

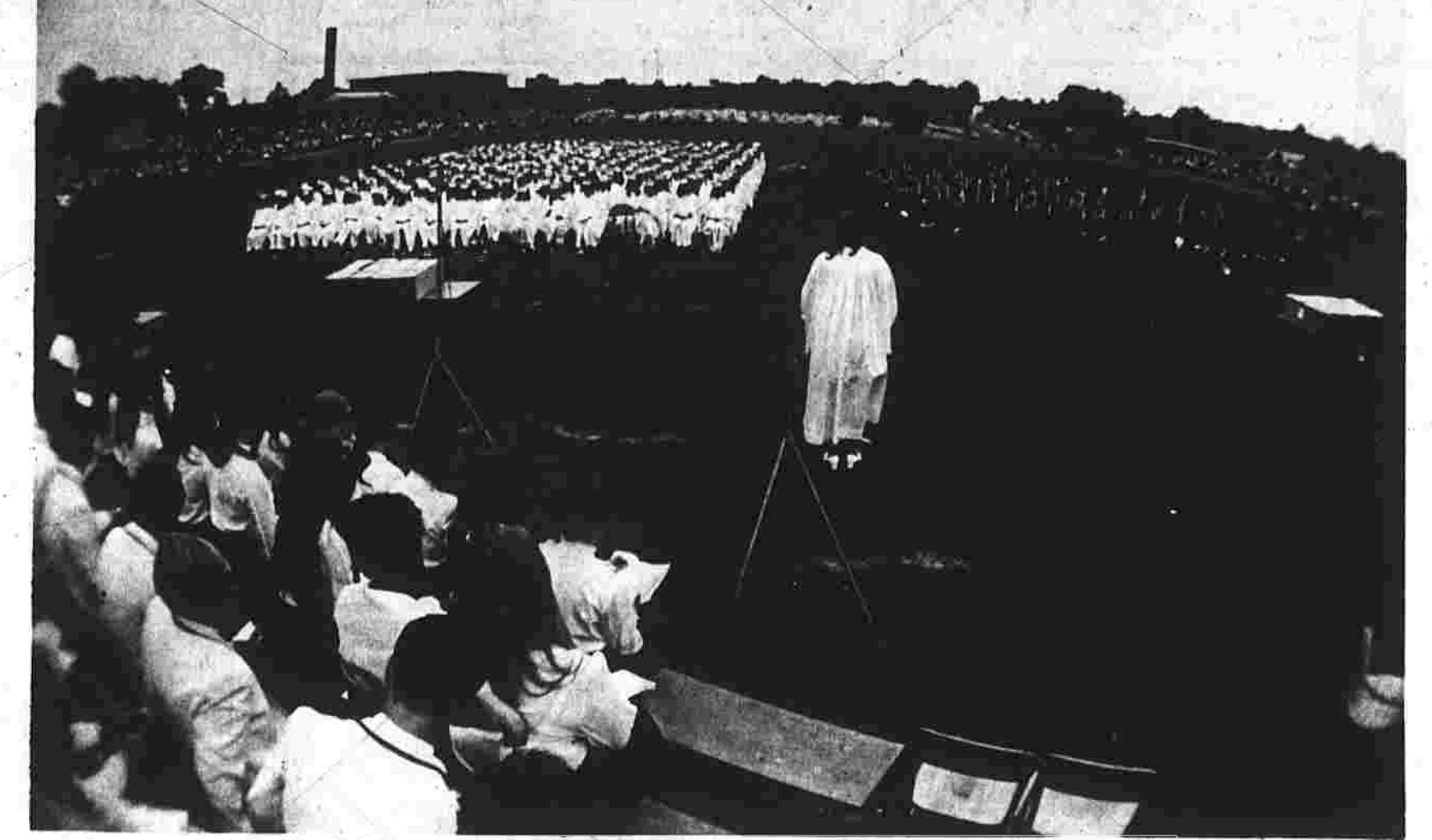

**DDT's 31 Years**

One of our large chemical concerns announces that it is halting its production of DDT. Thus averting court tests in which several conservation organizations have been seeking to restrict its operations.

