Town Board, for Third Time Demands Cut in School Budget

Instating on an additional \$50,000 cut, the Board of Representatives last night returned the education budget for the third time.

The motion to ask for the \$50,000 cut was made following a recommendation by Mayor Frank McCoy. It came after the Board of Representatives further cut the motion, which asked for a \$70,000 cut.

The budget has been tossed back and forth between the two boards for several weeks now. The first time the representatives returned it was with a request that it be reduced by \$400,000.

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Rebel Flag Edict Ends For Police

ABERDEEN, Miss. (AP) - Mayor H. A. Miller has ordered an end to the requirement that city police officers wear Confederate flag shoulder patches on their uniforms.

Miller's action was a victory for two black policemen who objected, maintaining the patches represented a "badge of slavery."

Patrolmen William Walker and James Luckert earlier filed a suit in federal court seeking a court-ordered end to the practice.

Miller also said Rebel license plates would be removed from the square car used by the black officers.

References to Cambodia were deleted from the original version of the ordinance, which was drafted by George Romney, city secretary of housing and urban development, explained the Nixon administration's war policy.

Romney, in an appearance before the assembly Tuesday, rescinded President Nixon's pledge to withdraw all combat troops from Cambodia by June 30 and said the Cambodian action was necessary to insure the success of the Vietnamization policy.

Bolton Contractor, Town Review I-84 Routes

Russell Tong and Richard S. Bates, who is in charge of state parks in eastern Connecticut, spoke of one such area that had been ruled out.

Bates said his commission was against an interchange in Bolton and favored a route through the Notch, rather than the one proposed. A sketch of this, which was given to Tong, shows an elevated I-84 bridge by the State Highway Department.

The meeting was called by first selectman Richard Morris, who introduced Tong. "One of the first things the highway department asked McGuire to do was to find out from towns what they wanted," Tong said. "What do you want to do with the highway?" he asked the town officials.

Recommendations from town, based on a checklist sent out by McGuire, are supposed to come into the first June 1. Tong said a public hearing on the proposed "corridor" (the general path of the highway) will be held late in the month.

"We will do our best to make sure your goals are reflected in our recommendations to the state," Tong said.

The three proposed lines, published in The Herald about a month ago are labeled A, B and C. A is the most northerly and C the most southerly. Tong said that he himself couldn't tell exactly why the lines were where they are, and perhaps none of them will be used.

Officials questioned state and federal role in planning the interstate. Both review the plan. The federal government is also interested in linear parks along interstates, Tong said, but will not permit sewer lines along rights of way.

There will be a definite increase in property values, he pointed out. And if you're interested in industrial growth, the increase in activity acts as a spur.

Donald noted that when the highway is an actuality and Bolton is only 11 minutes by car from Hartford, the "green buffer areas" between East Hartford and Manchester, and Bolton, will no longer make a difference. Bolton cannot remain rural for long, whether it wants to or not, he said.

Stanley Bates, chairman of the Conservation Commission, began his presentation by saying "I represent the minority opinion." He expressed "mainly ecological and environmental concerns" for the Blackledge River and for Gay City State Park. He pointed out that swampland areas can be "put out of business when highways go through their watershed" because of silt from more rapid runoff after rain and from calcium chloride used on roads.

