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Wallace at the Verge Of Destroying Career

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—Alabama's Republican national committee says George C. Wallace is second choice for the party's presidential pick in 1972.

And the chairman of the state Democratic Executive Committee, Robert S. Vance, said, "If he runs 'nigger' and the big-city districts where non-Negroes have a majority."

Wallace had charged before the primary that black "millions" were conspiring to beat him.

The former governor, who accused President Nixon's administration and both GOP and Democratic leaders of working against him, said he would make a pitch also against "Washington interference."

James O. Martin, the Republican national committee chairman, said it would be "difficult for Wallace to launch another third-party movement having been defeated in his own state and not having won the

FTC Planning To Monitor TV Commercials

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Chairman Caspar W. Weinberger of the Federal Trade Commission says one of his agency's chief concerns is the fact that the average American child is exposed to 300,000 televised commercial messages by age 12.

To do his job, Weinberger said Wednesday, the FTC must monitor each year's great many advertising messages as part of its obligation to protect consumers against false advertising.

"Our job is made somewhat easier by what I am sure is the network's basic ethic that honesty is indeed the best policy," he said. "Under current legal trends, we must also note it is not the advertiser alone who is held to high standards of truth."

Weinberger, who was California's director of finance before his appointment to the federal post four months ago, spoke at a conference of Columbia Broadcasting System television network executives and free press.

Of television, Weinberger commented: "Democracy can't survive unless it is based on the truth. The Athens public prosecutor challenged this. He said Niarchos could leave any time because no charges have been filed against him."

A burial certificate issued Wednesday said 44-year-old Eugenia Livonou Niarchos died early Monday from "poisoning due to an excessive use of barbiturates."

Athena police said the death was still under investigation, and that Niarchos, one of the world's wealthiest men, had been told he could leave the country until the investigation was completed.

The Athens public prosecutor challenged this. He said Niarchos could leave any time because no charges have been filed against him.

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Cummings To Share Equally in Property

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Actor Robert Cummings, 60, and his ex-wife Mary, 52, will share equally in community property worth more than \$600,000, a court says.

Superior Court Judge William H. Hogoboom also ordered Wednesday that Cummings pay \$500 monthly alimony and \$500 monthly child support. The couple, married on March 5, 1948, had four children, three are adults, three are minors.

The judge ruled that the Cummings had agreed on the position of an Australian ranch and a Bahamas trust fund valued at more than \$600,000.

Rock Tune Asks Young to Groove Along with GOP

MIAMI (AP)—President Nixon and Vice President Spiro T. Agnew are the heroes of a rock song Florida Republicans hope will bring young Democrats into the GOP fold around the nation.

"Say you voted for Richard and Spiro and like was your favorite hero," the lead singer screams over the sound of the electric guitar. "Say you think it's solid and careful and hipsters are a bit much too hair-"

The rocking ditty is blasted out times a day over five Miami radio stations. The lyricist says it's available to Republicans in other states.

The campaign is aimed at the young, "our best prospects," says Mike Thompson, a young advertising man who composed the song and devised the campaign.

He had this to say about hipsters: "Hipsters, in a word, personally everything that conservative Republicans are upset about in this country... the drug scene, social promiscuity, anti-Americanism, violence."

After extolling Nixon, Agnew and former President Dwight D. Eisenhower for a few bars, the song swings into:

"Admit it, admit it, oh woman and man."
"Admit it, admit it, you're Republican."
Thompson says the hard rock jungle has been well received with the only real complaint coming from a conservative listener who called and asked in a quavering voice: "Have the hipsters taken over the Republican party?"

Education Costs Doubled by '80 Report Predicts

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—A report submitted to the State Board of Education predicts the cost of education will double by the 1979-80 school year and local communities will seek increasing help from the state during that period.

The report, issued Wednesday, estimates that costs of public education in Connecticut will reach \$1 billion by the end of the decade.

The report estimates that more than \$1 billion will be needed in 1979-80 school year to meet the cost of public education in the state.

The report estimates that the state's share of education costs will rise from 20 per cent to at least 40 per cent, and perhaps eventually to 50 per cent, says the report.

A number of factors will account for the increase, says the report, which was prepared by the education department's Bureau of Research, Statistics and Finance.