We are probably not many months away from a total prohibition of the use of DDT anywhere in this country. Banning its use in the rest of the world will take longer, because there are situations in which, for all its ineradicable perils to the ecology, it still seems by far the most efficient weapon against vermin and disease in areas of the world where human health weighs the most single important battlefield of the time.

This present news makes it a shocking thing, now, to remember back to the days when DDT was discovered, just in time to perform its precious miracles for the soldiers of World War II, who were doused and deloused in it as if it were the most benevolent and harmless of elements.

And one remembers, too, the innocent joy with which the new miracle dust was introduced to our gardens, the final answer to the gardener's prayer, and used for many seasons before anybody really began to worry about residue, either on produce or in the soil or in the fish or in the birds.

From the time that Swiss chemist announced it from his laboratory in 1899 until this 1970 closing of one of its chief producing plants in the United States is a span of 31 years, which is a long time to have on the loose an agent which may have been doing permanent damage far in excess of its miraculous temporary good.

We think and hope a better guard is being kept, these days, against the possible dangers inside our nurseries. There had better be a guard, for some kinds of ecological damage cannot be undone.

**For Our Own Best Welfare**

There is a certain kind of statement our good President cannot resist, like "The American economy is the strongest in the world."

And there is an unfortunate little smudge he has developed, which is supposed to be one of strong, gentle reassurance to his people.

In addition to these petty and relatively unimportant oratorical mannerisms, the speech on the nation's economic situation Wednesday noon probably is vulnerable, in some of its detail, to all kinds of sophisticated attack from professional economists in their own esoteric lingo.

Against such possible flaws, we buy the main import of the address, and the purposes to which it adhered.

This is the first time, that we recall, that President Nixon has put out on the line what has for some time been apparent in his actual acts and policies.

Perhaps he had not previously taken credit for dealing "with the problem of a nation in transition from a wartime economy to a peacetime economy" because he did not wish to rush into responsibility for the inevitable hardship involved in any such process.

But it has for some months been obvious, from the way particular defense industries were being hit, that the Nixon administration has been seriously shifting its spending emphasis away from the purposes of war toward those of peace, and that it has actually begun, therefore, that process of trying to negotiate the economic transition which other administrations have sometimes talked about, but always delayed actual action until new war developed, to authorize new war-style prosperity.

**The Price Goes Up**

There is still plenty of euphoria around this city on the Potsdam about the result of the fray into Cambodia. The official line is that the bag of enemy weapons was splendid and means more time for Vietnamization.

Less is said about the other side of the coin, for the obvious reason that it is against Sorensen to run for the Senate nomination in Tuesday's New York Democratic primary except the unlikely presence of Mario Biaggi, New York City's most decorated except who is now a Congressman from the Bronx.

Sorensen's unfulfilled date with the television camera was intended to publicize his anti-communist program. Early that morning he had telephoned Biaggi, a hard-line law-and-order Democrat (whose re-election campaign has Conservative party backing) and asked him to share the press conference.

But the all-important TV men never did show, so Sorensen took off down Stebbins Avenue on a walking tour and the Congressman went home.

