Some 227 colleges and universities were closed today in the widening of protests during religious services. The fatal shooting of four students at Kent State University, Ohio, and demonstrations curtailed classes at hundreds of others.

In State Protests Firebombs Hurlled, Buildings Seized A group of student demonstrators facing court action continued to occupy five buildings at the University of Bridgeport.

At Yale University, a national fund-raising effort began Thursday to collect money for antiwar candidates in next fall's congressional elections.

Declarer drew trumps and led the queen of clubs for a finesse. East won the king of clubs and returned the ten of diamonds, whereupon West defeated the contract with two diamonds and one heart.

Daily Question: Dealer, at your left, bids one spade and you have two bids. The next player passes, and it is up to you with Spades: 7-10-14-4-1; Diamonds: A-K-J; Clubs: 8-5-4-2. What do you say?

### It Takes a Lot of Blood To Capture Enemy Base

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Associated Press photographer Huynh Cong Thuy was wounded Thursday during a major battle between South Vietnamese and Viet Cong forces in the Far East. He was killed in the fighting in the Mekong Delta in 1969. Here is his account of the fighting Thursday.

KOMPONG CHHOR, Cambodia (AP) — Shortly after 2 p.m., the South Vietnamese Army's Task Force 318 rolled north from Svay Rieng toward a "suspected enemy base" between Highway 24 and the accidental river.

The task force included tanks and armored personnel carriers and two ranger battalions, the 31st and 32nd.

Shortly after 3 p.m., the tank was riding stopped to look over the suspected enemy position. Just as I jumped off, enemy soldiers in bunkers fired several 840 rockets at the tank. One scored a direct hit, wounding me and all the crew members.

A B40 hit another tank near us, and the concussion knocked half a dozen Rangers right off the tank.

The Viet Cong opened up on us with rockets, mortars and automatic weapons. Their bunkers were in an L shape, and the fire was coming from all around us.

Rangers from the 31st Battalion tried to charge the bunkers but intense enemy fire pinned them down. They fired back with 40 mm mortars and called for artillery support.

Some Rangers finally reached the bunkers, but they were killed or wounded. One of our artillery shells landed right in the middle.

At least five of our soldiers were killed and eight wounded.

I'm afraid they might be hit again by friendly artillery, the Rangers panicked and fell back to where the tanks were.

### GOP Governors Cancel Their Spring Conference

**SANTA FE, N.M. (AP)** — Republican governors, many of whom are facing tough re-election state campaigns, have called off their spring political meeting.

Monday, joined by Democratic Gov. Raymond E. Sproul of Pennsylvania, cancelling the spring meeting of the Republican Governors' Association.

Most of his colleagues already had sent their regrets, and he said only seven state governors made it to Santa Fe in time to go home again.

"The disruption of peace, violence and potential violence throughout the nation at this time has made it impossible for us to cancel this spring conference," said Shafer, association chairman.

"The critical nature of the present crisis must receive the highest priority attention by all governors."

The wave of campus demonstrations and disorders which flared after President Nixon ordered U.S. troops to attack across the borders of Cambodia led to a steady stream of last-minute cancellations from GOP governors. By Thursday, it was obvious that no more than a dozen governors would be coming to Santa Fe.

Shafer announced the cancellation a scant six hours before the governors and a throng of New Mexico Republicans were due at a barbecue at the Rader de Santa Fe. The barbecue went on while most of the governors went home.

"I have made this decision following conversations with my fellow governors for we feel a deep responsibility to keep our avenues of communication open with our home communities," Shafer said.

Shafer announced that Nixon has asked all 50 governors to meet with him Monday at the White House. There are 32 Republican governors, 18 Democrats.

The GOP governors had planned two days of conferences opening Friday, with election-year politics a dominant item on the agenda.

New Mexico Gov. David F. Cargo said the White House was consulted and had urged cancellation. "They had six White House people coming and they asked that it be canceled," he said.

The New Mexico governor said he would have hesitated to leave his state this week in view of the disturbances which led him to alert the National Guard and close the state university at Albuquerque at least until Monday.