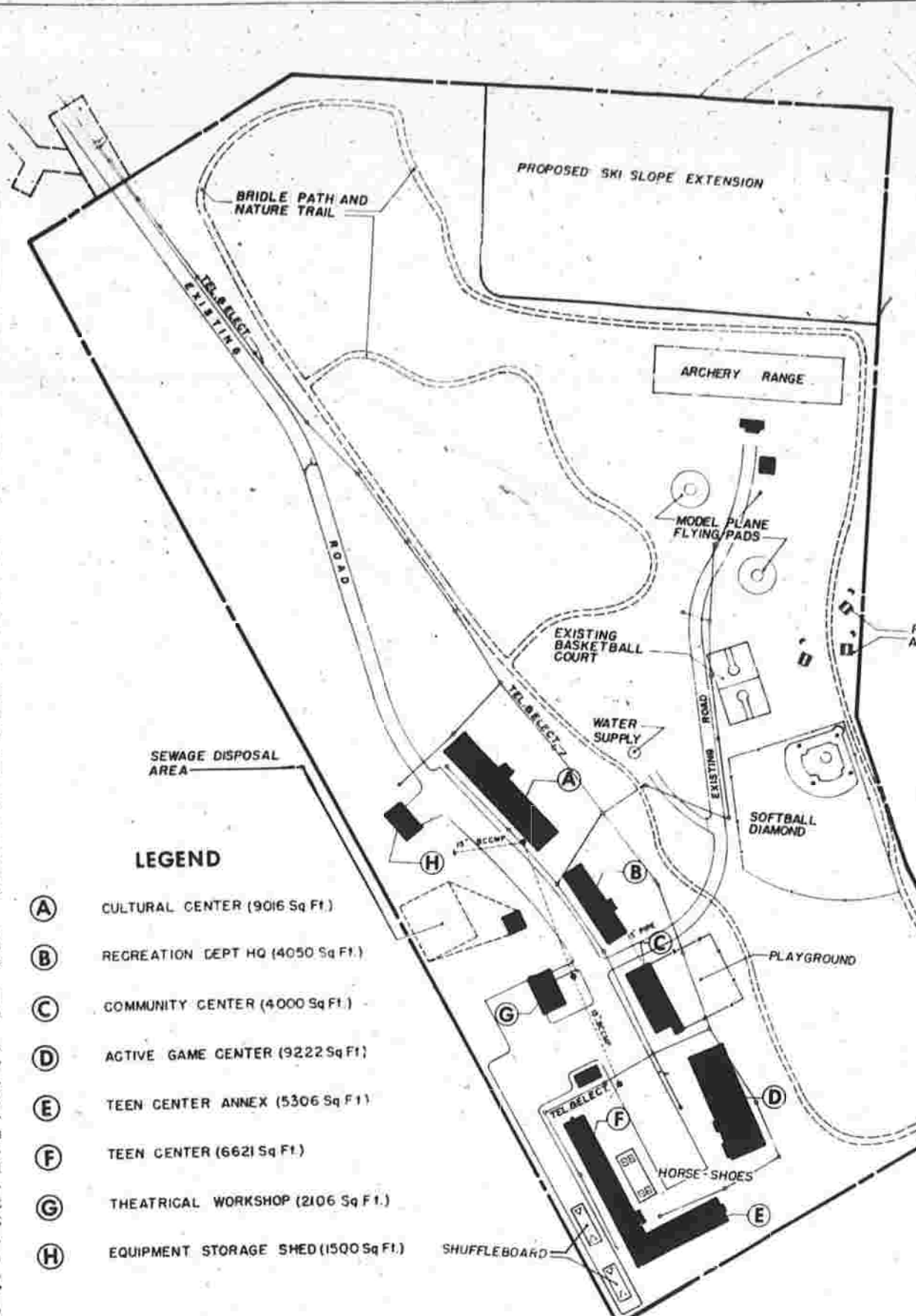

Youths Make Plans For Nike Site Use

About 40 young people and some adults meeting for a youth forum at the Nike Site last night made some basic decisions about what they would like to see done with two buildings proposed by the town for youth use.

The meeting was arranged by the Town Youth Commission.

The Nike Site, a some 39-acre tract formerly used by the military, was acquired by the town recently for use as a recreation and cultural center.

There are five major and three minor buildings included and two of the largest buildings, adjoined each other, have been reserved for youth.

Youth Commission Chairman Eric Simmonson had trouble keeping the group last night orderly and had to keep yelling "shut up" before the evening was over, the group had voted on a number of proposals.

Most agreed that they should leave the buildings pretty much as they are, with one being used as the new teen center, primarily for dances, and the other, which has about 14 small rooms, for more relaxing, conversational activities.

There were also some suggestions for pool and ping-pong tables.

Simmonson said that the Town Board of Directors is meeting June 2 to make some decisions about expenditures at the site and that young people should have some concrete proposals to make at that time.

Some members of the older generation in the audience emphasized their desire for activities such as camping at the site. During the break, a middle-aged man told and older, non-scout oriented teenager that non-scouts should not try to condescend to scouts.

Another woman during the break said she had come to "fight for the 13 and 14 year olds," who she said were not being represented by the town in attendance.