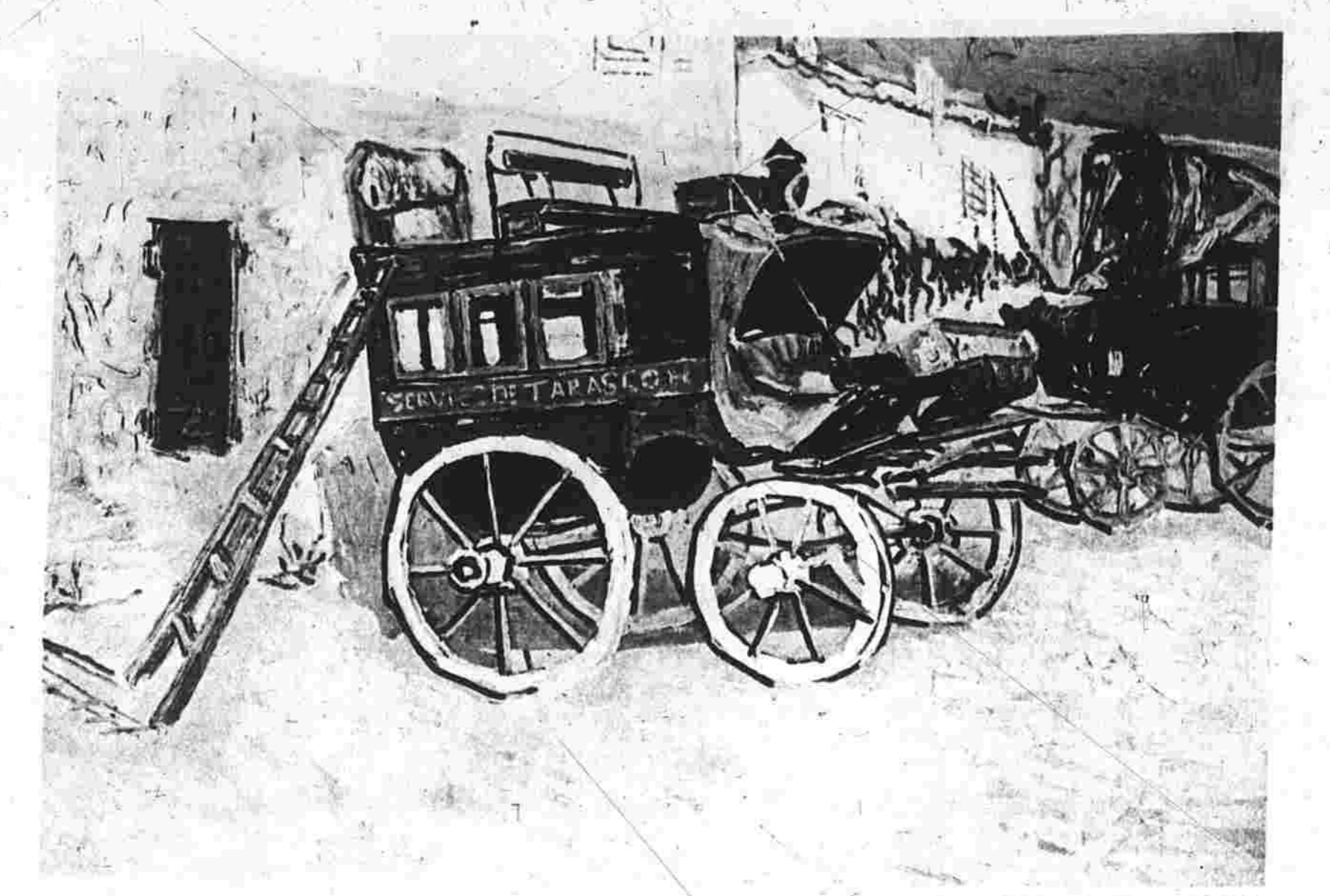
The dismal incident last week reveals much about the problems of Ted Sorensen, John F. Kennedy's longtime aide who is campaigning on the slogan: "President Kennedy trusted me, so can you." Wrapping himself in the mantle of JFK seems to be of no more value to Sorensen than it has been to other Kennedy White House aides.

Shortly after the Democratic party's endorsing convention last April, Sorensen was riding high. He won the endorsement and talked bravely about raising a \$2 million kitty for the primary and another \$2 million kitty for the general election.

From that moment on, however, he has made one questionable decision after another, and neither money nor campaign volunteers have showed up in the numbers expected. Thus, Sorensen has been totally unable to connect with Richard Ottinger's personal force in buying television time, leaving him dependent on the whims of television's news editors.

Sorensen's most costly mistake was to question the loyalty of Rep. Richard D. (Max) McCarthy's petitions to get his name on the June 23 primary ballot, a shot that boomeranged on Sorensen when the courts ruled McCarthy's petitions were in order.

