**Surtax End
Seen Spark
Of Economy**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pay envelopes grow a little fatter next month when the income tax surcharge, imposed in Lyndon B. Johnson's last year as president to help pay for the Vietnam war, becomes history.

The tax, originally 10 per cent, was cut in half last January and dies altogether July 1, the day the government's new fiscal year begins. Its passing will cost \$4.5 billion in federal revenue.

But strapped as the Nixon administration is for cash, with budget deficits predicted for the old and the new fiscal years, the surtax's death may help provide something needed even more: Consumer buying to help end the near-recession before the November congressional elections.

As a result primarily of the surtax's political unpopularity, the Nixon administration is sticking currently to its plan to let it fade away.

But Nixon has pledged to ask Congress for new taxes next January if conditions don't improve. He already has requested a new tax on gasoline containing lead.

He is content for now to let a small deficit—estimated by his planners at \$1.5 billion for the year beginning in July—stand, mainly because his analysts say it is caused by a drop in corporate income taxes brought on by the business doldrums.

Nixon was pledged to end the surtax when he took office, but the need for money caused him to ask Congress for a full rate extension.

The cutback to 5 per cent was a compromise made possible by new money gained from eliminating a tax credit for businesses buying new production equipment.

Ending the surtax won't mean much to the average taxpayer—an extra 70 cents a week for four-member families with \$6,000 yearly incomes, \$1.70 if income is \$10,000—but taken together it will be a substantial economic stimulant matching the one that accompanied the January cut.

Dr. Harold C. Passer, the Commerce Department's chief economist, last week listed the operation of the surtax as one of the major factors behind official administration forecasts of a business recession. The surtax were smaller—\$4 billion from higher Social Security payments and \$3 billion from higher federal aid pay.

The cut will be especially welcome to taxpayers with incomes of \$5,000, because their withholding taxes actually rose in January despite the surtax reduction.

Last year, \$5.70 was deducted from weekly pay of \$96.15. Since then it has been \$6.10, an anomaly the Internal Revenue Service called a "quirk." It was caused, the IRS said, by bugs in the complex mathematical formulas needed to figure out the new low income allowance included in the Tax Reform Act Congress passed last December.

The Social Security laws already have provided a minor bonus for some higher-income taxpayers, and more will be affected as the year wears on.

The taxes are collected at the rate of 4.5 per cent until they reach a maximum of \$74.40 for the year. People making about \$17,800 reach the limit this week, and those making \$15,000 pay through July.

Anyone who makes \$7,800 or less pays all year.