Students protesting the war in South Vietnam and Cambodia had planned two demonstrations around the conference site in Santa Fe.

"The White House was very much concerned about having governors absent for several days from their states," Cargo said. "Hopefully, by Monday, it

### Of Cambodian Campaign Weicker Qualifies Support —Daddario Questions Need

**GREENWICH, Conn. (AP)** — Congressman Lowell P. Weicker Jr., who is seeking the Republican nomination for U.S. Senator, voiced qualified support Thursday night of the Cambodian campaign.

Weicker assured a GOP gathering that he would not support any policy that would commit U.S. troops to defend the new regime in Cambodia.

Weicker said he believed it was necessary, as President Nixon said, to destroy Vietnamese command posts in Cambodia, and that he supported Nixon's efforts to achieve peace in Southeast Asia.

Meanwhile, in Washington, D.C., Democratic Congressman Emilio Q. Daddario questioned the need for the Cambodian campaign, saying it could not be worth the turmoil it has touched off in this country.

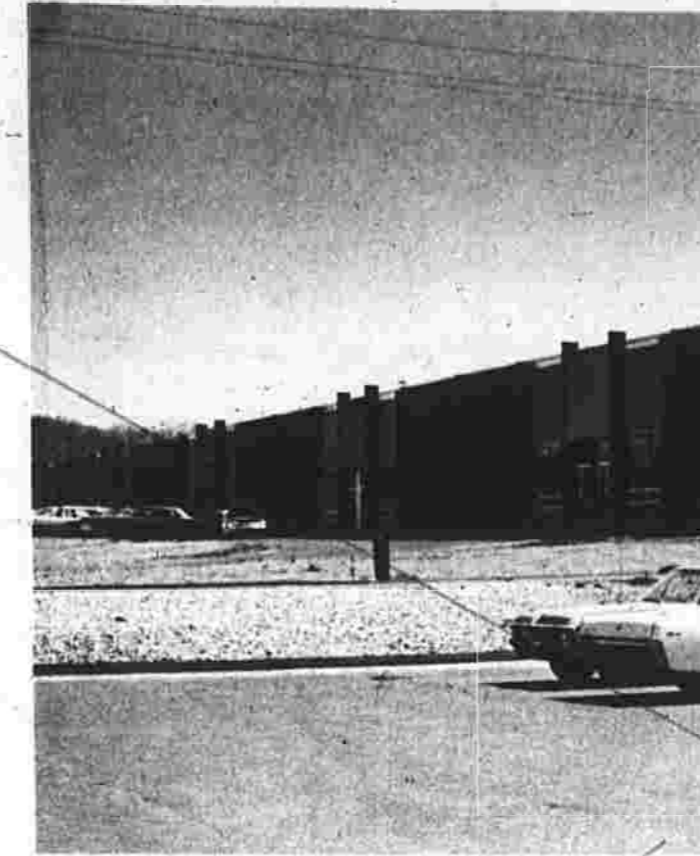

The first tenant in the park was the Dean Machine Products Inc., which occupies a 14,000 square foot building constructed for it when the company expanded from former quarters on Adams St.

