \$4 an hour, have centered their scattered strikes in the Chicago, St. Louis, Cleveland and Los Angeles areas.

Amid reports the wildcat strikes were undermining the national agreement, Frank E. Fitzmaurice, president of the Teachers Union, said he was organizing a national contract which provides pay increases of \$1.10 an hour over three years. The truckers, who currently average \$4 an hour, have centered their scattered strikes in the Chicago, St. Louis, Cleveland and Los Angeles areas.

practical problems of coping with the thousands of demonstrators expected to descend on New Haven on May 1.

Only nine of the 21 track and field athletes who were to compete in the Penn Relays at Philadelphia today and Saturday will make the trip. The others reportedly decided to honor the strike, including Captain Kwaku Oshem-Trempong, a native of Ghana.

Some individuals on the Yale crew, tennis, golf and lacrosse teams have indicated they will not show up for weekend contests.

The Yale baseball team convinced the school administration not to charge admission for the game today against Harvard and Saturday against Dartmouth College. Instead voluntary contributions will be taken at the games, with the money to be turned over to the Black Student Alliance at Yale.

The resolution adopted by the faculty also called for greater responsibility on the part of the university for the city in which it is located.

Other developments at Yale included the Black Panther Party's takeover of the Black Panther newspaper of a letter by the head of a student group called the "Fair Trial Committee."

The committee chairman, Grover J. Rivers II, said his group had disbanded, acknowledged that this was "an admission of defeat for those who would be reasonable and moderate," and called for a complete shutdown of the university to avoid violence on May Day.

On the other hand, Yale Chaplain William Sloane Coffin said he was encouraged by recent developments in the trial to call for a demonstration he had been planning for Friday.

Coffin cited the fact that National Panther leaders who had been sentenced to six months in jail last week for contempt of court were freed this week after they apologized to Superior Court Judge Harold M. Mulvey for causing a disturbance in the courtroom.

John Curtis, president of the royal province of New Hampshire, fell ill, and the Colonial General Assembly declared a day of fasting and prayer for his recovery on March 17, 1861.

Curtis died in less than a month, but his last day remained the date of observance fixed in the 1848 Legislature.

In Florida Hoosier Herb Shriner, Wife Killed When Car Hits Tree

DELRAY BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Herb Shriner, the Hoosier humorist who starred on television in the 1960s, and his wife were killed Thursday night when their auto ran off a highway and struck a tree. He was 61, his wife Ellen was 63.

Police gave no reason for the car's leaving the road. They said the tree was about 80 feet off U.S. 1.

Shriner, who grew up in Indiana, rose to stardom with his dry, country wit. He reached his greatest fame with the TV program "Two For the Money," and also appeared on radio and the Broadway stage.

Shriner was returning from a performance in West Palm Beach. The couple's three children, a daughter Judy 18, and two sons, Kin and Will, lived at home in Fort Lauderdale.

Shriner made his reputation as a low key comedian reminding about life back home in Indiana in a wry, Will Rogers manner.

He actually started in show business as a harmonica player with his harmonica solos and later the instrument was essentially a prop for his monologues.

After World War II service, he became a featured performer on many major radio programs.

Coventry Breast Feeding Defended In UConn Demonstration

Wednesday's Earth Day teaching at the University of Connecticut had a special meaning for mothers in the local La Leche League, who spent the day on campus handing out literature challenging the recent rash of publicity charging that mothers' milk is harmful to the health of babies because of the presence of DDT.

La Leche is an international organization devoted to promoting good motherhood through breast feeding. Members throughout the country were concerned that certain aspects of the Earth Day activities were "panicking mothers into abandoning breast feeding," by the massive use of a button campaign implying that presence of DDT in mother's milk was harmful.

Too much emphasis has been placed on this, according to national La Leche officials. It is a fact that the "emphasis should be where it belongs, the content of the foods we eat."

"The mother does not manufacture DDT. It is there in her milk because she has eaten it." Research indicates that "the advantages of breast feeding far outweigh the risk of DDT in breast milk. No baby should be taken off the breast because of DDT."

On the other hand, doctors who have consulted with La Leche have asked that members caution mothers on the use of various sprays used around the home. These can have harmful effects, especially on a baby, long after spraying has taken place, and La Leche suggests spraying them and spraying.