Before McCarthy's late entry into the Senatorial primary, Sorensen had campaigned hard in update Erie County (Buffalo) and won the endorsement of Erie's powerful county leader, Joe Crangie, and the county Democratic committee. But his legal move against McCarthy—after Erie County had withdrawn the endorsement from Sorensen to McCarthy—angered McCarthy's friends and cost Sorensen vital party support. Party leaders in Albany have not formally endorsed McCarthy, but there, too, Sorensen's error.

**Impediment or Pardon?**

One of the major problems of modern society is the soaring crime rate. The high incidence of crime makes us increasingly conscious of the criminal and of the problem which he poses to society in the streets.

If the criminal is imprisoned, society is burdened with his support. If the criminal is pardoned and allowed to go free, the demands of justice remain unfulfilled. Pardon should be offered sparingly, and only for the best of reasons.

In the court of God's justice, we stand before the bar of justice as guilty sinners. And yet God offers pardon to all of us. This pardon is a full pardon. The people who accept it will be treated by God as if they were never guilty, if they had never sinned.

Although God Himself offers the pardon to man, His justice is satisfied. The crime does not go unpunished. Someone else has offered to accept the guilt and to pay the penalty for the sin which man has committed. Someone else has offered to satisfy the demands of God's justice. God, the Great Judge, has accepted the offer, and is extending the pardon to man. If he accepts it, man can go free.

It is Christ who accepted the punishment for our sins, "Christ died for the ungodly" (Romans 5:8). He procured God's pardon for us. But the pardon is of no value if we refuse to accept it.

We would be astounded if a criminal refused to accept a pardon offered by the governor of a state. How much more astounded it is that guilty people reject the pardon for their sins which is offered to them in Christ.

**To Open Suburbs**

The Nixon Administration last week asked Congress for authority to try to force a breaking of local zoning laws and building codes which, it says, prevent the building of low-cost housing in suburban areas.

George Romney, Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, emphasized the social goals of the proposal: "Adoption of this provision is a necessary first step in ending the onerous trend toward stratification of our society by race and income," he said.

This is the new conventional wisdom. The academic experts in sociology and city planning have been moving in this direction for some time, and they have considerable influence in the White House, thanks to Presidential Counselor Daniel P. Moynihan.

Even Vice President Spiro Agnew is part of the convention. In very strong terms, which caused no little anguish among some GOP political planners, he told the national alliance of businessmen in March that the white suburbs of America had to start supplying jobs and housing for the poor, or nation would become intolerably divided. He took his argument from a memorandum sent to him by two fairly radical social analysts.

The conventional wisdom is not often right in social planning, even when we can decide, perhaps, what we want, effective pre-planning of results eludes us. Actually, there are some fundamental practical reasons for the Romney proposal. No matter how they have looked at the problem of supplying housing in large volume, the top planners at HUD have concluded that no adequate national housing scheme can be devised unless the mass of local building codes and zoning laws, entrenched in law, is broken down.

Thus, it is not insignificant that Romney called his proposal this week a "first step." Politically, it is an ambitious step, especially in an election year.