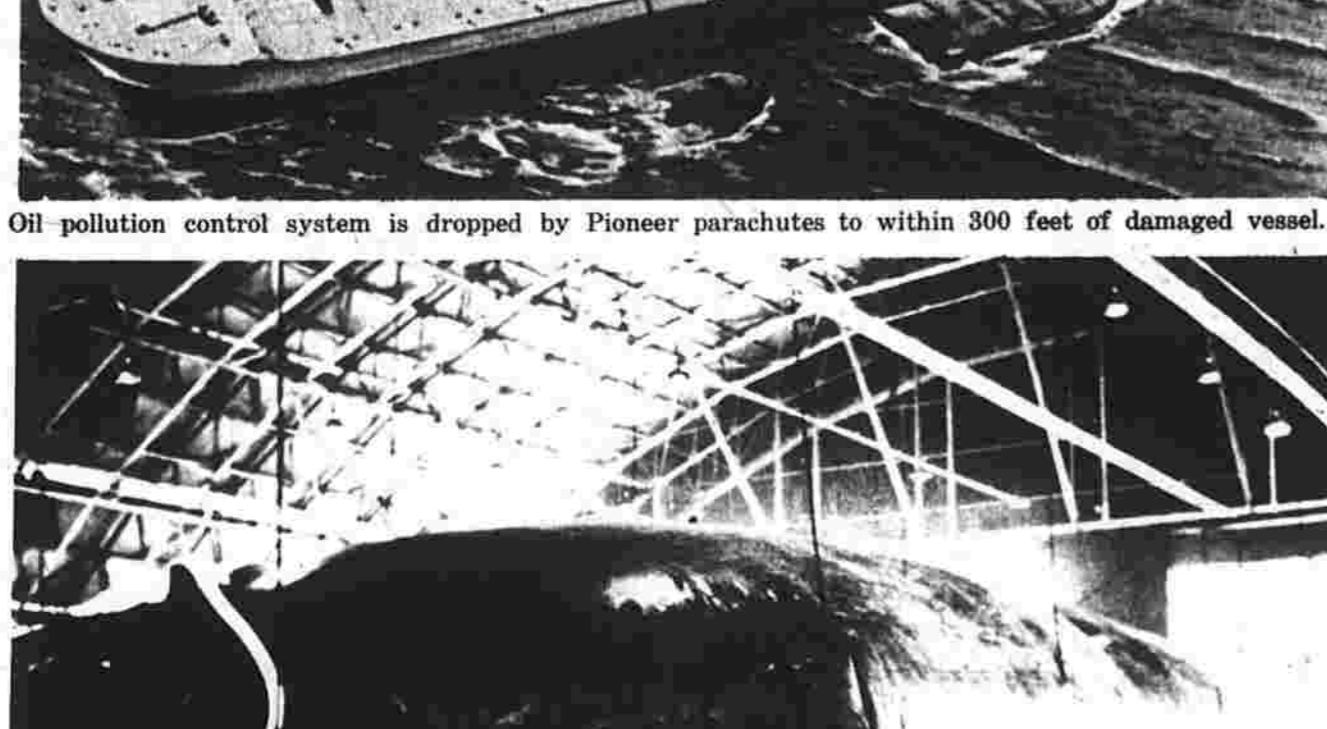

Arabs Kill School Girls In Israel

TEL AVIV (AP)—Arab guerrillas in Jordan stoned school girls and wounded 10 others, killing two Israeli school girls and wounding 10 others, according to a report here.

Foreign Minister Abba Eban said such guerrilla "murder" organizations are encouraged by "an impression of international apathy and indifference."

The Arab guerrillas fired two volleys of Soviet-made Katyusha rockets into the immigrant border town and two missiles hit a one-story religious school, leaving one girl dead and 11 persons wounded, seven of them school girls, the Israeli command said.

Earlier a rocket crashed into a house, killing a 9-year-old girl. Three other school girls and a woman were wounded.

The attack came two days after the Jordan River community of 12,500 was hit by Arab gunners. The latest shooting turned the school into a smoldering wreck of twisted metal.

Witnesses said Israeli planes struck the suspected launching areas in Jordan, encountering antiaircraft fire. Israeli jets also struck a Jordanian village. Eban, in his statement issued here, said: "Every government has a religious leader, newspaper, or public man who raises an unequalled and vehement voice against these outrages and supports them, will contribute to the struggle against the moral decadence in which children of Israel lose their lives and their kind loses its human 'ignity.'"

Eban claimed today his forces inflicted 32 Israeli casualties in an artillery engagement in the Golan Heights, the third heaviest officially reported in the area within 24 hours. No Syrian losses were reported.

A Jordanian army spokesman said Jordanian and Israeli troops fought a two-hour artillery duel in the northern Jordan Valley today after the Israelis opened fire on troops in Manshiya, Tel el Sukhan and Urd el Khirwa.

Rockets also struck the settlement of Moza Ham, two miles from Beit Eban, but no casualties were reported.

A bomb exploded in Jerusalem early today, a few hours before the start of the 33rd anniversary of the third anniversary of Israel's conquest of the Arab sector. There were no casualties in the blast.

Although the third anniversary does not come under the Gregorian calendar used by most other nations, the Jewish calendar used by Israel puts the date today.

Explosives also were set off on two popular Israeli streets but again there were no casualties.

Israeli planes bombed Egyptian military targets in the Suez Canal area today with intermittent strikes lasting about 45 minutes. The military command said all planes returned safely. In five similar attacks Tuesday, Israeli missiles pounded Egyptian canal positions for 11 hours.

In Cairo, a missile spokesman claimed that one Israeli Skyhawk was downed in the raids. He said five Egyptian tanks were killed and five wounded.

The Israelis have intensified their attacks against Egyptian positions on the canal, trying to block placement of Soviet and Ukrainian missiles there. Air missions into Egypt this week were halted from Tuesday.

George C. Wallace has won his bid to recapture Alabama's governorship in the likely prelude to another presidential race in 1972 and Jack Unruh claimed the Democratic nomination to run against Gov. Ronald Reagan of California.

Wallace, who overcame a narrow first primary loss, promptly celebrated his victory in Tuesday's Democratic runoff over incumbent Albert B. Brewer by demanding President Nixon "virtually complete returns the former governor and the state's Democratic Party to the White House."

Unruh, who won the runoff, said he would lead a "strong, unified, and energetic" administration.

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Rescue Effort Encumbered In the Andes

LIMA, Peru (AP)—Bad weather and blocked roads today hampered efforts to rescue 11 Peruvian mountaineers who were trapped in a snow-capped mountain range in the Peruvian Andes.

The towns of Yungay, Caraz and Huancayo in the canyon were almost totally destroyed in the earthquake which rumbled through half of Peru Sunday. Government officials feared as many as 30,000 people were killed, but broken communications still prevented anything like an accurate tally of casualties.

In Yungay, about 250 miles north of Lima, only 2,500 residents reportedly survived out of the population of 20,000. A high school teacher said he had seen 10 bodies in the narrow streets of the Andean village and towns were killed by falling rocks and debris from the canyon walls. A surging tide of water from Lake Llanganuco added to the destruction.

The air force managed to drop a squad of 34 rescue workers Tuesday at Yungay at the south entrance of the gorge. It followed up with several more rescue parties.

Senate Hands Nixon A Setback on War