According to Mrs. John Froehlich, executive secretary of La Leche League International, "The human contamination is widespread, especially in the problem milk, however, there is no medical evidence that switching to formula will protect the baby, or that in any way a baby would be better fed. Demanding of our legislators that we be protected from all contamination seems to be a far better action to take."

The area La Leche group is headed by Mrs. Debra Crozier of Coventry. Mrs. Crozier said yesterday that five mothers, two of them accompanied by their nursing babies, were on hand for the protest at UConn Wednesday and all hope they accomplished something by lecturing in this country under

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — A 29-year-old advertising executive was reported in poor condition today after apparently being hit by a train Thursday night and lying near the tracks overnight.

Joe McPherson of Putfield, a regular commuter to his job in New York City, was found at 1:30 a.m. today lying in a dazed condition near the eastbound track of the Penn Central Railroad.

How to feed the teeming millions of Asia. Today that question has been answered, but a new one has been substituted.

Such plentiful production makes the price of rice go down. At the same time, the new method of culture required for growing the new rice required higher expenditures for fertilizers, insecticides and herbicides.

The end result seems to be the result typical from most technological advances in agriculture—a combined raising of production costs and a decline in wholesale prices which tends to eliminate small farmers and drive out the little fellow.

In such a trend, the chief effect of the miracle rice in Southeast Asia might be to force the peasant who is just reaping the benefits of his own land reform programs to turn around and dispose of it back to some large operator.

Such are some of the complications in what must otherwise be called the most spectacular piece of progress ever to hit Southeast Asia—a kind of thing that at first seems to save the world, but then, later on, proves, once more, that there is no such thing as a free lunch.

Our Leader Has Fallen!

It is difficult to imagine the Stamford Advocate without Ted Yutkin but his death leaves another man to pick up the standard and carry on.