The report forecasts the discontinuation of church-connected schools and the extension of public education to large numbers of four-year-olds, increasing school enrollment from the present 600,000 to 750,000 in the next decade.

Per pupil expenses will shoot up at the same time from this year's \$800 per student to \$1,600, says the report.

State Education Commissioner William Sanders termed the report's prediction that the state would assume 40 per cent of the cost of education, "highly conservative." He said other reports indicate Connecticut may some day pay all educational expenses.

Alabama's Albert Brewer Always Has Time to Joke

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Albert Brewer is one of Alabama's best orators. He's also one of the wittiest.

There's a place for a clean, wholesome joke even in the governor's office. The 41-year-old chief executive says. It's an escape valve for the responsibility of governing a state, more recently, the strain of an election campaign.

The victim of one of Brewer's practical jokes was a veteran legislator known around the capitol for his ability to get people behind his constituents.

The governor was running behind schedule and the legislator had to wait in the outer office. When he finally was admitted Brewer grinned and apologized. "We had to look everything up before we could let you in."

The slightly built, Tennessee-born attorney was 26 when he was elected in 1962. He served two terms in the lower house of the Alabama Legislature. George Wallace chose him for speaker when he became governor in 1963.

Brewer was elected lieutenant governor in 1966 and when Wallace's wife, Gov. Lurleen Wallace, died on May 7, 1968, he succeeded her as chief executive.

This week, two years later, he ran for a full four-year term, and Wallace was his most formidable opponent. Because neither got a majority in Tuesday's Democratic primary, they will meet in a runoff June 2.

Born near Bethel Springs, Tenn., Oct. 26, 1928, Brewer moved to Decatur, Ala., as a child. His father was employed by the Tennessee Valley Authority.

To help put himself through the University of Alabama Law School, Brewer worked behind the counter at a campus drugstore. During the summer, he got jobs with TVA and Ingalls Shipbuilding Corp. and worked in church and civic affairs in Decatur. In 1963, the Alabama Jaycees named him one of four outstanding young men in the state.

He stood by Wallace's side in two presidential elections, as a pro-Wallace elector four years later. He was one of 10 Alabama electors who supported Wallace in the 1968 election.

Brewer and his wife, the former Martha Farmer of Chattanooga, Tenn., have two daughters, Becki and Beverly Allison.

The governor is an avid country music fan. When Johnny Cash played an engagement recently in Montgomery, Brewer entertained him at the executive mansion.

Bake about 40 minutes at 350. Excess bacon fat may be removed at this time if desired.

Government May Triple Amount of Iron in Bread

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government proposes tripling the amount of iron in enriched bread to combat fatigue and low resistance to disease which iron deficiency anemia produced in many women.

Particularly the poor, specialists have said, are likely to be hit by widespread iron deficiency in milligrams per pound.

In response to the bakers' protest, the FDA has proposed changing the tolerances to 50 to 60 milligrams for enriched bread and 22 to 28 milligrams for enriched flour. Standard bread and flour would not be affected. Bakers and millers say the changes would not affect the taste, texture or appearance of bread.

Conversely, the FDA still has before it a four-year-old proposal to cut the amount of iron in fortified cereals to 1.5 milligrams per ounce serving.

Some popular brands of raisin bran, bran flakes and highly fortified cereals have substantially more than 15 milligrams of iron per ounce.

"The FDA proposal on breakfast cereals was offered before national health legislation was passed in June 1967.

It described the movement as a relief operation to transport medicines and other relief supplies to Vietnamese in Cambodia who cannot leave.

The stretch of the Mekong River extending to Phnom Penh has been closed to commercial traffic for several weeks after two Japanese ships were fired on.

Cambodian navy patrol boats have withdrawn to the vicinity of Phnom Penh after they encountered heavy fire in the vicinity of the ferry crossing point at Neak Laong.

North Vietnamese troops captured the ferry crossing several days ago.

Newspapers arriving from Cambodia today reported heavy fighting on the western bank of the Mekong River halfway between the border and Phnom Penh.

Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops have seized control of all the villages along the Mekong from the border north to the Neak Laong ferry crossing.

Phnom Penh. The Cambodian army is reported to have moved about 2,000 troops to within 10 miles north of Neak Laong.

There was no indication with an attack in the area.