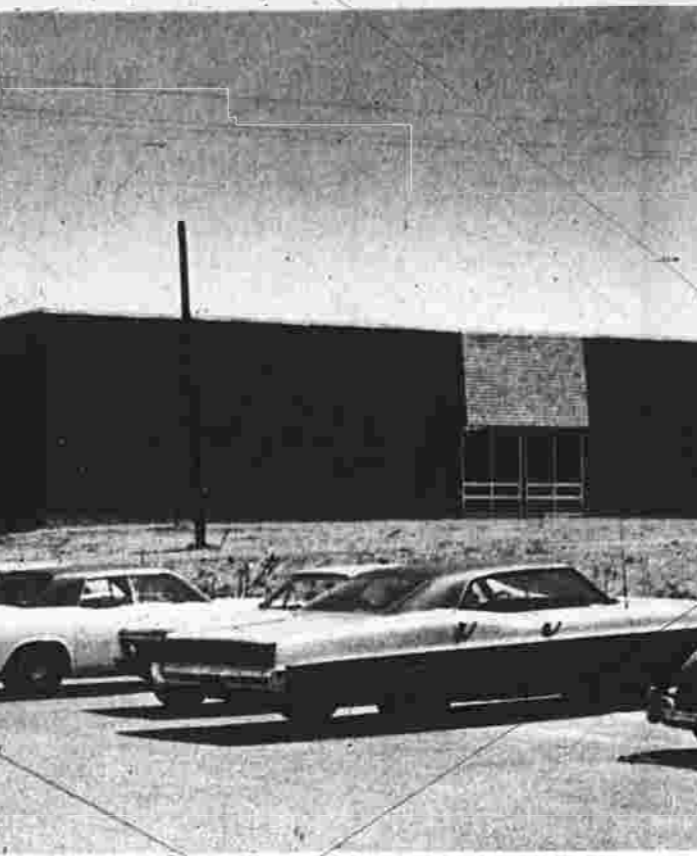
The Millers Falls Co. manufactures hand, cutting and electrical tools which are sold to hardware, building supply, plumbing, electrical and industrial markets.

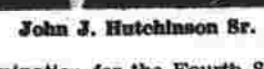

Still worse, it has been discovered by one of our most patriotic Southern newspapers that Earth Day, April 22, when we were supposed to be thinking pure thoughts about our environment, was also Lenin's birthday.

What that means is that every time a beer can was picked up or a tree planted anywhere in America that day, the Communists were laughing their heads off, because they knew we were really honoring Lenin, even if we didn't know it ourselves.

The moral seems clear. If we wanted to be safely American, we had better not fool around too much with any silly, sissyish crusades. It's a good thing to remember, there's nothing as American as dirt.

Can We Renew Our Compact? It is both extraordinary, and yet logical, that big news should be made by a letter written by Secretary of the Interior Walter Hickel to his President.

At one point in his letter, he said that he was not so much interested in the Cabinet as he was in the general things of life. His letter to his President was a plea for the Nixon Administration to adopt a gentler, more understanding attitude toward the youth of the nation, for fear that, otherwise, this youth might be driven more and more toward anarchy.

Secretary Hickel feared a loss of communication between this nation, as represented by its adult leadership, and its youth. But it was perhaps even more striking that, at the end of his letter, this member of the Nixon Cabinet made his final plea one for more communication between the members of that Cabinet and the President who had appointed them.

Why should a letter on such intangible things create such a stir, and be considered worthy of national headlines? The answer would seem to be that it goes straight to the heart-ache of our problem, which is not any one specific issue but rather our inability to reach communication with ourselves, remember and renew compact with ourselves, on any of the problems which face us.

On front and rear, we face problems which seem insoluble. We cannot handle a war to our satisfaction and our honor. We cannot resolve our domestic problems with our own children. And then we face each other across these insoluble problems and cannot even agree on our approach to them. We look at one another, and cannot even agree, vividly enough, that sense of belonging together in one society which used to be good enough to persuade us to close ranks over our differences of mood and method.

In our despair, we tend to grow cold and heartless and cynical, until we even begin to lose the capacity to be hurt by terrible things that happen among us. It is as if we needed to find our nation, and our society all over again, agreeing on fresh terms for our forward living together which will enable us to renew our American compact, our moral, human being compact with one another.

Keep Ecology Pure There is the beginning of shadow on the bright shining edges of the ecological crusade. Nobody has noticed supermarket customers bringing their own containers or choosing items in returnable containers or selecting products which have been rated more pollution-safe than others.

People have begun, on the other hand, to pay some attention to the possibility of a threat to their jobs, or to their business as usual, or demand that they change some life-long habit of their own. Furthermore, it has been discovered that the anti-pollution cause may, after all, be anti-American. The Daughters of the American Revolution, who ought to know about such things, have adopted a resolution saying that the pollution problem "is being distorted and exaggerated by emotional declamations and by intensive propaganda."