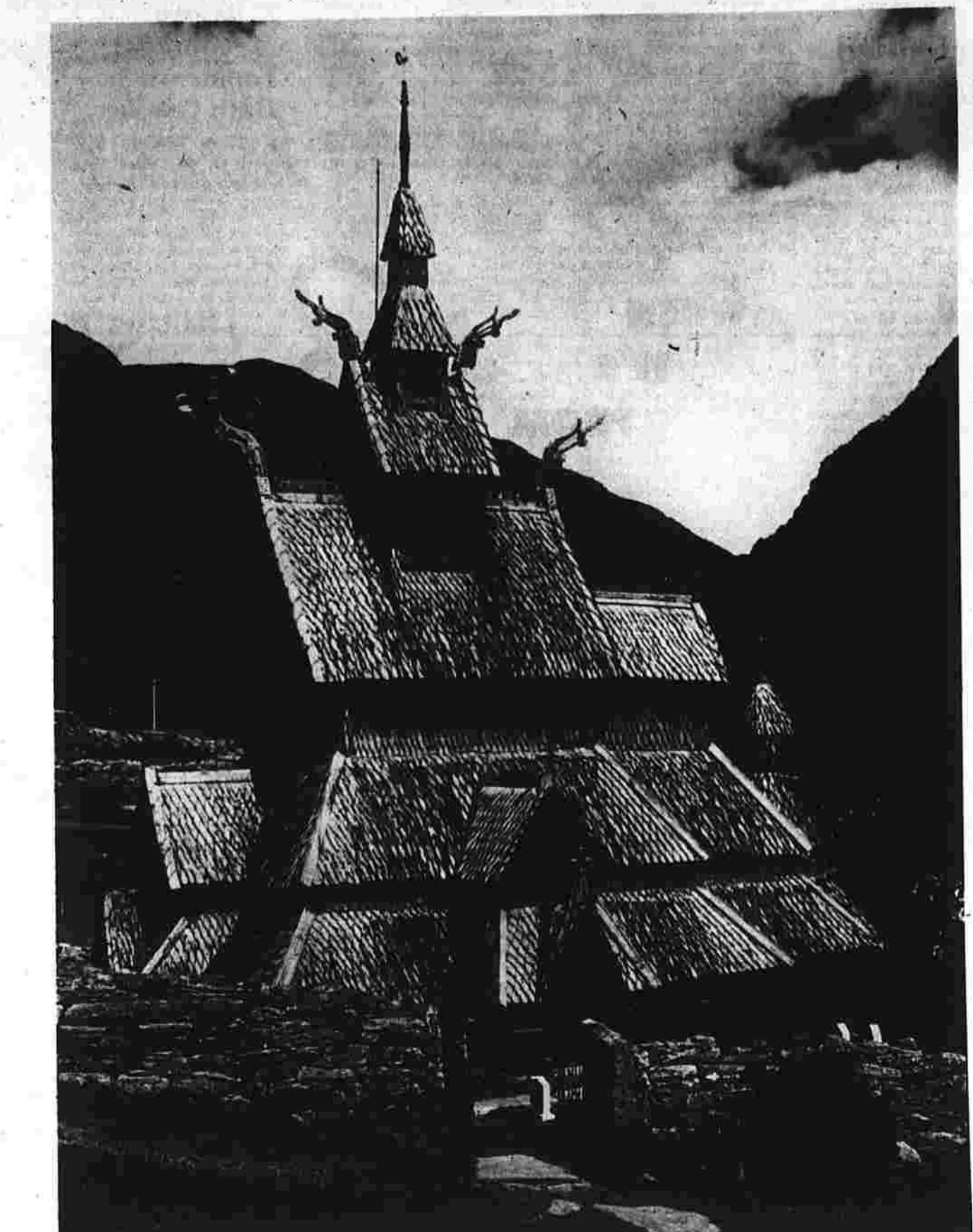

Less Eye Damage Caused By Eclipse Than Feared

NEW YORK (AP) — The major eclipse of the sun last March 7 failed to produce the epidemic of eye damage the experts had feared, according to a survey by the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

The survey turned up 100 cases of eye damage, a number of cases in California, where the eclipse was only partially visible. Most states had two to four cases but California had 18.

The nationwide survey of eye specialists and hospital emergency rooms found 68 cases of eye damage from looking at the sun, not all permanent. This compares to the 87 cases found after a 1953 eclipse in a far less comprehensive survey.

A spokesman for the society said the relatively low number of cases this time appeared to be the result of widespread publication of warnings of the dangers of looking at the sun.

Ophthalmologists, commenting before the survey returns were tabulated, said they had voiced grave concern about the danger of burns to the retina as a result of looking at the sun in large part due to the work of the news agencies in reporting the event.

Jail in Lieu Of Fine Said To Be Unfair

WASHINGTON (AP) — The ancient practice of jailing people who don't pay their fines is under strong attack in the Supreme Court as unfair to the poor.

Lawyers representing indigent people who were jailed because they were too poor to make immediate payment of fines asked the court Wednesday to declare the practice unconstitutional.

Robert G. Fisher, representing a number of Baltimore indigents, told the court that letting an affluent defendant pay his fine and go home while jailing a poor man for nonpayment is not equivalent punishment.

Stanley E. Bass, representing a Chicago man kept in jail because he couldn't pay an additional fine, said time spent in jail is a more severe penalty than paying a fine.

James R. Thompson, Illinois assistant attorney general, predicted chaos if the court knocks down the work-out system, particularly in courts where fines are only partly paid, such as traffic courts.

A three-judge federal court in Baltimore under the old Maryland law but ruled judges had to take into consideration the indigence of defendants with a view to adjusting the sentence.

The three-judge panel also said the practice of requiring indigents to work out court costs they could not pay was unconstitutional.