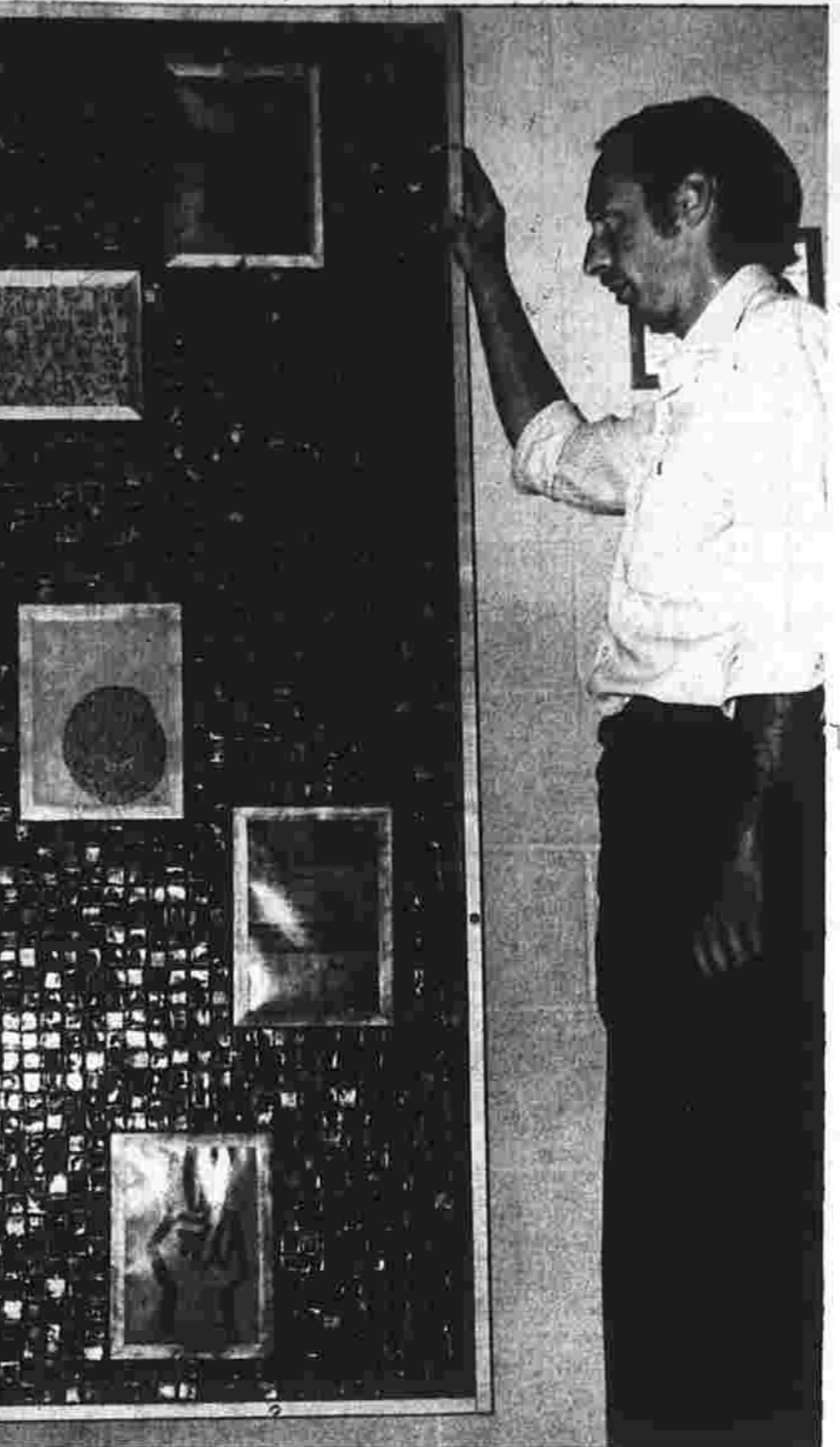

On the record, in the fact, then, it is Richard Milhaus Nixon, believe it or not, who, with his advisors, has been trying to move this country toward peace not only in the field but in the domestic economy.

It can be pointed out that the problem involved is a problem which has not been solved successfully since 1945, but one that has to be solved, some day, if we are not to continue to depend upon war as the life blood for our economy.

As to the state of the Nixon Administration's effort, the President himself admitted, Wednesday, that the strains and bumps and hardships encountered have been a little more severe than had been hoped.

But his main decision was to keep on with the existing effort to negotiate the transition, to ballast the balloon of inflation without crashing it, or, in his own analogy, to draw into the dock without sinking the boat.

With such a main goal before us, — one that has never yet been smoothly achieved, and one that hasn't been achieved ever in the last quarter century—even the hardships involved make some sense, and can be sustained.

And it has to be pointed out that, if the navigation is to be correct, this moment, right now, should be the moment in which the water is choppiest, the helm most uncertain, and the way that the passengers happen to lean most important.

We ought to lean, as the President asked, toward that restraint in our immediate demand for our particular selves, wherever we happened to be located in the economic picture, which will increase the chance of a smooth berthing for everybody. The President's leadership on this front deserves respect and support for what should be less easy in the future. The whole of Cambodia can be their future "sanctuary."