What kind of monster are we entrusting for moral and mental sustenance will in time find themselves as well nourished as a new baby on a diet of cold candy. At that point, they will return to the enduring values just as every generation before them has done. But unfortunately, there is a much smaller group of students who are committed to radical change through violent means. Some of these may be treatable; all will require very firm handling. ### Early Senate Vote Planned On Cambodia Fund Cutoff

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Democrats, with the blessing of Republican Leader Hugh Scott, have moved to bring an early Senate vote on a proposal aimed at cutting off funds for U.S. operations in Cambodia.

The bipartisan proposal, an amendment to a bill, could come before the Senate as soon as the end of next week with a vote the following week.

But even if the Senate adopts it, House action would be doubtful in view of that body's refusal Wednesday and Thursday to support any curb on the U.S. insertion into Cambodia.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield said Thursday approval of the bill by the Senate would mean "the imprint will have been made."

The amendment is sponsored by four members of the Foreign Relations Committee—Mansfield, Sen. George D. Aiken, R-Vt., John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky., and Frank Church, D-Idaho.

Five other senators, meanwhile, sent telegrams to more than 400 student leaders urging support of their efforts to cut off funds for the Southeast Asia war.

"Your letters, phone calls, petitions and personal visits to your senators and congressmen are urgently needed during the next three- or four-crisis weeks," the telegram said.

Signers of the telegram were Sen. George McGovern, D-S.D.; Mark Hatfield, R-Ore.; Alan Cranston, D-Calif.; Harold Hughes, D-Wash.; and Charles Goodell, R-N.Y.

Sen. Clifford P. Case, R-N.J., another supporter of the amendment, issued a statement urging "all who are concerned with this terribly important issue to work in Washington and throughout the country for the widest possible support for this amendment in the Senate."

Nixon, who holds a new conference at 10 p.m. tonight, spent the night at his Camp David retreat in nearby Maryland. But, before leaving, he conferred for more than an hour with the Citizens Committee for Freedom in Vietnam.

The President is reported to have told them that destruction of North Vietnamese bases in Cambodia would gain eight to 12 months of time before enemy troops could rebuild the bases for use in the Vietnam war.

Herb Klein, the administration's communications director, said later the aim of the Cambodian strategy was to give the United States 10 to 12 more months to train South Vietnamese to take over the fighting.

Klein spoke on ABC's Dick Cavett show.

A State Department spokesman said Thursday U.S. policy is not to become involved in Cambodian affairs. The spokesman, Robert J. McGovern, refused to discuss reports from Saigon that American boat crews had been assigned to operate up the Mekong River to Phnom Penh.

Nixon pledged to congressional committees that U.S. troops would strike no deeper than 217 miles into Cambodia. He said if they went further, he would seek congressional approval.