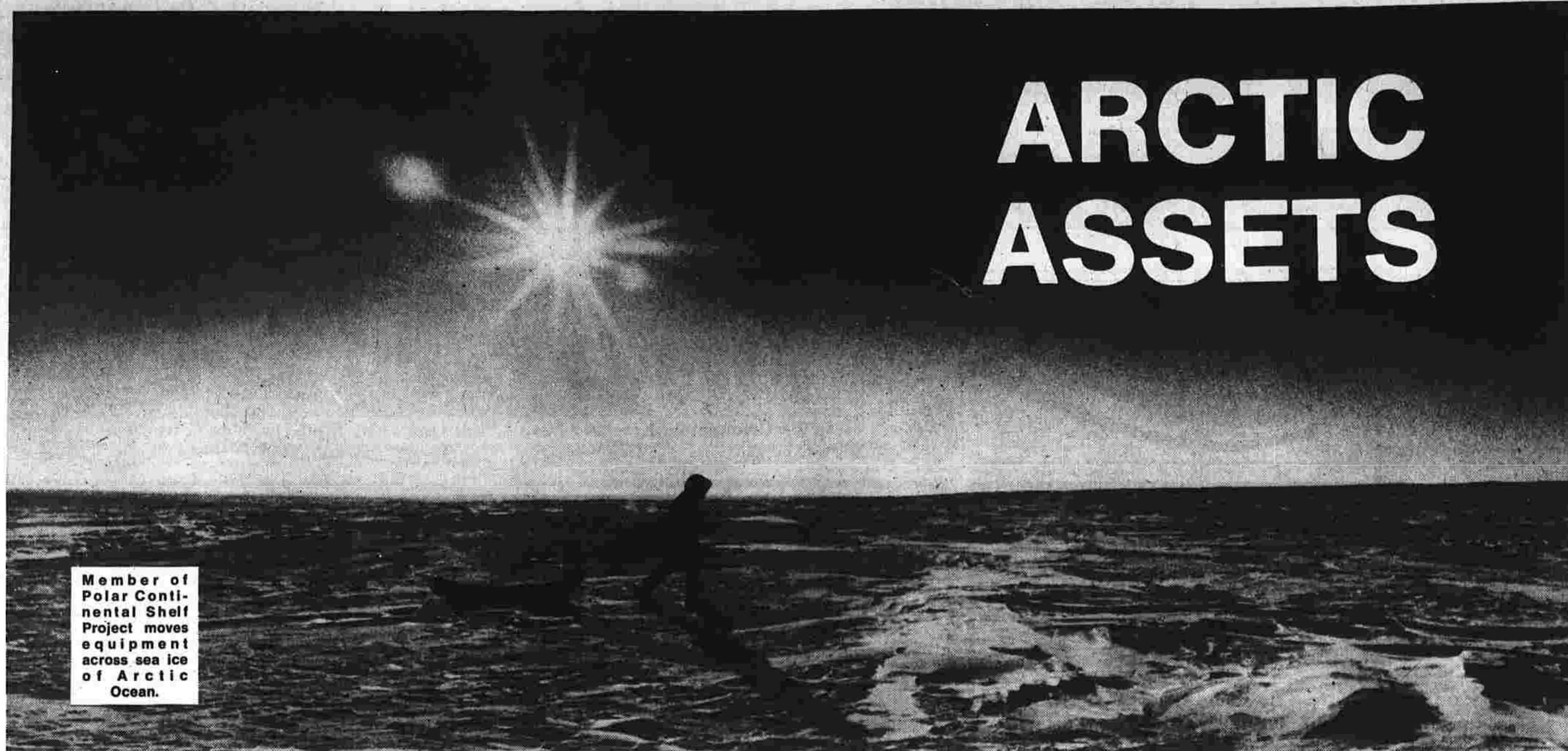

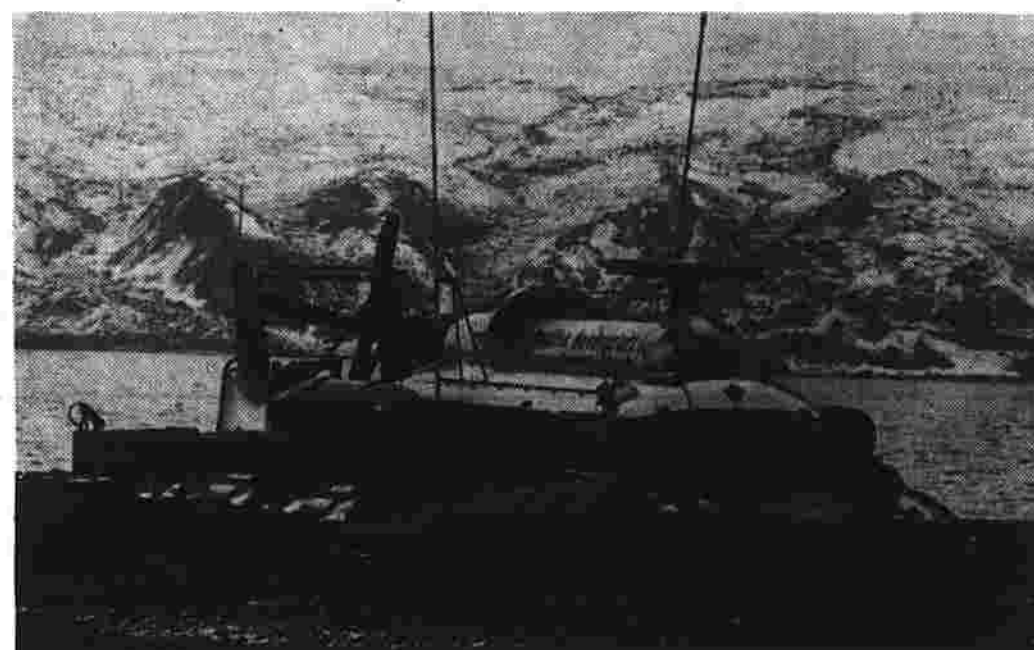

Member of Polar Continental Shelf Project moves equipment across sea