Meanwhile, a 10,000-man South Vietnamese task force and its American advisers were pulled out of Cambodia.

A fresh ground force prepared to cross the border again touched enemy base camp in the western Mekong delta, and some 40,000 other troops continued their drive in six other areas of Cambodia.

Reports today indicated they were making only light resistance.

The South Vietnamese military command said one task force had returned to the western Mekong Delta from Cambodia after "successfully completing their mission to destroy base camps and supply depots around Ba Thoi, in the southern end of the so-called Parrot's Beak 40 mile strip."

The command said that during the operation the force killed 1,187 enemy troops, captured 168 prisoners, and seized 1,200 weapons, 180 tons of ammunition and 30 tons of rice.

U.S. headquarters also announced that a total of 16 American troops were killed and five wounded in the crashes of six helicopters in the last three days, two of them down inside Cambodia by enemy fire.

The war materials seized or destroyed include nearly 375 weapons, 100 supply trucks and 78 tons of rice, the allied command said.

Although the U.S. and South Vietnamese forces were reported moving little resistance, a Cambodian military spokesman in Phnom Penh said the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese had launched powerful new attacks Wednesday against Cambodian forces and after a day of fighting captured Senmonrom, the largest city in Mondul Kiri province, in northeast Cambodia, 100 miles northeast of Phnom Penh.

The U.S. and South Vietnamese commands issued their weekly casualty reports for last week, announcing that 123 Americans, 600 South Vietnamese troops and 3,415 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese were killed, and 987 Americans and 1,228 South Vietnamese were wounded.

The totals were considerably higher than those for the previous week.

TEL AVIV (AP) — Arab guerrillas made three attacks across the Lebanese border Wednesday night, ambushing an Israeli patrol in the eastern sector of the frontier, shelling three settlements and penetrating within 15 miles of Haifa, Israel's chief port. Four Israeli and four guerrillas were reported killed.

One group of Palestinian commandos ambushed an Israeli patrol on the slopes of Mt. Hermon, killing three soldiers and wounding two in a crossfire of machine guns and hand grenades. The patrol was ambushed by guerrillas from both sides of the road, the Israeli command said. The Israeli military said it scattered the attackers and called in a helicopter to fly out the commandos.

The rocky area has been the scene of several bloody encounters between Israelis and Arab guerrillas.

Israeli troops killed four Arab infiltrators in a running battle through a forest 13 miles north-east of Haifa, the military command announced.

The guerrillas, on their deepest penetration from Lebanon since the 1967 Middle East war, clashed with the Israelis near Abhah, about 13 miles south of the Lebanese frontier.

Three Israelis were wounded in the fighting, and troops and helicopters fanned out in a search for other infiltrators. Weapons, ammunition, submachine guns and food were found on the bodies of the dead guerrillas.

It was the second deep penetration from Lebanon in a week. Arab guerrillas in Lebanon also fired Soviet 120mm rockets at a school in Kfar Sumein, 15 miles from Haifa, and wounded her father and her sister, the military command said.

The rockets ripped through the school, but did not injure any visiting children sleeping in a classroom. A number of houses were damaged.

The military command said two other Israeli settlements on the Israeli-Lebanon frontier were shelled during the night, but there were no reports of casualties or damage.

On Israel's southern front, Egyptian warplanes attacked Egyptian military objectives along the Suez Canal for four hours today, the military command said.

Senate Okays Plan to Aid Intercity Railroad Service

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate passed Wednesday a bill that would establish a government-backed corporation to operate the nation's ailing intercity passenger train service. The measure was sent to the House on a roll call vote of 78 to 19.

Under the plan, a profit-making corporation would take over much of the nation's passenger service in much the same way Conrail operates a communication satellite system. Sen. Vance Harke, D-Ind., said the plan has the complete support of the Nixon administration.

Passage came after the Senate rejected two alternative proposals. One approved earlier by the Senate Commerce Committee, would have provided nearly a half billion of direct subsidies to the railroad. Another, by Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., would have established three regional corporations to operate railroads in different parts of the country.

"This country needs all modes of transportation operating at their maximum efficiency if its 1970s American are to be able to travel from city to city safely, comfortably and in reasonable time."

Harke noted the administration's opposition to a direct subsidy plan when it was before the Commerce Committee but changed its position when key changes were made.