Still another woman, who was interrupted by a young person while talking about scouts and mite-biting, became annoyed. When she sat down, she turned organized a similar group during the break, and she said, "If they want us to support it, they've got to behave," and sweep out broken glass.

The Youth Commission had a recent letter to 73 local service groups, veterans organizations and other town organizations. Town Manager Robert Welch is expected to be heard at a meeting at the site on Monday evening, June 5, to break down what kind of discussion they can get in.

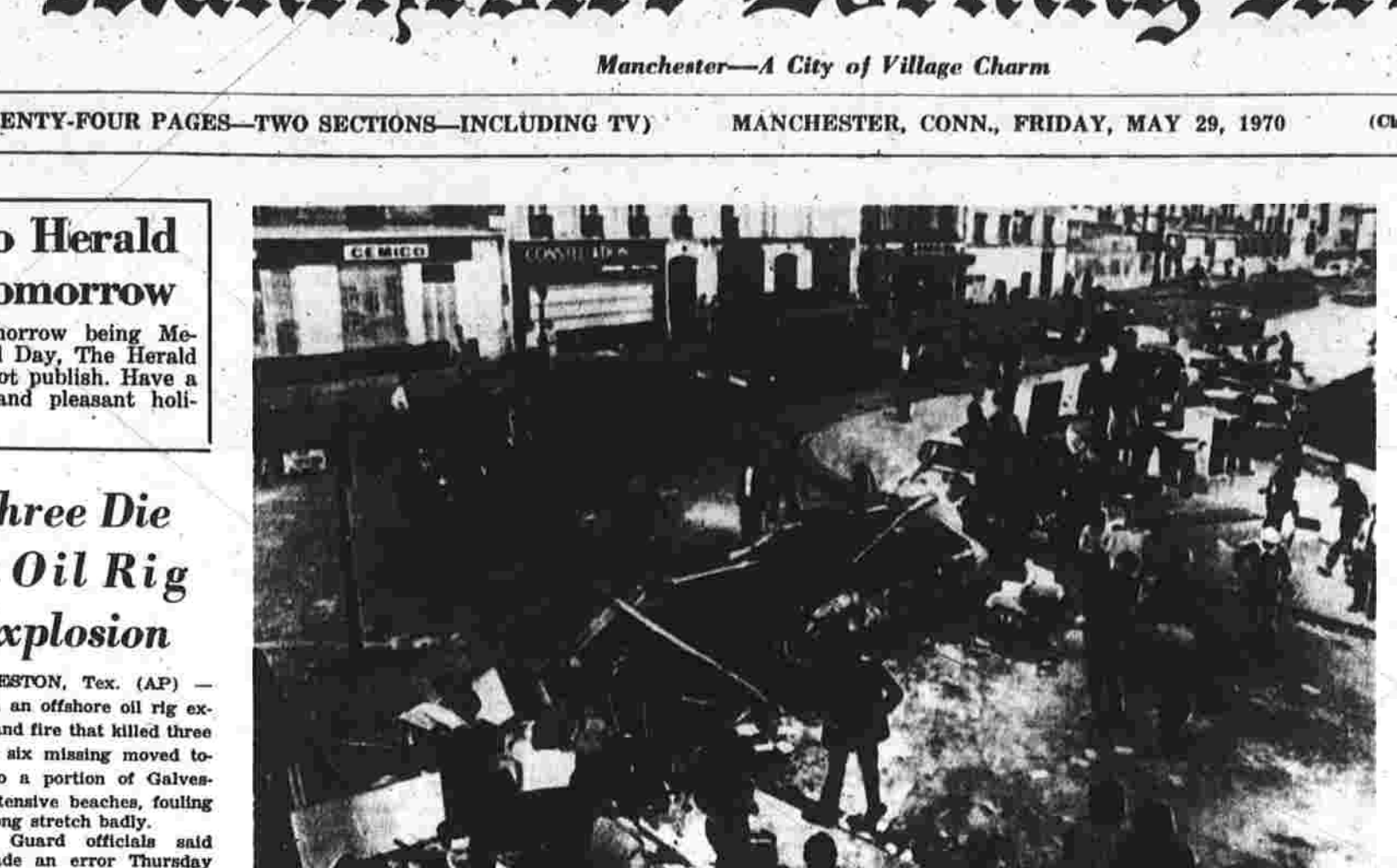