ice of Arctic Ocean.



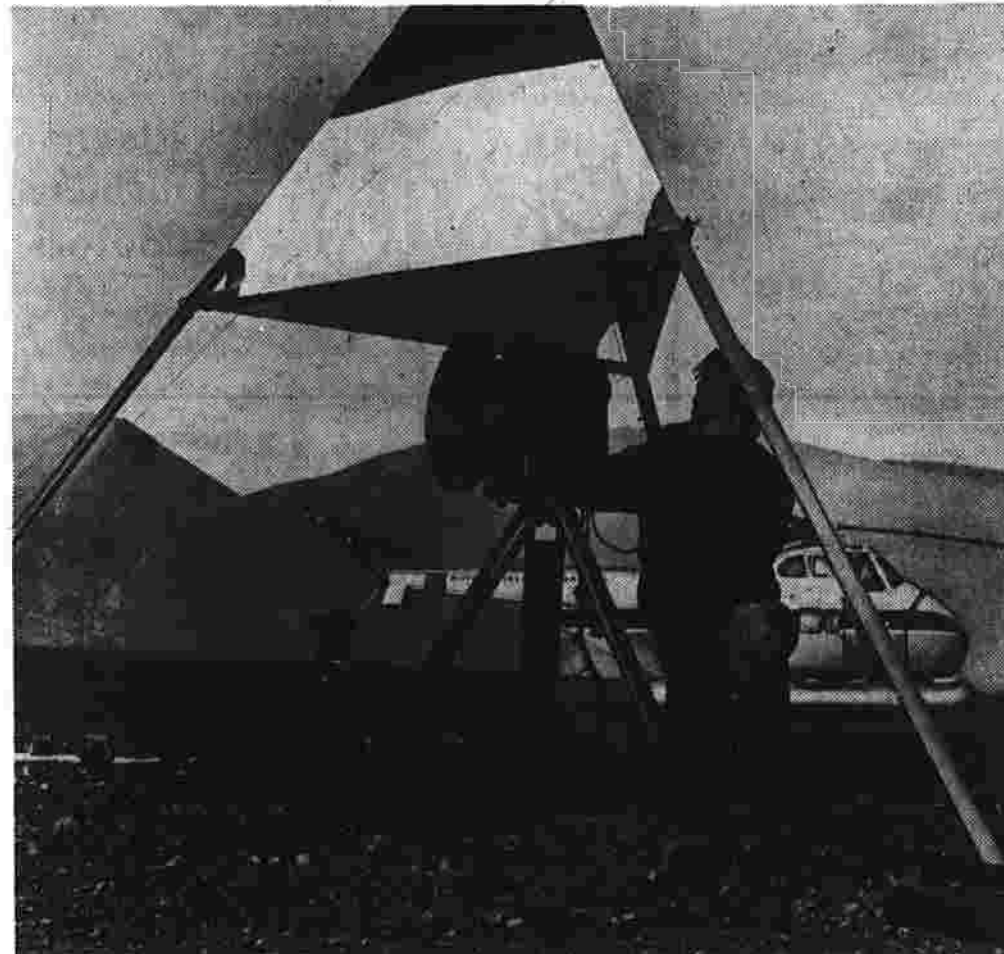
Amphibious hovercraft is versatile aid to exploration—pictured here on Herschel Island.