The plan before committee would have provided \$65 million over four years in direct federal subsidies for the purchase of new equipment and for operating expenses.

The single-corporation approach was worked out as a compromise by Harke and Sen. Winston Prouty, R-Vt.

It establishes a corporation with 15 directors, eight named by the President, three by Congress and four by the railroad. The corporation would be required to propose a plan for a nationwide rail network within 30 days after the measure becomes law.

Backed by an initial \$15 million in federal funds, the corporation would contract with the railroads to operate intercity passenger trains. Any railroad not entering into a contract with the corporation would not be al-

National Guard Told To Keep Guns Empty

WASHINGTON (AP) — National Guardsmen called out to control protests at four major universities across the country after the Kent State shootings have been given orders to keep their guns unloaded.

Troops sent into the University of Kentucky to enforce a night-long curfew were issued live ammunition Wednesday on orders from Gov. Louie B. Nunn, but the guardsmen were told not to load their rifles.

Ammunition was kept from guardsmen at the University of Wisconsin, where students built barricades in the streets and set them ablaze before being routed by an officer. The guardsmen still carrying loaded rifles, but no warnings were issued against opening fire in wake of the earlier deaths.

Four students were killed and 12 wounded Monday when Ohio National Guardsmen shot into a crowd of antiwar demonstrators at Kent State. What touched off the gunfire remains unclear, enmeshed in controversy and confusion.

Illinois put 5,000 guardsmen on standby alert and sent part of the force into the Southern Illinois University campus after a clash Wednesday night. But the militia top general said the troops had standing orders not to load or fire without a specific command from a senior officer. Guard guns were also kept unloaded at the University of Maryland, where the last troops were withdrawn Wednesday after five days of demonstrations.

The Pentagon's riot regulations say troops are allowed to load their weapons only upon an officer's orders or if their lives are in danger.

Brig. Gen. Robert Cantorbury said his Ohio guardsmen, under state control at the time of the shootings, carry live ammunition. Pope Warns: Crises Menace World Peace

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI declared today that power struggles, arms races and "the infiltration of systems of violence" are menacing world peace.

In an allusion to the conflicts in Southeast Asia and the Middle East, he said these were days "full of sad happenings and sadder omens."

The Pope was speaking from the apartment window to a crowd of pilgrims in St. Peter's Square on the Roman Catholic Feast of the Ascension. It was the second day in a row that the pontiff had spoken of peace. On Wednesday he told a general audience that the extension of the war into Cambodia threatened to "multiply" victims.

Today he deplored the ambiguous attitude of the world's major powers and their incapacity to give itself tranquility and order.

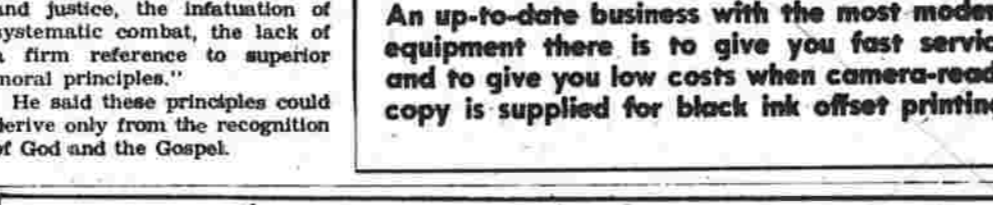
He said peace was threatened by conflicts of ideology and interest, but perhaps more by the competition of power, the means of destruction, the lack of a firm reference to superior moral principles.

He said these principles could derive only from the recognition of God and the Gospel.

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Purge Looming in Hanoi As Part of Power Struggle

By WILLIAM I. BYAN
A resolution adopted by the Politburo in North Vietnam, makes it probable that there will be a widespread purge of Communists, high and low, in that country.

The purge over Cambodia has diverted attention from Hanoi's internal problems. It is likely that the forthcoming purge is connected with a power struggle in progress ever since Ho Chi Minh died last September.

The prospects for this struggle are obscured by recent events which brought Red China back into the Indo-China picture. It would seem that the outcome to be the work of an April 28 resolution of the Politburo.

