The long-range news conveyed by the news of the day from Trinidad is that the whole Caribbean is on the edge of being spilt as a playground.

On Island After Island, It Is The Blacks

On island after island, it is the blacks who are in the majority.

Consider the nature of the times and the news from elsewhere, it would be strange indeed if the blacks of the Caribbean were satisfied with their present status, or with the progress being made on their behalf, even in those instances where blacks themselves now control and operate the government.

As everywhere else, there is a younger generation in the Caribbean. Like younger generations elsewhere, it is turning things over, and looking at them differently.

It tells itself that it is pretty close to living in slavery, not to stand too eagerly for that, it is not a man who is outside capital not an assistance but a domination. It resents being taken for granted.

This younger generation can read the news from the United States, to know how fashionable revolt has become.

It can witness the affluence of the increasing numbers of people who come to play and invest in their islands, taking advantage of cheap servants, cheap labor, and white man's privilege.

It is not easy to visualize any quick social revolution, anywhere in the Caribbean.

But there is precious little chance that the pressure toward such a revolution, now having begun, will now diminish.

Those who have found the new playground are going to really have to love it, and bear with it while it, too, comes out of its warm and comforting sun into the troubles of the Twentieth Century.

Penn Central Service Cuts Start Sunday

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Major changes on the Penn Central's train schedule between Springfield, Mass., and Hartford will go into effect Sunday with the advent of Daylight Saving Time.

Despite strong opposition from a number of commuters and from Connecticut state officials, Penn Central is trimming service between those two points to four daily round-trips. The railroad said deficit operations and a reduction in the number of travelers prompted the service cutback.

The only change in scheduling on Penn Central's Shore Line

between New York and Boston involves the Washington-Boston sleeper express, called "The Federal." The run is being speeded up by 25 minutes, changing the arrival times at most stations.

Penn Central said new schedules are available at its stations.

In an attempt to forestall the schedule change on the Springfield line, objections from four of Massachusetts' members of Congress were filed Friday night with an Interstate Commerce hearing officer.

More than a score of Springfield-area residents also filed objections to the elimination of the five round-trip runs between the two cities.

Summer: Relief On The Way

NEW YORK (AP) — The summertime is coming to be regarded as a television season in its own right.

There still will be plenty of reruns—economics dictates that—but the networks have lined up some relief for weary viewers.

For one thing, the Smothers Brothers are coming back. Pat Paulsen, whose own show is mercifully being dropped, will join them on ABC at 10 p.m. Wednesdays.

Tommy and Dick apparently are going to be closely watched, both as to ratings and behavior. ABC does not want to become embroiled in the kind of censorship battle that caused their firing by CBS last summer. Presumably, if they pass muster on both categories they will be offered an opening next January.

Summer also is the time for silly titles for shows. Try these: "Andy Williams Presents Everything Is Beautiful With Ray Stevens." "Dean Martin Presents the Goldiggers." "Johnny Cash Presents the Everly Brothers Show." Doubt that anyone is going to forget who Andy Williams is over the summer.

Other original shows are on tap. "The Kraft Music Hall" will be hosted by British star Des O'Connor and taped in England. Glen Campbell will be replaced by a variety show to be called, tentatively, "Rap."

Half of "Hee Haw" on Wednesday will be replaced by cartoons called "Where's Huddles" and the other half by reruns of "Gomer Pyle." And Jim Nabors himself will be replaced by a music and comedy show known as "Happy Days." "Animal World," seen last summer on CBS, replaces Paulsen on ABC on Thursday.

CBS is bringing back three series from past seasons. Besides "Gomer," there's "Wild Wild West" for Carol Burnett on Monday nights and "He and She" for Tim Conway on Fridays. "He and She" was one of the most civilized comedies on the tube, but died of ratings anemia.

"The Virginian" is bringing back some of the best episodes from its eight years on the air. Among the stars to be seen are Lee Marvin, Lee J. Cobb, Bette

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tery and the voice of a plumber's plunger, suggests a person interested in the field start by reading every billboard you pass on the road. "Pick up newspapers and read them aloud," he says. "Use a tape-recorder and spend as much time practicing as you would if you were already in the business."

He suggests an amateur with no previous experience start by attempting to land a job at his local station. "Then you can hit the center in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles."

His final advice was to get the reaction of others to your work and always to compare the quality of your efforts with that of those who are tops in the field.

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