An economic spring is coming to the Canadian Arctic. The "ice" of lack of knowledge and dark Polar mystery is rapidly being broken up, and the idea of useless, frozen wastes is plain out-of-date.

In fact, the vast, unknown Arctic is now just a romantic myth. During the last 25 years the northern regions of Canada have been methodically investigated and explored to such an extent that they are better known at present than parts of provinces further south. Arctic Canada has, first of all, been systematically mapped, with the help of aerial photography of the whole land area. Hydrographers have charted the coasts and coastal waters, and geologists on land have probed rock and soil. Glaciers and icefields have been studied by one band of specialized scientists, the flora and fauna by another.

Perhaps the most intensive and sophisticated research program is the many-sided Polar Continental Shelf Project. It began in 1959 and is still active across the great, frozen flank of Canada's north western extremities, in 50-below-zero temperatures. Among masses of scientific data has emerged the fact that very extensive oil deposits are lying under the Arctic islands and mainland.

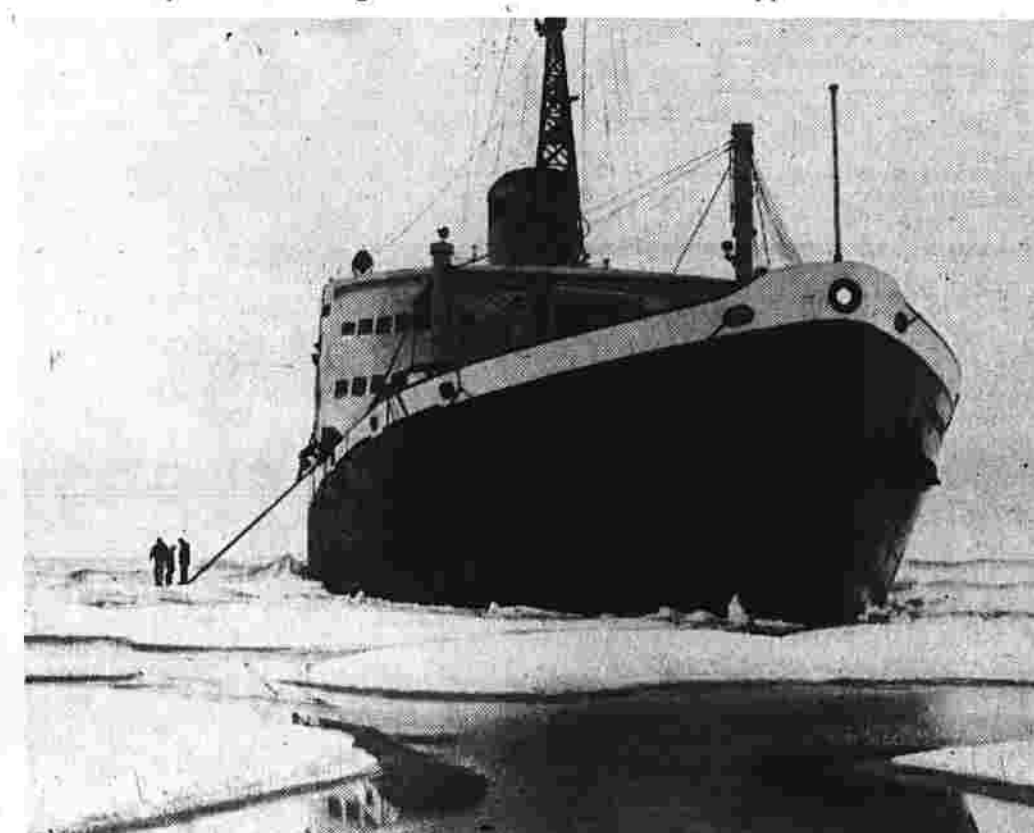
Research and studies have involved hundreds of millions of dollars, and many thousands of Canadians—most employed by the federal government, but many of them private air survey teams, crews of chartered commercial ships, and, recently, private oil seekers and mining prospectors. A lot of cold fingers and noses perhaps—but it seems to have broken the ice once and for always.