In any case, a major North Vietnamese conflict seems to be in the works. An April 28 resolution of the Politburo, known as the "Ho Chi Minh clause," is a major development. It is a call for a new "Ho Chi Minh clause" members. This is reminiscent of Communist reshuffles in other countries, following a Soviet pattern laid down by Joseph Stalin after Lenin died.

The "Lenin enrollment" served to bolster Stalin's personal power as general secretary.

The party secretary in North Vietnam is Le Duang and his name alone is affixed to the resolution in the name of the whole Politburo. This suggests that he is in a commanding position. He is regarded as pro-Moscow, and is the same time a proponent of bold military measures in the South as opposed to long, patient and protracted "war" in the Chinese style of Mao Tse-tung.

The resolution, a roughly worded document, suggests that Hanoi has been having continuing troubles because of the war's demands. Some U.S. specialists profess to see signs that the troubles are mounting because of new strains of supporting invasions in Laos and Cambodia.

The Hanoi document lashes party members, "politically backward in spirit, who infringe on party discipline and... are disoriented and distrustful of the masses. It accuses some of "factionalism," a hint that the members involved are in high positions.

University Head Quits Widening Protests Close 227 Schools

Some 227 colleges and universities were closed today in the widening of protests during religious services. He will be the evangelist at a Calvary Church crusade Sunday until May 22.

At the University of Wisconsin, one of the university heads who met with President Nixon this week to discuss campus unrest, announced his resignation in Madison, Wis. Fred H. Harrington, who will become a professor in history, said he had planned the move for some time and it was unfortunate that it came at a time when the university was torn by four days of violent anti-war demonstrations.

In State Protests Firebombs Hurlled, Buildings Seized A group of student demonstrators facing court action continued to occupy five buildings at the University of Bridgeport to day as protests against the Cambodian campaign went on at many colleges throughout Connecticut.

At Yale University, a national fund-raising effort began Thursday to collect money for antiwar candidates in next fall's congressional elections. Leaders of the campaign, which former U.S. Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark is one of its advisers, said graduating seniors would be asked to forego wearing caps and gowns during commencement and donate the rental money instead to the Peace Commemoration Fund.

At the University of Bridgeport, where students had occupied four buildings Thursday afternoon, a Superior Court order was served on the protesters requiring them to show cause in court Monday why they should not be ordered to vacate the buildings.

Earlier in the day, the president of Yale had called for a nationwide campaign to exert pressure on Congress to end the war.

\$14,980,827 Budget Needs 46.85-Mill Tax

The Manchester Board of Directors last night adopted a \$14,980,827 budget and a 46.85 mill tax rate for the 1970-71 General Fund—up \$701,382 from the current budget and tax rate. It also adopted an \$894,083 budget and a 4.39 tax rate for the Town of Manchester Fire District Fund—up \$107,564 and .19 mill.

The current tax rates are 44.6 mills for the General Fund and 4.3 mills for the Fire District. Except for East Hartford, which relies on Pratt & Whitney for the bulk of its income, the Hartford area appears to have greater tax increases than Manchester for 1971.

The average property owner, with a home assessed at \$13,000, the tax hikes will add \$7.80, if he lives within the boundaries of the 18th Utilities District, which levies its own tax for fire protection. Each mill is the equivalent of \$1 in taxes for each \$1,000 of assessed property. The 1970-71 fiscal year will begin July 1. The board adopted a \$418,000 budget for the Sewer Department—up \$83,409 over this year and the 1969-70 budget. The board also adopted a \$2,700 raise for the Sewer Department's public works director, on the basis that he is sufficiently under the present fee formula. The sewer charge is computed at 75 per cent of the water bill.

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The Police Department approved a 20 per cent raise for all employees, including all but one department head—the public works director, who receives about a 20 per cent raise. The directors out back on the recommendations voted made for department heads' salaries. Weiss was given a \$1,270 raise for the department head.

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WASHINGTON (AP)—With thousands of antiwar protesters heading for a hurriedly called demonstration in the nation's capital, President Nixon has moved to ease the crisis mounting over the use of American troops in Cambodia.

A statement from the 10th Naval District in San Juan said two submarines and a submarine tender entered the Mona Passage off western Puerto Rico about 2 a.m. today. It said three other Soviet ships were about 200 miles beyond the first three. This second group, the statement said, consisted of a Kresta class guided missile cruiser, a Kania class guided missile destroyer, and an oiler.