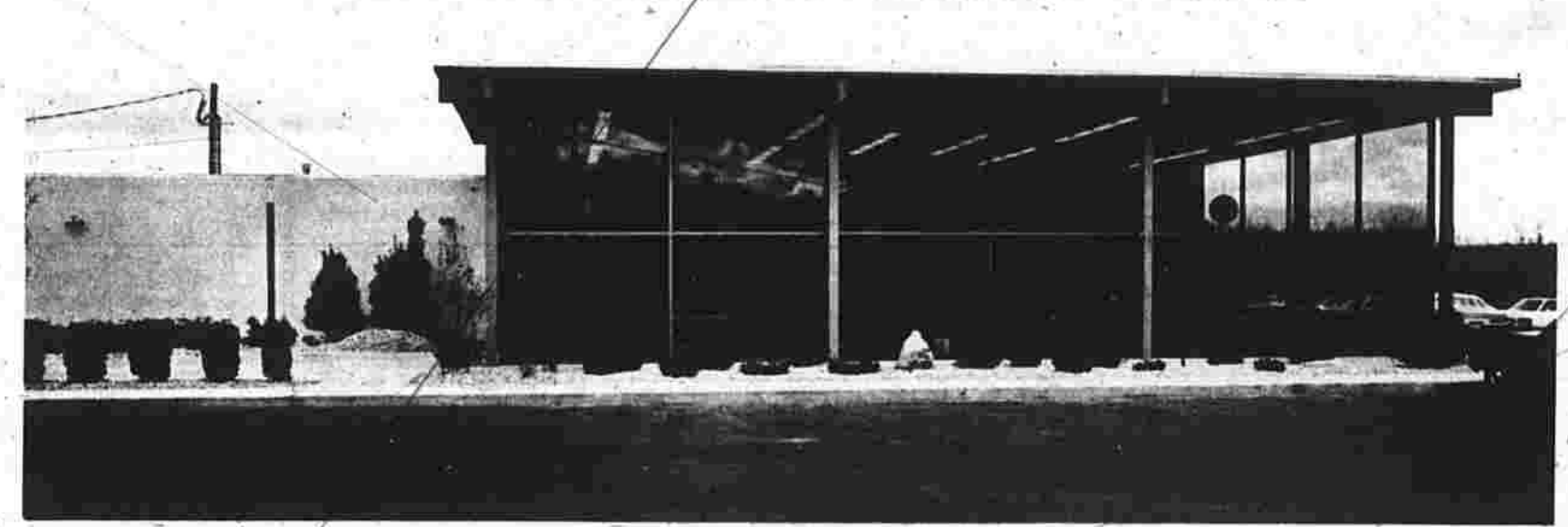

### Muskie, McGovern Ready Power Bases for '72

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two springs before the 1972 presidential primary season, Sen. Edmund S. Muskie of Maine and George S. McGovern of South Dakota are taking the first important steps likely to lead to races for the presidency.

Other hopefuls in the Senate include Sen. Birch E. Bayh of Indiana, who has stepped up his national speaking activities after leading the successful fight against President Nixon's two Supreme Court nominees; Sen. Fred R. Harris of Oklahoma, who resigned as the party's national chairman to speak out more on national issues; and Sen. Harold E. Hughes of Iowa, mentioned as a dark horse possibility.

Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota, who is retiring from the presidency in 1972, has dropped hints in recent months that he may undertake a second try for the presidency in 1972.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts insists he will serve out the six-year Senate term to which he seeks election this fall, although National Chairman Lawrence F. O'Brien says he must be considered among potential 1972 nominees.

Neither Muskie, 54, nor McGovern, 47, denies he is considering a 1972 race. "It's the kind of challenge that obviously I'm thinking about," Muskie said in a recent interview. "The impetus that took me into public life in the

Democratic meeting at Salt Lake City, McGovern to the Negro leaders who comprise an increasing share of the Democratic party in the South. "I think they feel more comfortable with either Humphrey or Muskie than they do with me," he conceded. But he said he expects some organization support in states such as California, New York and Michigan. McGovern, who will be drawing opposition from organization Democrats for his return activities, also has been criticized by some on the party's left. Some 1968 McCarthy backers resent his failure to back their man after Kennedy's assassination, and a recent speech in Wyoming for Sen. Gale McGee, a hawkish Democrat with a generally liberal domestic record, produced anti-McGovern ads in South Dakota from Wyoming war opponents.

Muskie, who has been in the South whose support was so important to Humphrey in 1968. McGovern faces distinct handicaps there for his more outspoken opposition to the Vietnam war since his activities in pushing party reform. Much opposition to the latter has centered in the South.

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Vietnamese in Cambodia Flock to Church for Safety

SAMKONG THOM, Cambodia (AP) — Blue smoke from cooking fires drifts slowly through the Catholic church. Vietnamese women hunker around the small flames, fanning the coals and trying to keep their children from going to sleep.

There are more than 300 Vietnamese living on the grounds here, all women and children. They are refugees from the war, refugees from both the Cambodian army and the Viet Cong.

Unlike thousands of other Vietnamese, they are not being held in camps. They can leave but they are afraid to go. They can only pray, but even that is not easy.

They are here in Samkong Thom, 30 miles southeast of Phnom Penh. It is full of refugees. They have come during the past four weeks from nearby villages that were threatened by the Viet Cong.
